Our November meeting was well attended. Sponsored by WSRA, Deb Zarling discussed "Intervention and Progress Monitoring in Literacy," which proved to be very informative. She shared an article by Donna Scanlon explaining the trouble with packaged and scripted interventions found in the August/September 2013 edition of *Reading Today*. Her main message was this: *Expertise matters! Teachers matter!* In December, I had the opportunity to attend the Waukesha County Reading Council where Christopher Lehman spoke about writing. His message was to give students choice when writing. As his colleague Lucy Calkins puts it, "Writers do not write with words and convention alone; writers write above all with meaning. Children will invest themselves more in their writing if they are allowed indeed if they are taught - to select their own topics and to write about subjects that are important to them." As teachers, we need to hook into students' interests to make that statement a reality!





The Importance of Strong Vocabulary

Learning about new words is an important and exciting part of reading development. Words are the vehicles we use to take us into new stories and adventures. They help us to understand and learn more about the world around us. Vocabulary is an important part of a child's growth in reading and will help a child in many other subjects, as well.

It is not necessary for children to memorize long lists of words, but it is important for them to use words in many different situations. As adults, we can help children to develop and appreciate new words. Here are some tips that may help:

• Encourage your child to share new words with you. What new words have you found in books or magazines? What new words were heard on TV or radio? Help your child to become more aware of new words and their uses.

 \cdot Share with your child new words that you have discovered. If your child sees that you enjoy words and their uses, he or she will appreciate them, too.

 \cdot Encourage your child to read from a variety of printed materials. The more words your child encounters in reading, the more valuable they will become for him or her.

 \cdot Help your child understand that many words have multiple meanings. Demonstrate how other words in a sentence help define a new word.

 \cdot As a family, attempt to learn a new word each day. All members of the family will benefit from this simple exercise!

 \cdot Read many books to your child. The more opportunities children have to hear words in action, the more inclined they will be to add those words to their own vocabularies.

As with most things in today's world, the Internet is a great source for vocabulary assistance. The Merriam-Webster site [www.m-w.com] has many different possibilities including Word of the Day for anyone wishing to expand his or her vocabulary. Unique, fun, and educational spelling games and word puzzles are also available there! <u>Wordsmith.org</u> [www.wordsmith.org/awad] has a goal for a word a day (AWAD) for vocabulary expansion. Dating back to 1994, they have been contributing numerous words to vocabulary growth worldwide!
