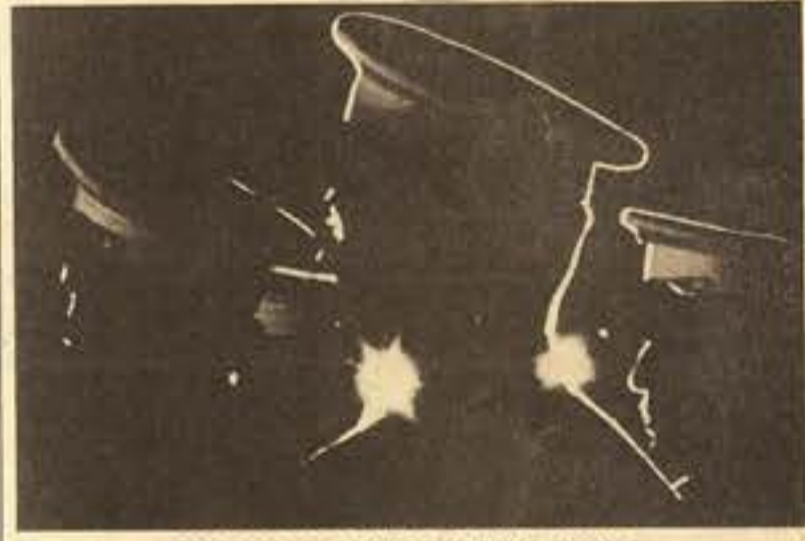

Courts-Martial Report



EDITOR'S NOTE: The information contained in Courts-Martial Report is submitted by the Joint Legal Service Center and is published as a source of information for all Marines.

Private First Class Cecil E. Scott, Headquarters Company, 3d Marines, was convicted at trial by special court-martial of nine specifications of failing to go at the times prescribed to his appointed places of duty; unauthorized absence from Aug. 17-19, 1983; from July 4-9, 1983; from July 10-27, 1983; and knowingly and wrongfully possessing and using marijuana.

He was sentenced to three months confinement at hard labor, forfeiture of \$380 pay per month for three months, and reduction to private.

Lance Corporal Robert J. Hammersley, Marine Air Base Squadron-24, was convicted at trial by special court-martial of wrongfully introducing and distributing 15.4 grams of marijuana; and wrongfully using marijuana.

He was sentenced to four months confinement at hard labor, forfeiture of \$380 pay per month for four months, reduction to private, and a bad-conduct discharge from the U.S. Marine Corps.

Corporal Julio C. Arellano, MABS-24, was convicted at trial by special court-martial of wrongfully possessing marijuana with intent to distribute; and wrongfully distributing 10.5 grams of marijuana.

He was sentenced to six months confinement at hard labor, forfeiture of \$180 pay per month for six months, reduction to private, and a bad-conduct discharge from the U.S. Marine Corps.

PFC Jonathon K. Kipi, Marine Fighter Attack Squadron-212, was convicted at trial by special court-martial of unauthorized absence from June 15-July 15, 1983; and Aug. 4-Sept. 12, 1983.

He was sentenced to 75 days confinement at hard labor, forfeiture of \$380 pay per month for three months, reduction to private, and a bad-conduct discharge from the U.S. Marine Corps.

Private Wayne J. Wardlow, Station Operations and Maintenance Squadron, was convicted at trial by special court-martial of stealing one eyeglass strap, property of the Post Exchange, Hale Koa Hotel, Fort DeRussy, Hawaii.

He was sentenced to 30 days restriction and forfeiture of \$200 pay per month for one month.

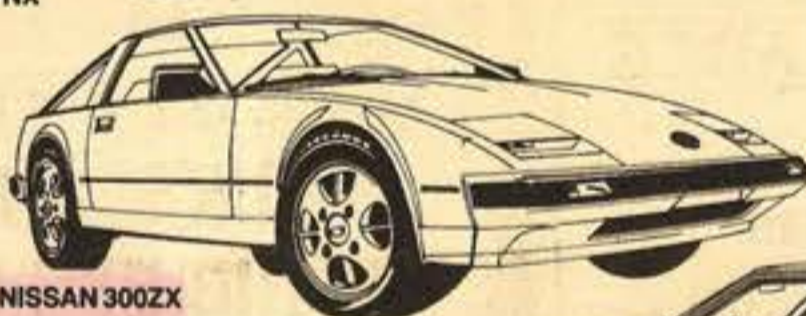

Career alternatives

Veterans, service men and service women who contemplate retirement from military duty within the next year are invited to attend a free "Career Alternatives Seminar" sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce of Hawaii on Nov. 22.

The seminar will be held at the Price Kuhio Federal Building's 5th floor cafeteria from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m.

A panel of business leaders in different industries will speak and answer questions on various career alternatives and job possibilities in Hawaii, on the mainland, and worldwide. Experts will explain how to set realistic goals, identify one's best job prospects, make up "civilian" resumes, and be most effective in interviews. A free 20-page workbook will be provided to each participant by the Chamber of Commerce.

Marine Corps spirit lives on

I've been called a lot of names, but names aren't important. What's important is that I'm the spirit of Marines, past . . . present . . . and future.

Yes, I've been called a lot of names — leatherneck, teufel hunden (Devil Dog), gyrene, but mostly, I've been called Marine.

I've been around for 208 years and let me tell you, I've seen some sights. I remember well when the continental congress proclaimed that two battalions of fighting men be raised, and that they be called Marines. That was quite an honor for me. When Samuel Nicholas was told to be the first commandant, it brought on a deep feeling of pride, knowing I was going to take my first steps along with a nation that was learning to walk. Yes, that was a momentous occasion.

I was around when John Paul Jones was asking Marines to be sharpshooters, firing from his riggings. In those days, we'd close quarters with enemy ships and pick off the French and the British with our rifles as we fired from the masts. I was a youngster then, and some people didn't know exactly what I was supposed to do.

We Marines got a fierce reputation early on. As marksmen we didn't miss. And that tradition has carried on. It brings a smile to my face knowing that traditions like that haven't changed.

I remember when Lieutenant Presley O'Bannon and a few Marines traveled across the desert to raise the flag over a stronghold of the Barbary Coast pirates, who had been robbing our sailing ships. It took a lot of guts and determination . . . crossing in that heat. But young O'Bannon didn't stop until the city of Derne was taken. Yes, that's where the lines, "to the shores of Tripoli," come in.

I remember when the fare for a Marine was a few dollars a month, a batch of potatoes and meat and a grog of brew. That's what we got paid and we sure appreciated it. Yes, things have changed and yet, things have remained the same. If there's trouble brewing, as in olden days, call the Marines.

Back in the 1800s, I remember when the Corps came under the command of a fiery young leader. He wasn't a big man, kind of slight with flaming red hair. But when he spoke, by golly you'd better listen. It wasn't a real strong time for the Marine Corps. We'd settled into an almost lethargic state. But I tell you, when Archibald Henderson spoke, you'd better stand up and pay attention. If you didn't, it was a sure trip to the brig. And those Marines that Archie deemed were not qualified to be marines, well, I remember when he'd stand them in

front of a formation, read off the charges, rip off their emblem and drum them off the base. And that was a literal drumming, with the individual walking between two columns of Marines to the gate.

Those Marines who were not honorably discharged knew they weren't welcome.

And then I remember when the Creek and Seminole Indians began fighting because they didn't want to leave their lands for the reservations. It was nip-and-tuck for the Army until Archibald volunteered the Marines to go fight in Florida. The Army command gladly welcomed the Marines. But Henderson was not content to send the Marines; he decided that he would lead them. So, he left a sergeant major in charge back in Washington, tacked a note to his door that said, "Gone to fight the Indians, be back when the war is over." And it was a hard battle, as the Indians fought stubbornly, until finally on a patch of ground in the swamps of Florida, the Seminoles were left in peace.

Back at the turn of the century, the "Boxers" decided that China belonged to the Chinese and murdered Chinese traders that had dealings with foreigners. They seized the cities of Peking and Tientsin and attacked the foreign legations.

That's when a Marine lieutenant nicknamed "Old Gimlet Eye" made his appearance in Marine Corps history. Smedley D. Butler was a leathery faced, tough officer with a great jutting nose. As he led his Marines against the Boxers in Tientsin, Butler was shot in the leg. After the siege was over, and Peking became the next objective, Butler had persuaded the doctors that he was fit for travel. The Marine contingent advanced over hot, barren country where water was scarce and the temperatures rose to 140 degrees.

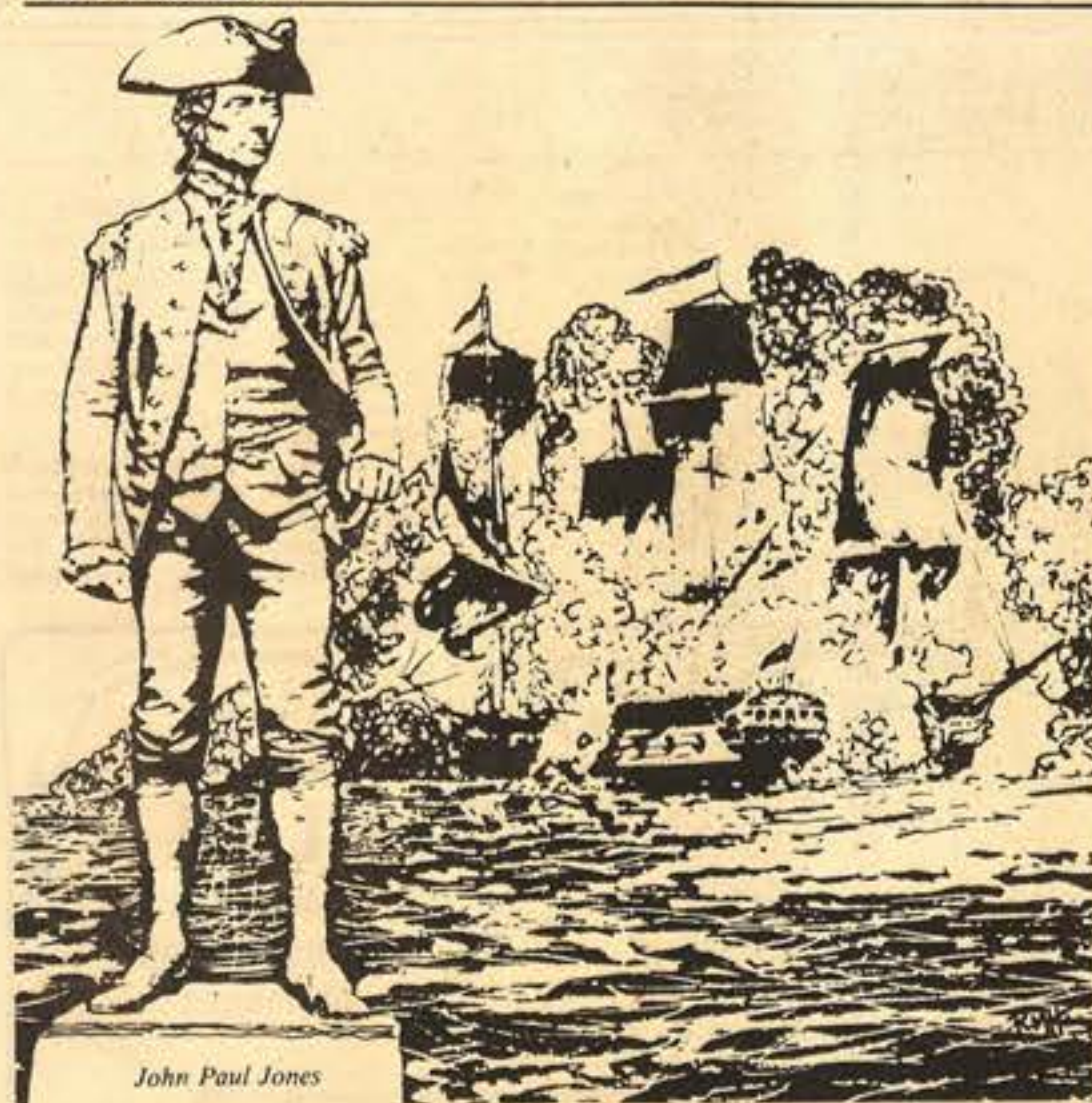
When the Marines engaged the Boxers at Peking, Butler was shot as he turned to shout a command.

Blood oozed from Butler's chest, and his men thought he had been shot through the heart. As they peered over him, he came to and as they pulled off his shirt, they found where a bullet had deflected across his chest, taking with it part of the Marine Corps emblem tattooed on his chest.

Yes, we've been known to fight in every clime and place — like that cold day in November 1950. Marines from "Easy" company were assigned a mission . . . to take Hill 688 in Korea. Other marines had tried . . . and died. The hill was a Chinese stronghold. Marines would have to come up a narrow strip of ground to get to the fortified position. Lieutenant John Yancey prepared his men. Corsairs dropped bombs in the area close to the hill . . . but too far to be effective. Yancey called for another drop . . . none was available.

With quick precision, Yancey's men began their upward fight. The Chinese knew they were coming. Of the 32 Marines that began the climb, six Marines made it to the top. Yancey took a Browning Automatic Rifle from a wounded Marine, propped it on his hip and began firing at the Chinese. Another Marine threw grenade after grenade at the enemy. Soon the enemy fled. But the Marines knew there would be a counter-attack. Ammunition was low. Reinforcements would have a hard time making it to the top of the hill, since the Chinese had it surrounded. But through the mortar fire, a barrel-chested Marine came running up. A machine gun and two boxes of ammunition were his load — the load of two men. The Chinese attacked the Marines, but with the

renewed munitions supply the Marines held.

Later, when a Marine commander was surrounded, gathering his men about him, he threw out his chest and said, "Well they're in front of us, they're behind us. They're to our right and they're to our left, Gentlemen, we have them where we want them. They can't get away." And to his word, Colonel Louis "Chesty" Puller led his Marines through the Chinese.

Yes, I remember another similar incident in Vietnam. A recon patrol was in enemy territory. Soon, they found themselves surrounded by Viet Cong. As the evening turned into night, the Marines were attacked. All were wounded or killed. But one Marine took charge. Gunnery Sergeant Jimmy Howard decided that the hill would not be taken. When their ammunition was depleted, the Marines used rocks throughout the night. In a last ditch effort, the Viet Cong worked their way to the Marines' final stand. Wounded and battered, the Marines stood and held their ground. As morning broke, reinforcements came to the Marines aid. A small group of Marines had held off two companies of Viet Cong.

Yes, as I recall times, dates and names, a warm feeling flows throughout my body. I stand a little bit prouder and taller, remembering the deeds of fellow Marines.

But, it's not just things of the past that bring on a good feeling. More recently, when Marines were subjected to attack by bombing in Beirut, the

hideousness of the act was appalling. On the only day Marines get a chance to get an extra wink in, they were attacked, many still in their racks.

Through the grief and turmoil of the ensuing days, Marines cared for each other. And one Marine, hurt, with tubes going into and out of his body expressed his feelings. As the Commandant stood over him and wished him well, the Marine asked for a piece of paper and wrote the words "Semper Paratus." The words that are a shortened version of what all Marines know to mean "Always Faithful."

As we approach the third century of

our existence, as the spirit of Marines, I hope that everyone will remember what it felt like on graduation day. When we stood tall, straight and proud. Remember when the Marines Hymn played and you felt a tingling up and down your spine. That was me, the spirit of former Marines and Marines to come, telling you that you were a part of something special. That's when you learned what the term "Marine" meant.

On this our birthday, join me in a vow to always uphold those standards that we have set for ourselves — as United States Marines.



Beirut phone service continues

Hundreds of U.S. Marines in Lebanon have been able to speak with family members back home and inform them of their safety, thanks to two free telephone lines between the United States and Beirut, Lebanon, set up by the American Telephone and Telegraph Company.

Shortly after 9:30 a.m., Oct. 26, the first Marine in Beirut spoke directly to an operator at the AT&T communications international operating center in Pittsburgh, Pa. That operator then connected him to his home telephone number so he could

complete his two-minute call.

By the time this first Marine had finished his call, another was waiting to take over the phone, and soon a long line of "leathernecks" crowded the corridor outside the office where the connection was being made. By the end of the first day of service, a second free line was in operation, and nearly 500 members of the 24th Marine Amphibious Unit of the multinational force had informed their families that they were safe in the aftermath of the Oct. 23 terrorist bombing attack.

AT&T said it provided the free international service to help alleviate the concern family members in the United States had about their servicemen who are part of the multinational force. AT&T suggested the free telephone service to the Department of the Navy on Oct. 25, and both sides worked long hours to get it ready.

According to AT&T, the service will remain available 24 hours a day until Headquarters Marine Corps, Washington, DC, and the Maine commander in Beirut, deem that it is no longer necessary.

HQMC toughens pay policy

On July 1, 1973, the Marine Corps began a new program for payment of its members. The Joint Uniform Military Pay System was combined with the Manpower Management System. An entry into the MMS by Unit Diary could update both systems at once. Through this, all computations could be accomplished at the central site, Kansas City, Mo., which would in turn transmit that information to local disbursing offices.

According to ALMAR 195, August 1982, "time-consuming" and "redundant" pay procedures had been retained by many disbursing offices. They had been over-riding the computer generated pay forecasts in an attempt to pay service members exactly what was owed them.

In response, the Commandant of the Marine Corps, through ALMAR 195, established a new pay policy, effective Jan. 1, 1983.

The ALMAR states, "The master military pay account maintained at the central site at Kansas City, Mo. is the official pay record for Marines. Payment effected through JUMPS/MMS shall be based on the computations made at central site. Exceptions to this policy will be limited and strictly adhered to." "An exception to pay policy results from a severe hardship,"

said Captain Gary Munn, assistant disbursing officer, Station Disbursing Office.

"A severe hardship is determined by the individual's commanding officer. No guidance has yet been established as to what constitutes a severe hardship.

"There's a lot of disgruntlement among disbursing personnel about that hardship clause," added Munn. "It seems that a unit will run an entry on the diary, and if it doesn't post by the very next payday, it automatically becomes a severe hardship. The units aren't giving the entries time to post. It takes approximately 10 full working days for an entry to post in the system.

"The pay system is the same as it was in 1973. We're only trying to get units to follow it more closely.

"The new pay policy is designed to get units to report events through the MMS in a timely manner. If events aren't reported as soon as possible, an overpayment could result.

"For example, a service member's Commuted Rations should have stopped last month. If the MMS hasn't received the information, the service member will receive ComRats this month also. He doesn't rate that money, and it will be taken from him later," he explained.

"The problem is that we never hear from an individual who is overpaid, but we sure hear from him if he's been underpaid.

"When an individual receives a 'no pay due', he has actually received all money due to him at that time. He was probably overpaid at some point because of a late entry."

"We would rather the individual give back the money he has been overpaid. The money can be put back into the system, and the service member can remain in a confirmed pay status, always guaranteed of receiving a paycheck.

"If there is a legitimate problem with an individual's pay, he should go to his administrative office. They will go through his service record book to find the pay problem. The disbursing office should only be contacted when all other attempts to correct the problem have failed.

"The pay policy would work fine if units would adhere to it more closely," said Sergeant Jack Guthrie, disbursing clerk. "Many cases that are considered financial hardships by units, really aren't, and could wait until they post in the system."

"There is more reliance on the administrative section now," said Corporal Chuck Maness, disbursing clerk. "This new pay policy sure makes my job easier. It can also be a real headache though when units don't remember we can only pay someone when it shows up in the system."

Booze kills motorcyclists

NORFOLK, Va. (NES) — Alcohol and driving don't mix, especially when motorcycles are involved.

A report by the Naval Safety Center shows alcohol to be a major factor in the rising number of motorcycle fatalities recorded in the first half of 1983. The report lists speed, loss of control and lack of skills as the other three top contributors of those deaths.

In the first six months of 1983, motorcycle fatalities increased by 29 percent, from 38 deaths during January through June 1982. Most of this year's 49 fatalities included a combination of two out of three causes — alcohol, loss of control or speed. The report suggests that increase may be because of the increased popularity of motorcycles among Navy members.

Alcohol was involved in 23 of the 49 fatalities, while seven didn't involve the liquid drug. In the remaining 19 fatalities, it wasn't known whether alcohol was involved.

As in previous reports on motorcycle fatalities, the majority occurred during the hours of darkness on weekends.

Examples of deaths or serious injuries reported to the center for each major cause of accidents include:

- Lack of skills: A Navy member who wanted to buy a motorcycle from a friend asked to take it on a test ride and was killed within 10 minutes.
- Speed: Operator killed and passenger hospitalized after they passed a car at a high rate of speed and were unable to stop for railroad gates that were down.
- Alcohol: After drinking at a bar for several hours, two Navy men got on a motorcycle. The passenger tried to make a pass at a woman pedestrian which caused the driver to lose control of the motorcycle. Both men were hospitalized.

• Loss of control: Sailor entered the freeway, lost control, went down and was run over by a truck.

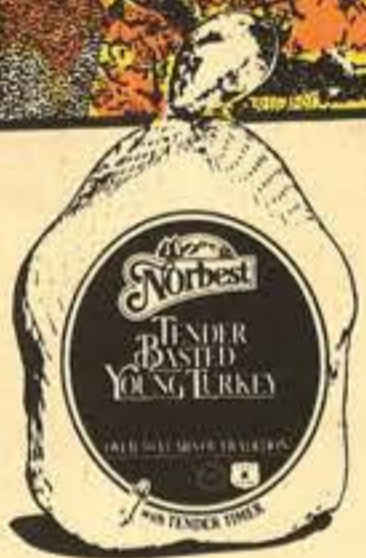

SAN BRUNO, Calif. — As a service to U.S. Marines stationed in Beirut, Lebanon, and their families in the United States, DHL Worldwide Courier Express will airlift correspondence to and from Beirut on a daily basis, Joseph W. Waechter, president of DHL, announced Oct. 27.

"With sporadic telephone service and slow regular mail service, we are offering our worldwide courier capabilities to make air express communication possible to U.S. Marines in Lebanon and their families," explained Waechter.

"One of the most agonizing aspects of a situation like this is the inability of Marines to contact their families in the United States and for families to get messages to the Marines," he added.

The DHL network serves over 120 countries worldwide and includes 400 stations, providing service to more communities than any other courier service. In 1982, DHL handled more than 10 million shipments. Founded in 1969, DHL is a privately held company. Its name derives from the first initial of each of the last

names of its founders — Dalsey, Hillblom and Lynn.

DHL, the world's largest worldwide courier express service, will airlift correspondence free of charge on a daily basis now through the duration of the emergency. If a family member of a U.S. Marine has correspondence to send to Lebanon, here is what to do: Drop off correspondence up to 8 ounces (letters only, no gifts) at the following Honolulu address: 530 B-5 Paiea Street, Honolulu, HI 96819. Include addressee's proper name and address (in the usual military procedure), return address and the telephone number of sender. Bring identification, as this service is provided by DHL only for immediate family members of U.S. Marines in Lebanon. No pick ups from sender can be made.

If a DHL location is not nearby, immediate family members may mail correspondence (up to 8 ounces) to:

- DHL Marine Airlift
- DHL Airways Cargo

Robert Conrad to portray Marine colonel

PARRIS ISLAND, S.C. — Television fans who remember Robert Conrad's salty portrayal of World War II ace Pappy Boyington in "Baa Baa Black Sheep" a few years ago will be glad to know the veteran actor is once again donning a Marine Corps flight suit.

"Hard Knox," a pilot series being produced by NBC, stars Conrad as a retired Marine aviator — Colonel Joe Knox — who moves back to rural Illinois to take command of the military prep school he attended as a boy, according to Gunnery Sergeant Tom Griggs of the Corps' Los Angeles-based public affairs office.

"Part of the first episode is being filmed at (Marine Corps Air Station) Yuma, Ariz.," said

Griggs. "It shows Conrad as a fighter pilot who decides to take leave when taken off flight status because of medical problems.

An added bonus for old *Black Sheep* watchers, said Griggs, is that the colonel's squadron maintenance chief — played by Red West — also goes on leave and accompanies his boss to Illinois to "get that school squared-away."

The red-haired West was a cigar-chomping senior staff noncommissioned officer in the earlier series, as well, gruffly advising "college boy" pilots how to take proper care of their Corsairs, this time, the F-4 Phantom will be the featured bird.

Captain Nancy LaLuntas, reached on location in western Illinois where she serves as technical advisor to the project, said that the "leave" taken by the Conrad and West characters

becomes a de facto retirement when, at the end of the film, it is inferred that the pair will stay on, "continuing to whip the school into shape."

LaLuntas, a former enlisted Marine and 1976 Parris Island alumnus, said that the proposed series is "positive for the Marine Corps and positive for the Marine Corps Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps program (upon which the boys' uniforms and other details are based)."

And, the skipper promises "a nice haircut scene" in the pilot, symbolizing Knox's resolve to rid his alma mater of its present "loose, undisciplined state."

While the earlier Conrad sortie into Marine television achieved some success, observers criticized *'Black Sheep'* as lacking authenticity. But the former "Wild, Wild West" star told the

Yuma Daily Sun that he is "gonna make this ('*Hard Knox*') absolutely authentic."

"I don't want to do what I did to old Pappy Boyington," Conrad said. "We needed a little hype because we were on against *'Charlie's Angels'* so we put in four nurses. But Pappy didn't seem to mind. He could handle that — or most anything."

Griggs expects that new project to air in January as a two-hour movie, followed by what the projection staff "hopes will be further episodes."

Award winner: 'not a one-man show'

"The word 'honored' comes to mind," said Staff Sergeant David L. Watson, Provost Marshal's Office, after being selected as one of the Honolulu Council of the Navy League's grand award winners.

Watson was among 60 winners from the Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard who earned the distinguished Navy League Award, and was named the outstanding enlisted winner at the luncheon in their honor Oct. 27.

Watson was recognized for his outstanding contributions to the community, but made it clear in his remarks that "it wasn't a one-man show." He has been involved with Little League, Hawaii Joint Police Association, Summer Youth Programs/Summer Fun, Carole Kai bed and raft races, Honolulu Police Department Explorer Post, Mokapu Elementary School Parent-Teacher-Student Association... the list goes on.

"My favorite group? All of them," Watson said. "Each group I work with is satisfying in different ways." The common denominator for his activities is undoubtedly children: though, Boy Scouts to Girl Scouts, kindergarten to the Teen Club, Watson works with kids.

"When it comes to kids, my heart's there," he said. Watson has worked primarily in community relations and crime prevention with the Provost Marshal's Office, and many of his duties have brought him in contact with children.

"It was really mind-boggling because of the number of kids who

were afraid to even look at a policeman," Watson said, remembering the first couple of times he entered the kids' turf at Mokapu Elementary School and other places.

When Watson began reaching into the classroom to further understanding and communication between the military police and the youngsters, some of the kids shook with fear just standing next to him. But the barriers wore down, and when Watson leaves a classroom now it's to the tune of hugs and kisses, or admiration from the older kids.

Watson presented lectures to more than 25,000 people in the military and civilian communities during the past two years, and through his speeches, demonstrations and volunteer work, he's brought understanding and cooperation between the community and the security department.

Watson says that it's become difficult to distinguish between his professional and private interests since the two have nearly merged, but his number one priority is still the Marine Corps and his duty as a military policeman. "I have to be careful in my commitments," he said. "If I say I'm going to do something, or help organize an event, I have to have the time to do it. Otherwise, I won't commit myself."

The 27-year-old San Francisco native has received support for his endeavors from many sources, particularly from the security department. "If it weren't for the backing of my superiors, I wouldn't have been able to accomplish as much as I have," Watson said. More support came from other professionals here,

especially from the medical department and Family Service Center, Watson said.

The awards program honoring the 60 Navy League Award winners came a few days after the bombing of the Marine headquarters building at Beirut International Airport, and the Marines in Lebanon were foremost in the leathernecks' minds at the luncheon.

"The recognition I received as the grand award winner paled in comparison to the sacrifice those Marines made," Watson said. "I

feel very honored about winning, but their sacrifices make me feel very humble."

Other Navy League award winners are: Captain William Herran, Headquarters and Service Battalion, Camp H.M. Smith; First Lieutenant Henry Leonard, 1st Battalion, 12th Marines; Gunnery Sergeant Ronald Koebe, Marine Heavy Helicopter Squadron-463; Staff Sergeant Edward Steinhauser, Brigade Service Support Group; and Sergeant Jerry Lewis, Marine Air Control Squadron-2.

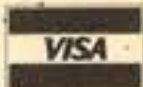

Soldier deems Marines 'best'

EDITOR'S NOTE: This article originally appeared in the *Washington Evening Star*, Nov. 10, 1947 and was brought to the *Hawaii Marine's* attention by *The Boot*, published at Parris Island, S.C. The columnist, Henry McLemore, served as an Army colonel in Europe during World War II.

I am glad I saved my little soldier's cap.

I threw away my trousers, my coat, and my combat shoes. The government took my M-1 rifle, my carbine, and my long drawers.

But out of it I saved my little cap. It's ringed with the blue ribbon of the infantry. I'm glad I saved my little cap because I want to tip it today. I want to take off that cap in honor of the only fighting organization in the world that is better than the infantry.

I want to tip my cap to the Marines.

Today the Marine Corps observes its 172nd anniversary. From the time the Marines were authorized by the Continental Congress up until today, they stand as America's finest fighting men.

Any man who fought for his

country has pride for the outfit he was in. Men like me who waddled down the dirty long road will argue all night that the rough end of the stick belongs to the infantry. Sailors will tell you that sea power is everything.

Yet when a Marine walks into the room you gotta' shut up, because his heart, beats to the tune of a song that's on the level. Let the children sing "Near You," but when a Marine sings or whistles, he whistles or sings a story of bravery that has been matched, perhaps, but never outdone.

The Marines walked into Guadeloupe in 1798, and they didn't spare the blood. They added "The Shores of Tripoli" in 1804, and in 1847 they wrote "Montezuma" into their hymn. I could get very sentimental about the Marines, but I'd rather put it this way:

... The Marines... are the gents who come in first. When they lower the boats, the Marines jump in. If you don't know how dangerous or rugged coral is, the Marines can tell you. They have been there. The fresh blood and plasma is late, but the Marines don't wait until it gets there. They are the Americans who look at it, don't like it, and say to

themselves, "Let's get a toe-hold for the other boys."

This may be treason to the blue that I wore on my cap, but the Marine is a better soldier than the Infantryman. He's meaner, and that's what makes for a good soldier.

World War II is slipping into the mist of yesterday, and we Americans are forgetting what so many men did for us. Even the dismal honk of the ship bringing back the war dead does not arouse us. Men who gave their lives for this country are being buried while we fret over meatless Tuesdays and eggless Thursdays.

Yet I declare that in any Marine encampment in this country, or wherever Marines are stationed throughout this world, shoes are shined, rifles are cleaned, and a bugle's call will send them to the fullest fulfillment of a citizen — the defense of his country.

The Marine's motto, if my Latin teacher didn't lie to me, is *Semper Fidelis*. To my knowledge a Marine has never violated that motto.

I hope that this is a tribute to the Marines. If I had a son, and he lived up to the Marine tradition, I, as a father, could ask no more, because I would be the father of a MAN.

Seagoing hospitals to support Marine action

WASHINGTON (NES) — The words "seagoing hospital" will take on even more meaning when conversion of the Navy's new hospital ship is complete. The hospital will be constructed in the hold of a merchant tanker where thousands of gallons of liquids were once stored. The new ship will primarily support U.S. Marines during amphibious assaults.

Converting a tanker into a hospital ship will be relatively simple. "The hospital will be constructed ashore in modules and then be lifted into the hull," said Captain William Phillips, Medical Corps. The captain was the last commanding officer of the hospital on board USS Sanctuary (AH 17), the Navy's last hospital ship, decommissioned in 1975. He is currently the director of Surface Medicine at the Naval Medical Command in Washington, D.C.

T-AHX 19 — as the ship is designated — will have more medical facilities than Sanctuary did, and equipment will be the newest available. "The new hospital ship will be much more mission effective because of the increase in the number of operating rooms — 12 on the new ship compared with three on Sanctuary," said Phillips. "That reduces the waiting time to get a patient into an operating room, increasing the patient's survivability."

In addition to 12 operating rooms, the new hospital ship will feature 1,000 patient beds,

four X-ray rooms, an 80-bed intensive care unit and a 50-bed casualty reception/trauma area.

The new ship will also be much larger than previous hospital ships. In fact, at 894 feet long, 105 feet wide and displacing 49,000 tons, it will be nearly as large as USS New Jersey (BB 62). In comparison, a hospital ship the Navy commissioned for service in the Spanish American War — USS Solace (AH 2) — only displaced about the same tonnage as a Knox-class frigate. Sanctuary was 520 feet long and displaced about 15,000 tons.

The Navy's first hospital ship — USS Red Rover — was even smaller, though, displacing 786 tons. The ship was a side-wheel steamer used as a barracks ship by the Confederacy early in the Civil War. After capture by Union forces, it was converted into a summer hospital boat for the Army's western flotilla. The Navy purchased the ship on Sept. 30, 1862, and commissioned it on Dec. 26. The ship operated mainly along the Mississippi River during the war.

Red Rover carried a crew of 47 and a medical department of about 30.

The Navy's newest hospital ship, however, will carry a larger crew and have several times as many medical people as Red Rover. Facilities for more than 1,000 medical specialists and nearly 500 other Navy people to operate the new hospital will be built in during the conversion.

The ship will be manned by a Military Sealift Command crew of 68.

Since the Navy plans to save money by keeping the new ship in a restricted operating status — somewhere between active and reserve — a full-time hospital crew will not be assigned. If the ship is called up for service, it will have five days to be in a fully operational status, and a Navy hospital crew will be assigned from mostly active duty people and some reservists. Reservists will then be called up to fill billets left vacant by the active duty people transferred to the ship.

A merchant tanker will be converted into the new hospital ship at National Steel and Shipbuilding Co. in San Diego for \$180 million. Delivery is scheduled for late 1986. The contract for the first ship includes an option for a second hospital.

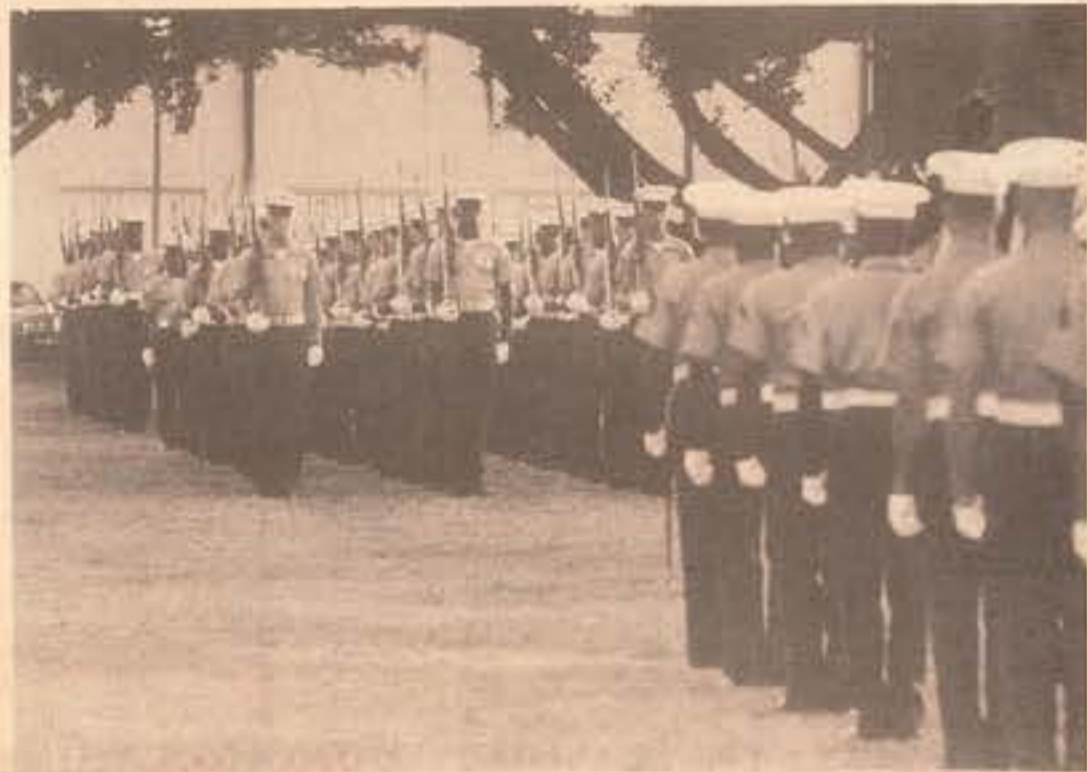

Marines celebrate anniversary, honor comrades' sacrifices

MARINE BARRACKS, Pearl Harbor, Hawaii — The Marine Barracks Sunset Parade held Nov. 4 in commemoration of the 208th Marine Corps Birthday, dazzled the audience with its usual ceremonial spit and polish, but the atmosphere in this year's performance took on a more somber tone because of the loss of fellow Marines and sailors in Beirut and Grenada.

Promptly at 6 p.m. the flag, howed in solemn half-mast respect for those killed-in-action, was lowered into the waiting arms of a Marine in Dress Blue uniform. As the flag was gently gathered in, the Fleet Marine Force, Pacific Band played, piercing the night with the strains of the Star Spangled Banner.

A moment later, Old Glory reappeared on the parade deck accompanied by the Marine Corps colors and two riflemen. The color

guard moved silently to the center of the field and stood rigidly at attention as the FMFPac Saluting Battery fired a booming 21-gun salute in honor of the parade's reviewing officer, Lieutenant General Charles G. Cooper, commanding general, Fleet Marine Force, Pacific and Marine Corps Bases, Pacific.

The evening's ceremony included a historical uniform pageant in which leathernecks from Marine Barracks, Pearl Harbor, bedecked in the numerous uniforms worn by Marines since Nov. 10, 1775 took their turns in the spotlight as the parade's narrator brought history to life for the hundreds in attendance.

A highlight of the parade was a brief but poignant speech from LtGen. Cooper on the occasion of the Corps' birthday and those Marines and sailors who have made the supreme sacrifice.

Included in his message was the general's insistence that the Navy-Marine Corps team can be

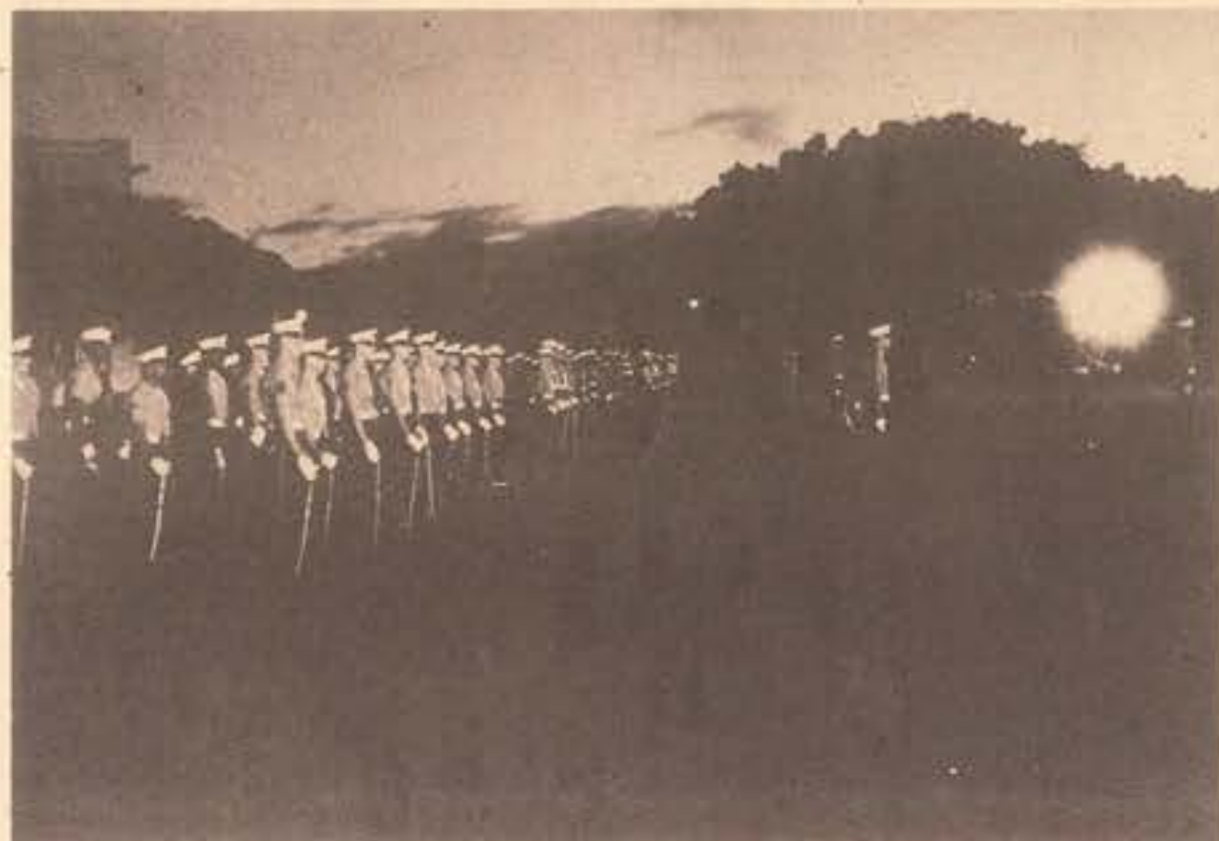
compared to a "zipper that has never been tighter," graphically emphasizing that the two services are inexorably bound together in defense of the nation.

At the conclusion of LtGen. Cooper's speech, a short benediction was offered followed by the haunting requiem of echo taps.

After a moment's silence, the crisp command of "pass in review" was given and Marines on the field snapped to attention.

With the FMFPac Band leading the way, three companies of Barracks' Marines paraded in front of the reviewing stand. As the men marched smartly off the field, the band remained and concluded the ceremony with the traditional playing of the Marines' Hymn. When the first notes filled the air, spectators and guests alike quickly rose to attention.

For the Marines present, it was a fitting close to the parade, a living reminder of fierce pride, patriotism and tradition.

Grapplers contort, thrash opponents

The two antagonists stand poised, ready to attack. Nothing moves, and then suddenly, quicker than the eye can see, one launches an attack. A knee hits the mat as he moves, low and forward. A head travels into the opponents' stomach; arms wrap around the waist, and suddenly, two bodies go crashing down. Using the opponent's body as a lever, the "victim" is quickly helpless.

"We've got some wrestlers here who can go a long way," said Captain "Rocky" Chavez, wrestling coach. "Lance Corporal Ronnie Buggs is hoping to make

it to the Olympics. He was stationed in Quantico last year and competed in the All-Marine team. If he keeps working, he'll make it.

"When the program started in September, there were about 20 people coming to work out. Some came for a couple of weeks and then quit. Others couldn't come out Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday nights. That's when practices are held. But we've started picking up wrestlers now."

As the coach spoke, grapplers were busy working, learning and improvising new moves. Grunts and groans could be heard as bodies twisted and thrashed on the practice mats. Bodies moved sometimes in sinuous motion and

other times in quick, choppy movements, fighting to gain an advantage. Some of the more advanced "wraslers" attacked and parried so quickly that the movements seemed to flow from one point to another.

"What you have to do is move your opponent," Chavez stressed to the assembled grapplers. "If you can get him going the way you want him to go, then it should be easy to take him down."

Reaching for one of the grapplers, Chavez gives a practical demonstration of a take down. Swift forward attack, a hand hold for leverage and down goes the "opponent."

A smallish Marine had been working quietly in the back-

ground. His opponent was being subjected to quick take downs. Chavez had him come forward and "show his favorite take down."

"What I like to do is a one-two move," related Private First Class Peter Odn. "Once you get him (opponent) moving the way you want him to, then all he feels is this . . . as he goes down." Odn

demonstrated his move. "Odn wrestled in the 'World' class," said Chavez. "He's small for college, about 110 pounds, but he's fantastic. He's been working hard, I see him as one of the best there is."

"We've got some wrestlers in some of the standard weight classes, but we're hurting for some of the heavyweight and super

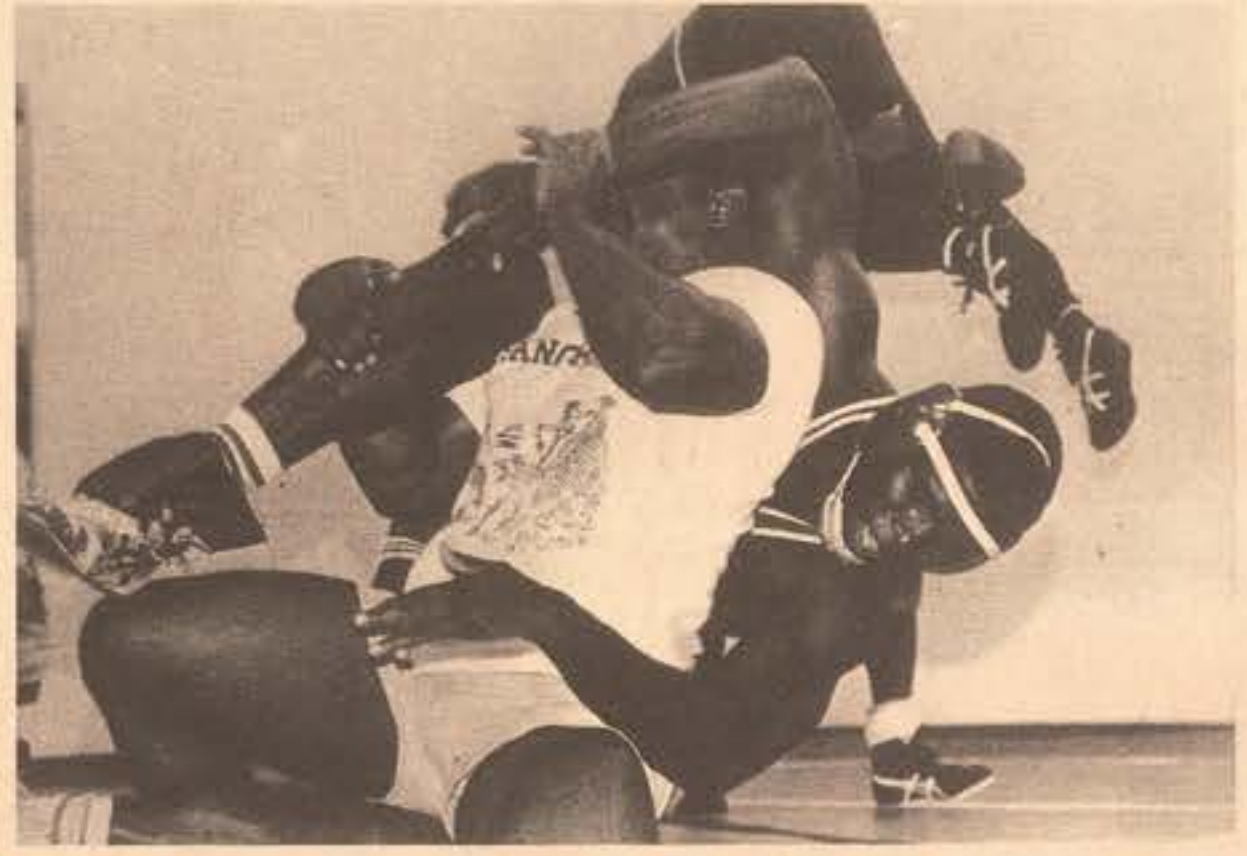
heavyweight classes. We'll be competing in a match here Nov. 9. Buggs and Odn are very good, some of the other wrestlers need some development. "Hammer" (Corporal Gary Horn) and (Private John) Baldwin are really coming along."



Marine varsity team edges Hawaii Pacific

Spectators hollered, jeered, and stomped their feet as the Marine Corps varsity basketball team here barely pulled out a victory against Hawaii Pacific College, 65-63, Thursday night.

Staff Sergeant Norris Chappell, Brigade Service Support Group, led his team in scoring with 25 points.

"We have some excellent leadership this year from Chappell, an All-Marine basketball player," Best added. "Corporal Lary Titus, Marine Air Control Squadron-2 and Cpl James Puckett, CommSptCo, along with Chappell, played for me last year and I look to them for leadership."

"There are some new players on the team this year and they're coming around well. Our greatest advantage occurs when the whole team strikes together and supports each other," concluded Best.

"We played a real good game," said Puckett. "We played together and talked. We haven't always done that."

"It was a real rough game, but we held it together this time," said Hooks. "We played smart ball and everybody worked together, unlike a couple of other games. We looked more like a team this time."

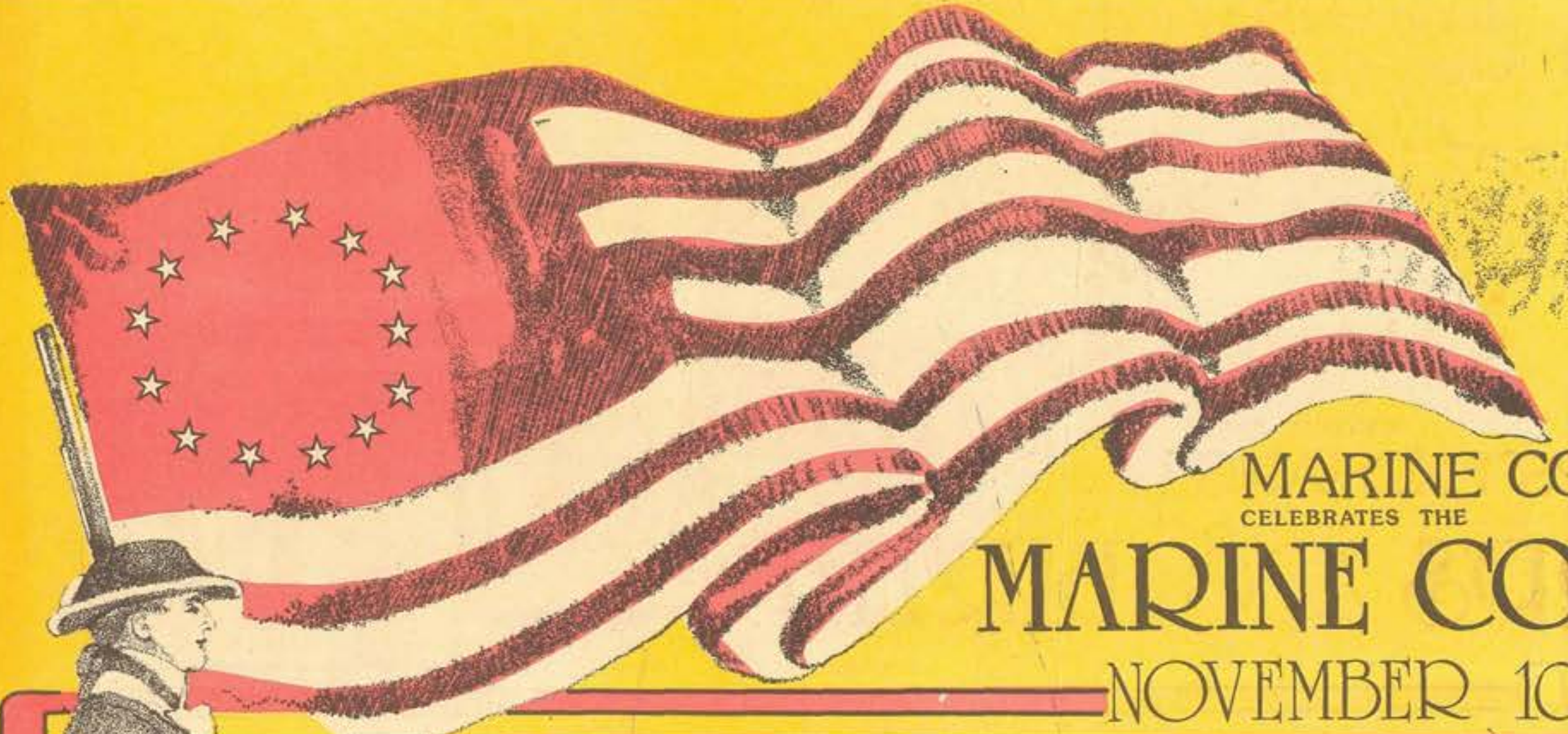

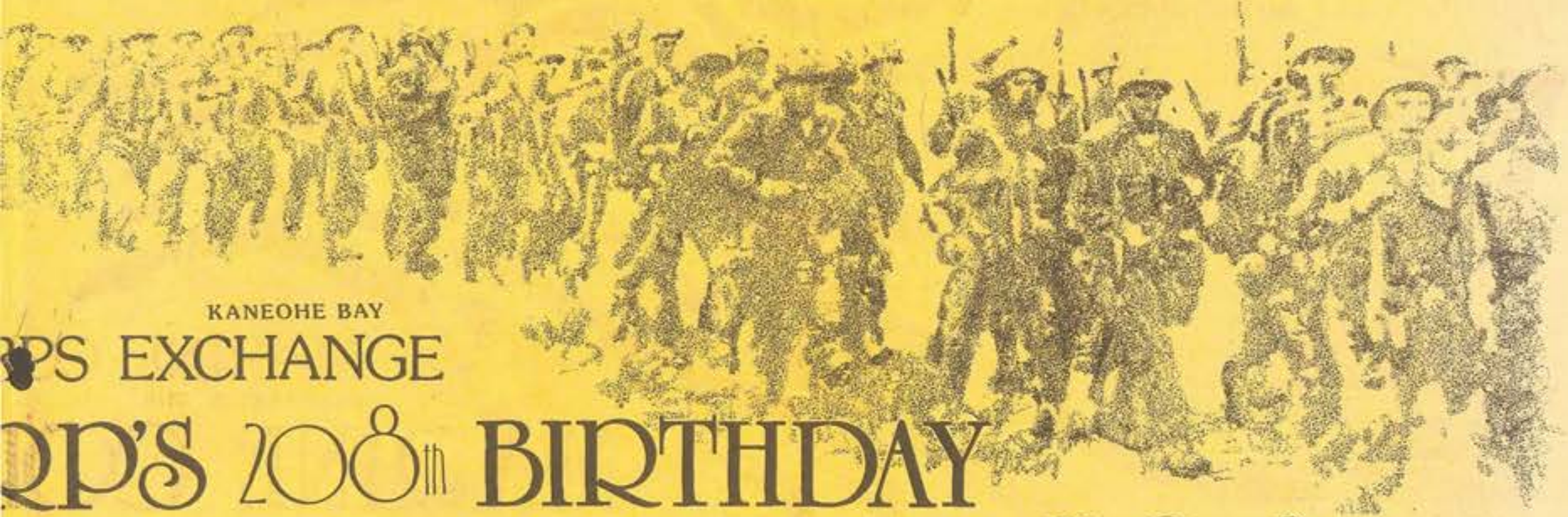

Army-Navy football game moves to Pasadena, Calif.

WASHINGTON (NES) — For the first time, the Army-Navy football game, held traditionally in Philadelphia, will be played on the West Coast in Pasadena, Calif.'s famed Rose Bowl Stadium on Nov. 25. Kickoff is slated for 11:45 a.m. (Pacific Standard Time) and will be broadcast nationally by ABC-TV.

The historic move was brought about by the Army-Navy '83 Foundation, a non-profit organization established last spring to plan and organize the event. According to Robert H. Finch, foundation president, "This is not just a game, but a Thanksgiving celebration salute to the two service academies that train America's future Army and Navy officers."

In keeping with tradition since the first Army-Navy game in 1890, cadets from the U. S. Military Academy in West Point, N. Y., and midshipmen from the U. S. Naval Academy in Annapolis, Md., will attend the game. More than 9,000 cadets and midshipmen will be flown to the West Coast at no expense to the government or the taxpayers.

"The entire logistical operations of the game, including airlifting cadets and midshipmen across the country and their room and board while visiting Southern California, will be supported by private contributions," said Finch.

About 8,000 cadets and midshipmen will be housed and fed by host families in the Southern California area through a foundation-sponsored program called "Adopt a Cadet/Midshipman Program." The remaining 1,000 will stay in hotels.

"We are looking for families who are interested in learning firsthand about military academies and our future military officers. This is an exciting opportunity for both the cadets, midshipmen and host families," said Finch, a former California

lieutenant governor and a former U. S. Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare. "We want the cadets and midshipmen to feel at home during their stay in Southern California," he added.

"We are certain that participating families will enjoy having future military personnel in their homes to celebrate the holiday and this once-in-a-lifetime event," Finch said. Pasadena area people interested in the "Adopt a Cadet/Midshipman Program" should write the Army-Navy '83 Foundation located at 11 W. Del Mar Blvd. (Suite 201), Pasadena, Calif. 91105. The telephone number is (213) 796-7049.

Rolf G. Arnhyrn, a 1953 graduate of West Point and executive vice president of both the foundation and the Pasadena Chamber of Commerce, was instrumental in bringing the 1983 Army-Navy game to the West Coast. He encouraged the services to move the rivalry after research showed a large number of active and retired military personnel living in Southern California.

"Our outstanding Rose Bowl facility is available for major games beyond the annual Rose Bowl game on New Year's Day," said Arnhyrn. "Our community leaders recognized that the economic impact of an Army-Navy game played here in the Rose Bowl would result in approximately \$6 million of revenue to Pasadena and 10 times that amount in tourist income to the entire Southern California area."

The activities for Army-Navy week, Nov. 20-26, begin Nov. 22 and feature a star salute to the military; coaches breakfast; Rotary/Kiwanis luncheon; combined band and glee club concert; a reception hosted by California Governor George Deukmejian; and military night at Disneyland. On game day, Nov. 25, there will be a breakfast hosted by Pasadena Mayor Loretta

Glickman and a parade composed of the entire Corps of Cadets and Brigade of Midshipmen.

The Navy, coached by Gary Tranquill, will headquarter at the Huntington-Sheraton in Pasadena Holiday Inn.

The cost of the entire event is estimated at \$5 million. The 500-member foundation has raised its assets from the private sector and anticipates no profit from the event.

The Navy holds the edge in the rivalry between the academies — leading by a margin of 39 wins to the Army's 37, with seven ties. More recently, the Navy has won five consecutive matches, including last year's 24-7 victory in Philadelphia.

Game tickets cost \$25 each, and premium seats are available for \$25 plus an additional \$25 donation. All seating is reserved and available on a first come, first-served basis through nationwide Ticketron outlets.

"Pasadena is proud and pleased to host the 1983 Army-Navy Game and to provide a once-in-a-lifetime experience to the 105,000 fans attending the game and all its activities," said Arnhyrn.

Uniform prices hiked in new fiscal year

HQMC, WASHINGTON, D.C. — With the new fiscal year, the individual cost of replacing uniform clothing items showed little significant change from last year's prices.

The Defense Personnel Support Center in Philadelphia announced those new prices, effective Oct. 1, that shows a \$10.94 "overall" decrease in men's clothing from last year, and only a \$2.27 increase in women's. This year, a full seabag issue will cost \$591.42 for men and \$668.75 for women.

One additional item was added to the clothing outlet's shelves. The green, wool scarf has been approved for both men and women and will cost \$5.08. No mandatory date has been set to own the scarf; however, it is available at various cash sales outlets and authorized for immediate wear. The women's red scarf is no longer authorized.

H&S was charged with a penalty which moved the ball to the 2. On the next play Bags hit

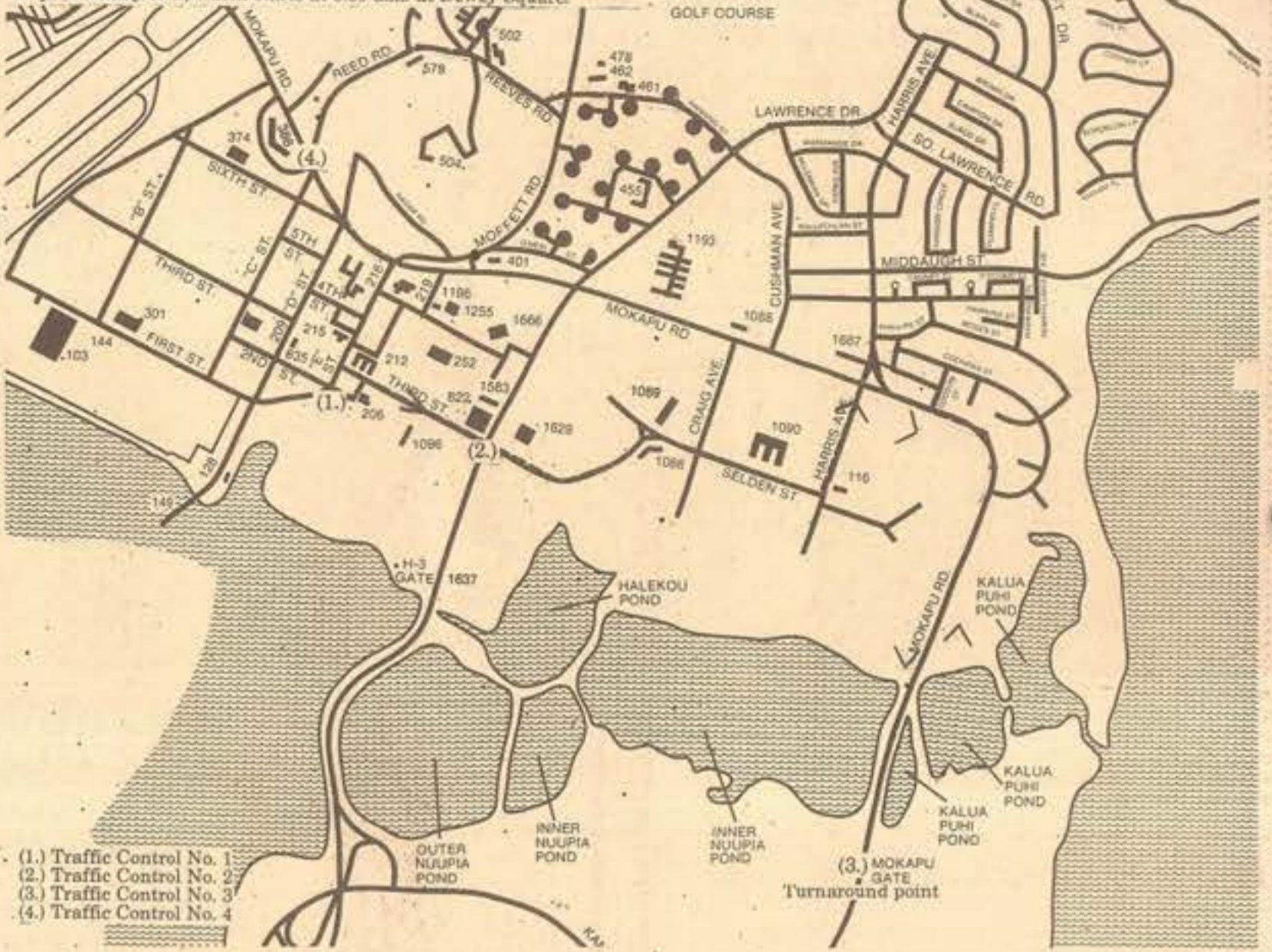
Cpl L. Terry over the middle for the touchdown. The extra point was good. The final score was 17-7, Rag Bag.

Corps' new turret

MCAGCC, Twentynine Palms, Calif. — By fall of this year, Marine Corps, Navy and Air Force crash crews will be receiving a new, low-profile and compact turret designed to fit aboard the M-1000 and new P-19 Crash Trucks.

The new turret, Style 3462, is of rugged brass construction, weighs 65 pounds, is 18 inches tall, 14 inches wide and 16½ inches in length, has 360 degree horizontal rotation and a 500 gallon-per-minute flow rate.

"This piece of gear is great because it is much easier to control and, at the same time, allows you to see what you are doing," said Lance Corporal Duane Dabney, a member of the crash crew at the Expeditionary Air Field here.

"It is smaller than what we currently have, so it makes it much easier to look over," the three-year crash crewman added.

"The spray pattern is better, making the transition from a fog pattern to a straight stream much smoother. And the new turret is more stable and doesn't require locking lugs on its base to keep it from vibrating and moving all over the place," he concluded.

"Among its other features, the turret has no need for periodic maintenance because moving components are permanently sealed with factory lubricated O-rings," Troutner said. "From what I've heard while taking the turret to various bases for testing and comments, all the company is going to have to do is modify the 'T' handle which regulates the flow. We will put a larger handle on it giving the operator a firmer and more positive grip."

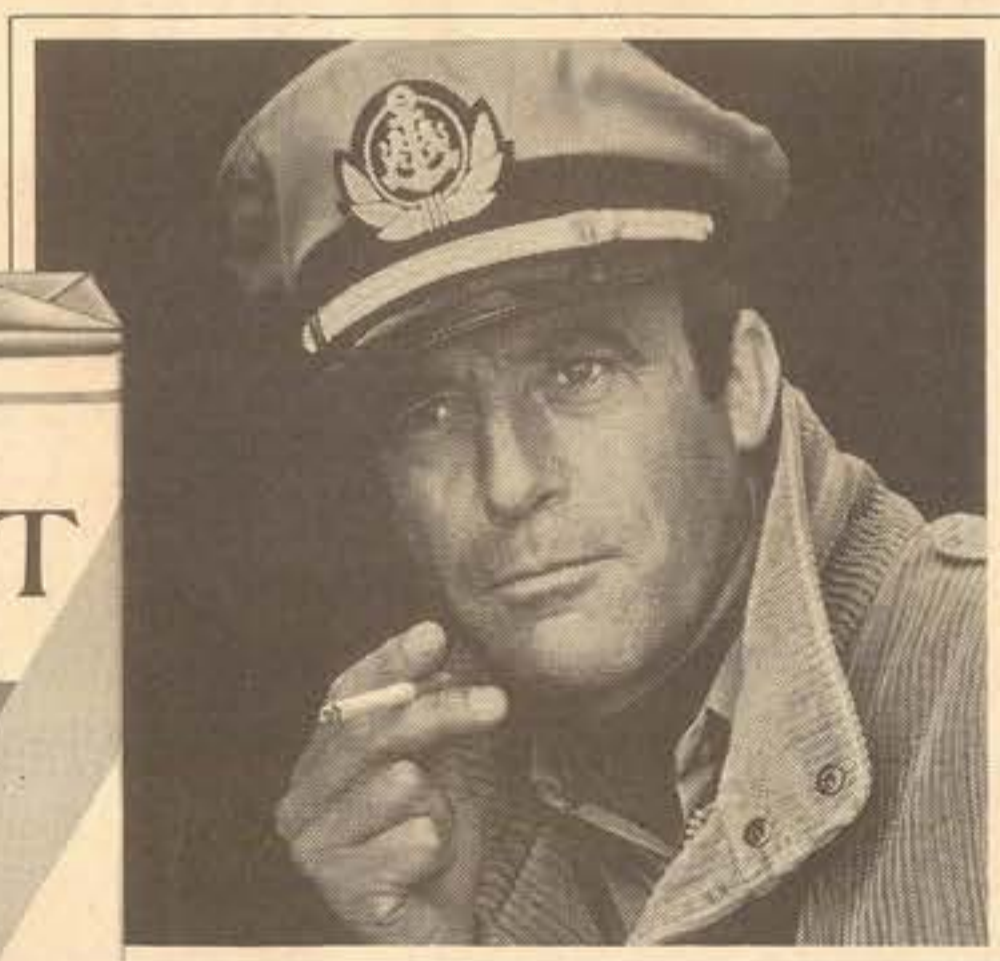

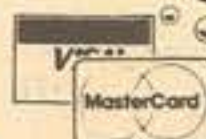
