Coming Home – the Grace in Aging

In the middle of this road we call our life, I found myself in a dark wood With no clear path through. - Dante Alighieri

We lack a developed spirituality for the second-half of life. As we grow into our wisdom years, we often discover there is a dearth of spiritual guidance to help us navigate the diminishment, loss, grief and challenges of aging with grace and self-compassion. The hope is that this class will begin to prepare us to live wisely and well, learning to see "dying to self" as a grace so that in the words of Henri Nouwen, "they might be able to give both their life and death away" for the sake of the world.

This one-semester course will include a buffet of outside reading from across spiritual traditions including sacred scripture, the mystics and select spiritual writers, as well as some secular writings. It will consider different psycho-spiritual models of aging and spiritual growth. It will also include the opportunity for participants to address the challenges they find most prominent in their personal journeys by setting personal intention, engaging in guided introspection and contemplative practice, processing their discoveries through small group process, as well discovering ah-hah moments with monthly mini-projects including life mapping and creative process. Participants will also be encouraged to participate in regular spiritual direction if they are not already so engaged.

Engaging the Enneagram (A level 2 course)

In itself, the Enneagram of Personality is not a spiritual path. However, it is an exceptional tool and help for anyone on a spiritual path. IT IS A REQUIREMENT THAT EACH STUDENT HAVE A DAILY CONTEMPLATIVE PRACTICE so that the teachings can be incorporated as they are received. This class will focus primarily on each individual's experience as we explore the inner workings of this helpful tool. Included will be teaching on the various triadic groupings of the points, the "wings" for each number, the Levels of Development, the meaning of the direction of the arrows, and looking at what are most often called the "subtypes".

This one semester class is NOT FOR BEGINNERS! In order to engage this material a student MUST have a firm understanding of his/her basic enneagram type and be at least familiar with the terminology typically used with the enneagram. If you want to enroll in this class but were not in the fall semester class, please contact the class facilitator before doing so.

She was originally introduced to the Enneagram in 1995 and has studied with a number of enneagram master teachers, including Beatrice Chestnut, Cynthia Bourgeault, and Russ Hudson.

The Story of the Bible

The Bible has consistently been the world's best selling book. It has been printed an estimated 5 billion times, and translated into at least 2,043 different languages. "Compiled over centuries, the Bible is considered to be both a divinely inspired message and the work of human authors. Throughout its history, it has grown from a collection of stories and teachings shared through oral tradition to a founding text for three of the world's great religions. It has been copied and recopied into countless manuscripts, pronounced from the pulpit, studied in universities and synagogues, and read in private. Translated and distributed all over the world, it bears the mark of the many cultures that have debated its meaning and prized its wisdom."

"In **The Story of the Bible**, renowned scholar Luke Timothy Johnson [will] illuminate ...the remarkable and complicated process by which this great book came into being. Tracing the development of biblical texts across millennia, Professor Johnson takes you on a journey from the farthest reaches of ancient history through antiquity and the Middle Ages up to the present. You'll learn about the many forms the Bible has taken and the ways history, scholarship, and technology have helped shape this great tradition, as well as the Bible's powerful influence on human history and culture." "Throughout its history, the Bible has served as a powerful force, both reflecting and shaping the cultures that have read and embraced it. Over the centuries, perceptions of the Bible have inspired everyday men and women and shaped nations; they've sent nations to war and martyrs to their deaths."

This course is a DVD course from The Teaching Company. Professor Johnson is one of the best instructors in a large pool of excellent instructors. This course is about the Bible itself, not primarily about its contents. It is a one-semester course, and will require generally viewing two, 30-minute video lectures per session. Access to a course study guide will be provided; used copies of a transcript book can sometimes be found for purchase on line if desired. He has served as curate, vicar, rector and pastor of churches throughout Oklahoma and Kansas. After "retiring" in 1996, he and his family moved to San Marcos. He continues his ministry through Partners in Ministry, is an active member of St Mark's Episcopal Church and a regular facilitator with the School of Wisdom

Wading in the Edge of a Deep Sea of Theology

Come along with me as we dip our toes into some real, and really good, theology, very well written. We're going to sample the powerful thoughts of Catherine Keller in her book *On the Mystery: Discerning Divinity in Process*. Sample is the operative word here. This book is the basis of yearlong graduate theology courses, so we will only get a taste. But think what we would have missed without a taste of fine chocolate!

Keller is a process theologian. She defines process thusly: "Process in this book means becoming: it signifies the intuition that the universe itself is not most fundamentally a static being or the product of a static Being—but an immeasurable becoming."

"The truth-process does not eliminate uncertainty or its chaos. It makes it visible, in order to release a livelier, more redemptive, order. But such order, like the truth it supports, cannot be imposed: it must emerge."

Are we called to participate in the co-creation of a "new heaven and new Earth?" The thought Keller inspires prepares for that exciting work.

How this course will work:

It will all be on Zoom. For each class meeting you may select passages from the book that excite, perplex, or offend you. I will also send selected passages that we might discuss. Our purpose is not to finish the book or to say we have done a survey of process theology. We are wading around, picking up seashells. But what fun!

Maximum class size is 24 (so I can see you all on the same screen!)

In 9th grade, I (Brandon) became fascinated with fractal geometry and the mathematics of chaos theory. The latest theological work from Fr Richard Rohr and colleagues of The Living School at the Center for Action and Contemplation centers on one of the foundational tenets of chaos theory and the related fractal geometry - order, disorder, reorder. What a perfect reading and discussing topic as we continue to wonder/wander through Zoomscapes and look for Christ behind all those eyes.

Join us (Brandon and Jerry) Wednesday afternoons (1:30-3:00pm) on Zoom (register in order to receive link) to read and discuss articles written by the Living School teachers (Fr Richard Rohr, Cynthia Bourgeault, James Finley, Barbara Holmes, and Brian McLaren) alongside Fr Richard's reordered book: *The Wisdom Pattern: Order Disorder, Reorder,* in which Fr Richard updates a previous work for these times, providing wisdom around hope in chaos. Altogether, these modern mystics offer us a look at "how the great spiritualities and philosophies often taught [order, disorder, reorder] quite directly, but with different vocabularies, symbols, and metaphors." (Rohr).
