GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

- 24 credits are needed to graduate
 - o 4 credits of English
 - o 3 credits of Science (including 1 credit in Biology)
 - o 4 credits of Math (including 1 credit in **BOTH** Algebra and Geometry)
 - 3 credits of Social Studies (including 1 credit in World History, 1 credit in US History, .5 credit in Economics, .5 credit in Government)
 - o 1 credit in Practical or Preforming Fine Art
 - 1 PE credit (to include Health)
 - 8 Elective credits (including 1 online course)

Total = 24 Credits (for information on the *Early Graduation Plan (18-credit plan*), contact your student's counselor.)

- All students must have 2.0 GPA (unweighted) to earn a diploma
- ➤ All general education students must pass both the FSA Reading & Writing Grade 10 Standardized test and the Algebra 1 EOC Standardized Test with a Level 3 or higher. (For information on ACT/SAT/PSAT/PERT concordant scores, please contact your student's school counselor.)
- **World Languages are not required for Graduation**; however, admission into most universities requires a minimum of two years of the same language.
- Community service hours are not required for Graduation; however, they are required for Bright Futures eligibility.

SELECTING A COLLEGE

It is always suggested to apply to 4 or 5 colleges. Generally, we recommend applying to **TARGET** schools, **SAFETY** schools, and **REACH** schools.

- ➤ Target Schools are schools where your GPA and test scores are solidly within the average scores of recently admitted students.
- ➤ **Safety Schools** are schools where your GPA and some or all your test scores are within known acceptance scores.
- ➤ **Reach Schools** are schools where your GPA and/or some of your test scores are below the average of recently admitted students. Please note that due to their low admissions rates, the most highly selective colleges should always be considered reach schools.

Most admission decisions at out of state and private schools are holistic and will include a review of your GPA, transcript, test scores, essays, extracurricular activities, recommendations and honors, but academic grades and test scores are often primary importance. Holistic views consider special talents or abilities, unique life experiences, legacy connection, etc. Colleges do not only care about your grades, but your character and what you can bring to their college campus. How involved are you?

COLLEGE VISITS

We always encourage students to visit colleges or universities when possible. Visiting colleges can help in your application decision. A good time to tour a college or university campus is during school holiday's in which colleges are still open and in session. Visiting a campus while school is not in session will give you a different feel as compared to when it is in session. Imagine walking into NHS during the summer versus while school is in session. You cannot get a true feel to what that campus life is like when school is not in session.

We know that in our current climate it may not be possible to do an in-person tour to every college or university. Contact Admissions/Recruiting Offices of any college or universities to set up a in-person or virtual tour. Inquire about any preview days that they may have as well. You may also ask if you are able to sit in any classes that are in session.

This form must be returned to the NHS Attendance Clerk to have your school day absence excused. Students are allowed 2 college visits that will not count towards their absences.

University/College Representatives on NHS Campus

Throughout the school year, NHS will host University/College recruiters on campus or virtually. Colleges from Alabama, Mississippi, Georgia and Florida will typically set-up information booths during lunch periods; however, we will host virtual events until further notice due to COVID-19. Some colleges will request student's sign-up for an individual time slot during the school day.

If you have questions about college recruiters on NHS campus, please contact your School Counselor or the Guidance Secretary for more information. Due to our current climate College visits have not been scheduled or confirmed. Listen to afternoon announcements, check social media pages, and/or speak with your School Counselor.

ACT / SAT INFORMATION (cont.)

The ACT vs. the new SAT

Format

The ACT has 4 sections (English, Math, Reading and Science) with an optional writing test (essay) at the end.

The new SAT has 2 sections (Math with a calculator / Math without a calculator, Reading / English) with an optional writing test (essay) at the end.

While the essay is optional for both tests, many colleges and universities require the writing section, so be sure to check with the schools where you are applying before opting out.

Scoring

Each of the 4 sections of the ACT have a total of 36 possible points. The composite is determined by finding the average of all 4 sections. The essay is scored separately.

The new SAT has a total of 800 points on the Math and 800 points on the Reading / English section. The total score is determined by adding the points for each section (1600 possible points). The essay is scored separately.

COMMON APP / COALITION FOR COLLEGE

Common App and Coalition for College are platforms that most college and universities utilize for the admissions process. It is free and you are welcome to create a profile using your personal email. College websites note which platform they prefer to use.

Common App and Coalition for College provides the students with information as for as deadlines, application information, test information, letters of recommendation, etc. for each college you select. The platforms allow students or School Counselors to upload needed documents to one location for multiple colleges and universities.

You will need your School Counselors information when creating your free account. This information can be found on the NHS web page under the Guidance section or by calling the Guidance Office.

BRIGHT FUTURES SCHOLARSHIP

Students should visit <u>www.floridashines.org</u> to review the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship eligibility and State University System course requirements for admission. Evaluations for the scholarship will be based on the most recent transcript (sent twice a year) from the school district. Students may access their records at https://www.floridashines.org/go-to-college/pay-for-college.

Florida Academic Scholars (FAS) and Florida Medallion Scholars (FMS) Awards

In addition to the test scores and community service hours listed in the table, students must earn the minimum required weighted GPA in the following 16 credits of college preparatory coursework:

- 4 English
- 4 Mathematics
- 3 Science
- 3 Social Science
- 2 Foreign Languages (in the same language)

Students may use up to 2 additional credits from courses in the academic areas above to raise

their GPA. Go to <u>www.FloridaStudentFinancialAid.org</u> for complete information.

Award notifications will be posted to students' online account in March 2021. Students may check their eligibility at http://www.FloridaStudentFinancialAid.org/SSFAD/home/uamain.htm.

Eligibility Period: Students who qualify for Bright Futures must begin using their scholarship within 2 years of high school graduation. Funding is available for up to 5 years after graduation. Students who enlist in the military or engage in a full-time religious service obligation lasting at least 18 months may defer the commencement of their scholarship. The 2-year eligibility period will commence upon separation from active duty or the religious service obligation.

<u>Application Deadline</u>: Early (mid-year) graduates must apply for Bright Futures by December 31 of their senior year. Test scores may be used through January 31st. Spring graduates **may begin applying on October 1st of their senior year and must complete their application** before graduation. Test scores may be used through June 31st.

These requirements are subject to change with each legislative session.

2019-20 Award Amounts for the Florida Bright Futures Scholarships

Florida Academic Scholarship – pays 100% of tuition and applicable fees at public postsecondary institutions and comparable amounts at private institutions (\$211 per credit hour at 4-year private schools and \$104 per credit hour at 2-year private schools). Students will also receive \$300 per semester for textbooks and other educational expenses. Classes taken in the summer at public institutions will also be covered at 100%.

Florida Medallion Scholarship – pays 75% of tuition and applicable fees at public postsecondary institutions and comparable amounts at private institutions. Classes taken in the summer at public institutions will also be covered at 75%.

Gold Seal Vocational Scholars are only eligible to receive funding for Career Certificate Programs, Applied Technology Diploma Programs, or Technical Degree Programs (AS degree).

FAFSA

Free Application for Student Aid (FAFSA) can be started October 1, 2020. All college-bound students must complete a FAFSA application. Be sure that you are on the correct website: https://studentaid.gov/ as you will be filling out confidential information. There are several fake websites for FAFSA. If in doubt simply go to any college or universities financial aid website. Students will need to create a free account. It is recommended that students complete the FAFSA application alone or with the help of parents.

The FAFSA questions ask for information about you (your name, date of birth, address, etc.) and about your financial situation. Depending on your circumstances (for instance, whether you're a U.S. citizen or what tax form you used), you might need the following information or documents as you fill out the application:

- Your Social Security number (it's important that you enter it correctly on the FAFSA form!)
- Your parents' Social Security numbers if you are a dependent student
- Your driver's license number if you have one
- Your Alien Registration number if you are not a U.S. citizen
- Federal tax information or tax returns including IRS W-2 information, for you (and your spouse, if you are married), and your parents if you are a dependent student:
- IRS 1040
- Foreign tax return, IRS 1040NR, or IRS 1040NR-EZ
- Tax return for Puerto Rico, Guam, American Samoa, the U.S. Virgin Islands, the Marshall Islands, the Federated States of Micronesia, or Palau
- Records of your untaxed income, such as child support received, interest income, and veterans noneducation benefits, for you, and for your parents if you are a dependent student
- Information on cash; savings and checking account balances; investments, including stocks and bonds and real estate (but not including the home in which you live); and business and farm assets for you, and for your parents if you are a dependent student

Keep these records! You may need them again. Do not mail your records.

LETTERS OF RECOMMENDATION

When you are looking for letters of recommendation from teachers, counselors or an Administrator choose one that has taught you recently and/or with whom you have a great student relationship. The individual should be able to write about you both as a student *and* as a person. Not all colleges require a letter of recommendation, but most scholarships do. Check that information before requesting one.

Keep in mind, that writing recommendations is time consuming for some and most will have limits to how many they will write for the school year, so ask early.

After a letter is completed, please write a note to say thank you, and when you choose or are accepted to a college or university or have been awarded a scholarship, be sure to let them know of your acceptance or award.
