Program – Scott Holder – "Into Thinner Air: A Rotarian's Pursuit of the Seven Summits"



Tim Moore introduced <u>Scott Holder</u>, member of the Sebastopol Sunrise Rotary Club. <u>Scott</u> is a man of many interests and talents, but today he shared his passion for mountain climbing. I get a rush from Green Bay Packer games [Shameless! **-Ed.**]; he gets a rush from climbing mountains in minus 40 degree wind chill. He shared his adventures climbing <u>Aconcagua</u>, the highest peak in the Andes in South America, and <u>Denali</u>, (Mt. McKinley) in Alaska, the highest peak in North America. With dramatic photos, he shared his adventures on these mountains, carrying at least 150lbs. of gear.

Incredible weather extremes, life-threatening crevasses, ice, snow, and wind are all a part of this relaxing get away in the mountains. He has actually seen bodies frozen in the snow. The ABC's of Rotary

<u>(Taken from "The ABCs of Rotary", a Rotary International publication originally prepared by</u> <u>Dr. Cliff Dochterman who was RI President in 1992-93)</u>

#35 Types of Membership

There are two types of Rotary club membership — active and honorary. An active member is one who has been elected to membership in the club under a classification of business or profession and enjoys all the obligations, responsibilities, and privileges of membership as provided in the RI constitution and bylaws. Active members may hold office in their clubs and serve RI at the district and international levels. They are expected to meet attendance requirements, pay dues, and bring new members into Rotary.

Honorary Rotary membership may be offered to people who have distinguished themselves by meritorious service in the furtherance of Rotary ideals. An honorary member is elected for one year only, and continuing membership must be renewed annually. Honorary members cannot propose new members to the club or hold office and are exempt from attendance requirements and club dues.

Many distinguished heads of state, explorers, authors, musicians, astronauts, and other public personalities have been honorary members of Rotary clubs, including King Gustaf of Sweden, King George VI of England, King Badouin of Belgium, King Hassan III of Morocco, Sir Winston Churchill, humanitarian Albert Schweitzer, Charles Lindbergh, composer Jean Sibelius, explorer Sir Edmund Hillary, Thor Heyerdahl, Thomas Edison, Walt Disney, Bob Hope, Dr. Albert Sabin, British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher, and many of the presidents of the United States.

 The flu is much worse than the common cold — or winter bug. When it hits, the uncomfortable symptoms can disrupt your life for days...

 But, you can protect yourself. A flu shot now will give your body time to develop immunity before flu season begins. It's the smart way to protect yourself against the flu.

 Remember, you cannot get flu from a flu shot. The vaccine is made from inactivated or "killed" flu viruses, which are not infectious.

 Influenza vaccine should not be administered to anyone with a history of hypersensitivity to eggs or egg products. As with any vaccine, vaccination may not protect 100% of all susceptible individuals. The most common side effect is soreness at the injection site for up to two days. Less common side effects are fever and fatigue.


