House Calls

An Interdisciplinary Program designed to improve communication between health care professionals

House Calls is a cooperative interdisciplinary clinical education experience between Truman and A.T. Still University. The program, which began in 2002, provides Truman Nursing students the opportunity to collaborate with students and faculty from other healthcare disciplines including Osteopathic Medicine, Communication Disorders, and Health Sciences. A team of three or four students, each from different health professions, make four team visits to the home of an elder volunteer. The team provides the client with physical assessment, health education, home safety information, and social interaction. The House Calls program assists the students in improving their communication skills, learning to work together as professionals, and gaining a respect for the knowledge and expertise each discipline brings to the team. These are key components in reducing errors and improving the quality of health care.

Truman Nursing Students participate in the House Calls program during junior year (as part of Adult Health Nursing) and in the fall of the senior year.

Poor communication among health care professionals has been found to be a major contributor to health care errors. Interdisciplinary programs such as "House Calls" play a role in helping students have a better understanding of the role of other health care professionals. This improves communication and teamwork between them.

News in Nursing

We are at the beginning of a chilly Spring Break. Kirksville is still thawing after several major snow storms during the winter. The president thoughtfully closed campus for one day so snow could be cleared. Students described traveling over Spring Break to climates warmer than Kirksville. Others reported plans to apply for summer internships or positions as graduate or registered nurses. Regardless of their plans, students are considering how to address new challenges as future professional nurses. Best wishes to our graduating seniors as they consider employment and/or graduate education.

The spring semester has been very busy for faculty and students. The senior class and five faculty visited Missouri's Capitol in February to speak with legislators about funding for education and removing barriers to practice. The students advocated for the profession and access to nursing care. Several students made plans to attend the National Nursing Student Association spring meeting in North Carolina; they have been raising funds to provide support for their trip. Nursing students also organized and offered a campus health fair and several screenings for early detection of disease.

With financial assistance from a Missouri Board of Nursing grant, faculty and staff have been preparing for students in the first accelerated BSN cohort. Faculty will offer three online foundational courses. After completion of pre-requisite courses, students with a previous bachelor's degree may complete a BSN degree in 15 months of study, starting in May 2013.

We are waiting for the final accreditation report from the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE) in late April 2013. Thanks to our faculty, staff, students, administration, and alumni for providing such excellent outcomes. Faculty, staff, and students recently celebrated the good news of Truman's

NCLEX® pass rate of 97% during 2012.

Faculty and staff continue to utilize technology to improve teaching/learning in classrooms, clinical, and the nursing simulation center (NSC). Faculty, staff, and students appreciate and learn from building scenarios, recording patient care between students and manikins, and discussing how to improve patient care.

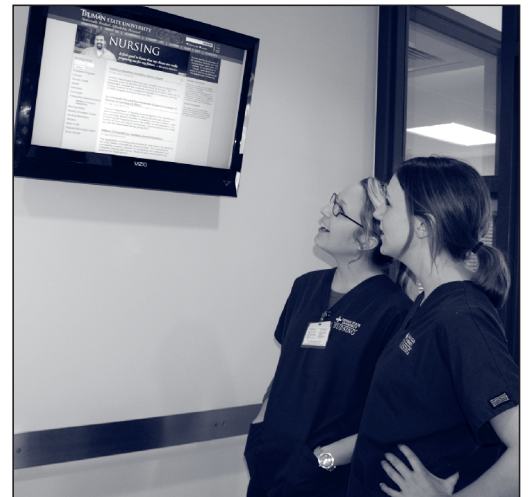

Accelerated BSN Program begins Summer 2013

Truman's first cohort of 10-15 students will begin the ABSN program this summer. This new program is designed for individuals with a previous bachelor's degree seeking a Bachelor of Science in Nursing. This program was made possible by a \$150,000 grant awarded by the Missouri State Board of Nursing and the Missouri Department of Higher Education. The second cohort will begin in the summer of 2014. The goal is to graduate 10-15 additional students each year in order to meet the growing demands for nurses.
