<u>Overview</u>

Welcome to Social Studies 8! Social Studies is designed to help you critically reflect upon events and issues in order to examine the present, make connections with the past, and consider the future. The aim of Social Studies is to help you become an educated citizen, which means being a thoughtful citizen who is able to acquire information, consider multiple perspectives, and make learned opinions and judgments. Throughout the course, students will be exposed to many different ideas and perspectives.

- We will examine what is going on in the world today using the internet, newspapers, magazines, etc. and talk about why it is important to know what is going on and how it affects us.
- We will watch, analyze, and reflect upon various documentaries that explore current issues and perspectives

- a social standard that means that we will help people in need
- we will be doing various studies and small projects based on this idea

Evaluation

Both formative and summative evaluation will be used to determine your progress. Formative evaluation is defined as the small, frequent work/quizzes that inform both the students and the teacher of the student's progress with the essential learning outcomes. Summative evaluations are the larger, less frequent assignments that measure a collection of learning outcomes. Typically, unit tests, major projects, and presentations are often used summative evaluation tools.

Each term: Daily work/practice 20% (practice work done on a regular basis, quizzes, etc...)

Knowledge 20% (tests, demonstrate knowledge learned activities, etc...)

Oral 20% (presentations, discussions, debates, questions...)
Research 20% (find that information please, some parts of projects...)
Written 20% (written work, paragraph writing, parts of projects...)

Final mark: Terms 1 & 2 80%

Final exam 20%

Each student will receive a copy of the Social Studies 8 Essential Learning Outcomes, and will self-assess their progress throughout the course, in conjunction with other formative and summative assessments.
