Gainesville police say victim, 16, froze in fear.

A 19-year-old Lake City man faces a sexual battery charge after a 16-year-old girl says he took

her clothes off and performed oral sex on in a changing room at Gainesville's Oaks Mall in April.

Jeremy Dixon of Southwest State Road 47 was in a "non-intimate relationship" with the girl, whom he went shopping with on April 22, according to a Gainesville Police Department report.

The girl's parents told Dixon,

who has been diagnosed with Asperger syndrome, according to the report, that the two could "only be friends" due to their age difference.

When the girl wanted to try on new dresses at Dillard's, Dixon followed her into the dressing room, according to the report.

She told Dixon she didn't feel

which states only that the girl found his response confusing.

comfortable changing in front of him.

Dixon's reply was redacted in the Lake City Reporter's copy of the report, which states only that the girl

The girl proceeded to change into her dress, but left her jeans on because she was uncomfortable with Dixon in the room.

Dixon stopped her from changing and began to kiss her and grope her, according to the report.

He then began to unbutton her

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'A memorial to first responders'

Cason Schneider passes resolution in their honor.

Cason Schneider, a Columbia High School student, recently got to participate in a true-to-life civics lesson when he participated in the 75th Session of Boys State for Florida, where he introduced legislation honoring two local fallen firefighters.

At the Florida American Legion's Boys State, participants learn the rights, privileges and responsibilities of franchised citizens. The training is objective and centers on the structure of city, county and state governments operated by students elected to various offices.

Schneider, 16, was a Columbia County delegate at Boys State where he held multiple offices. Some of the offices he held included that of city council member and a member of the House of Representatives Conference Committee.

Florida Boys State was held at Florida State University in Tallahassee from June 17-22.

While participating in the session, Schneider introduced a concurrent resolution expressing appreciation for law enforcement officers, first responders and emergency workers.

The resolution was passed by the Boys State government.

"It's a memorial to first responders," Schneider said. "I told a story of what inspired the document to the Boys State governor before he signed it and he was really moved by the story and gave me a copy of the resolution."

Schneider said the inspiration behind the resolution is that it's in honor of first responders and emergency workers that sacrificed their lives and died to serve our local community.

After the resolution was adopted, copies of the resolution were to be deposited in the archives of the Florida American Legion Boys State program in Orange County, and inserted into the commemorative 75th session time capsule.

A resolution directing the session's time capsule to be opened on the occasion of the 100th session, 25 years from now, was approved.

"I was excited about the resolution," said Columbia County Fire Chief Jeff Crawford, Schneider's step-grandfather. "I thought it was very good. I read the resolution and I thought it was very good. The story behind it was definitely a moving story because it's

about local people from our area that were actually killed in one of the forest fires above Lake City in Hamilton County. I'm very proud of Cason for doing it."

Schneider, a rising senior at CHS, said the inspiration

behind the resolution come from the actions of Florida Forest Service workers on June 20, 2011.

"They lost their lives protecting our safety," Schneider said.

The legislation introduced by Schneider now becomes a Boys State law.

"It's just an honor," he said of the legislation being adopted. "There's only a select group of individuals in high schools around the state that get to go to Boys State. The resolution was a way for me to personally honor the first responders and those two men specifically. It's a way for me to show my appreciation to them — that's why it's important to me."

Crawford said he thinks Schneider watching him in his duties as a first responder may have helped the youngster gain knowledge about the role first responders play in a community.

"I'm very proud of Cason and the resolution," Crawford said. "He did a very good job on the resolution. The resolution was kind of unexpected. It wasn't something he had

told me about ahead of time. I was surprised and very proud."

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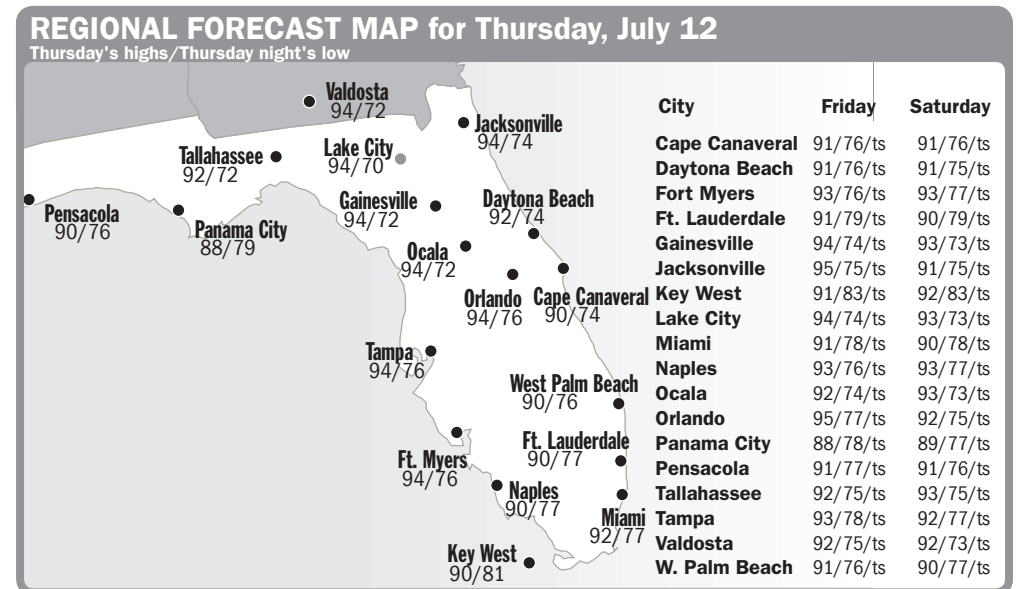
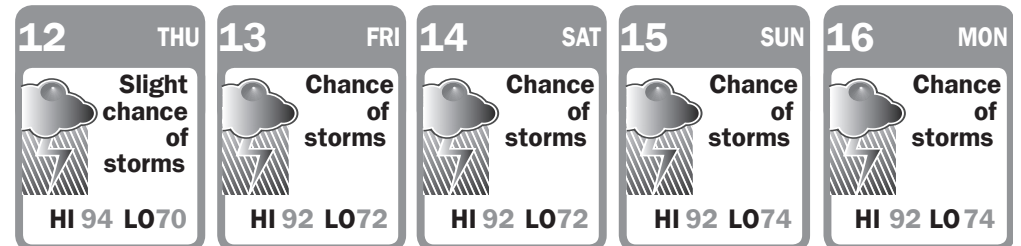

Dixon left the changing room, leaving the girl to drop on the floor and cry until she could compose herself and leave, the report states.

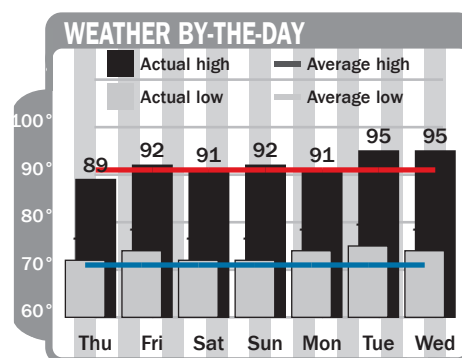
When she left, Dixon was standing at the door.

Jax developer has big plans for area

30-employee welding shop, strip malls, apt. complex in the works.

More strip malls and welding jobs? Both may be a possibility for the area.

Toney Sleiman, president and CEO of Sleiman Enterprises, purchased hundreds of acres he plans to develop on the northern side of Suwannee County. A handful of projects at untold millions in capital outlay are quietly being developed, and a few expect to see some degree of operation in about a month.

With Live Oak as his initial focus, some of these are expected to generate dozens of career-track jobs in welding and more in retail. The Jacksonville Landing owner has plans to develop about 168 acres off the intersection of 72nd Trace and U.S. Highway 129 for retail development.

"I'm going to show this to a lot of my tenants and try to market it to see who I can get here," Sleiman said, adding that he plans to do site testing to develop apartment complexes on a portion of this land. "What's great about retail is it creates jobs. I'm going to try to market this intersection. We're doing a study on building 300 units on the back part of the property here."

Less than a mile away, he has manufacturing aims and a project set in motion at an existing workshop set to become a warehouse for the fabrication of construction debris containers.

"There's a shortage of roll-off containers being built in the country because the construction industry's booming," Sleiman said.

"We're going to open up a manufacturing plant here building roll-off cans."

He said he had a goal of eventually producing upwards of 10 containers a day. At that rate he estimated a need for up to 30 employees at the site.

In a walkthrough of the workshop, Sleiman appeared high spirited and energetic, moving quickly from one job site to the next.

He delivered breakdowns of the fabrication process, and spoke about what the sale of the containers could generate.

"What's exciting about an

area like this is most of your welders that are in this area — Live Oak, Lake City — they're probably driving to Gainesville or Valdosta or Jacksonville to do work," Sleiman said. "We're going to be able to say, hey guys, why don't you work in your own community where you don't have to drive so far?"

Sleiman, who owns 5.5 million square feet of strip malls, has tentative plans for a shopping center in Lake City, but also expressed interest in developing industrial and manufacturing jobs here at some point.

Sleiman said he saw land

area he liked enough when he was in Suwannee County to purchase a deer preservation farm full of exotic breeds about two weeks ago.

"I love hunting," Sleiman said on a tour of the remote property Wednesday. "I've always wanted to own a deer farm."

The preservation sits on roughly 400 acres of fenced property and was near a landfill, used for construction debris.

He bought the landfill and developed the second part of a three-pronged approach when he discovered the dump contained its own profitable resources —

concrete and metals, tens of thousands of pounds of them.

"This concrete has been sitting at the bottom of this place for years and we're pulling it up and recycling it," Sleiman said. "That's important. When we're crushing it we're able to take the steel out of it and recycle it and nobody's doing it."

He's amassed hills of crushed concrete, broken rubble and heaps of salvaged iron.

"For years this has been a landfill, but it's never really been used at its capacity," he said. "We started digging

up concrete, big ol' chunks of concrete. You know when somebody's remodeling a house or tearing a building down they'll bring it to the landfill."

Sleiman has started digging and mining a landfill for raw material. He estimated 15,000 tons of concrete, which would take roughly a year.

The landfill is expected to employ roughly 8-10 people.

He's since started selling raw goods to purchasers in construction.

"I already started something that should be done with every landfill in the country," he said.

Industrial jobs on the way?

Jacksonville developer Toney Sleiman, the hard-driving strip mall magnate who has taken a shine to our neck of the woods, has big plans for the Live Oak-Lake City area.

As detailed in a story on Page 3A, Sleiman is looking to build a shopping center and apartment complex in northern Suwannee County.

That's great, but what's of even greater interest to us is his planned foray into manufacturing.

Sleiman plans to open a fabrication shop there that will employ 30 welders. Those are the jobs we really need: career track posts that pay enough to raise a family on.

Putting 30 area welders to work won't assuage anybody's long-term economic concerns.

But it's a start.

Thirty from another entrepreneur, then 20 more from somebody else, and we're at least off and running.

We've just got to do more to attract high-energy jobmakers like Sleiman — who found us on his own, with no help from the government types — to the area.

That's a puzzle we cannot seem to crack.

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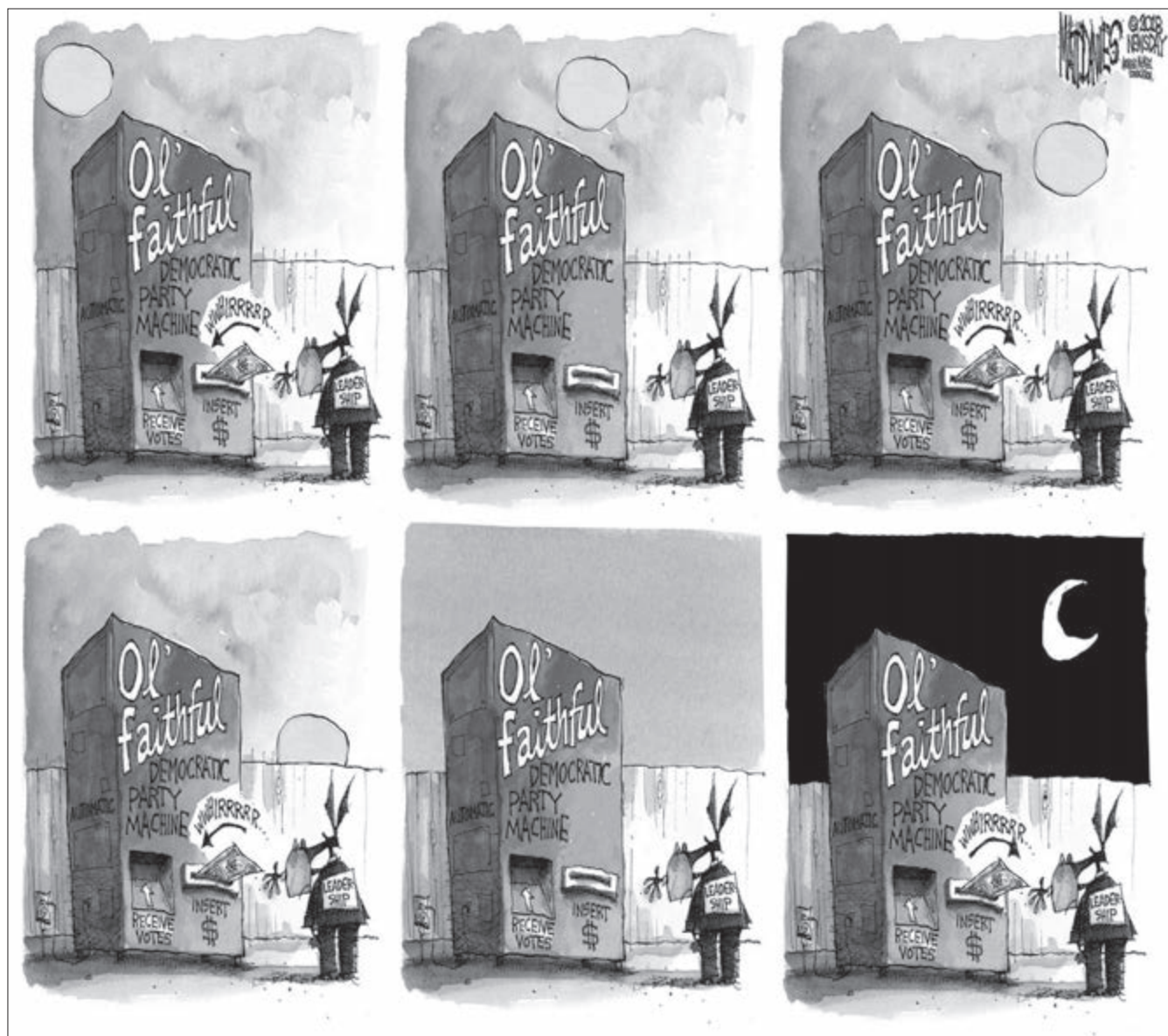

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Asian-Americans at Harvard

Everybody knows how President Donald Trump asked for a Muslim ban in his campaign and at least some of us know his travel ban was no such thing. This country did, however, once have a Chinese ban — people didn't want them around for mostly bigoted reasons. Thank heavens the population of Asian-Americans from some 20 countries is now booming despite some lingering inhospitality.

We have to watch the generalities — Asian-Americans are a diverse group and what counts ultimately is individuals — but here is a gift that keeps on giving. As the Pew Research Center reports, no racial group in America can match them in income or education, and they embrace hard work, are big on marriage and family and really, really like it here.

Their overall median income is \$73,000, something like \$20,000 above the national median income although one Asian segment, Indians, makes that seem picayunish. Their median is \$100,000. But why dwell on money?

One reason is that minority immigrants seldom have ease of passage, as is illustrated by the 19th century Chinese ban that lasted until the 1940s. The fastest growing racial group in America, now about 5.6 percent of the population, Asian-Americans are largely blessed with a culture and values helping to overcome difficulties, yanking the most out of tough circumstances. And besides income, consider how they also excel in school to the extent that half have college educations while less than a third of all Americans do.

At Harvard, widely considered the top of the top universities, Asian-Americans knock on the door with academic achievements higher than any other racial or ethnic competitors.

Text scores? No. 1. High school grades? No. 1. Extracurricular activities? No. 1.

The *New York Times*, which tells us all of this, also tells us that if admissions were based on such matters alone, these exemplars of matters of the mind would constitute 43 percent of the student body. Instead, they are somewhere around 19 or 20 percent and have been around for a long time.

How come? The answer is discrimination. Students for Fair Admissions says in a lawsuit that contends that the university balances out racial groups in prearranged percentages that negate actual qualifications. Stereotypes are at work here, much as in the quota system limiting the number of Jewish students in the 1930s, the plaintiff alleges. The Harvard position is that there are other criteria of character and the like and that the selection system is fair and commendable.

I would agree that it can be worthy to examine nonacademic aspects of who a student is, but then you have the interesting fact that the university itself once explored whether there was a bias toward Asian-Americans and concluded there was. That was about all we know — no reforms or apologies emerged — and meanwhile we are also aware the university is particularly tough on Asian-Americans in assessing what they are like personally.

Not so hot, would be one way of summing it up.

My limited contact with Asian-Americans has been with a few acute professionals and entrepreneurial souls who have started businesses and are conscientious and honest while doing a good job. Such anecdotal evidence, even with statistical backing, hardly frees any broad statement of exceptions. But with no intended disparagement of any other of our amazing groups, I will nevertheless argue there is a reinvigorating quality about many Asian-Americans portending large benefits for our American future.

Of course there is this about some of our ideologically instructed academic and other leaders: They betray principles fallaciously supposing they thus serve a higher good. Are you aware that the Supreme Court, in affirming affirmative action, did so with reference to a law forbidding racial preferences? Someday, however, I am guessing there will be an Asian-American president of Harvard whose talent, grit and character carried the day.

Partisanship on the Supreme Court

Now that President Donald Trump has named circuit court Judge Brett Kavanaugh as his choice for the U.S. Supreme Court, Congress will begin the predictable process of scrutinizing him.

That process is often disingenuous, sometimes ugly and rarely productive. Democrats are now scouring Kavanaugh's biography for evidence of intolerable character flaws and his opinions for signs of ideological extremism. Republicans are preparing a glossy brochure of intellectual brilliance and personal beneficence.

Kavanaugh surely understands his role in the drama. He can be expected to deliver rehearsed answers to anticipated questions. He may sometimes be evasive, even inaccurate. The five conservative justices who just overturned a decades-old Supreme Court ruling on unions all pledged, at one point or another during their confirmation hearings, fealty to court precedent.

The court is increasingly perceived as one more partisan outfit in a town that's lousy with them. In a recent string of 5-4 decisions,

Republican appointees all voted with the majority and Democratic appointees with the minority. Republicans are hoping that Kavanaugh will prove to be a more reliable partisan than Anthony Kennedy, the justice he is slated to replace.

Beyond devoting Kavanaugh's confirmation hearings to learning how many ways he can avoid opining on abortion rights and *Roe v. Wade*, the members of the Senate Judiciary Committee should focus on the precarious state of the court itself. How does Kavanaugh propose to preserve the court's integrity when so many of its decisions are issued as red team versus blue team? How would he help construct a bridge across the court's expanding partisan chasm? How can the court's decisions be better crafted to reflect American society as a whole instead of sharpened into weapons of one political party or one side of a culture war?

It's a lamentable sign of our times that these questions need to be asked. But in recent years, the court has shaped American democ-

racy with dubious actions on campaign spending, voting rights, gerrymandering and other issues. In the near future, the court may need to settle presidential challenges to the work of the special counsel investigating Trump ties to Russia, revisit abortion rights and address further erosions to the franchise.

Kavanaugh is an experienced, competent and well-qualified judge. Barring a shocking disclosure or misstep, he is very likely to take a seat on the court. If he falters, a conservative legal movement that has spent years building Supreme Court supply chain will promptly deliver a workable replacement.

Rather than fixate on an individual judge, senators should home in on the hazards of an increasingly polarized judiciary in the Supreme Court is too vital to American democracy to avoid responsibility. The questions Kavanaugh must do to help defuse a mounting crisis.

CCE scores a 'High Five'

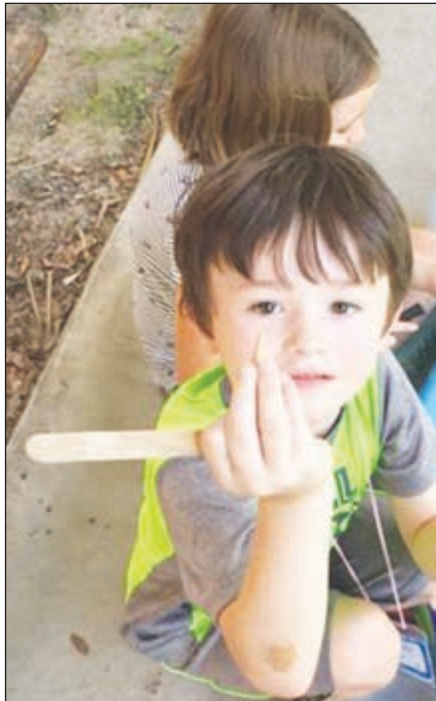

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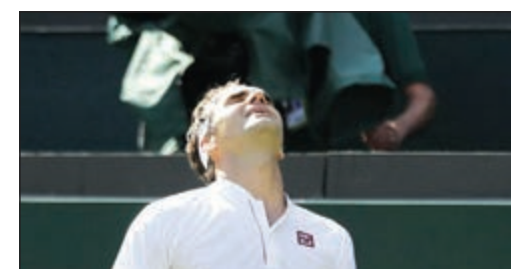

Croatia in World Cup final for 1st time

Croats shock England, rally for 2-1 win for date with France for title.

MOSCOW — When the final whistle blew and they knew they were going to their first World Cup final, the Croatians ran to their jumping and cheering fans in their iconic red-and-white checkered jerseys.

Mario Mandzukic scored the winning goal in the 109th minute and Croatia shocked England, rallying for 2-1 victory Wednesday.

Defender Sime Vrsaljko kept the score even in extra time by heading a shot off the goal line about 10 minutes before Mandzukic scored for Croatia, which is the first team in 28 years to come from behind to win a World Cup semifinal match.

"Mentally strong team," midfielder Ivan Rakatic said. "It's just unbelievable to get back in the game in this way."

The Croats will play France for the title on Sunday in its biggest

GAINESVILLE, — Two-time national champion and 2007 Heisman Trophy winner Tim Tebow will be inducted into Florida's ring of honor, becoming the sixth player to receive the honor.

The school announced Wednesday that Tebow will be recognized during the LSU-

Florida game on Oct. 6. His name will be unveiled on a wall inside Ben Hill Griffin Stadium.

The display will now feature Tebow and the other five members of the program's ring of honor: linebacker Wilber Marshall, running back Emmitt Smith, 1966 Heisman winner and famed coach Steve Spurrier, 1996 Heisman winner Danny Wuerffel and defensive end Jack Youngblood.

Tebow went 35-6 in four seasons (2006-09) at Florida, finishing with a Southeastern Conference-record 170.8 career

pass efficiency rating. He left college with 28 school records, 14 conference marks and five NCAA records.

"I am so humbled and thankful to be able to receive this blessing, being inducted into the Ring of Honor," Tebow said. "I know in my heart that I truly couldn't have done it without amazing coaches and teammates who loved and sacrificed for each other so that we could accomplish our goals."

"Loving Florida wasn't just something I did for four

years, but it has been a lifelong passion. I want to thank the University of Florida and all the fans for making Gator Nation so special. I was born a Gator, I played as a Gator, and I'll always be a Gator!"

"God Bless and Go Gators!" More than 100 members of UF's 2008 national championship team will also be invited back with Tebow to celebrate the 10-year anniversary of the Gators' national title. The Gators defeated Oklahoma to win the BCS National Championship Game.

Ex-Louisville players sue NCAA over vacated title

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — A group of former Louisville men's basketball players have filed a lawsuit against the NCAA over the organization's vacation of the Cardinals' 2013 national championship and 2012 Final Four. John Morgan, one of several attorneys representing former Cardinals captain Luke Hancock, the 2013 Final Four Most Outstanding Player, and four teammates from that title team, said a lawsuit had been filed and described the NCAA as "a morally bankrupt organization" that exploits student-athletes during a Wednesday news conference.

The suit filed Wednesday in Jefferson County Circuit Court does not specify monetary damages. It states the NCAA cast the plaintiffs in a false light and seeks declaration that it wrongfully vacated the plaintiffs' wins, honors and awards.

Morgan added, "If all we get is this championship back for Louisville, and the players, and the city, and Luke's MVP back, that's going to be plenty pay for us."

The attorney also mentioned former Louisville players Gorgui Dieng, Tim Henderson, Stephan Van Treese and Mike Marra as plaintiffs in the lawsuit.

The NCAA stripped Louisville of the title as part of sanctions for violations discovered during an escort scandal investigation.

Hancock stressed that his title ring "is not coming off" and said the embarrassing scandal continues to dog him despite not being involved. "It's been five years and I can't tell you two days where I've gone without having someone come to me and ask me if I had strippers or prostitutes in the dorm," he said.

"I'm excited that Morgan & Morgan has partnered with us and is going to represent us because enough is enough."

NCAA spokeswoman Stacey Osburn told The Associated Press that the organization hasn't received a copy of the lawsuit and declined to comment Wednesday afternoon.

The governing body in February denied the school's appeal and vacated 123 victories, including their third NCAA title, following an escort's book allegations in October 2015 that former basketball staffer Andre McGee hired her and other dancers for sex parties. Louisville removed the championship banner from its home arena soon afterward.

"We are used to fighting giants," Morgan said. "In the sports world, I don't think there is any Goliath

that exists like the NCAA. The NCAA is a giant, but the NCAA is a morally bankrupt organization that has taken advantage of economically disadvantaged young people throughout our country. "They answer to nobody but are bad for everybody."

The liability attorney did not mention former Louisville coach Rick Pitino, who has denied knowledge of the activities alleged by Katina Powell in her book "Breaking Cardinal Rules: Basketball and the Escort Queen."

Hancock said he frequently talks with Pitino but did not specifically ask if he wanted to be involved.

Several investigations soon followed after Powell's allegations, including ones by the school and the NCAA. Louisville's own investigation found that violations did occur and imposed penalties including sitting out the 2016 postseason in an effort to mitigate NCAA penalties.

The organization in June 2017 ordered Louisville to vacate victories that included the championship and Final Four appearance for activities it described as "repugnant" in its decision. Pitino was suspended for five games for failing to monitor McGee and vowed to fight the penalties. The school and the coach vowed then to fight the penalties.

Atlanta Lawyer: McCoy orchestrated assault

The lawyer for the ex-girlfriend of NFL star LeSean McCoy says the Buffalo Bills running back orchestrated an attack that left her bloody amid attempts to get

her to leave his suburban Atlanta mansion. Attorney Tanya Mitchell Graham says in a statement to news outlets that her client was physically assaulted Tuesday morning by a man who entered the home with no signs of forced entry. The man demanded specific items of jewelry that had been gifted to her from McCoy, who had requested them back on many occasions.

The Associated Press is not identifying the woman, pending further details of the attack.

McCoy and the woman have been in court over his attempts to evict her from the home.

An image of the ex-girlfriend's bloodied and beaten face was shown in a social media post blaming McCoy for the assault. The football player denied the allegations Tuesday.

Atlanta Pacman Jones attacked by employee at airport

Police say former Cincinnati Bengals cornerback Adam "Pacman" Jones was attacked during a run-in with a facility-service employee at the airport in Atlanta.

Atlanta Police spokesman Jarius Daugherty says Jones confronted ABM Industries employee Frank Ragin after Ragin made a "gesture" toward the football player Tuesday night at Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta International Airport. Police say words were exchanged before Ragin struck Jones with a closed fist, causing a cut to Jones' face.

Cellphone video footage shows that Jones and Ragin traded several punches with each other. Jones ultimately knocked Ragin down to the ground with a punch to the face then hit the employee one more time before a man broke up the fight.

Daugherty says that at some point during the fight, Ragin ended up hitting a woman who was with Jones, injuring her hand. He says Ragin was the aggressor and Jones defended himself.

However, there are many state and private military cemeteries nationwide, and their rules may differ from those of the national. Because you didn't mention which category your brother-in-law's cemetery falls under, the best advice I can offer is to contact it and find out what its rules are in circumstances like this.

Anderson stuns Federer in quarterfinal

Nadal, Djokovic, Isner all win to advance to semis.

LONDON — Roger Federer was a point away from a rather tidy, straight-set victory in the Wimbledon quarterfinals. One lousy point.

And then, slowly, over the next two-plus hours, all the way until the fifth set reached its 24th game, as the temperature dropped and the spectators' cries of "Let's go, Roger!" echoed through the shadows, everything came apart for the eight-time champion. Against an opponent who'd never beaten him nor made it this far at the All England Club.

In a stunning turnaround in an unfamiliar setting — No. 1 Court instead of Centre Court — the top-seeded Federer blew a third-set match point and, eventually, all of his big lead in a 2-6, 6-7 (5), 7-5, 6-4, 13-11 loss to No. 8 Kevin Anderson on Wednesday in a 4-hour, 14-minute tussle.

"It was just one of those days where you hope to get by somehow," said Federer, who last played at No. 1 Court in 2015. "I almost could have. I should have."

While his tournament is over, two of his long-time rivals at the top of tennis set up a semifinal showdown: Rafael Nadal and Novak Djokovic. Nadal, who's won two of his 17 Grand Slam titles at Wimbledon, edged 2009 U.S. Open champion Juan Martin del Potro 7-5, 6-7 (7), 4-6, 6-4, 6-4 in a

wildly entertaining match that featured diving shots by both and lasted 4 hours, 48 minutes.

Djokovic, whose 12 major championships include three from the All England Club, got to his first Grand Slam semifinal since 2016 by beating No. 24 seed Kei Nishikori 6-3, 3-6, 6-2, 6-2.

In Friday's other men's match, Anderson will face No. 9 John Isner, the 33-year-old American who reached his first major semifinal in his 41st try by eliminating 2016 runner-up Milos Raonic 6-7 (5), 7-6 (7), 6-4, 6-3. Isner hit 25 aces, saved the only break point he faced, and has won all 95

of his service games in the tournament.

Federer hadn't been broken until facing Anderson. Still, the 20-time major champion was leading by two sets and 5-4 in the third when, with Anderson serving, he got to Ad-Out. He could have ended things right then and there. Federer managed to return a 134 mph serve, but on his next stroke, he shanked a backhand.

Back to deuce. From there, it all began to change. Anderson held for 5-all, broke to 6-5 with a violent return winner off a 97 mph second serve, then staved off three break points and

closed the set with a 133 mph ace.

The comeback was just beginning.

"I had my chances," Federer said, "so it's disappointing."

This was only the third time in Federer's 20 years of contesting Grand Slam matches that he lost after taking the opening two sets; both of the other defeats came in 2011. And, according to the ATP, it's the fifth time Federer lost a match at a major after holding a match point, something else that last happened seven years ago.

How hard was it to see this coming?

First of all, Federer was 4-0 against Anderson, winning every set. But there was more. So much more. Federer was attempting to reach his 13th semifinal at Wimbledon and move closer to title No. 9, both of which would have broken his own records.

He came into the match having won 32 consecutive sets at Wimbledon, a run he stretched to 34 before faltering.

"I just kept on telling myself, 'I have to keep believing.' I kept saying that today was going to be my day," Anderson said, "because you really need that mindset taking the

court against somebody like Roger."

Anderson was the runner-up to Nadal at last year's U.S. Open, but he never made it beyond the fourth round at Wimbledon until this week. He hit 28 aces against Federer, saved nine of 12 break points and managed to hold his own in the rare lengthy baseline rallies.

"It's like that with the big servers," Federer said. "You're never really safe."

As the fifth set became as much a test of mental strength as anything, from 4-all to 6-all to 8-all to 10-all, Anderson stayed steady. It was Federer who blinked, double-faulting to face a break point at 11-all, then slapping a forehand into the net.

Anderson, a 32-year-old South African who played college tennis at Illinois, served it out, ending things with a 128 mph service winner before raising both arms.

LOOKAHEAD TO THURSDAY:

Serena Williams will play in her 35th Grand Slam semifinal against an opponent appearing in her first. Julia Goerges is hoping she can pull off a massive upset against the American — despite losing to her five weeks ago at the French Open. Williams is the big favorite to win an eighth Wimbledon title with all of the top-10 seeded women already knocked out. She's the only former champion left in the field and has a 9-1 record in semifinals at the All England Club. She's also the lowest-ranked woman to reach the last four. The former No. 1 is only ranked 181st after only recently returning from having a baby in November. No. 11 Angelique Kerber faces 12th-seeded Jelena Ostapenko in the other semifinal.

sporting moment since becoming an independent nation in 1991.

France, which won its only title at home in 1998, will have an extra day of rest after beating Belgium 1-0 on Tuesday. Croatia played three straight extra-time matches — two ended in penalty kicks.

Football will not be coming home to England, and there will be no title to match the 1966 triumph at Wembley Stadium. Harry Kane & Co. will deal with the same disappointment that felled Shearer and Platt, Gazza and Wazza, Beckham and Gerrard.

Croatia's legs at the start seemed to carry the weight of so many minutes in the knockout stage, and a pressing England went up quickly. Kevin Trippier curled in a free kick in the fifth minute.

But Croatia found energy after the break when the game opened up, making England's missed first-half opportunities seem all-the-more significant.

Ivan Perisic tied the score in the 68th minute with his fourth goal of the tournament.

Rakitic switched the ball from left flank to right, where Vrsaljko crossed. Walker attempted to clear diving header but Perisic jumped and from behind raised his left boot over Walker's head to poke the ball past goalkeeper Jordan Pickford from about 8 yards.

Four minutes later, Perisic hit Pickford's near post.

Mandzukic scored after Walker stuck out a leg to block Josip Pivacic's cross. The ball popped up and Perisic outjumped Tripper to head the ball behind the defense.

Mandzukic alertly reacted to the unexpected ball in the penalty area, splitting defenders John Stones and Harry Maguire, who had taken four short steps up. The ball bounced twice, Mandzukic ran onto it and one-timed a low, left-footed shot to Pickford's left.

Mandzukic was mobbed by teammates, who jumped on him in the corner and trapped photographers under them in the crush.

England went ahead with its ninth set-piece goal of the tournament, after Luca Modric tripped Dele Alli, giving England a free kick about 25 yards out in the center of the field.

Trippier struck the ball with his right foot and it rose above leaping Dejan Lovren and Mandzukic to the left of the desperate dive of goalkeeper Danijel Subasic, who turned his head and watched the ball land in the upper corner.

With his first international goal, just over a year after his England debut, the 27-year-old Trippier joined David Beckham as the only English players since 1966 to score on free kicks at the World Cup. Choruses of "God Save the Queen" began in England's end.

Kane had a chance to double the lead in the 30th minute when Subasic made a sliding save on his short-range shot and Kane's follow-up effort from the end line hit the post and bounced off the keeper and up as the flag went up. Jesse Lingard sent an open 18-yard shot just wide in the 35th.

England had its moments to come back but could not finish its chances. Lingard failed to connect with a Kane through ball in 78th, Kane miss-hit a header off a free kick in stoppage time, and Stones' header from a corner was cleared off the line by Vrsaljko in the 99th.
