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Professor Okazaki, Danzan Ryu, and Loyalty

"Loyalty is something you give regardless of what you get back, and in giving loyalty, you're getting more loyalty; and out of loyalty flow other great qualities." – Charles "Tremendous" Jones.

Loyalty is a hard word to define. Sure a dictionary definition exists, but put loyalty into layman's terms and the definition becomes a bit muddled. People use words like respect, honor, devotion, responsibility, and perseverance. All those words have their own definitions and appear to be part of the definition of loyalty, but they are not loyalty.

Just so everyone works from the same spot, the dictionary.com definition of loyalty is "faithful adherence to a sovereign, government, leader, cause, etc." That works, and it is easy to understand how all those other words are bandied about when discussing what loyalty means.

Those of us who practice Danzan Ryu have loyalty to Professor Okazaki and to the art - at least one would hope we do – but what does that mean? Is it disloyal to question? Is it disloyal to see flaws? Is it disloyal to modify a technique? Exactly what loyalty do we owe to Professor Okazaki? Can we be loyal to someone that 99.9% of us have never met?

Ed Townsend, Yodan, from Hi No De Ryu said this about Professor Okazaki, "I don't know Professor Okazaki's character that much. I didn't know him. I know about him. He did a lot of great things for the martial arts. He brought an art to the U.S. I respect him for that. He went out on a limb and taught anyone who wanted to learn. So if you just look at that, it's amazing."

Yes, Professor Okazaki did what he thought was best, he taught non-Japanese people jujitsu at a time when that was frowned upon by the Japanese community. If he had not done that, how many of us would be here today? We might have fallen into some other martial art, but it was because of his steadfastness that Danzan Ryu has spread.

"It's more of a loyalty in gratitude for what he has done." Brown belt Alfonso Ramirez said as he discussed where his loyalty was for Professor Okazaki, "It's for his legacy. It's a loyalty to him and all those who followed him."

Which creates an important point, would so many people have followed Professor Okazaki's example if he did not have the kind of character that garnered respect and loyalty?

Professor Ramon Gallegos of Kaito Gakko expanded on that thought, "I can only refer to my knowledge of the stories about him. The stories make him sound like a great man, but I've never met him. I will say that I see it in his students. Such a great devotion to the man, he must have been a great man to assume that devotion."

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Official SRY Dojo Certificates



Your dojo and students are important to Shoshin Ryu. Shoshin Ryu Yudanshakai will be issuing an annual official dojo certificate to SRY schools with ten or more members. In April of each year, it will be determined which dojos meet the membership requirement, and certificates will be sent out to those Official SRY Dojos.

An Official Shoshin Ryu Dojo will receive:

- *A verification certificate
- *National Recognition from Shoshin Ryu Yudanshakai
- *Listing on the Shoshin Ryu website
 - Which includes your dojo logo, class times, a link to your webpage, and more.
- *Free advertising on the Shoshin Ryu website
- *A dojo biography in the Shoshin Ryu Newsletter.

If you would like to have an official SRY dojo, but have fewer than ten students, you can urge your students to bring in their friends and sign them up, or for fifty dollars a year – that is a little more than four dollars a month – a dojo can become an official SRY dojo.

Becoming an official SRY dojo is not a requirement for being a part of Shoshin Ryu Yudanshakai. If you have run your dojo for years with six or seven students, keep doing it! You and your students will still have all the benefits that membership in Shoshin Ryu provides. However, your dojo will not be listed on the website or have official dojo status.

Put this into a little perspective. Every two or three years, the entire Danzan Ryu family gets together to share ideas, thoughts, energy, and friendship because of one man. Did Professor Okazaki know he was going to leave such a legacy? We do not know. We will never know. Each Ohana is something we do to celebrate the man. That tells us more about his character than we can say and in that regard, he is deserving of our loyalty.

We can understand the great debt that we owe to Professor Okazaki for doing what he did. He offered a system of martial arts to anyone who wanted to learn, and we have taken that same philosophy and applied it to our dojos and organization.

In order to understand the nature of loyalty, the opposite, disloyalty, should be addressed. Where do we draw the line between loyalty and disloyalty? Where does one stop and the other start? At what point do blind allegiance and willing loyalty split?

Alfonso Ramirez had this to say, "We should not follow blindly. We chose who we follow. The followers should know what a good leader is. The leader needs to inspire those he leads." As expressed earlier, Professor Okazaki has inspired thousands of people. His art should continue to inspire people in the future.

"I think any teacher who expects their students to be mindless followers, isn't giving their students the opportunity to develop correctly." That sentiment from Professor Ramon Gallegos sums up the idea of following blindly. For all accounts, Professor Okazaki appeared to be thoughtful and articulate – just read the Esoteric Principles. We can only assume that he would not have wanted his students to follow lockstep behind him without wondering about better ways to do things.

Is it disloyal to criticize? Can we be loyal and still critique Danzan Ryu and Professor Okazaki?

"If it's just criticism, then it could be disloyal," said Ed Townsend. "If you are showing him respect, then you are not being disloyal. I guess it depends on what you mean by it."

In a similar vein, Professor Ramon Gallegos expanded on Ed Townsend's thought, "It could be considered disrespectful in the manner you deliver it. Constructive criticism is necessary to advance an art, to make it better. But if you are being disrespectful in your criticism or doing it out of a perceived insult, then it's destructive and negative. But it can be positive and having criticism toward something at its root isn't wrong or disrespectful."

How many of us have worked on a Danzan Ryu technique and said, "That just won't work in a fight." Probably all of us have heard our sense say, "I'd do something else if my life depended on it." Maybe everything has its place and a moment exists for each technique. Is that disloyal? Or are we just seeing Danzan Ryu for what it is?

Finally, What about Professor Okazaki himself? Like each of us, our motives and behaviors get questioned from time to time. It offers us a moment of careful reflection about where we can improve our character. Is it disrespectful to question Professor Okazaki's life? (see **Loyalty**, continued on page **SIX**)

Danzan Ryu Jujitsu Hall of Fame

Professor David Nuuhiwa

Inducted in 2006

David Kawaiikoolihilihi Nuuhiwa was born to Elizabeth and David Nuuhiwa on December 30, 1925. The Nuuhiwa family lived in Kauai's Hanalei River region, then moved to the suburbs of Honolulu, not far from Waikiki Beach.

"Uncle" David loved the water and spent a lot of time during his early years at the beach, becoming both an accomplished surfer and a member of the Waikiki Beach Boys. Nuuhiwa became something of a celebrity in surfing, but few people were aware that he was also an

outstanding martial artist, winning more than 100 consecutive matches. In later years his martial arts skill would provide the opportunity for him to make appearances on "The Ed Sullivan Show" and "The Steve Allen Show."



Uncle David was not in the first group of students to train under Professor Okazaki, but he did learn from Professor Okazaki as a young man. He learned most of his Danzan Ryu from John Cahill, one of Professor Okazaki's original students.

Professor Nuuhiwa eventually moved to Anaheim, California, where he worked for Walt Disney and was instrumental in setting up the Disney security team for the theme park.

In terms of martial arts, Professor Nuuhiwa took much of what he had learned from Professor Okazaki and Professor Cahill and worked it into a new style of his own creation, Kaito Gakko. The system was believed to have originated between 1935 and 1945.

Professor Nuuhiwa passed away on January 21, 2005, in Honolulu. His ashes were separated and half were scattered at Waikiki and the other half at Huntington Beach.

One response to that question has to do with the fact that he is not here to defend himself. He cannot explain his actions or answer the most basic question, "Why?" To criticize and not offer that courtesy may not be disrespectful, but it is one sided.

However, we do need to remember one basic thing, Professor Kevin Dalrymple explained, "He's human like anybody else. He made mistakes. He did some great things and some things that should probably be frowned upon. The idea is that what he was able to pass on to his students is something that everyone should respect and honor."

Professor Ramon Gallegos had the final thought about Professor Okazaki, "There are flaws in everybody. To put someone on such a high pedestal is to do them a disservice as well, because they had tribulations, they had challenges to overcome, they faultered, and if you don't recognize that, then you are eliminating a part of their life."

Seeing Professor Okazaki for who and what he was, seeing Danzan Ryu for the art it is, is not disloyal. It is imperative. That may be the best way we can be loyal to Professor Okazaki's memory and Danzan Ryu.
