General Information

The Spring term begins March 3 and includes virtual courses and in-person courses.

Virtual courses will be offered mostly in March and April through Zoom. Please note that you will need a computer/laptop or a mobile device (tablet or iPad) and access to email to participate in virtual courses. A camera and a microphone are recommended if you plan on joining a course which is a discussion group.

In-person courses will be held in May and early June. In-person courses are dependent on gathering conditions at the time of the course schedule. Enrollment limit for in-person courses is subject to change depending on safety guidelines at the time of the courses. Cancelled in-person courses will not be rescheduled, but participants will be refunded \$10 per course should a cancellation be necessary.

Please note that the course fees are per person, NOT per household. Members of the same household will need to register separately and pay separately. Please send a check for each person. 

THE DIGITAL HARRISBURG PROJECT

The Digital Harrisburg project, in partnership with Messiah University, has compiled multiple data sets which include historical Census data, building footprints, and Sanborn maps. Geospatial processes were performed on each of these data sets and ultimately, an online interactive web map was constructed. The work done on Digital Harrisburg improved Census data, allowing a more accurate spatial analysis of the City of Harrisburg. As a result of the spatial analysis performed, trends of ethnicities and race movements across the city became apparent.

This course will look at the population across Harrisburg from 1900 to 1930, exposing individual resident details such as race, immigration status and employment, and the patterns and trends of this population through time.

As a member of the Pennsylvania State Forest Commission, Dock helped formulate policies that served as models for other, northeastern industrial states. She also worked tirelessly for women's rights to have meaningful careers, enroll in institutions of higher education, and vote.

She had numerous lovers including the Prince of Wales, later King Edward VII of the United Kingdom. An intelligent and talented woman, she was an author, playwright, interior decorator and famously known for chartering a hospital ship to care for those wounded in the Boer War. She married twice more, one husband being three years younger than her son Winston.

When Victor had difficulty establishing a steady labor force, he hired Puerto Ricans. The company provided English classes and cultural awareness training to help these people in transition to the States. He helped establish the first Spanish-American Mennonite congregation in the area. Victor was guided by his Christian faith and remained a humble man whose success didn't change him. He and Edith supported many churches and other causes that benefited his community and beyond.
