






Mills named to Silver Spur Hall of Fame



Bob Mills, Gordon, Neb., was sure the Black Hills Stock Show® had run out of people eligible for the Silver Spur Hall of Fame when they told him he is earning the honor. He is, in fact, being inducted this year.

"It's a huge honor. I couldn't believe it. It's amazing," Mills said.
"I guess it didn't ever think of it as work, because I've enjoyed [volunteering]. It was a shock and I very much appreciate it."

Mills and Tina have been married since 1983 and they had their only child, Bailey, in 1989.

Mills is a two-time cancer survivor. "The first year I had cancer was 1999. It came back in 2013. I had a stem cell transplant right after the stock show in 2013," he said. He says that he thinks he has won the battle against cancer.

Mills has early memories of attending Black Hills Stock Show® and Central States Fair to show

"I can remember coming up here to Central States and that's back when them barns was 50 to 60 Shorthorns and Angus were full, and they'd rotate in and out," he said. "Back then, that was their form of advertising and how they met people, so going to state fairs was more critical. We didn't have quite the networking they have now. I can remember coming up here. I was probably six or seven when we'd come up and dad would show Shorthorns up here."

After Mills' father passed away, other men in his life took him to BHSS and CSF. "I suppose the first time I actually went on the road with somebody else, I was 14 and that was here to CSF with a guy by the name of Sam Moore. Coming through the gates here at Central States Fair, I was a little 14-year-old snot-nosed kid and I was sitting in the middle of three us in the front of a single cab pickup. We'd pull up to the gate and the guy that was running the gate visited with Sam for quite a while and Sam visited with him. As we pulled away, Sam looked over at me, he said, "I guarantee ya, he's probably got one job here, you treat him with respect, he'll treat you with respect.' That meant a lot to me.'

Tve been coming up to BHSS® for a lot of years. The main thing I remember, it was cold," he said of the days when it still took place at the Central States Fairgrounds.

moved to the civic center. "I don't think a lot of people realize how nice that is. ... "The people that put it on, y'all are very good to us. A lot of people that are first-time being there and I guess I've said it all along, it's just the atmosphere, it's laid back, nobody gets too wound up about things. I always tell people, it's our vacation before we go home and start calving."

customers and see old customers. There are some people you see once a year and have a chance to visit with," Mills said. "... There's a chance to see what genetics are working and what might work for your program. At BHSS $^{\text{\tiny{\$}}}$, there's a lot of herd prospects there, not just for the commercial man, but for the commercial man and purebred breeder that they'll take home and use as a herd sire. That

says quite a bit for BHSS. There's sure enough quality. The Supreme Bull deal's a magnificent program

Mills has served on the BHSS Livestock Committee, for about 15 vears. Mills and Tina raise Shorthorns and Simmentals, and a few club calves.

"We're trying to get a good commercial herd built up and gearing maybe more toward the replacement heifer deal, and not so much still have some good show prospects.'

Mills values the opportunity for youth to show cattle for the good qualities it builds.

"Mills has been involved in other organizations, including being the Livestock Superintendent at Nebraska State Fair, on the Sheridan County Fair Board for 23 years, and serving a couple terms of 4-H Extension Council, he said.



Anderson Agribusinessman of the Year



Bob Anderson has dedicated his life's work to helping livestock producers get the most for their cattle. For his work as a field man for more than 30 years and volunteering spare time at the Black Hills Stock Show and Central States Fair, Bob Anderson is being honored as BHSS Agribusinessman of the Year.

Anderson officially retired from his sale barn fieldman position, yet has found himself with the job yet again.

"I started in 1988, at Belle Fourche [Livestock Auction] as a fieldman and been a fieldman ever since. I retired when I turned 65, and there's a guy that runs the Philip sale barn. He called me up and said, 'I want to talk to you,' and I thought, 'Oh, boy." Anderson was offered a job at Philip Livestock Auction, to which he replied, "No,' I said, 'I got some things I want to do before I get so old I can't, and I'm going to plan on it.' He said, 'Go ahead and do it, we'll work around it, plumb fine." Anderson was once again a field man.

Anderson was born and raised on a ranch on the Belle Fourche River northeast of Sturgis. "I spent the first 37 years of my life there, raised my kids and the whole bit on the ranch."

Family disputes ended Anderson's family ranch, he said, and he had four mouths to feed at the time. He filled the need for a job by working for Tri-State Livestock News from 1981 to 1983.

"I went to TSLN, and spent three years there. That opened a lot of doors to a lot of things," he said. "Morris Hallock was a man that didn't know the first thing about a cow and would be the first to admit he didn't, but he taught me a lot about talking to people, getting along with people, and sales. That kind of stuff was tremendous."

A friend, Milo Rypkema, gave Anderson advice he's never forgotten. "We were heading into Dodge City to look at bulls, Milo was driving and he said you've got to surround yourself with good people. Good people will make you or break you," Anderson said. An editor at TSLN during Anderson's stint is one example of this.

"I had an editor there by the

name of Bob Lee and he had worked as press secretary for Governor Foss. He taught me a lot about how to do it and what to do. He said, 'Get you a book, you go to a guy's place and you go to his sales. You write down his name, his wife's name, and if he's got seven kids you be sure you write down get all the kids' names. Keep that book.' He said, 'The next time you think you're going to run into him or think

you're going to see him or call him about advertising, you say, how's Marietta or whatever her name is and go from there."


Anderson covered four states during his time as an ad salesman.

"Once Anderson shifted his work from advertising to a field man for area livestock sale barns, he stayed in that field. Anderson spent many years working for Belle Fourche Livestock Auction, and when his current employer, the owner of Philip Livestock Auction, bought it, it was like returning home.

"When I went back to Belle, here they all come: customers from Wyoming, Montana, North Dakota, and South Dakota, through Belle Fourche. And so I got a jillion good buddies and old buddies I sold cattle for for years, and you pick these up again," he said """

Anderson's advice for the next generation is to be adaptable in this technology-based world, but the basics still apply.

"The quality has gotten better; it really has really, really improved. The younger generations are maybe more prone to doing a better job of selection," he said. "I wouldn't trade what I've done," Anderson said. "It's quite a thing to do what I've done and travel. It's not for everyone."



Lindblom Stockman of the Year

Rapid City rancher Dave Lindbloom has been on the Black Hills Stock Show Committee whose job is to chose Stockman of the Year. This year, the table has turned and he has earned the honor.

Dave's family has been tied in

with Hart Ranch, south of Rapid City, since he moved there with his parents in 1961. Dave, his father Dan, and his son Brad still run cattle on Hart Ranch ground. "The history of Hart Ranch for the last 55 years is the same as our history now. The Lindbloom

family is tied in tightly," he said. "The history of Hart Ranch goes back 100 and some years...John Hart was a freighter and a big cattleman in western South Dakota. That was one of the properties he ended up with and thats ultimately where he lived.

John Hart operated down there until 1930s and from '30s to early '40s, he'd moved into retirement in Rapid City and they leased it out."

The Birdsal family bought Hart Ranch in the 1940s, then shortly after, sold it to Western Cattle Company, a division of Norris Grain Company.

"Western Cattle Company was big; they probably at one time had more than 350,000 deeded acres in South Dakota on various ranches, and they had another ranch in Montana that was 260,000 almost exclusively deeded," Dave said. "What's important there is dad's story with Western Cattle Company and Hart Ranch. He went to work for Western Cattle Company in the late '50s and was on several ranches but eventually ended up on Hart Ranch in '61, and that was the best ranch of everything Western Cattle Company had, and he was foreman of that, then evolved into the manager for four of the final five South Dakota

In 1984, Hart Ranch was sold to Deneke brothers. Dave's father helped them get established, but didn't work for them long. He shifted into leasing ground and running cattle.

"The Denekes are a very good family and very good friends, but the trail riding and riding arena just was a business plan that couldn't work down there, so dad got out of that and we've been running cows ever since," he said. "They needed someone to come up and look after our cows. That's where Starla and I decided to leave the construction deal and come back up here and we've been here ever since."

When Western Cattle Company sold their last cattle in the late 1970s, Dan took advantage of the available pastures.

"They sold out their last cattle in '75 or '76. At that time, dad started buying cattle from them and still managing the ranch for them and taking in pasture cattle. Eventually very soon in the late '70s, he had all the cattle there on Hart Ranch," he said. "When Denekes come in and bought that, he just kept leasing from them. Then as he retired, we've been building our numbers and taking over from him."

"There have been Charolais cattle on that ranch almost as long as I can remember. When dad was with the Cattle Company, they were very inquisitive on what would work so they were willing to spend money to try different things," he said. "One time, we had a three-breed rotation. When dad was running it, we had Hereford, Angus and Charolais. They tried all the exotic breeds that have come along, even Brown Swiss. Brown Swiss on Charolais cows were quite a cross. It was interesting. You'd be



hard pressed to pick a breed we haven't had a few cows bred."


The Lindbloom family has a common-sense reason for owning solid-colored mother cows.

"We're just tenants on a leased ranch. There's a high risk factor that you could lose the lease and if you did that, you don't want to be sitting on a herd of cows that are not merchantable as cows, so that's where we quit running Charolais-crossed mother cows and went to a straight Angus," Dave said. "We have a few baldies but very few. Whether it's Black Angus or Red Angus, as long as we had solid color for our main herd, we thought we had a better exit strategy, which we've never needed to use yet."

"Moving forward, what is important for the next generation on the ranch is to make sure it's getting better. Our underlying philosophy on ranch management, there's several, but first, keep your hands out of your pocket. That means, don't do something you don't need to do," he said. This is God's pocket; Hart Ranch really is unique. It's not only easy to manage but fun to manage. This fall of 2016, I've abused it because I needed to try to make as much money as I could this year, so I'm using it awfully hard, but I know, I'm confident it's going to spring back and that's just a stewardship deal. We're in a good location and we haven't abused it for generations or even multiple years in a row. If next year looks like this year, we'll make some big changes.'

Dave has been a board member of Central States Fair and Black Hills Stock Show.

"To me, BHSS is a social aspect. The event brings all these people from North Dakota, Montana, Nebraska, and bring them in to just to set down and go have a beer or go have a meal," he said. "The only thing I've bought at stock show in at least 10 years was some horses. We don't go there for the seed stock, I go there to see the seed stock producers and visit with them. That's what I see the role of the stock show, the atmosphere to network."




