Wendy Baer, MD Medical Director, Psychiatric Oncology Winship Cancer Institute at Emory University

Wendy Baer, MD, is Medical Director of Psychiatric Oncology with appointments in the Departments of Psychiatry, Hematology and Medical Oncology at the Winship Cancer Institute of Emory University. Dr. Baer helps patients and families deal with the stress of receiving a cancer diagnosis and of subsequent treatment. As a psychiatrist, she has expertise in treating clinical depression and anxiety both with medications and psychotherapy to help people manage emotions, behaviors and relationships. The fundamental goal of Dr. Baer's practice is to promote wellness and maximize patients' quality of life. Dr. Baer attended medical school at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and completed her residency in Psychiatry at the University of Pennsylvania. Prior to moving to Atlanta, she worked at the Swedish Cancer Institute in Seattle, WA.

Prior to joining Big Brothers Big Sisters, Janice was the Vice-President for Development at Spelman College and held positions with Howard University, Hampton University and the Johns Hopkins School of Medicine. She holds both a Bachelor's and Master's degrees from Howard University.

Today, she is a member of Georgia's Comprehensive Cancer Control (GC3) Plan Steering Team and has served on the GC3 Survivorship working group since 2013. In 2014, she was invited to serve on the Georgia CORE Survivorship Advisory Board.
