'THE POOP FROM GROUP' -- CHANGES IN THE SPEEDX CONSTITUTION
SPEEDX President John R. Trautschold has directed that the following changes in the Constitution be published for the benefit of the membership:
SUBSECTION (b), Section 2 now reads:
"The Managing Editor shall reserve space in the July and/or August issues of the bulletin, each odd-numbered year, to permit publication therin of statements received from each nominee. The Managing Editor will remove from nomination the name of any person who does not respond by August l5th to the call for statements; the Managing Editor will also remove from nomination the name of any person who states that he is not willing to serve if elected. The names of those who accept nomination by submitting statements to the Managing Editor in writing will comprise the list of names on the ballot."
SUBSECTION (f), Section 2 BOARD OF DIRECTORS now reads:
"The term of office of the President and Vice-President shall be two (2) years. The President may serve up to a maximum of two (2) consecutive terms. The Vice-President may serve an unlimited number of terms. The President may be re-elected or appointed to other offices after his two (2) or less terms have been served. The individual who served as President may be re-elected to that position after a break in service of at least four (4) years."

Every serious DXer has his own developed method of chasing DX. The better the method, the higher your countries total will climb. I think the basic things you will find necessary to successfully chase DX is: 1) A good receiver. 2) A good well constructed antenna. and 3) The general knowledge and experience that comes with practice. Number 3, I think, is the most important of all. It includes handing your receiver, knowing when to 1 isten, where to listen and how to listen. It is this part of DXing that $I$ would like to present, my methods. Whether it is good, bad or poor, I will let you decide after you give it a try.

Starting from the very beginning, you must know your receiver and its controls. Your receiver has its own characteristics that you must know how to put to the best use. You must know, and be able to judge, your dial calibration reasonably well, if you do not possess a digital frequency readout. If you are really serious about hunting "big gane" DX, you will soon find that you must turn your tuning controls very slowly and delicately if you want results. Spinning the dials will only produce the 'powerhouses', not the low powered stations. It takes a lot of time and patience to slowly inch the dial towards your target, but it's well worth it. When I am station hunting I like to tune my main tuning dial slightly ahead of the frequency $I$ am trying for and then begin searching for it with the bandspread dial, turning it very, very slowly, trying not to miss anything.

In your search you will find such stations as RSA, VOA, BBC etc. I use the se strong stations as 'markers'. That is, by knowing the frequency of a 'powerhouse' $I$ can judge with relative accusacy where the station $I$ am looking for can be found on the bandspread dial. A crystal calibrator is also an invaluable aid in finding your way around the band.

Let us go through the steps I use in searching for a new station. Before even touching my dials, I refer to the World Radio TV Handbook (WRTH) and current shortwave hobby books such as the monthly SPEEDX bulletin for the latest information on the station $I$ am looking for. I compare the broadcasting times of the station as well as the latest freguencies in use, the language used and whether any DXers in my area have reported hearing in and how well.

You are not always going to find the station you are hunting broadcasting in English, so try to know beforehand what language to expect. It is recomended that you learn what a station's ID scunds like in various languages. This will take patience and time, so try to learn it by listening to the VOA or BBC. Listen to the way they give IDs in languages you do not understand.

Now that you are armed with information about the station, there is one vital factor you must know. That is, the technical side of DXing which deals with receiving conditions and the ionosphere. This is too long and complex to discuss here but there are books available on the subject. Also, SPEEDX has a BASIC INFORMATION PAMPHLET (BIP-5) you can obtain from club HQS for just a SASE. It is titled "Basic Propagation". Very simply though, it means you can hear stations from one part of the world only at a certain time of the day because of ionospheric conditions. I suggest you read up on this topic if you really are interested in searching for new and/or rare stations.

Okay, so let's look for a new station. Make sure your receiver is warmed up (especially if it is a tube type) to prevent drifting. Tune to the proper band. Put on your headphones, which $I$ recommend when chasing weak $D X$ to increase readability. Put your main tuning dial slightly ahead of the desired frequency and tune the bandspread slowly, noting all stations passed so to judge where our station will be. We don't want to pass it by. You think you have it? Good! If it's a man announcer, put your tone control at its highest setting for best readability. Be sure to adjust all controls to bring in the best readable signal. If you have more than one antenna, try switching to the other one. If there is a lot of static, try your ANL (if your set is so equipped). Listen carefully for ID announcement. NEVER GUESS OR ASSUME the ID. BE SURE!

Don't be discouraged if you don't find the station you are looking for on the first try. Be patient. Persistance pays off. Conditions to log the station may only be best once in awhile so keep trying.

If your receiver has a digital readout, that makes it easy. If not, you may wish to send for BIP-2 from club HQS. "Improving the Calibration and Tuning Operation of Receivers Having a Sliding-Pointer Dial" may help. Free for a SASE. Good listening.

It is an unfortunate truth that we DX editors must sometimes antagonize people by either not printing their loggings for some reason or by questioning a logging which we feel is not quite correct. In the last 9 yearst that I have been editing a logging colum, I have tried to be sparing in the use of invective and sarcasm to criticize loggings -if necessary, I omit the reporter's name to spare us all embarrassment. My practices seem to have antagonized someone, however. In the past several months, the following has occurred: (1) False loggings were submitted to SPEEDX under the name of Joe George, FL (who, as far as we can tell, does not exist); (2) Someone has written in my name to various mail order organizations asking for literature. This practice victimizes only the mail order business, as my wastebasket is ready to hand. (3) Most seriously, in the August 3lst edition of Sweden Calling DXers, two reports were submitted in my name. Both reports were patently false and drew on several facts and/or past corrections $I$ have made in this column.
THEREFORE -- BE WARNED! One of the mail order houses has promised to turn over the original request to me for follow-up. BE WARNED, ALSO -- that no report purporting to be from me is true unless you see it in SPEEDX or FRENDX (until this matter is cleared up, at which time I will report to you in this space).
This disclaimer will also appear in Shortwave Center. Thanks to all of you who have had to read this disclaimer -- I wish it had not had to be printed.

SPORLIGHT: RADTO LESOTHO

Lesotho, formerly Basutoland, is a tiny African nation situated in the southern part of the continent completely surrounded by the Republic of South Africa. The country was constitued a native state under British protection by a treaty signed in 1843 by native chief Moshesh. The country became a British protectorate in 1868. In 1966, Basutoland became the independent nation of Lesotho.

Current head of state is King Moshoeshoe II. Lesotho's head of government is Dr. Leabua Jonathin. The capital and largest city is Maseru, with a population just under 15,000.

Lesotho has a temperate climate with well-marked seasons. A greater part of the year is sunny and the skies cloudless. Rains come in summer from October to April. Mean annual rainfall is $700-800 \mathrm{~mm}$ in the lowlands with higher figures for most mountain areas. Precipitation is rare from May to september, but there may be snow in the high mountain areas called "maloti" from May to July. The GNP of the country is $\$ 440$ million. Per capita income, $\$ 270$.

Hearing Radio Lesotho in Chicago is not an easy task, but I did manage to log and verify the station this past year. For those who may not know, Radio Lesotho has been in existence for 16 years, providing Lesothoans with news, music and entertainment. It operates on two 100 kW xmtrs on 891 kHz ( 337 meters) mediumwave and 4800 kHz ( 62.5 meters) on shortwave. The station is operated by the Lesotho National Brocadcasting Service of the Ministry of Information and Broadcasting. It is on the air from Masery from 0400-2030 GMT daily, except on Wednesdays and Sundays, when its xmtns are from 0400 to 2100 GMT. Approximately three hours daily are in English and the remainder in Sesotho, the national language of this tiny Southern African nation of 1,375,000. BBC news is relayed at 0500 daily. Lesotho National News is aired at 0530 GMT in EE Monday through Saturday. On Sundays, there is no National News but Church News which goes on the air at 0520 GMT. The World News is at ll30 GMT and 1600 GMT in EE. Highlights of the week include an EE program produced by the news room which airs Fridays at 0745 GMT. Its Sesotho version "Maratha a Lilepe" goes on the air an hour earlier. It is a weekly review of major news items broadcast over Radio Lesotho. Sesotho news is at 1100 GMT , 1645 GMT and again at 1845 GMT with the National news at 0415 and 0700 GMT. Monday through Saturday, Radio Lesotho does not broadcast national news in Sesotho on Sundays, but Church news at 0415.

Special interest progranming includes feature magazines, interviews, announcements, music, entertainment and religious programs which are broadcast daily. Other programs include farming related shows, programs for housewives, and school children. For visitors to Lesotho, a program of special interest is "What's on in Lesotho." It airs at 1145 and again at 1530 GMT on Fridays. The country's current Minister of Information and Broadcasting is K. T. J. Rakhetla. Radio Lesotho's Director of Broadcasting is Tsoeu Ntsane.

The importance of Radio Lesotho is douily emphasized when you consider that the country has but two newspapers, both of which are weeklies. The papers are called "Lesotho Weekly" and "Mochochonomo."

The station will replace the HF communications link to Nairobi which has been put out of action from time to time due to lightning and occasional manpower difficulties.The satellite station will facilitate the relay of television news for Lesotho's proposed TV service. Consulting engineers for the project are Detecon on Bonn.

RTTY listening ten or fifteen years ago was a much different undertaking than it is today. At that time you had to face the prospect of noisy, bulky, mechanically intensive machines. It took considerable mechanical and electrical knowledge to keep these machines running. When microelectronics became available the situation changed dramatically. RTTY reception is now available through quiet, inexpensive devices that require very little maintenance and are easy to use.
Universal and Infotech have just announced the second generation of nTTY receiving equipment. The new model M-600 offers an entirely new potential of listening possibilities. This device will offer reception capabilities never before available to SwLers. Units with single similar features have been available for several years, but only to commercial users and at five or ten tianes the cost! These units would only copy one type of RTTY code for each unit or system. The new M-600 is one unit that will do it all!


The $M-600$ Multi-iMode Converter is a solid state unit that can decode a variety of communication protocols and display them on a monitor and also drive a variety of printers. The M-600 features and specifications: BAUDOT BIT INVERSION: At 60,66 , 75,100 and 132 wpm . Bit inversion is a common method used by RTTY users to insure a degree of privacy for their transmission. The M-600 will automatically determine the inverted bits and revert them back to 'normal' sense thus displaying the message!
TOR-SITOR-AMTOR (Teleprinting-Over-Radio) This mode is in wide use by the marine market. It is used to send telegram, press, and government traffic to and from ships. The M-600 can receive and decode both ARQ (traffic to a specific user) and FEC (general transmissions) TOR codes.
BAUDOT VARIABLE SHIFT: The M-600 also has a Variable Shift Control to facilitate tuning stations using non-standard shifts!
WEATHER-FORMAT: Some meteorological and aeroautical stations transmit weather symbols. The $M-600$ can be set to receive and display these symbols.
BAUDOT: At $60,66,75,100$, and 132 wpm . Baudot remains the most popular text transmission mode. All standard speeds are received by the M-600.
ASCII: At $100,150,300,600$ and 1200 baud (BPS). Lowspeed ASCII may become popular with HAMS, while highspeed ASCII is in use by commercial users.

RTTY aux. (used by hams who transmit RTTY)
Morse Aux (you could attach a code key and send into the M-600 for code practice or to monitor transmitted CW).
SPECIAL FEATURES: The M-600 has a variety of desirable features built in at no extra cost:
Sel Call Display is a feature that will display the digital Sel Call on the screen. Screen Print allows you to transfer (or dump) the current video display contents to the printer. This can be called at any time. . -great for selectively preserving messages for latter analysis.
Speed Readout displays on the video (25th line) the rate of incoming Baudot and ASCII traffic.
Multiple Scroll Inhibit is a feature that prevents multiple line feeds from displaying on the screen or printing on the page. A great paper saver!
Unshift on Space permits the unit to automatically shift to the "letters" case in Baudot upon receipt of a space character. It is useful during the reception of third shift traffic and Arabic.
Self Test System is a unique feature that allows the unit to run diagnostics on itself! Auto-Start Mode allows automatic unattended starting of the printer.
The ri-600 has a distinctive look with many options controllable from the built in key pad. The handsome enclosure measures $161 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ wide by $31 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ high by $103 / 4^{\prime \prime}$ deep (weight
3 lbs). An optional rack-mount kit is available. Switches control Sel Call status, zuto start mode, auto threshold (ATC), filter select, normal or reverse sense, wide/
narrow bandwidth and printer select. A built in ten step LeD bar graph display makes tuning a signal easy and quick. There are also LEDs to indicate: mark and space, power "on", auto start, buffer full, morse lock, Hi Baud Tuning, Peak Tuning, and Input Limiting.
The M-600 is priced at $\$ 799.95$. While this is a few hundred dollars more than a standard RTTY/CW converter, the additional capabilities will clearly be worth the difference to most DXers. While RTTY/CW/ASCII converters have improved over the years, the M-600 is the first to offer an entirely new range of listening modes. While it would be inappropriate (and perhaps ever illegal) to discuss the services you will be able to decode, it is safe to say that the Universal M-600 will offer some exceptionally interesting monitoring! 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 RECEIVER REVIEWTHE SONY ICR-4800 PORTABLE RECEIVER

Sony's entry into the ultra-mini portable SW receiver market is a useful device for the serious SWLer, but its lack of features makes it a less than serious receiver for the DXer. Its extreme portability and small size ( $5 \frac{1}{2 \prime \prime} \times 215 / 16^{\prime \prime} \times 7 / 8^{\prime \prime}$ ) fits any size pocket, but its price ( $\$ 89.95$ ) may not fit everyone's wallet. It may be available soon in discount chains at lower prices. The little receiver comes equipped with an earphone, a felt carrying-case, instruction manual, and a hand strap. It is powered by 2 AA batteries ( 3 volts) and does not have an external power jack. Battery consumption appears to be low. The manual suggests a battery life of 22 hours with normal usage.
The speaker grille takes up more than $50 \%$ of the receiver's front surface. The audio is pleasant and without and discernible defects. The tuning system (dial plate and knob) requires a steady touch and sharp vision. The printed numbers on the dial plate are necessarily small and difficult to read. There is no dial light. The markings in the 5 SW bands ( $49,31,25,19$ and 16 meters) are useless, for they correspond only very roughly to the numbers next to them. The red LED tuning indicator doesn't help much. The tuning knob is not susceptible to body capacitance. (On my RF-085 the frequency shifts when you touch the tuning knob.) There are three lever switches on the right side of the receiver. The "power off" switch can be locked in place by a side "lock" switch and this seemed to prevent the receiver from being accidentally turned on in one's attache case or day pack. The other two switches function as on switches for the $S W$ and MW bands and can be locked in place by the same "lock" switch. The 5 SW bands are seliected by a small slide switch on the top of the radio. The 22 inch telescopic antenna is also on the top of the set, but it doesn't have a swivel that allows the radio to lie flat with the antenna extended vertically. There is no provision for external antenna connection on the radio.

OPERATING CHARACTERISTICS: The radio does not have FM reception and this is perhaps why I could not detect any FM interference (unlike the RF-085) while standing 30 yards from WFU''s antenna emitting 50 kilowatts. The receiver seems to be fairly stable. I detected an image of approximately 1 MHz on fairly strong signals. FUF, transmitting a strong CW "Vmarker" at 16963 kHz was heard on the ICR-4800 at approximately 17900 kHz . Selectivity seems to be a little sharper than the 2001 since I was able to tune away from some RTTY QRM on the ICR-4800 and not able to do so on the 2001. But since there is no choice of selectivity or audio filtering on either rig, this remains a moot point. Sensitivity corresponds approximately to that of the Sony 2001. Since no technical specifications were available on sensitivity or selectivity in the enclosed manual, lab test equipment would be needed for scientific conclusions. Mw reception is adequate.
If portability and size are your chief considerations in purchasing a swL receiver, then the Sony ICR-4800 merits a close look.

##  BOOK REVIEW <br> INTERFERENCE HANDBOOK BY WILLIAM R. NELSON Reviewed by David Maxfield, MI

244 p., paper, $\$ 8.95$.
In the long run, if anything kills SWL/DXing, it may be the man-made radio interference that is increasing every year. Its sources are multiple and interactive, and it may come by induction, by conduction, and/or by radiation. At fault may be a tin roof near a high voltage line 10 miles away, or some of your own light bulbs. Not only power lines, but engines, motors, thermostats, dimmers, TVs and TV cables, telephones, radios, com-
puters, power tools, heaters, medical equipment, radar, neon signs, and many, many other things, all contribute to the din heard in our earphones and speakers. In fact, corroded metal joints anywhere, even if not part of intentional electric circuits, often raise $R F$ havoc!
Books written to combat RFI thus are most welcome, especially since cardiac pacemakers and electronic devices of all kinds are as much disrupted as our beloved sw receivers. Probably, the work most widely known is the American Radio Relay League's Radio Frequency Interference (ARRL, Newington, CT $06111 \$ 3.00$ ), now in a second edition. This is well illustrated, and many SWLs will find it useful. However, prepared for the ham, it places perhaps undue stress on how he may defend himself from irate neighbors who think that his transmitter is disrupting their TVs, etc.
Another good book of somewhat wider interest, but briefer and possibly less technical, is Larry Kahaner's Audio and Video Interference Cures (Hayden Book Co., Rochelle Park, NJ 07662, $\$ 5.50$ ). However, despite obvious merits this work is more specifically concerned with home entertainment devices than with $S W$ listening.
Thus the best book for the SWL/DXer at this time probably is Nelson's Interference Handbook, which covers everything important appearing in the above titles and much more, going into extremely useful details regarding numerous specific RFI sources and how to deal with them. The author is a professional RFI investigator with many years of practical experience. He (and his editor) write concise, interesting prose which would make their material readily understandable, even if they did not include numerous fascinating real-life case reports. The work is profusely illustrated with clear half-tones and easily-read diagrams. When one has finished it, one has a comprehensive grasp of RFI and what can-and what cannot-be done about it. Moreover, special attention is paid to the SW receiver. Several unfortunate typographical errors mar both text and illustration captions, but most copies are supplied with errata sheets, so no harm is done. A careful index facilitates permanent reference use.
Perhaps the easiest way to summarize the book's contents is to list the chapter headings: I. An Introduction to RFI.-II. Spark Discharge Interference.-III. Electrostatic Discharge. -IV. The RFI Investigator, -V. Power Line Interference.-VI. How the Power Company Locates Power Line RFI.-VII. Noise Reducing Bridges for Your HF Receiver.VIII. RFI From Nonlinear Devices.-IX. What You can Do to Your Transmitter.-X. Eliminating Interference in Home Entertainment Equipment.-XI. Grounds and Grounding.--XII. Vehicle Noise Suppression.-XIII. RFI Roundup.
This work is highly recommended for all SW listeners and DXers, as well as for hams, TV and hifi enthusiasts, and many, many others.

RESPONSE TO A RESPONSE

In reading over the two previous letters on the ham us. SWl debate by both Mark Johnson (Sept. '82) and Peter Card (Oct. '82), I. found both to have made some very valid points. However, I feel I do have to take exception to a couple of points made by Mr. Card in his response to the article by Mark Johnson.
First of all he says that "The SWL ONLY has to hear the station while the ham operator has to be heard in return for an exchange of reports." Its the word "only" that bothers me here. When working a fairly rare DX station, the average QSO lasts approx. 10 or 15 seconds with only an exchange of callsigns and signal reports. For this fantastic accomplishment, the ham will receive his QSL card. If I, as an SWL hope to receive that card, I will probably have to listen to that station anywhere between 45 minutes to an hour in order to have enough data for what I consider to be a complete report. This, however, is just the beginning, as far as I'm concerned. I then have to compile my notes and begin the job of typing a personal letter/report to this individual. This can be time consuming as well as monotonous. In the time it takes me to do all of this, the carefree ham operator has worked dozens of stations and probably had time for a meal. In addition to the time I invest in a card, there is also the financial aspect to consider. I do not make enough contacts to treat myself to the services of a QSL bureau where batches of cards can be mailed at reduced prices. Each card and report must be mailed separately with IRC's, SAE, or both. So judging by the effort and money it takes for the SWL to receive that same QSL that the ham gets, I hardly think the ham has it rougher. Once the ham ticket is obtained, a large signal can be purchased from any one of the radio outlets in $C Q$ or another ham publication. I do have respect for the QRP operator who has to work through the "big guns" by using his operating skills to the maximum. This is real hamming.

The other point I wanted to bring up is the "bad apple" syndrome as it applies to ham radio. I would like to accept the fact that there are only a handful of these bad operators, but a sampling of rare $D X$ pileups will prove otherwise. Two nights ago, I was listening to a PYø station on 20 mmeters which had attracted an extremely large pileup. The DX station was working split frequency. He was transmitting on 14195 kiz in the foreign portion of the band while listening 14200 and $u p$. I wish I had a nickel for every station operating illegally that night. l,iterally dozens upon dozens of hams (US) descended upon 14195 and continued to shout their callsigns, not even taking the time to notice that first of all, they were out of band, and secondly that the DX station wasn't even listening on that frequency to begin with! This was followed by accusations, name calling and abundant profanity. Although I had given up any hope of trying for a reception report through all that $Q R M$, I continued to listen (out of amazement) for nearly an hour and found that the supply of interfering stations was never exhausted. Just when one would finally get the point, there were two more ready to take his place. I guess the point here is that there is one main difference between ham and SWL that nobody has mentioned. That is, there are probably the same percentage of jerks in both hobbies, but the SWL does not have the capability (or the need) to disrupt someone else's hobby when he chooses to be irresponsible with his own.
In closing I would like to say that I think that radio is the most interesting and diverse hobby around regardless of which area is pursued. I shall continue to enjoy SWLing for many years to come, I'm sure, and would like to thank the good hams who have generously responded to my requests for QSL cards as well as been courteous and polite in all aspects of their operating. It is these people who continue to make my hobby what it is.

Solidarity interrupted an official newscast in order to broadcast to the Polish police the fact that they should go easy on pro-Solidarity demonstrators. Breaking a seven week silence, it was the first time they used the government stations' frequencies. (Wilder A. Pickard II, IL)
TUNNEL RADIO: An interesting article in the August 14th Billboard relates the fact that Boston's Dewey Square Tunnel has inaugurated its own radio station. By tuning in any AM frequency, commuters can pick up Tunnel Radio which offers a non-commercial format from house/garden tips to road repair info. The service was started by Rodger Skinner of Hollywood Florida who has also set up systems in Ft. Lauderdale and Bal.timore. A service is now being considered for NY. (Peggy Thompson, CA)
2 BUILD OWN STATION TO BROADCAST TO CUBA: The Sept. 6, 1982 Minneapolis Star and Tribune, in a recent article, related the fact that two US broadcasters have begun to build their own station in order to broadcast news, info and music to Cuba. Willian Kitchen and James Slaughter, Owners of Quality Media Corp. of Columbus, GA are building 3 stations on South Caicos Island in the Caribbean about 300 miles from Cuba. They are doing this because they are fed up with the Congressional and Administrative stalemate over the creation of R. Marti. They believe that because their stations are outside the continental US, Cuba will not retaliate by jamming US radio stations. Of the 3 stations, two will broadcast religious programs in English and one will broadcast Spanish programs for Cuba. The 3 stations will be called "The Turk \& Caicos Beacon." They plan to begin broadcasts in December using 2 AM and 1 FM transmitter. (John D. Williams, MN)

SENATE COMMITTEE APPROVES R. MARTI: ACcording to the Sept. 10, 1982 Minneapolis Star and Tribune, the Senate Frareign Relations Committee approved the creation of R. Marti. Many US broadcasters oppose the bill because they say the station will invite Cuban jamming of American stations. The Senate bill contains an amendment by the Reagan Administration not in the House version which requires the Commerce Dept. to consider the jamming abilities of Cuban stations in selecting a frequency for R.
