New Liturgical Ministers

We are continuing our push for new liturgical ministers — ushers, extraordinary ministers of Holy Communion, and readers. How important these ministries are to the reverent and full celebration of our liturgies! What a gift you would be giving to the parish by offering yourself in one of these roles! STEWARDS OF THE TRADITION

Fifty Years After Sacrosanctum Concilium

COMMITTEE ON DIVINE WORSHIP

The Committee on Divine Worship marked the 50th Anniversary of Sacrosanctum Concilium with the publication of Stewards of the Tradition. This week, we publish the next sections of the document.

4. Liturgical Song (SacCar, no.42)Liturgical song has a preeminent place in the ars celebrandi, for not only is it a means of active participation, but it is another source of beauty that can lift hearts and inspire worship. We commend those who have dedicated themselves as composers and pastoral musicians who enrich our worship and enable our songs of praise. The development of a repertory of vernacular music for the Liturgy over the past fifty years is a gift for which we are grateful and which we continue to promote. We also seek to improve the quality of our celebrations in light of the 2007 USCCB guidelines Sing to the Lord: Music in Divine Worship. To rely only on the music of a single genre or style for the celebration of the Liturgy is to diminish the breadth and depth of our liturgical heritage and to risk the exclusion of the legitimate contributions of particular cultures and composers. We wish to underscore the importance of the words set to music for the Liturgy, and that they must accurately reflect the theology of the Liturgy or be drawn from the liturgical texts themselves.

Living What We Celebrate

Having been gathered in the Lord Jesus, the Church participates in the saving mysteries of our faith. The Sacred Liturgy enables us to live more committed to the Lord who sanctifies us in a privileged way through sacramental signs. The Constitution also reminds us that the Church's mission moves from worship to charity and evangelization: "For all these works make it clear that Christ's faithful, though not of this world, are to be the light of the world and to glorify the Father in the eyes of all" (no. 9). This perennial challenge to go forth from the Liturgy as witnesses of the risen Lord was taken up by Pope Benedict XVI when, in response to the 2005 Synod on the Eucharist, he added two texts for the dismissal to the Roman Missal, Third Edition, linking the Liturgy with the living of the Christian life each day: "Go and announce the Gospel of the Lord," and "Go in peace, glorifying the Lord by your life."

There must be an intrinsic link between what we do

in the Liturgy and what we do in the world. In the Eucharist, we partake of the Bread of life and share in the Chalice of salvation in order to strengthen our union and to become a leaven—a source of unity and healing—for a world wounded by sin and division and hungry for the holy. At the Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday, the Church does two things that illustrate the relationship between the Eucharist and the Christian life: washing of feet and collecting gifts for the poor. The ritual gesture of service leads to the work of charity. Christ is present in the liturgical act and in the charity that flows from it: "Where true charity is dwelling, God is present there" (antiphon for Offertory Chant, Holy Thursday Mass of the Lord's Supper). Christ's command, "Do this in memory of me," is therefore not only a call to partake of the Eucharist, but also a summons to charity and service.

Conclusion

As we commemorate the fiftieth anniversary of Sacrosanctum Concilium. . . , we thank you for your ongoing, sustained, and ever-deepening contribution to liturgical ministry. We offer these reflections as an encouragement and an exhortation to continue the work you have undertaken so faithfully for the Church. It is our fervent hope and daily prayer that we might live in the Word proclaimed and the sacraments enacted. "What we have received we hand on to you" (see 1 Cor. 11:23). In the Liturgy we celebrate the dying and rising of Christ, and through him our own dying and rising in the *communio* of the Church. The words of the Prayer over the Offerings for December 20 ring true; we pray together that:

by participating in this mystery, we may possess at last the gifts we have awaited and for which our faith bids us hope.

In the meantime we celebrate the Liturgy as both privileged and humble *stewards of the tradition*.

CHILDREN'S LITURGY OF THE WORD

The **Children's Liturgy of the Word** will begin at the 9:30 a.m. Mass on Sunday, **March 2, 2014**. Next Sunday, February 23, after the 9:30 Mass, we'll introduce you to it at an "Open House" after Mass.

Where does the idea of the Children's Liturgy of the Word come from?

It comes out of the *Directory for Masses with Children* which tells us in paragraph 17, "Sometimes, if the place itself and the nature of the community permit, it will be appropriate to celebrate the Liturgy of the Word, including a homily, with the children in a separate, but not too distant, room. Then, before the Eucharistic liturgy begins, the children are led to the place where the adults have meanwhile celebrated their own Liturgy of the Word."

How does the Children's Liturgy of the Word work?

After the Collect (the Opening Prayer of the Mass), children **first-grade and older** are invited to come forward to the sanctuary to receive a special dismissal. They are then escorted to a separate chapel set up in the north sacristy of the church, where they listen to that Sunday's readings as proclaimed from the *Lectionary for Masses with Children*. These are the same readings everyone else is hearing in the church, but in a slightly different translation that is easier for children to understand. A special homily is then given to the children to help them understand the readings. This Liturgy of the Word concludes with the Prayer of the Faithful, as the children pray intercessions together. Meanwhile, the Liturgy of the Word has continued as usual in the church. The children return to the church at the beginning of the collection/presentation of the gifts, and participate in the Liturgy of the Eucharist as usual.

What is the purpose of the Children's Liturgy of the Word?

The purpose of this is not to offer a babysitting service, nor is it to isolate the children or to make them feel unwelcome. Rather, it is actually an act of hospitality to them: they will be given the chance to listen to the Sunday readings and participate in a homily that will be on their level, and yet still be a part of the worshiping assembly, since they participate in all other parts of the Mass. It does require a certain maturity level and ability to focus, so it is intended for **first-grade children and older**, not kindergartners, pre-schoolers or toddlers.

Participating in the Children's Liturgy of the Word continues to teach children how to participate in Mass, since they do the same things as are being done in the main body of the church.

Ideally, parents and children then talk to each other on the ride home or later in the day about what they heard in their respective homilies. In this way, God's Word continues to be alive and active in the family's faith life.

Suppose I want my child to stay with me in the main body of the church?

That's fine; parents are in no way required to send their children to the Children's Liturgy of the Word, and no child is forced to participate. Children are welcome to stay in the main body of the church and to participate in the Liturgy of the Word there, where the usual readings and homily will take place. Since we think this is a great opportunity for children, though, we do hope you will encourage your child to participate.

Come and get a better idea of what it will look like!

We're having an "OPEN HOUSE" next Sunday, February 23, after the 9:30 a.m. Mass. Come and see the chapel space which will be used. People from the Children's Liturgy of the Word Committee will be present to explain how things will work and answer any questions you might have.

A WORD ABOUT LITURGICAL PRACTICES AND GOOD HEALTH

As we continue through the winter days of cold and flu season and long for the warmer days of Spring to arrive, it's a good time to review some common-sense liturgical practices and issues, to help everyone stay healthy and to care for one another as we gather each week for Mass.

Holy Communion: Priests, deacons and extraordinary ministers of Holy Communion should be especially encouraged to wash and sanitize their hands before Mass begins. If Communion ministers need to clean their hands during Mass, it must be done discreetly. The best way for extraordinary ministers of Holy Communion to clean their hands during Mass is to use a sanitizing liquid in the pew before they come into the sanctuary (sanitizing liquids have no place on the altar or among the Communion vessels and other sacred items on the credence table).

Communion from the Chalice: The faithful should refrain from drinking from the chalice when one has a cold or is fearful of being infected. Receiving on the Tongue: Faithful who normally receive Holy Communion on the tongue should refrain from receiving on the tongue and instead receive in the hand when one has a cold or is otherwise contagious. Do not spread your saliva to the hand of the Communion minister if you are sick: receive Communion in the hand instead.

Greeting of Peace: Use your own discretion and best judgment when invited to exchange the greeting of peace during the liturgy; limit physical contact with others if necessary. If a handshake is not advisable, a simple bow of the head is acceptable. Do not be insulted if someone prefers to avoid shaking your hand.

Mass Attendance: MOST IMPORTANTLY, IF YOU ARE SICK, PLEASE DO NOT COME TO MASS! There is no obligation to attend Mass if you are sick; it is not a sin to miss Mass for this reason. (Also, there is no need to go to Confession if you miss Mass because you are sick.) Personal prayer and reflection on the Sunday Scripture readings is encouraged; many people also enjoy viewing the Mass on television.

GETTING READY FOR LENT 2014

BRING PALMS TO BE BURNED FOR USE AS ASHES



We are all familiar with the practice of receiving ashes on Ash Wednesday, which this year is March 5. The ashes are a sign of the public penance to which we are all called during the Lenten season. As we promise to repent and believe in the Gospel, the ashes brand us with the sign of the cross — a sign of our commitment to the journey of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving, a journey which ends with the new life of baptism and baptismal renewal during the Easter season. Penitential acts are undertaken as a community, as together we journey to the cross and resurrection.

What you may not know is where the ashes come from. Very simply, the ashes used on Ash Wednesday are the ashes from palms saved from Palm Sunday the previous year, which have been burned.

This year we once again invite you to share in our communal celebration of Ash Wednesday in a special way. We ask you to bring old palms from your home and deposit them in the baskets which will be available. These palms will then be burned at our Mardi Gras celebration on March 4 and used as ashes on Ash Wednesday.

Please join in this meaningful gesture of community and solidarity as together we embark on our Lenten disciplines.





MEETINGS FOR THE WEEK

PREPARING FOR NEXT SUNDAY

Just as the life of the Church is strengthened through more frequent celebration of the Eucharistic mystery, similarly we may hope for a new stimulus for the life of the Spirit from a growing reverence for the word of God, which "lasts forever" (Is. 40:8; see 1 Peter 1:23-25).

-Dei Verbum, 26

Sunday, February 23, 2014: Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time

Scripture Background for next Sunday's Readings...

Leviticus 19:1-2, 17-18: "Because *I* said so!" What parent has not made this statement to assert his or her authority over a child who does not understand the reason for being told what to do? The very first commandment God spoke to Moses on Mount Sinai—that "You shall have no other gods beside Me"—is preceded by a similar assertion: "I am the Lord your God." Before we can even begin to understand God's ways, we must first make the decision to serve God, to submit to His ultimate authority. But here is where the similarity between God and humans ends. Unlike us, He would never instruct His children as we in our weakness might: to "Do as I say and not as I do." Rather, as the Lord tells all the Israelite people through Moses, "Be holy, for I, the Lord, your God, am holy." That is to say: "Imitate Me in your dealings with one another. Do as I say AND as I do!"

1 Corinthians 3:16-23: Paul established a Christian community in Corinth about the year 51, on his second missionary journey. While Paul was in Ephesus on his third journey (1 Cor 16:8; Acts 19:1–20), he received upsetting news about Corinth. The community there was fraught with division, as certain members were identifying themselves exclusively with individual Christian leaders, and interpreting Christian teaching as a superior wisdom only for the initiated few (1 Cor 1:10–4:21). Paul reminds the Corinthians that they are all one in Christ, and that each of them, as holy temples of the Spirit of God, possesses the fullness of the true wisdom that can only come from God.

Matthew 5:38-48: Explaining what is at the heart of Law with the authority of God Himself, Jesus teaches the people that they are not true children of God unless they imitate their Father in their dealings with one another, even to the point of showing mercy and doing good to their enemies.

Gospel Reflection Questions....

After reading next Sunday's Gospel (Matthew 5:38-48) take some time to pray on it before you come to Mass.

- 1. Who loves like that? Did Jesus show us a new revolutionary kind of acting when he showed us how to love our enemies? How far was he willing to go for them with his radical self-emptying? How far was the Father, "who makes the sun shine on the evil and the good," willing to go for his children?
- 2. Is it easy to love your enemies? What might help? What do you think praying for those who persecute you might do for you? "If anyone wants to go to law with you over your tunic, hand over your cloak as well." So Jesus tells us to give more than is asked of us. How did he give us an example of this?


