National sports columnist Kevin Blackistone will be the featured speaker at the Friends of the Takoma Park Maryland Library's annual membership meeting. The annual meeting will take place Tuesday, March 24, at 7:30 p.m. in the Children's Room at the Takoma Park Maryland Library. The event is free and open to the public. The presentation will be followed by a Q&A, refreshments, and board elections.

Kevin is a sports columnist for *The Washington Post*, a visiting professor at the Philip Merrill College of Journalism at the University of Maryland, a panelist on ESPN's "*Around the Horn*," a sports roundtable television show, and a regular contributor to National Public Radio. Kevin has written thought-provoking columns and journal articles about the intersection of race, sports, and the media. Featuring a local literary talent at the annual meeting is a long-time FTPML tradition, and the Friends are excited to have Kevin continue the tradition this year.

After the presentation, there will be a very brief membership meeting to hold elections for board positions. This year, the following positions are up for reelection: President, Vice President, Secretary, and Members-At-Large. Additionally, there are five vacant board positions. Any member of the Friends whose dues are current may be a candidate for office and may vote. 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Library Fundraiser

Headlined by local band and 80s pop music powerhouse - the Airport 77s the Friends of the Takoma Park Maryland Library hosted a fundraiser on February 8th at the Takoma Park VFW full of music, dancing, and friends. The Friends exceeded their initial goal of raising \$1200 to fund the Takoma Park Library's 2020 SummerQuest event, raising over \$2300.

SummerQuest is a unique summer reading adventure game that the Library hosts every summer. Each year, Takoma Park librarian, Dave Burbank, develops a one-of-a-kind whimsical reading program that encourages Takoma Park youth to read and to imagine over the summer months. The surplus from the fundraiser will allow the Friends to not only fully pay for SummerQuest, but also fund additional Library programs and help the Library develop innovative projects that meet community needs.

The event would not have been possible without the generous support from volunteers and donors. The Friends received raffle donations from Ace Hardware, The Girl and The Vine, Yoga Heights, TPSS Co-op, MAD Fitness, Takoma Bev Co., and Olive Lounge & Grill. Cheros Grill kindly donated towards the fundraiser. Azalea Award Winning artist and Takoma Park resident Todd Carter donated artwork from his latest novel, *Stealing the Scream*. Middle school volunteers, Ada and Stella, created a reusable fundraising thermometer, which incorporated artwork from SummerQuest. Thanks to these innovative and talented volunteers, the Friends will be able to use it for future events. The VFW, which prides itself as a community gathering space, generously donated the venue. Lastly, the Airport 77s kept the music going and the crowd dancing all night.

The event marked the first fundraiser thrown by the Friends in several years. Historically, the Friends have predominantly raised money through membership dues and our Spring, Fall, and Winter Book Sales. This past year, the library's budget was cut. Given the cut, the Friends decided to take a more proactive and creative fundraising approach to ensure that the library can maintain its robust array of programming. Plus, the event allowed enthusiastic supporters of the Library and members of the Friends to have fun and socialize, while also raising money for an important cause.

Status of Library Renovation



On February 26, Greg Lukmire, RR/MM Lukmire Architects, gave a presentation to the City Council on the current status of the Library Renovation, now planned as a replacement Library. The presentation centered around three main points:

Flood Plain effects: The big news is that the currently proposed construction footprint will NOT affect the current floodplain arrangements. The floor level will be set slightly above the level of the current Civic Center. Entrances will be a step above grade, and the main entrance will be on the parking lot side of the building.

Cost Estimate: A formal costing report on the "hard construction" developed. This does not include furniture, moving & temporary operation, or other general project costs. Existing Community Center power and HVAC systems will be adequate to support the new construction. It found that the overall hard construction cost with a 10% contingency pad added, would bring the total estimate to \$8,339,190. About \$500,000 of that is attributed to renovation of the Recreation Department offices and the nearby toilet rooms.

Design developments: The interior floor plan has stabilized. Entrances to the library would be from the parking lot side and via a straight corridor from the existing Community Center. It features a separated children's room on the parking lot side with a program room opening on the main entrance and the children's



room. The computer rooms are within the Library, and there is an added young adult space. The existing mosaic will be preserved, and there will be a small 'plaza' for gathering, between the Library and Philadelphia Avenue.

Exterior Treatments: Mr. Lukmire finished with a presentation of three exterior treatments. All featured a large curved window wall in the main room, and an emphasis on the flat roof. I found "Option 3" interesting, with a raised clerestory roof plan reaching across the building over the entrance and circulation desk.

As the Council deliberates on these options and further revised costs, there will be avenues for public comment.

Children's Programs at the Library Spring & Summer Programming

It's shaping up to be a busy spring in the Children's Room! From author programs to school visits, from Circle Time to Comics Jam, there's a lot going on this season.

As always, we have our two core weekly programs: Circle Time on Tuesdays at 10:30 a.m., which I lead, and Spanish Circle Time on Thursdays at 10:30 a.m., led by Senora Geiza. Both Spanish Circle Time and our Petites Chansons/ French Circle Time, led one Saturday a month by Madame Marie, are funded by the Friends of the Takoma Park Maryland Library. We are grateful for the Friends' support, which allows us to expand our reach to Spanish and French speakers (as well as those who are learning those languages!).

In addition, we offer our weekly Wednesday morning Early Literacy programs from 11-11:30 a.m. We alternate between Babytime one month (ages birth-18 months) and Toddler Time (18-36 months) the next month, then back to Babytime the following month, etc. Led by Ms. Kati, these registration-only programs are filled with rhymes, songs and stories, with a craft for the older children. Over the years, the Friends have funded multiple copies of books used in the program, giving us enough copies so that each participant can have their own book to follow along as Ms. Kati reads.

Our monthly programs also are popular with patrons. These programs include our LEGO Club, which usually takes place on the first Sunday of the month, Kids Art, usually on the third Sunday of the month, Comics Jam, which is offered on the second Tuesday of the month, and our Caldecott Club, scheduled for a Monday evening each month.

We also have regular visits from local preschools and the two elementary schools right next door. Ms. Kati does programs on Monday mornings for two local preschools, while Mr. Dave and I offer programs most Fridays for the 4th graders at Piney Branch Elementary; the programs are linked to their language arts curriculum. In addition, we do seasonal programs for the kindergarten, first and second grades at Takoma Park Elementary.



We'll wrap-up spring by kicking off our 2020





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FRIENDS BOOK CLUB

The Friends Book Group will discuss *The Winter Soldier* a novel about Vienna and the Eastern Front of World War I by Daniel Mason on Tuesday, March 31 at 7:30 in the Hydrangea Room of the Community Center.

Although broad in sweep, *The Winter Soldier* is unlike other war novels that describe epic battles. The story focuses on a young Polish medical student, Lucius Krzelewski posted from Vienna to an almost forgotten field hospital on the eastern flanks of the Carpathian Mountains. There Margarete, a gun-toting nun and the only remaining member of the hospital staff, greets him and introduces him to the rigors of battlefield medicine.

Mason drives the novel's narrative with intricate storytelling and powerful descriptions. Whether describing the sunlight on snowdrifts, the clash of cultures, or the amputation of a limb, his prose leads the reader to understand the trauma of war. As might be expected, the narrative also tells a love story between Lucius and Margarete that blooms amidst the horrors they face.

"The Winter Soldier," wrote Anthony Marra wrote in his *New York Times* review, "brims with improbable narrative pleasures. Mason is a practitioner of storytelling backhandedly praised as 'old-fashioned.' In fact, it's timeless."



Senior Outreach




