Nancy Thomas is another friendly face we're happy to see again (she was the editor/author of our first three Lion Brand books). This time she is headlining the show with her first solo gig since joining Tahki Stacy Charles with *Tweed*, the first-ever look at the rich history and nuances of knitting with nubby, nepped yarn.

For our knitting faithful, we're also very excited to introduce a bouquet of fresh names and ideas: Joanne Yordanou brings us thirty-six reasons to knit year-round in *Twelve Months of Knitting;* Lisa Lloyd takes knitters through the lush world of handspun fibers with *A Fine Fleece;* and Joan Tapper and Gale Zucker take us across America in *Shear Spirit* to give us a behind-the-scenes look at the lives and stories of fiber farmers and artists.

That's Potter Craft's spring list in a nutshell. We hope you agree that we are starting off our third year with our superstars blazing!





# RIVERBED SHAWL

### SIZE: One Size

KNITTED MEASUREMENTS: Approximately 15" x 57" (38cm x 145cm)

### MATERIALS:

3 skeins Twinkle Handknits Soft Chunky, 100% virgin merino wool, 7 oz/200g, 83 yds/75m, #09 Black (A)

2 skeins #06 Baby Pink (B)

US size 19 (15mm) 29" (74cm) circular needle or size needed to obtain gauge

Tapestry needle

Large crochet hook (size P/Q [15mm]) for attaching fringe

### GAUGE:

18 stitches and 21 rows = 12" (30.5cm) in feather and fan stripes on size 19 (15mm) needles. Take the time to check your gauge.

### FEATHER AND FAN STRIPES (MULTIPLE OF 18 + 2):

ROW 1 (RS): With A, knit.

ROW 2: Purl.

ROW 3: K1, \*k2tog 3 times, [yo, k1] 6 times, k2tog 3 times; repeat from \* to last stitch, k1.

ROW 4: Knit.

**ROWS 5–8:** With B, repeat rows 1–4. Repeat rows 1–8 for pattern.

**NOTE:** A circular needle is used to accommodate the large number of stitches; work back and forth in rows.

### SHAWL:

With A, cast on 92 stitches. Work in feather and fan stripes until 8 stripes are complete; then work rows 1–4 again. Bind off loosely. Weave in ends.

### FRINGE:


Cut sixty 26" (66cm) lengths of A and forty-eight 26" (66cm) lengths of B. Matching fringe color to stripe color, attach 3 sets of double-stranded fringe to each end of each stripe.

### INSTRUCTIONS

- Place scarves (a, b, c, d) together creating a large square (as shown), and pin in place
- **2.** Sew a large X in the middle of the 4 scarves to connect them, but leave slits at the ends
- 3. Cut off corners of (b) and (d) creating pieces (e) & (f)
- 4. Re-sew piece (d) onto raw edge of scarf (b)
- 5. Sew piece (e) onto piece (f), corner to corner
- 6. Simple knot 2 bottom slits, as shown
- 7. Clean finish sew backside of piece (a) and (c) together, and tie with a simple knot at the top
- 8. Tie together corners of piece (b) and piece (e) with a simple knot

AN EXCERPT FROM *MORE BIG GIRL KNITS* Sizes are the biggest joke in fashion. Every company has their own version of a size 16, and you'll have to look damn hard to find two companies that match. Year to year, companies change the measurements that correspond with each size, trying to please the population. You know a size 16 from 1950 is about the same as an average size 12 now, right? That's why Marilyn Monroe looks curvy-ish to us, but she sure doesn't look like a size 16 as we know it today. Sheesh. Seriously if their numbers mean nothing, why are we paying attention to them?

The only numbers we need to know are *actual measurements*, not the number on the tag or the size label in a knitting pattern. That's because measurements don't lie, unless you make them.

To figure out which set of numbers to follow in a knitting pattern, you need three things:

- a schematic of the garment showing the finished measurements
- a current set of your own measurements
- your favorite ease numbers

No moaning. We guarantee that when you knit a sweater to your own current measurements, you will be astounded at the results—you'll have a sweater that fits you!

### AN EXCERPT FROM TWEED

Tweed fabric was a fortunate accident that occurred when wool spinners began using several shades of wool during the carding process. . . . Occasionally, a bit of yarn would not get completely integrated into the fiber and, when spun, would turn into a large fleck, called a nepp. These flecks eventually caught on, and spinners tried adding small pinches of felt in a contrasting color. While normal unfelted fibers would be drawn into the spinning to change the shade of the yarn, the felted nepps stayed intact.

## **TWEED FABRICS**

**CHEVIOT TWEED** The name comes from a British breed of sheep originating in the Northumberland region and known for its heavy fleece. Cloth produced from this wool has a heavy twill weave. It is sometimes called Scotch tweed.

**HERRINGBONE** A pattern consisting of adjoining vertical rows of slanting lines suggesting a V or an inverted V. It is also known as chevron.

**HOUNDSTOOTH CHECK** A pattern of broken or jagged checks.


**TWILL WEAVE** One of three basic weave structures in which the filling threads (woof threads) are woven over and under two or more warp yarns, producing the characteristic diagonal pattern.

**WORSTED** Firmly twisted yarn or thread spun from combed, stapled wool fibers of the same length. Cloth produced from this yarn has a hard, smooth surface and no nap.
