Christ continues to reign at the right hand of his Father, sending his Holy Spirit to build his kingdom on earth. It is with this spirit of celebration that we worship for the last time together in Page Auditorium, grateful for the blessings of the past year, and full of eager hope for our return to the Chapel.

On this Communion Sunday, families with children are invited to sit up front so they can better observe The Great Thanksgiving. The importance of welcoming children is exemplified in Matthew 18:2-5, by Jesus' answer to the disciples as they wondered who was the greatest in the kingdom of heaven: "He called a child, whom he put among them, and said, 'Truly I tell you, unless you change and become like children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven. Whoever becomes humble like this child is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven. Whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me." Please help us welcome the children in our midst by letting them know you are glad to see them in worship. By doing so, you are also welcoming Jesus.



Sunday, May 22—10:30 a.m. Gathering for 11:00 a.m. Worship


