



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PLAYWRIGHT'S NOTES



MARCIA JOHNSON

When we were little girls, my sister and I dressed up as princesses; fashioning ball gowns from bed sheets and draping cardigans on our heads to represent their long flowing hair. I followed the exploits of the British royal family, especially Princess Anne. I loved watching her compete in horseback riding at the Olympics. Lady Diana came along and I became even more fascinated with princesses.

As I got older, my love of princesses provided a huge conflict with my newly found outrage towards imperialism. I tried to kick my habit but still woke up early for royal weddings.

In the fall of 2016, I tuned in to the Netflix series *The Crown*. I was drawn in by the excellent writing, acting, design; the whole production. And that was just the first episode! I curled up on my couch, excited for episode two. Elizabeth and Philip were going to Kenya! I was thrilled that the writer included that country in the telling of this very important part of Elizabeth's story. But, when it ended, my disappointment was palpable. (You will understand why after the play's intermission.)

The very next day, I was made aware of a call for submissions for the 2017 playwriting unit at Thousand Islands Playhouse (TIP) in Gananoque. For the 150th anniversary of Confederation, the theatre was asking writers to pitch ideas focusing on colonialism and its (after-) effects. I wrote my proposal for *Heavy is the Head (Serving Elizabeth*'s original title) in less than thirty minutes and sent it off. I got selected for the group and proceeded to vent my spleen, writing the first draft in eight months; a record for me.

I wrote this play to give voice to the under-represented. It is dedicated to my mother, Cynthia Johnson. As a little girl in Jamaica she would watch Princesses Elizabeth and Margaret having tea in the backyard of their vacation home. As an adult, she looked forward to Queen Elizabeth's speech every Christmas. She knew that I was writing this play and I believe that, of all my plays, *Serving Elizabeth* would have been her favourite.

I'm deeply indebted to Alexis Diamond for encouraging me to apply for the Playwrights Unit (where the play was developed) and everyone at TIP who read and gave feedback, including Carolyn Bennet, Brett Christopher, Ian D. Clark, Ashlie Corcoran, Shannon Currie, Tess Degenstein, Erin Fleck, Virgilia Griffith, Rob Kempson, Cassel Miles, Anand Rajaram, Andrea Scott, Rashida Shaw, Marcel Stewart, and Alana Hibbert. I would also like to thank Leah-Simone Bowen for her gentle, passionate and wise direction, as well as James MacDonald and WCT for this world premiere in the tournament capital of Canada.



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PROGRAM NOTES DISHING UP JUSTICE IN SERVING ELIZABETH

My second most memorable museum experience – first forever is the immersive tours at the Secwépemc Museum and Heritage Park – was not at the British Museum or the Louvre, but at the humble People's Story Museum in Edinburgh. There I saw, for example, not mere elegant Victorian ball gowns, but detailed accounts of those who toiled in dreary conditions to create them; not more monuments to a few "great men", but artefacts – in the form of placards and t-shirts – memorializing the many who opposed them. Who doesn't appreciate wrongs righted, especially when the "new" stories are evocative?

A similar impetus to give centre stage to the previously unheard is behind the world premiere we are witnessing in Kamloops today: Marcia Johnson was moved, after viewing *The Crown*, to write *Serving Elizabeth* "to give voice to the under-represented", as she says in her program notes, in this case to British subjects in Africa who were relegated to the background in the Netflix series. Johnson has succeeded in creating an intellectually stimulating, emotionally engaging play that features characters in their rightful positions while not sacrificing credibility.

Serving Elizabeth intellectually engages by juxtaposing fascinating historical events – the 1952 visit to Kenya by Princess Elizabeth during the death of King George VI and the not unrelated Mau Mau Uprising (in which, importantly, Kenyan women played an instrumental role) – with contemporary issues. This is not to suggest the circumstances of the protagonists

in 1952 rural Kenya and 2015 London, England are parallel. However, Mercy's position as a black colonial woman, subject to temporary imprisonment and ongoing financial punishment, who apparently compromises her ideals, inspires Tia, who, as a young black Canadian intern in a British television studio, faces certain barriers of her own. Tia's eventual defiance of the perpetuation of colonial attitudes is inspired by her creation of a spirited alternative – much as Johnson reacted to the Netflix series.

Johnson stimulates emotional engagement by transcending types and employing humour. While a lesser playwright might be forgiven for resorting to stereotypes, Johnson infuses her characters with complexity, empathy, and grounding. I most anticipate the scenes in which Mercy confronts the princess and Tia marches into her nemesis's fancy home: the outcomes in each case are unexpected, but credible and delightful.

Both Mercy and Tia pull off something ultimately more fulfilling than revenge – satisfaction, with their self respect intact. Every indication is that Marcia Johnson will have a similar experience as her play debuts. Chances are also excellent that experiencing *Serving Elizabeth* shining the spotlight on the worthy underdog will prove memorable for us audience members.

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
