Assumption into heaven

The Dogma of Assumption was declared by Pope Pius XII on November 1st 1950 when he wrote 'Munificentissimus Deus'. Dogma says: "Mary, the immaculate perpetually Virgin Mother of God, after the completion of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into the glory of heaven."

TIME magazine in a cover story on Mary of Nazareth said, "Among all the women who ever lived, the mother of Jesus Christ is the most celebrated, the most venerated, the most portrayed, the most honoured..." She is mentioned only on selected occasions in the Gospels, yet she has dominated the art, the music and the faith of the world for centuries. Catholics and Orthodox unite in calling her mother of God. Protestant Christians recognise her importance in the Christian story. Even the Quran devotes several chapters to her. Yes, indeed, she is an universal Mother!

FIRST READING

A reading from the book of the Apocalypse

11:19; 12:1-6, 10

The sanctuary of God in heaven opened, and the ark of the covenant could be seen inside it. Now a great sign appeared in heaven: a woman, adorned with the sun, standing on the moon, and with the twelve stars on her head for a crown. She was pregnant, and in labour, crying aloud in the pangs of childbirth. Then a second sign appeared in the sky, a huge red dragon which had seven heads and ten horns, and each of the seven heads crowned with a coronet. 
RESPONSORIAL PSALM



Prayers & Reflection

Preparing to hear God's word

Today is a special day in the Church's calendar. It is the day we remember the end of Mary's life when she was taken up into heaven, body and soul. Like Mary, we hope and pray that one day we too will be with Jesus in heaven.

The Gospel story

The gospel story, remembers a special event in Mary's life when she visited her cousin Elizabeth. Both women were expecting babies. When Mary greeted Elizabeth, the baby in Elizabeth leapt for joy! Elizabeth recognises that Mary is the mother of the Lord and celebrates Mary's faith in God's promise.

Reflecting on the Gospel

In today's gospel, both Mary and Elizabeth are expecting babies as a result of the promise of God. Has anyone ever made you a promise? As we heard in today's gospel, Mary was blessed because she believed that God would keep his promises to her.

We know that God promises to love and care for us always. Share aloud some of the things you know God has done for you, and give thanks with a joyful heart!



Dear God,

Like Mary, we praise you for keeping your promises to us.

Help us to follow you even when we don't understand everything.

Amen.

Commentaries

Belief in the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary was decreed only in 1950 but was evident in the prayer tradition of the Church long before that. Liturgical texts appeared as early as the fifth century. The present Preface for the feast links Mary's unique destiny with her role as the Mother of God; it also sees her Assumption as sign and promise for the pilgrim people of God.

She was personally spared . . . the corruption of the tomb, since from her own body she marvellously brought forth your incarnate Son, the Author of all life.

But her privilege is a blessing for us all, since Mary was assumed into heaven as the beginning and image of your Church's coming to perfection and a sign of sure hope and comfort to your pilgrim people.



St. Bernard- August 20

St. Bernard was born of noble parentage in Burgundy, France, in the castle of Fontaines near Dijon in 1090. Under the care of his pious parents he was sent at an early age to a college at Chatillon, where he was conspicuous for his remarkable piety and spirit of recollection. At the same place he entered upon the studies of theology and Holy Scripture. After the death of his mother, fearing the snares and temptations of the world, he resolved to embrace the newly established and very austere institute of the Cistercian Order, of which he was destined to become the greatest ornament. He also persuaded his brothers and several of his friends to follow his example. In 1113, St. Bernard, with thirty young noblemen, presented himself to the holy Abbot, St. Stephen, at Citeaux. After a novitiate spent in great fervour, he made his profession in the following year. His superior soon after, seeing the great progress he had made in the spiritual life, sent him with twelve monks to found a new monastery, which afterward became known as the celebrated Abbey of Clairvaux. St. Bernard was at once appointed Abbot and began




that active life which has rendered him the most conspicuous figure in the history of the 12th century. He founded numerous other monasteries, composed a number of works and undertook many journeys for the honour of God. Several Bishoprics were offered him, but he refused them all. The reputation of St. Bernard spread far and wide; even the Popes were governed by his advice. He was commissioned by Pope Eugene III to

preach the second Crusade. In obedience to the Sovereign Pontiff he travelled through France and Germany, and aroused the greatest enthusiasm for the holy war among the masses of the population. The failure of the expedition raised a great storm against the saint, but he attributed it to the sins of the Crusaders. St. Bernard was eminently endowed with the gift of miracles. He died on August 20, 1153.

St. Pius x- August 21

Pope Pius X, born Giuseppe Melchiorre Sarto, was the first Pope elected in the 20th century. He came to the papal office in 1903 and died 11 years later in 1914, just as World War I was beginning. He was born in 1835 at Riese, near Venice, and was one of eight children. His family was poor. He felt a calling to be a priest at a young age and was ordained in 1858. After 26 years, he was named bishop of Mantua, Italy, and in 1893, he

became patriarch of Venice. As Pope, he issued decrees making the age of First Holy Communion earlier (at the age of 7) and advocated frequent and even daily reception of the Eucharist. He promoted the reading of the Bible among laypeople, reformed the liturgy, promoted clear and simple homilies, and brought back Gregorian chant. He revised the Breviary, reorganized the curia, and initiated the codification of canon law. He died in 1914 of natural causes reportedly aggravated by worries over the beginning of World War I. Pope Pius X was canonized by Pope Pius XII in 1954. His last will and testament bears the striking sentence: "I was born poor, I have lived in poverty, and I wish to die poor."
