

From Fr. Q's Desk

Two weeks ago in Rome, our Holy Father officially made our Washington Archbishop, Wilton Gregory, a cardinal of the Church. It was a historic moment for a few reasons. First, Cardinal Gregory is the first African-American cardinal in our nation's history. (Of course, he is not the first black cardinal in the world; that distinction would go to Cardinal Laurean Ru-

gambwa of Tanzania, made a cardinal in 1960.) The cardinal's elevation comes at a poignant moment in our country, when questions of race and prej-

udice are being raised anew, and we can pray that his voice of prominence will help

us as we all struggle forward together with these questions.

This consistory was historic in a second way, too, being held as it was in the midst of our coronavirus pandemic. Two of the cardinals attended "virtually" from their home countries, since the virus made travel too risky and difficult. The rest of the new cardinals were attended only by the smallest entourages. Ten years ago, I was present in Rome when Archbishop Wuerl of Washington was made a cardinal; hundreds and hundreds of faithful had travelled from the U.S. to be present for the ceremonies. This year, Cardinal Gregory was at-

tended only by his priest secretary, and they had to quarantine in the Vatican for two weeks before the consistory.

At the consistory, the Holy Father assigned a church in Rome as the Cardinal's "titular" church. Every cardinal - regardless of his home city - is given a church in Rome as a symbolic reminder of his connection to that city and to the Holy Father. Cardinal Gregory received the

church of the Immaculate Conception in

Grottarossa, a small neighborhood just north of Rome. The church is located very close to the Milvian

Bridge, where the Emperor Constantine won a famous battle, thus paving the way for the legalization of Christianity and a new rapport between Church and state in the 4th century. In our own time, the Cardinal will face delicate and difficult questions about Church & state in the years ahead under President-elect Biden. Let us pray for Cardinal Gregory's wisdom to govern the Church in these tumultuous times!

We offer Cardinal Gregory our congratulations and our prayers!

St. Catherine The Angel Tree



Catechism of the Catholic Church

The Liturgy - Work Of The Holy Trinity

I. The Father-Source and Goal of the Liturgy

1077 "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in Christ with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places, even as he chose us in him before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and blameless before him. He destined us before him in love to be his sons through Jesus Christ, according to the purpose of his will, to the praise of his glorious grace which he freely bestowed on us in the Beloved."

1078 Blessing is a divine and life-giving action, the source of which is the Father; his blessing is both word and gift. When applied to man, the word "blessing" means adoration and surrender to his Creator in thanksgiving.

1079 From the beginning until the end of time the whole of God's work is a blessing. From the liturgical poem of the first creation to the canticles of the heavenly Jerusalem, the inspired authors proclaim the plan of salvation as one vast divine blessing.

1080 From the very beginning God blessed all living beings, especially man and woman. the covenant with Noah and with all living things renewed this blessing of fruitfulness despite man's sin which had brought a curse on the ground. But with Abraham, the divine blessing entered into human history which was moving toward death, to redirect it toward life, toward its source. By the faith of "the father of all believers," who embraced the blessing, the history of salvation is inaugurated.

SAINTS THIS WEEK

OUR LADY OF GUADA-L U P E is also known as the Virgin of Guadalupe, is a Catholic title of the Blessed Virgin Mary associated with a series of five Marian apparitions in December 1531, and a venerated image on a cloak enshrined within the



Basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe in Mexico City. The basilica is the most visited Catholic pilgrimage site in the world, and the world's third most-visited sacred site.



THE St. John OF **CROSS** was a Span-Catholic ish priest, mystic, also a Carmelite friar, of converso origin. He is figure major Counter-Reformation in Spain, and he is one of the thirty

-six Doctors of the Church. He is known especially for his writings. He was mentored by and corresponded with the older Carmelite, Teresa of Ávila. Both his poetry and his studies on the development of the soul are considered the summit of mystical Spanish literature and among the greatest works of all Spanish literature. He was canonized and declared Doctor of the Church by Pope Benedict XIII in 1726. He is regarded as the "Mystical Doctor" by the Church.
