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October 1st, 2015 was the state's official student count day for South Hamilton and all other school districts across Iowa. The district comprehensively reviewed the data and it shows the district's "Certified Enrollment" is very near last year's total – down ever so slightly. Conversely, the district's "BEDS enrollment" rose significantly due to an increase of students "open enrolled in" to South Hamilton from other districts. Overall, this is a very positive circumstance for the district, in that; the district is providing educational services for more students this year than last and most all funding is based upon enrollment...however, the two enrollment numbers provide two vastly different funding amounts.

Insight into why the distinction between "certified enrollment and BEDS enrollment" matters...in dollars.

There are a couple of things to remember about the certified enrollment process: any student who enrolls after October 1st is not included in the district's official count, and therefore is not eligible for funding. The **CERTIFIED ENROLLMENT (CE)** number is used to calculate revenue projections for the next fiscal year and the count that the state utilizes for numerous state-aid funding calculations. SAVE, TLC, TSS, and so on. The CE is primarily determined by counting resident students – served by SH and open enrolled out to other districts; with a few supplementary funding sources (i.e. Home-schooled Assistance, etc.) added.

BEDS ENROLLMENT refers to the total number of students that are being served in the South Hamilton Community School District. This count does not include the resident number of students who are open enrolled out to another school district, students who are "tuition-out" to another school district, or students who are served in an interim for the purposes of special education or some other educational placement. What the BEDS Count does include is resident pupils served in South Hamilton and "open enrolled in" students from other school districts who attend South Hamilton. *An important point of reference*, this year resident pupils will generate \$6,501 (plus the additional funding resources noted in the explanation of C.E.) and our open enrolled in students generate \$6,366.

All-in-all South Hamilton is blessed that there is any positive enrollment news, for most rural districts in Iowa are not experiencing growth in any manner. The additional funding is good, but I truly believe the best thing about the increase in enrollment has been the fact that more good patrons have been added to the South Hamilton family.

SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEMBERS for the 2015-2016 School Year

South Hamilton Community School District Superintendent Ken Howard is looking for interested parents and community members to serve on the 2014-2015 School Improvement Advisory Committee (SIAC). The School Improvement Advisory Committee meets up to two times a year, and is charged with annually making recommendations to the board with regard to progress achieved with annual improvement goals for the state indicators that address reading, mathematics and science, and progress achieved with other locally determined indicators that address the core content areas.

Within the SIAC, each district in Iowa, to the extent possible, is required to have committee membership that is a balanced representation with regard to race, gender, national origin, and disability. Membership includes students, parents, teachers, administrators, and representatives from the local community.

A brief list of some of the SIAC goals and purposes are:

- Understand and exemplify the school improvement process.
- Work collaboratively to support the district and students.
- Connect with community businesses and area service agencies in regard to school improvement.
- Review and receive reports regarding curriculum processes and educational programming.
- Review of district goals, analyze student achievement data, and make recommendations
- Every five years conduct a community needs assessment. Completed; to be reviewed, discussed and recommendations made.

Superintendent Howard is requesting that anyone who has served on the SIAC and any parents or community members who are interested in serving on the SIAC, to please contact the Superintendent's office (827-5479). The initial South Hamilton SIAC meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, November 17th, 2015 starting at 6:30 p.m. in the Middle/High School Library. Refreshments will be provided.

Iowa Code section 280.12

SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE.

The board of directors of each public school district and the authorities in charge of each nonpublic school shall do the following:

- 1. Appoint a school improvement advisory committee to make recommendations to the board or authorities. The advisory committee shall consist of members representing students, parents, teachers, administrators, and representatives from the local community, which may include representatives of business, industry, labor, community agencies, higher education, or other community constituents. To the extent possible, committee membership shall have balanced representation with regard to race, gender, national origin, and disability.*
- 2. Utilize the recommendations from the school improvement advisory committee to assist in determining the following:*
 - a. Major educational needs.*
 - b. Student learning goals.*
 - c. Long-range and annual improvement goals that include, but are not limited to, the state indicators that address reading, mathematics, and science achievement.*
 - d. Desired levels of student performance.*
 - e. Progress toward meeting the goals set out in paragraphs "b" through "d".*
 - f. Harassment or bullying prevention goals, programs, training, and other initiatives.*
- 3. Consider recommendations from the school improvement advisory committee to infuse character education into the educational program.*



IOWA COLLEGE APPLICATION CAMPAIGN

Starting September 28th, South Hamilton participated in the Iowa College Application Campaign, which is sponsored by the Iowa Student Aid Commission. The purpose of the program is to have all students start exploring possible career and college opportunities available after graduation. This initiative is important because research shows that in Iowa, nearly two-thirds of the top fifty fastest growing occupations require some type of formal training program or postsecondary education.

Students in grades 9-12 enjoyed activities related to college and career readiness during Seminar time, guest speakers, and college trivia. The goal is for every South Hamilton senior to complete a college application by November 1st. Representatives from various community colleges and universities have been here during the month to help students apply and answer questions. A panel discussion was held in the auditorium for our seniors. Local professionals - Jeff Hilleman from Workiva, Shon Smith from ACI Mechanical, Sylvia Acheampong and Jerry Rabe from POET were the panel members. Questions about background, education level and experiences were discussed as well as changes in technology and openings in their respective companies.

IOWA CENTRAL COMMUNITY COLLEGE CLASSES

Registration for ICCC spring FlexNet courses began on October 15th. 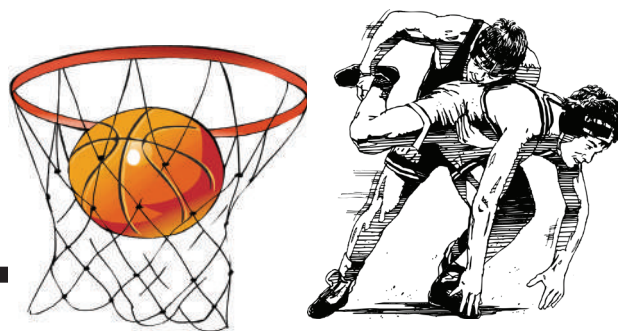
VETERANS DAY PROGRAM

Any student interested in participating in winter sports must have a physical on file. If you do not have one, you need to get one before you can practice.



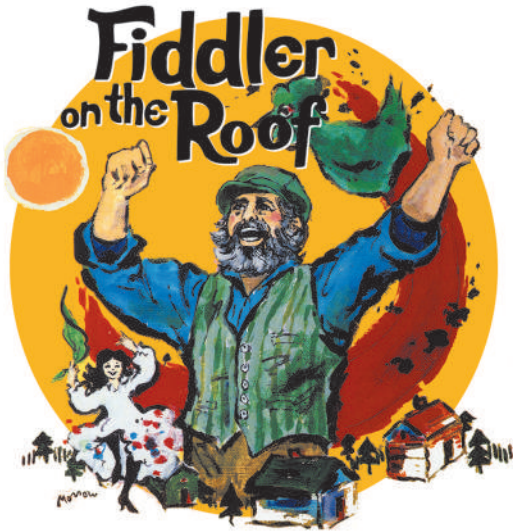
5-12 MUSIC PROGRAM

The South Hamilton School Foundation Board met on October 21, 2015. Officers elected were: Scott Ervin, President and Jeanne Wintermote, Vice-President. Board members include: Dave Carlson, Brenda Dryer, Julie Lutjen, Judi Meyer, Tara Northrop, Marv Penning, Paul Skartvedt and newly elected Kristi Busch replacing Vicki Hill who completed her second three-year term in August 2015.

The Foundation accepted the generous donation from Charlene Fox’s Estate to be used for scholarships in the amount of \$500 each.

The Foundation’s largest fundraiser, “Leave A Legacy” landscape project, has nearly completed Phase I of the project. The Industrial Arts students have the first group of bricks/pavers engraved and will be installing them before November 15, 2015. Bricks/pavers may be purchased at any time (note the order form on page 8) with installation scheduled for twice a year - in the Spring and Fall.

South Hamilton Community Schools Severe Weather Procedures

Snow, ice, and cold temperatures are right around the corner – we do live in Iowa - which could potentially alter school schedules with delayed start times, early dismissals, or school closings.

Many factors are taken into consideration when a change in the school schedule may need to take place, but our first priority will always be the safety of our students and staff. Transportation Director Gene Greenfield and I will check road conditions beginning as early as 5:00 a.m. Multiple sources – Iowa/Hamilton County D.O.T. connections, other area school district leaders, and sophisticated forecasting/radar technology - will be used to determine if weather conditions are or will be safe enough to hold school. Weather conditions can vary and/or change quickly throughout our 200+ square mile district, so please keep this in mind.

Any decision to change the school schedule due to inclement weather will be made as early as possible. When it is necessary to cancel school or delay the start of the school day, media outlets will be directly contacted. Once a decision has been made to delay, dismiss early or cancel school, the following radio and television stations will be contacted:

KCCI (Channel 8)
WOI (Channel 5)

When school is delayed, it is important for one to continue listening/watching the above media sources for any further updates. Announcements will also be posted on the school website: www.s-hamilton.k12.ia.us and sent out via Infinite Campus. Parents: If you have not yet registered for your parent portal account, please do so before winter weather settles in. This is important, as the school district will utilize the Messenger feature to send out text messages and emails regarding weather announcements. If you have any questions about your parent portal account, please contact the school.

Parents are encouraged to review any plans they have established with their children as to where their child is to go in the event of an early school dismissal. Please make sure your child and anyone providing after-school childcare services are aware of these plans. In addition, please make sure your child's school has your current emergency contact information.

Severe weather may affect school bus service. Hazardous road conditions or temporarily closed roads may make it difficult, if not impossible, for the buses to pick-up and/or drop-off students at their regular bus stops so parents/guardians may be asked to meet buses at designated pick-up points. Routes and assignments will be handed out to bus riders as needed. If you have any questions about your alternate route assignment, please call the bus barn at 515-827-5658. The same notification process noted above will be used if it is necessary to use alternate bus routes.

A school patron once asked me, "How do you decide if school should be held on questionable weather days?" My reply was, "If I would not be comfortable with my own 16 or 17 year old son or daughter driving to school...then I do not care to have someone else's child make that same drive...because I know there will be a 16 or 17 year old student that will have to drive if classes are held."

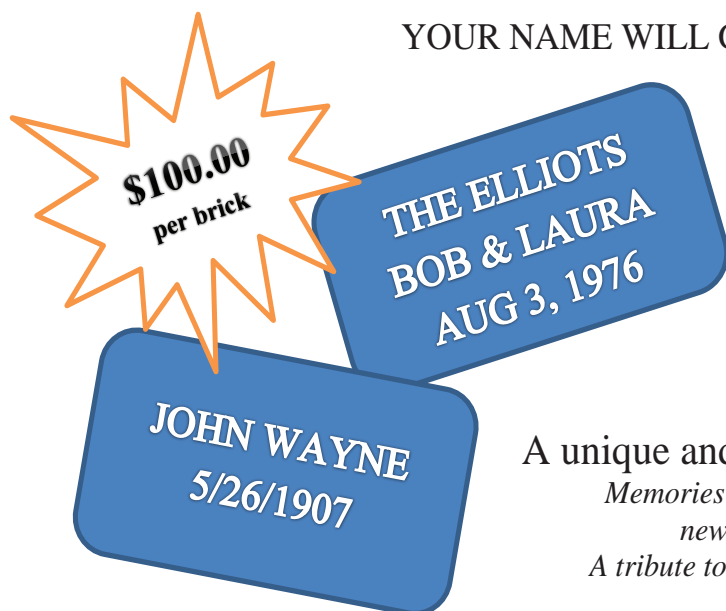

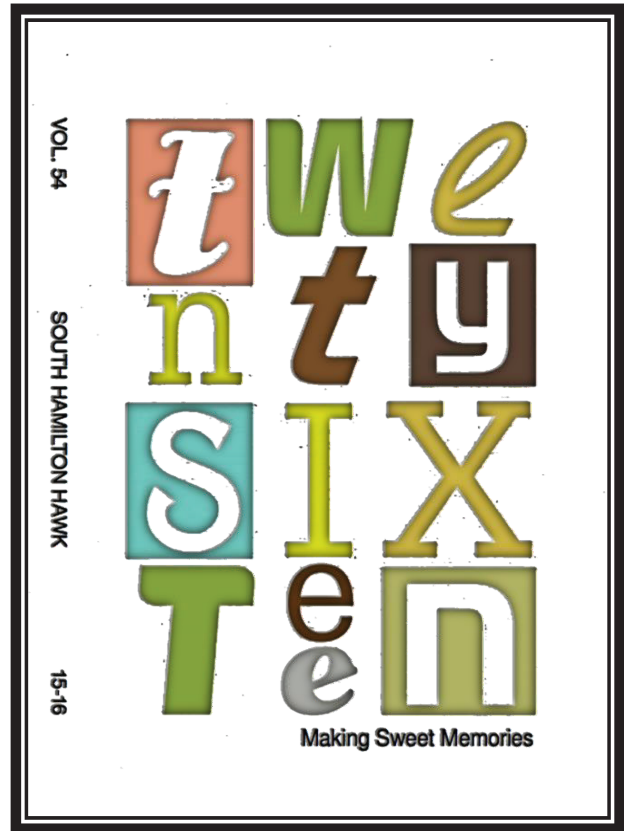
