

Girl Scout Slogan: "Do a good turn daily"

The Girl Scout Sign: The right hand is raised shoulder high with the three middle fingers extended and the thumb crossing over the palm to hold down the little finger. These 3 fingers represent the three parts of the Girl Scout Promise. You give the sign when:

- You say the Promise
- You are welcomed into Girl Scouting at an investiture ceremony
- You greet other Girl Scouts and Girl Guides.

The Quiet Sign: This is used in meetings and other gatherings to let people know it is time to stop talking. The sign is made by raising your right hand high. As people in the group see the quiet sign, they stop talking and also raise their hands. Once everyone is silent, the meeting continues.

The Girl Scout Handshake: This is a formal way of greeting other Girl Scouts and Girl Guides. You shake hands with the left hand and give the Girl Scout sign with your right hand. The left handed handshake represents friendship because the left hand is closer to the heart.

Troop Government: We divide members into small groups called Patrol. Patrols choose patrol name, patrol slogan, patrol leaders, and assistant patrol leaders. A kaper chart lists jobs and who does them. Members of the patrol should rotate the leadership jobs so that everyone has an opportunity.

Blue – piety, sincerity, and loyalty

The World Trefoil Pin: The international symbol of Girl Scouting. The three trefoil leaves represent the three parts of the <u>promise</u>: "To serve God and my country, to help people at all times, and to live by the Girl Scout Law." Your World Trefoil Pin shows that you are a part of this global organization.

The Birthday of Girl Scouting in the United States of America is **March 12**. It marked the day in 1912 when Juliette Gordon Low officially registered the organization's first 18 girl members in Savannah, Georgia.

Low, Juliette Gordon (nicknamed Daisy): Founder of Girl Scout of USA was born on October 31, 1860.


World Thinking Day: Celebrated by Girl Guides and Girl Scouts throughout the world, February 22 is the birthday of Lord Baden-Powell and lady Baden-Powell. This is the day for Girl Scouts and Girl Guides to think about their sisters around the world, through special projects, international program activities or pen pal projects.

World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts (WAGGGS): An international educational association for girls with a membership of eight million.

The World Centers: WAGGGS has four world centers. The Cabana is in Cuernavaca, Mexico; the Chalet is in Adelboden, Switzerland; Pax Lodge is at the Olave Center in London, England; and Sangam is in Pune, India.

The Pledge of Allegiance

I pledge allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America, and to the Republic for which it stands: one Nation under God, indivisible, With Liberty and Justice for all.



Color-in the United States of America Flag

The American flag was adopted in 1777 and originally called The Stars and Stripes. Over the years, tradition has given meaning to the colors.

RED is for hardiness and valour

WHITE is for purity and innocence

BLUE is for vigilance, perseverance and justice

The US Code declares that a flag displayed horizontally or vertically against a wall should show the Union (the blue portion) at the top and to the viewers left.

Also this from a book about the flag published in 1977 by the House of Representatives...

"The star is a symbol of the heavens and the divine goal to which man has aspired from time immemorial; the stripe is symbolic of the rays of light emanating from the sun."

The National Flag of Free Vietnam has yellow background and three horizontal red bands in the middle of the flag.

The Meaning of National Flag of Free Vietnam

The yellow background represents the ancestral land and the skin color of Vietnamese race. The yellow color also represents earth (one of five elements - metal, wood, water, fire, and earth) symbolizing the territory and the national sovereignty. That is why the oriental emperors in the past wore Hoang Bao (yellow emperial robe) and proclaimed themselves Hoang De (Yellow Emperors).

The red color represents fire (one of five elements mentioned above). The red color is also the color of the South and symbolizes a brave, un-submissive, heroic, and independent race in the south region.

The three red bands represent the three regions of Vietnam: North, Central, and South. But, these three regions unite in the national home, the home of Vietnamese people, who always love and protect one another.

Mentoring Awards

Counselor-In-Training (CIT)

Take a leadership course designed by council on outdoor experiences and work with younger girls over the course of a camp session.

Volunteer-in-Training (VIT)

Find a mentor volunteer who is currently the adult volunteer for a group of girls @ the level you'd like to work with and you need to provide 6 months of service. Complete a council-designed leadership course, and create and implement a thoughtful program based on a Journey or badge that last over 4 or more sessions.

Safety Award

- 1. Take a self-defense class or ask a police officer to talk to you or your troop about self defense tips.
- 2. Teach younger Girl Scouts about fire and kitchen safety, water safety, or safety on the trail.
- 3. Learn about the dangers of distracted driving, and make a poster or PSA about paying attention behind the wheel.
- 4. Help 2 people to resolve a disagreement peacefully and respectfully.
- 5. Discuss the dangers of alcohol and drug use with your Girl Scout group, friends, or family. Write a personal-responsibility statement that covers how you'll behave.

Bridging to Girl Scout Ambassador

Two steps involve:

- 1. **Pass It On:** Share your talents and skills by teaching younger Girl Scouts something you learned to do as a Senior
- 2. **Look Ahead:** Explore what it's like to be an Ambassador. Connect with girls who are already there.

My Promise, My Faith

Complete these five steps to earn the pin:

- 1. **Pick a line from the Girl Scout Law.** Find a hymn, psalm, prayer, reading, or ritual of your faith that relates to it. Think about how this shows a connection between your faith and what you've learned in Girl Scouting.
- 2. **Interview a woman in your own or another faith community** who can talk to you about how she tries to act in her life based on that line of the Law. Ask her to give you examples of what the line of the Law means to her and how she tries to follow it in her daily life.
- 3. **Find three inspirational quotes** by women that fit with that line of the Girl Scout Law. Put them somewhere you can see them every day to remind you to live that line of the law.
- 4. **Make something, like a drawing, painting, or poster** that reminds you of what you've learned. You could also write a story or develop and perform a skit.
- 5. Make a commitment to live what you've learned. You may want to talk to your friends, family, or a group in your faith community about how you plan to live what you've learned in your daily life. Maybe you'd enjoy showing them what you just made or performing your skit! You can also choose to make a private commitment to yourself to live what you've learned.
