Following the very successful Fete in September, your Community Council have been actively engaged in improving different aspects of life for residents. #### **Traffic**

The concerns of Gileston residents about crossing the B4265 by the memorial have been raised at both County Council and Welsh Government levels and discussions continue regarding a solution. Further details to follow in due course. We have also been instrumental in the setting up of a new Community Speed Watch Group to raise awareness, and to act as a deterrent, of speeding through the Ward, so please support the volunteers in this important work. Your Community Council will continue to represent local interests on various committees to ensure that local views are properly communicated, which include reviewing and commenting on local planning applications to the County Council.

## Local Improvements

As you will see from the following articles, we have, in addition to normal maintenance works in the Ward, arranged for repair and restoration works to be undertaken at various locations, including the BT Exchange Building and Flemingston telephone box, to keep St Athan Ward looking good. Litter picks have been organised, but more local support is needed both in collecting the rubbish and changing mindsets to stop this type of

behaviour. A B-Lines project is also now underway to help deal with the loss of flowers and pollinators and to improve our local environment.

# Paul Lewis Community Centre Management Committee



This is very much a hands-on committee role. Unfortunately, centre activities were stopped for much of this year due to the enforced Covid 19 restrictions. Now that these restrictions have been removed its business as usual.

More recently, the centre has run a refreshment stall and tombola at the summer Fete, resulting in a decision to once again hold our very popular Halloween disco. There is lots more planned including helping the St Athan Fete become even better next year.

#### Natural Regeneration

The natural regeneration of wildflower and grass seed is one of the cheapest and easiest methods of enhancing the plants present in grassland. Restoring semi-natural habitats by natural regeneration from the seed

bank, the use of local green hay or colonization from plants in adjacent areas, is the most

effective and ecologically robust method for improving plant diversity at these sites for the long-term.

Importantly, these methods also help safeguard the distinctiveness of local flora. This is part of the magic of wildflowers; a Norfolk wildflower meadow, with green-winged orchids and pepper-saxifrage, will be different in character to a Carmarthenshire wildflower meadow with whorled caraway and lesser butterfly-orchids, which makes both of them special.

## Local Nature Partnership - Community Meadows Project

The council are working with the Vale of Glamorgan council Local Nature Partnership to stop the decay of the material, which in turn will allow few common species of wildflower to grow. The partnership is also running a grassland harvesting project including the purchased of a new brush seed harvester, to be used on species rich meadows across the Vale and suitable areas within St Athan. The plan is to have a sizable number of seed which community groups and community councils are welcome to use on their own sites. The benefit of this method is rather than buying seed which could come from abroad or a completely different type of meadow, it comes from great examples of meadows within the same county.

## **B-Lines Project**

B-Lines are an imaginative and beautiful solution to the problem of the loss of flowers and pollinators. Imagine trying to travel around Britain without our road and rail network, life would be impossible. Well for much of our wildlife this is the reality. The B-Lines are a series of 'insect pathways' running through our countryside. These routes are then being mapped by a wildlife organisation called Buglife. This will provide large areas of brandnew habitat benefiting bees and butterflies but also a host of other wildlife. The following images show potential areas within St Athan that could be considered for the B-Line Project.

#### Gileston Ward



Lane heading towards Aberthaw beach, Left to grow long, cut twice a year and check in the summer.



Small, wooded area within Gileston, possible bulb planting in borders and along edges

#### St Athan Ward



Junction between B4265 and Gileston Road, plan to change management of road verges. Left to grow long, cut twice a year. Area highlighted in blue, bank of a mix of cornflower and poppies to commemorate World War Monument.



The area in red shows small patch of mown grass with fencing and hedge surrounding. The plan is for the bramble coming through the fence to be cut back. The fence then covered with trellis and climbing plants and one or two small local heritage fruit trees planted.

## Flemington Ward



Area highlighted in red, small conifer removed and grass left to grow long.

Cut twice a year come back to check on species diversity in a year or so time.



Area highlighted in red left to grow, except small strip along the outside.

Cut twice a year and check back next summer to examine species richness.
