<p><i>Achillea millefolium</i></p> 	<p>Yarrow Easy, will spread at a reasonable rate. About 1" high, white flowers. Wants some water. Perennial flower</p>	0
<p><i>Achnatherum speciosum</i></p> 	<p>Desert needlegrass A low growing bunchgrass about 1 foot tall. Reseeds itself easily and spreads. The silvery seeds in June backlit by afternoon sun are beautiful. It looks good in groups and you will have a lot of them in a few years with its reseeding qualities.</p>	84 supercells
<p><i>Anemopsis californica</i></p> 	<p>Yerba mansa A beautiful white coneflower. Likes water so plant near a stream or water a lot. Spreads by rhizomes. Dies back in fall but the big fleshy leaves come back in the spring. The dry leaves have a lovely odor.</p>	6 gallons 6 tree pots
<p><i>Angelica lineariloba</i></p> 	<p>Soda Straw Parts of this plant are poisonous. It flowers in mid summer and grows to be 24-48" tall. Attracts bees, butterflies and birds. It needs full to partial sun and regular water, but don't overwater.</p>	19 gallons
<p><i>Apocynum cannabinum</i></p> 	<p>Indian Hemp can get to be 3 feet tall. Grows in open wooded areas, slopes and likes moist areas. Flowers in mid summer. Spreads by rhizomes so can become invasive. All parts of this plant are poisonous to livestock. Native Americans use the bark to make cordage.</p>	3 gallons
<p><i>Aquilegia formosa</i></p> 	<p>Red columbine Pretty-red/yellow flowers once in spring/early summer. A perennial flower. Part to full shade. Wants water-either a watered garden or by a creek. Will reseed, but not too weedy. About 1-2' tall. This will bloom its second year</p>	55 cups







<p><i>Arabis pulchra</i></p> 	<p>Beautiful rockcress A 3 foot tall perennial with purple flowers. It likes full sun. It is a lot like wallflower but with purple flowers.</p>	<p>8 gallons 6 cups</p>
<p><i>Artemisia tridentata</i></p> 	<p>Sage An evergray shrub 4 feet tall and wide. Its form is stately and it stands out in a landscaping situation. It is a nitrogen fixing plant. Needs full sun and good drainage, very drought tolerant.</p>	<p>15 tree pots</p>
<p><i>Asclepias speciosa</i></p> 	<p>Broad leaf milkweed Easy and invasive! Don't plant this where you don't want it to spread. However very pretty in bloom and into the fall and winter. The spent seed-pods are very decorative on the dried plant in the fall. Needs very little water, the more water, the faster it spreads. Full sun. About 3' tall and as wide as you let it spread. Do not plant this near a watered area or it will take over. Butterflies like it.</p>	<p>2 gallons 3 tree pots</p>

<p><i>Atriplex canescens</i></p> 	<p>Four-wing salt bush A shrub that grows to 5 feet. Needs full sun and well-drained soil. It is a good bird plant. If you are planting in rabbit or deer habitat cage the plant until it is 3-4 ft. high.</p>	<p>0</p>
<p><i>Betula occidentalis</i></p> 	<p>Water birch Likes moist situations. Grows to 20 feet, with many trunks. Has beautiful fall foliage and smooth reddish bark.</p>	<p>15 tree pots 4 cups</p>
<p><i>Calystegia longipes</i></p> 	<p>Desert morning glory A vine that likes dry, rocky places. It has showy flowers that are cream to pale pink. Grows to about 1 foot high and wants full sun.</p>	<p>10 cups</p>
<p><i>Castilleja angustifolia</i></p> 	<p>Indian paintbrush</p>	<p>4 cups 2 with Ephedra 16 with Ericameria</p>
<p><i>Ceanothus greggi</i></p> 	<p>Desert ceanothus</p>	<p>0</p>







<p><i>Ceanothus leucodermis</i></p> 	<p>Chaparral Whitethorn A shrub that grows 8 ft. tall and 6 ft. wide. It has white bark and azure blue flowers, which cover the plant in spring. Plant in full sun and well drained soil. Water in spring and fall but not in summer!</p>	<p>0</p>
<p><i>Cercocarpus ledifolius</i></p> 	<p>Mountain mahogany Extremely slow going evergreen that will eventually get quite large so give it room. It will end up being a small tree that is as wide as it is tall. Easy care, water monthly on the valley floor. Likes well drained soil. Full sun to part shade. Needs no pruning and very little care. A great evergreen for around here</p>	<p>22 gallons 30 super cells</p>
<p><i>Chamaebatiaria millefolium</i></p> 	<p>Fern bush Has an aromatic herbage and a pretty white flower. Likes full sun and good drainage.</p>	<p>26 gallons</p>
<p><i>Chilopsis linearis</i></p> 	<p>Desert willow is a large deciduous tree. Can grow to 20 feet- so give it room. Its leaves look like a willow and the flowers like an azalea. It is the last tree to leaf out but will flower until frost. Humming birds love it.</p>	<p>28 gallons</p>
<p><i>Cirsium andersonii</i></p> 	<p>Rose thistle A three foot high plant that blooms in late July and early August. Very prickly. Grows in the damp areas of mixed conifer forest and sagebrush steppe up to 10,000 feet. Hummingbirds, butterflies and bees are frequent visitors.</p>	<p>13 gallons</p>
<p><i>Clematis ligusticifolia</i></p> 	<p>Virgin's bower Likes full sun and regular water. It spreads along the roots so gets a little "weedy" but looks nice on a fence or arbor.</p>	<p>8 gallons 59 cups</p>







<p><i>Cryptantha confertiflora</i></p> 	<p>Golden forget-me-not Has beautiful yellow flowers, blooms in June. Likes dry rocky soils and full sun.</p>	<p>29 cups 12 gallons</p>
<p><i>Datura wrightii</i></p> 	<p>Jimson weed Gets really big, 2 feet high by 2 feet wide by 3 feet long. Dies back completely in the fall. Likes the alkali soil of the valley floor and needs very little water. The seeds are poisonous.</p>	<p>5 gallons 9 cups</p>
<p><i>Delphinium parishii</i></p> 	<p>Desert larkspur Cardinal blue flower found in dry rocky areas. Likes full sun and well drained soil.</p>	<p>0</p>
<p><i>Encelia actoni</i></p> 	<p>Bush sunflower Beautiful round shaped bush with long stemmed flowers. They like full blazing sun. and very well drained soil. A nice perennial I think they may be a short lived plant that reseeds itself easily.</p>	<p>80 tree pots</p>
<p><i>Ephedra nevadensis</i></p> 	<p>Nevada ephedra A bluer green than Epedra veridis. If you get the female plant it can have lots of small yellow flowers in the spring but this plant is used for its evergreen vertical foliage. I see it as the juniper for the Eastside.</p>	<p>9 gallons 2 with paintbrush</p>
<p><i>Ephedra viridis</i></p> 	<p>Green ephedra A beautiful bush with a strong vertical evergreen presence. A nice background plant for the garden. Likes full sun and well drained soil.</p>	<p>4 gallons</p>







<p><i>Ericameria cooperi</i></p> 	<p>Cooper's Goldbush A nice shaped domed bush that grows about a foot high. In June it is covered with little yellow flowers. Likes full sun and well drained soil.</p>	<p>8 gallons, 2 with paintbrush 36 cups 16with paintbrush</p>
<p><i>Eriogonum elatum</i></p> 	<p>Tall buckwheat This plant has low growing wide leaves but throws up a 3 foot flower stalk that will have bunches of small white flowers tpical to buckwheats. It is very hardy. Likes full sun and well drained soil.</p>	<p>17 gallons</p>
<p><i>Eriogonum fasciculatum</i></p> 	<p>California buckwheat A small shrub with white flowers. Likes well drained soil and very little water if any. Loves the heat and gravel. Its flowers, leaves and seeds are all used by butterflies and small birds. White flowers come on in late spring, gradually turn pink in summer, then rust colored in fall. The rusty flowers commonly stay on until the next spring.</p>	<p>0</p>
<p><i>Eriogonum nudum</i></p>  <p>Heith McAllister, 2004</p>	<p>Nude buckwheat A slender spike of white, pink or yellow flowers. This plant has a 3 inch(6 cm.) base of small leaves from which it grows up into a 3 to 6 foot stem with small flower clusters near the top. It attracts bees, Needs full sun and good drainage.</p>	<p>0</p>
<p><i>Eriogonum umbelatum</i></p> 	<p>Sulphur buckwheat Has yellow flowers, grey foliage. Sulphur Buckwheat needs good drainage to the point of living in gravel. It is very drought tolerant but best with a little water.</p>	<p>10 gallons 38 cups</p>
<p><i>Eriogonum wrightii</i></p>  <p>Dan Shumman, 2011</p>	<p>Wrights buckwheat Is a low growing form with slender pale pink flowers from higher elevations. The buckwheats are very important butterfly plants</p>	<p>11 gallons 8 cups</p>







<p><i>Forestiera pubescens</i></p> 	<p>Desert Olive A beautiful tree that can grow to 10 feet. It has attractive fruit that the birds like. It likes to grow along the stream banks and canyons in the valley. Likes full sun and good drainage.</p>	<p>0</p>
<p><i>Grayia spinosa</i></p> 	<p>Spiney hopsage</p>	<p>0</p>
<p><i>Helianthus nuttallii</i></p> 	<p>Nuttall's sunflower A beautiful and very tall flower - about 8 foot stalks. Has yellow flowers that bloom in August. It likes full sun and needs occasional deep watering.</p>	<p>7 tree pots</p>
<p><i>Hesperostipa comata</i></p>  <p>Robert Sivinski photo</p>	<p>Needle and thread grass</p>	<p>69 supercells 5 gallons</p>
<p><i>Krascheninnikovia lanata</i></p> 	<p>Winterfat This has an unexciting flower but when in full bloom gives the illusion that it is glowing. It is a beautiful dome shaped bush. It makes a nice gray-green backdrop in your garden. An important graze plant for wildlife in the winter.</p>	<p>32 tree pots</p>
<p><i>Lepidium fremontii</i></p> 	<p>Desert alyssum Is an one foot perennial. It needs perfect drainage and full sun. The fragrant white flowers are on a plant that resembles a large garden alyssum. Desert Alyssum an excellent border plant for desert gardens. Full sun, good drainage; summer dormant.</p>	<p>0</p>







<p><i>Leymus cinereus</i></p> 	<p>Great basin wild rye One of the easiest of the desert grasses to grow. Does well with regular watering or less. Likes well drained soil and full sun. The first grass to get growing in spring. Grows to 3 feet tall. Nice golden seeds in fall. Doesn't seem to self seed itself all over the yard.</p>	<p>16 tree pots 90 supercells</p>
<p><i>Linum lewisii</i></p> 	<p>Blue flax Grows about a foot high. Blooms in early June. The flowers open in the morning. It will reseed itself and spread. Will tolerate watering.</p>	<p>60 cups</p>
<p><i>Lupinus argenteus</i></p> 	<p>Silver lupine A little tricky, but worth it. If it lives, it will be around for years as a perennial. Gorgeous purple/white flower spikes in spring. Well drained soil and some water, but too much will rot it. Grows in the montane forest and sage scrub.</p>	<p>0</p>
<p><i>Lupinus excubitus</i></p> 	<p>Inyo bush lupine A little tricky, but worth it. If it lives, it will be around for years as a perennial. Gorgeous purple/white flower spikes in spring. Well drained soil and some water, but too much will rot it. Balance</p>	<p>0</p>
<p><i>Malacothamnus fremontii</i></p> 	<p>Bush mallow Flowers are pink on very fuzzy foliage. Spreads by suckers. Flower spikes are about 2-3 feet tall. Likes full sun, well drained soil.</p>	<p>13 gallons</p>
<p><i>Mirabilis alipes</i></p> 	<p>Rose four-o'clock</p>	<p>1 cup</p>

<p><i>Monardella linoides</i></p> 	<p>Flax leaf mountain balm Flaxleaf Monardella is a mounding perennial that grows in gravelly soil that is wet in winter and dry in summer. It is a delicate-leaved, lemon scented mint. It grows best (and the flowers last longer) in an aspect with morning sun and afternoon shade. Flowers are a light pink and attract lots of butterflies.</p>	<p>14 gallons 30 cups</p>
<p><i>Monardella odoratissima</i></p> 	<p>Mountain pennyroyal Pretty light purple flowers in early summer. Low growing-about 10" tall and wide. Nice peppermint fragrance. Wants well drained soil, some water okay, but pretty tough. Full sun to partial shade.</p>	<p>0</p>
<p><i>Oenothera caespitosa ssp. marginata</i></p> 	<p>Large white evening primrose A short-lived perennial. It has white-pink 3" flowers that fade to pink. The 12" leaves are from base only. The delightful fragrance is from the flowers. It needs regular water with good drainage. Protect from deer unless you like stumps.</p>	<p>3 gallons</p>
<p><i>Oenothera californica ssp. avita</i></p> 	<p>White desert primrose Clumps 3 feet by 10 feet across of 2 inch pink-white flowers are common. Really pretty flush of white flowers in late spring. Small and compact plant about 1' high and across. They like really well drained soil or they will rot out.</p>	<p>4 gallons</p>
<p><i>Oenothera xylocarpa</i></p> 	<p>Woody fruited evening primrose It has showy yellow flowers in small rosettes. It needs full sun, good drainage and regular water.</p>	<p>0</p>
<p><i>Penstemon eatonii</i></p> 	<p>Firecracker penstemon Easy, seems to be long lived for a penstemon. Likes some water during the summer, but don't let the base of the plant stay wet or it will rot. Fairly tolerant and very nice show of red blooms in spring.</p>	<p>22 cups</p>

<p><i>Penstemon floridus</i></p> 	<p>Rose penstemon Beautiful tall flower spike about 2 feet tall. Likes sandy well-drained soil. If you overwater it, it will look great for a year and then rot out. Attracts hummingbirds.</p>	<p>25 gallons 1 tree pot 53 cups</p>
<p><i>Penstemon fruticiformis</i></p> 	<p>Death Valley beardtongue A beautiful shrub with grey foliage. Fragrant white snapdragon like flowers. Needs full sun and very good drainage and occasional water.</p>	<p>0</p>
<p><i>Penstemon incertus</i></p> 	<p>Western desert penstemon A showy sky blue perennial that has 2 foot of light green (with a little silver) foliage with 2 foot spikes of blue above it. Needs full sun and good drainage.</p>	<p>6 gallons 102 cups</p>
<p><i>Penstemon monoensis</i></p> 	<p>Mono penstemon This penstemon has pink to red-violet flowers. It likes gravelly washes and hills so give it full sun and good drainage.</p>	<p>0</p>
<p><i>Penstemon speciosus</i></p> 	<p>Showy penstemon A 2' perennial with 1-2" sky blue flowers, May-July. Do not water after the first summer in all sites but the desert.</p>	
<p><i>Phlox stansburyi</i></p> 	<p>Cold desert phlox</p>	<p>12 gallons 7 tree pots</p>

<p><i>Phoenicaulis cheiranthoides</i></p> 	<p>Dagger pod Grows on rocky outcrops and clay soils. It has a pinkish flower and interesting dry seed pods. It likes full to partial sun and rocky soil.</p>	<p>8 gallons</p>
<p><i>Pinus jeffreyi</i></p> 	<p>Jeffery pine A 60' conifer. Its leaves are blue-green it is tolerant of most environmental conditions. This pine smells like fresh baked vanilla cookies. It is good for wildlife. It needs frequent watering until 5 feet tall.</p>	<p>10 gallons</p>
<p><i>Populus tremuloides</i></p> 	<p>Aspen A tree that grows to about 15 feet. Has pretty green leaves in summer which turn a vibrant yellow to orange in fall. It likes to be in a regularly watered spot.</p>	<p>2 5-gallon pots</p>
<p><i>Prunus andersonii</i></p> 	<p>Desert peach A deciduous shrub that grows to 3-6 feet. It has rose flowers in early spring. It likes sun, dry conditions, and good drainage. It has a beautiful flower show. It spreads by rhizomes so plant it where it can spread.</p>	<p>32 tree pots 3 gallons</p>
<p><i>Psoralea argophylla</i></p> 	<p>Indigo bush Seems to be happy in any well drained soil. Wants absolute full blazing sun, the hotter the better. Very little water while it gets established, then don't water it ever again! Blooms in mid spring with very pretty dark purple flowers. The odor of this plant is disagreeable to some people. About 3' tall and wide, slow grower.</p>	<p>0</p>
<p><i>Purshia tridentata</i></p> 	<p>Antelope bitterbrush An evergreen small-leaved shrub that grows to six feet. Give it full sun and dry conditions. You can prune it to shape it. In spring it is covered with small yellow flowers that smell great. A wonderful plant for the garden. You really can't kill it.</p>	<p>18 gallons</p>

<p><i>Rhamnus californica</i></p> 	<p>Coffee berry An evergreen shrub that grows fast to 6-8 ft. Coffeeberry likes sun to part shade and has low water requirements. The berries turn red, then black. This plant is almost always deer proof. (new genus name = <i>Frangula</i>)</p>	<p>0</p>
<p><i>Ribes cereum</i></p> 	<p>Wax currant A small-med shrub, deciduous. Nice red berries by late summer-good for birds. Full sun to partial shade. Wants some water.</p>	<p>0</p>
<p><i>Rudbeckia californica</i></p> 	<p>California coneflower Likes meadows and riparian areas. It has showy long-lasting bright yellow flowers. Needs full sun to partial shade.</p>	<p>0</p>
<p><i>Salazaria mexicana</i></p> 	<p>Bladder sage This plant grows from Mojave to Little Lake. It is found in the open gravelly soils. Likes full sun and good drainage.</p>	<p>5 gallons</p>
<p><i>Salvia dorii</i></p> 	<p>Purple sage Likes well drained soil, full sun and a little water. Blooms in June with fun pagoda-like flowers. Attracts insects and has fragrant foliage.</p>	<p>28 gallons 26 cups</p>
<p><i>Solidago californica</i></p> 	<p>California goldenrod A spectacular yellow flowered perennial that is very showy in the late summer and fall. It needs sun to partial shade. Plant in areas where the ground is wet in the Spring and almost dry in the summer. Spreads from underground roots so give it room to grow</p>	<p>9 gallons 8 cups</p>

<p><i>Sphaeralcea ambigua</i></p> 	<p>Apricot mallow Easy, wants some water in the summer. Likes well drained soil. Nice flush of orange flowers early in the summer. Looks ragged by the fall so cut it back in the spring before new growth starts otherwise it gets scraggly. Full sun is best. A really nice perennial flower for our climate. I water mine about once a week. Slowly spreads out to the sides. About 2' tall.</p>	<p>14 gallons</p>
<p><i>Sporobolus airoides</i></p> 	<p>Alkali sacaton A beautiful bunch grass that grows about 2.5 feet tall. Has delicate inflorescence. It is easy to grow, needs full sun and regular water. Slower to grow than Great Basin Wild Rye.</p>	<p>4 gallons 16 tree pots</p>
<p><i>Stanleya elata</i></p> 	<p>Prince's plume Full sun and well drained soil. Nice yellow spikes in the spring. Doesn't really need water, but a little will make it look better.</p>	<p>39 tree pots</p>
<p><i>Stanleya pinnata</i></p> 	<p>Desert plume Full sun and well drained soil. Nice yellow spikes in the spring. Doesn't really need water, but a little will make it look better. Blooms May through Julneand if you cut the spent flowers will give you another bloom in fall.</p>	<p>32 tree pots</p>
<p><i>Xylorhiza tortifolia</i></p> 	<p>Mojave aster This has to be one of the prettiest flowers we get. They bloom in early spring. They like well-drained soil and very little water after they are established. They are dormant in the summer. Pollinators love them.</p>	<p>2 gallons 1 tree pot</p>
<p><i>Zauschneria californica</i></p> 	<p>Desert fuschia This is a nice plant for fall flowers. It blooms late August until it freezes. Likes well drained soil. It will tolerate regular watering but containerize it or it will spread all over. Less water will help hold it in check. The hummingbirds like it. (New genus= <i>Epilobium</i>)</p>	<p>9 gallons</p>
