Welcome!

Welcome to the joint meeting of four societies: the Society for Pentecostal Studies, the Wesleyan Theological Society, the Wesleyan Philosophical Society, and the Society for the Study of Psychology and Wesleyan Theology.

The Society for Pentecostal Studies is meeting jointly with the Wesleyan Theological Society on the shared theme of holiness. Along with plenary and interest Group sessions, the conference includes a Thursday evening reception following a lecture by Walter Brueggemann, working-lunch meetings, society business meetings, a women's breakfast, and a banquet for each society.

The Wesleyan Philosophical Society is gathering to discuss the theme, "Are There Good Reasons to Believe? Epistemology and Christian Faith" while the Society for the Study of Psychology and Wesleyan Theology will focus on "Confessional Integration: Overtly Traditioning the SSPWT in Wesleyan Theology."

General Information

Registration

Registration for the conference will be held in the Weter Hall Lounge. Please note the registration times provided in this program at the beginning of each day's events. **Only persons wearing registration name tags will be admitted to sessions (except for the Opening Plenary Lecture, which is open to the public.)**

Lodging: There are three host hotels for this conference. There will be shuttle service provided from these hotels to Seattle Pacific University.

Courtyard Marriot (South Lake Union) located at 925 Westlake Avenue N., Seattle, WA 98109. Reservations may be made at (206) 213-0100. The conference rate is \$119 per night (plus applicable taxes) for a Single/Double room. Parking costs \$20 per night and Internet access is free.

Holiday Inn Seattle (City Center) located at 211 Dexter Avenue North, Seattle, WA 98109. Reservations may be made at (206) 728-8123. The conference rate of \$119 per night (plus applicable taxes) for a Single/Double room. If there is a third person for a room, the rate will be \$139 per night (plus applicable taxes) but you must let them know when you make your reservation and request either a rollaway bed or a room with 2 queen beds and sofa bed. The parking is \$10 per night, and high-speed Internet access is provided free. There is a 24-hour business center. Each room has a microwave, fridge and mini-sink.

Holiday Inn Express and Suites (Downtown Seattle) located at 226 Aurora Avenue, Seattle, WA 98109. Reservations may be made at 206-441-7222. The conference rate is \$129 per night for a Single or Double room or \$139 for a Triple or Quad room (plus applicable taxes). If there is a third person for a room, the rate will be \$139 per night (plus applicable taxes) but you must let them know when you make your reservation and request either a rollaway bed or a room with 2 queen beds and sofa bed. The parking is \$10 per night, and free high-speed Internet access is provided. There is a Deluxe Continental breakfast, 24-hour business center and indoor heated pool access is included with this room.

Transportation between hotels and Seattle Pacific University: There is an information sheet in the welcome packet with times and locations of the shuttle.

Meals

Breaks. Light refreshments will be served during the morning and afternoon breaks on Thursday and Friday and on Saturday morning.

Boxed lunches: If you ordered a boxed lunch, you can pick it up in Weter Hall Lounge.

How to Connect to SPU-Guests:

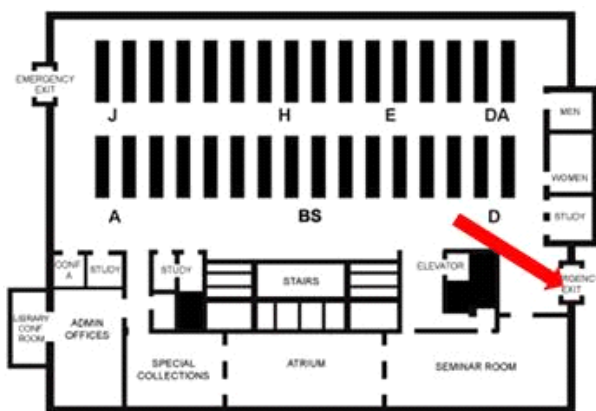
1. Connect your device to the “SPU-Guests” SSID.

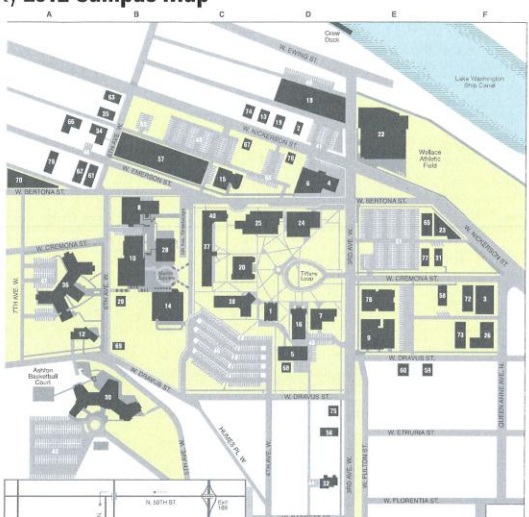
Seattle Pacific University 2012 Campus Map
