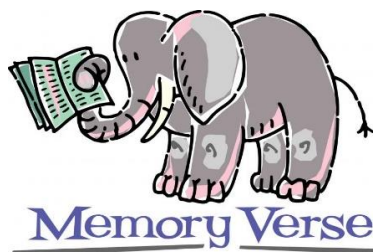

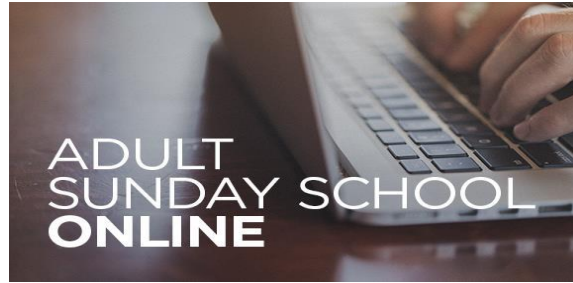

On-line Adult Sunday School: The Social Justice Bible Challenge

This fall, the Freeborn Garrettson Adult Sunday School is offering a class entitled *The Social Justice Bible Challenge* which is a collection of reflections by spiritual leaders and writers from around the world, edited by Marek P. Zabriskie. Each week we read and study a passage from Scripture and then come together on Sunday mornings at 11 AM to engage in challenging discussion that leads to action as we strive to carry out God's mandate to love and serve others.

These days we face many challenges as we live day to day and we can all benefit from daily engagement and exploration of the Word of God. *The Social Justice Bible Challenge* bridges the gap between knowing what the Bible says and actually living it.

We have already had two discussions based on readings from Genesis and Exodus. We were led to a not too trivial question: "What one small thing can you do to develop a food system that reflects the experience of Holy Communion...where all are fed in a manner which restores relationships between God and our neighbors?" Any ideas....?

We thought of all of the good people in our church who prepare and/or deliver food to those in our community who are in need. We thought of the good response that we get for various food drives throughout the year that address the hunger that many of our neighbors deal with every day. We are grateful to all who give and who share and who serve.

But as we thought about the problem of those who are malnourished and the subsequent health problems that ensue, we want to take another step forward as we address this problem. We wondered, are there ways to make the food that we give to others healthier? Are we carefully reading the labels on the foods that we purchase so that we might reduce the fat, the salt, the sugar, etc.? Is there a way that we might include more fresh fruit and vegetables in the food that we share?

We are seeking answers to these and many other questions and more as we try to answer the call to action. If you are willing to face the challenge to think more deeply about what you read in the Bible and how God is prodding us to act in response to His Word, we invite you to join the class: *The Social Justice Bible Challenge*, Sunday mornings at 11:00 via ZOOM. 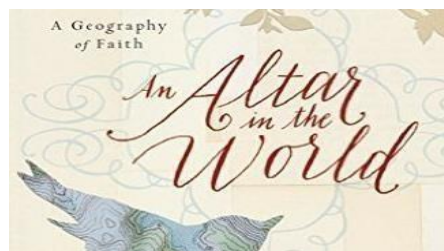

Sermon Series: An Altar in The World

Because of the coronavirus pandemic, until recently, many Christians have been unable to worship in their local church on Sunday morning. This threw a lot of us off kilter. The local church has been the place where we have communed with God. Still, what the stay-at-home order has forced us to do is to look for and worship God in other ways and places.

For some time now, the locus of the presence of God has been shifting. We experience God in the local church: in the liturgy, word, and sacraments, yes, but now, even more so, Christians are looking for God in the world. In her book *The Geography of Faith: An Altar in the World*, Barbara Brown Taylor reveals the meaningful ways we can discover the sacred from simple practices such as walking, working, allowing yourself to get lost, and saying "no". During the months of September and October, we will look to discover the many *altars in the world* where we can give thanks and worship God.
