

Scratchboard Tattoo Design

Name:

Objective: Students will create a black and white Flash inspired tattoo design using scratchboard techniques. **Frameworks Objective(2.13):** Students will create a tattoo design that demonstrates facility in selective use of elements and principles of design to establish a personal style.



Materials: Scratchboard, x-acto knife, colore pencil, pencil.

Overview:

Scratchboard: refers to both a medium, and an illustrative technique using sharp knives and tools for etching into a thin layer of white China clay that is coated with black India ink.

Reductive drawing: Is the process of starting with a dark surface and using white to define forms instead of using a white surf

Hatching: is an artistic technique used to create tonal or shading effects by drawing closely spaced parallel lines. When lines are placed at an angle to one another, it is called *cross-hatching*. Here are some examples of scratchboard hatching.

Flash Art: is a stereotypical tattoo design printed or drawn on paper then colored using colored pencil. It is typically displayed on the walls of tattoo parlors and in binders to give walk-in customers ideas for tattoos. Most traditional tattoo flash was designed for rapid tattooing and used in "street shops" often having sailor imagery. They can be characterized by their bold lines and evenly rendered shading. Some common themes are symbolic items like roses, daggers, crosses, snakes, pin-up girls and anchors.

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Use the following steps...

- -Create a pencil sketch of your tattoo on draft paper, the same size as the final.
- -Lay the pencil drawing on top of the scratchboard and use a ball-point pen to trace over the original drawing. An impression of the drawing will appear on the scratchboard surface. (DEMO)
- -Use an X-Acto, toothpick, or hatching pen to slowly pull out the light areas of your object. (DEMO)
- -Lastly you will add selective color with colored pencils (like what you see in the flash tattoos) to subtly add color to your finished scratchboard. (DEMO)


Assessment:
