Spirit and Truth Ascent to Truth (Part 1)



My dear parishioners, if the Eucharist could be compared to expedition mountain climbing, we could say that the Liturgy of the Word approximates setting up a base camp and supply camps in preparation of climbing to the summit. The Penitential Rite, Sacred Scripture, homily, Profession of Faith and the Intercessions all prepare the Body of Christ to make an ascent to God. Without these

necessary preparations our "spiritual expedition" to our Heavenly Father would not be possible in the Mass.

The mountain itself, of course, is a metaphor for God's Kingdom. Sacred Scripture refers often and eloquently to God's holy mountain. "And the glory of the Lord shall be revealed" on this mountain [Isa 40:5]; not in wind, earthquake or fire [cf. 1Kg 19:9-13] shall the Lord appear, but in the purity of his light and "steadfast love" which never ends. [Psa 89:1] "Beautiful in elevation...the joy of all the earth" [Psa 48:2], it is to be a "mountain of myrrh and the hill of frankincense." [SongSol 4:6] The mountain shall "drip sweet wine, its hills shall flow with milk." [Joel 3:18]

In the Mass, when the essential preparations have been made—Gifts, Preface and Sanctus—the great ascent begins. The spiritual ascent of God's holy mountain is perfectly expressed as the Eucharistic Prayer, the central act of worship in every celebration of the Mass. Jesus himself taught his apostles (and therefore the whole Church) what to do in remembrance of him.

At the "Last Supper" celebrated by Our Lord and his apostles, Jesus desired that the Jewish Passover celebration yield to the new and extraordinary revelation of his own passion, death and resurrection. Our humble, prayerful approach to God in the Mass opens our spiritual eyes to behold the infinite horizon of God's kingdom, the farthest reaches of his divine love. ... (continued on page 7)



Getting Through the Holidays

Having lost a loved one, the holidays will never be the same. That's a fact!--- but there are ways to cope that will help. Some family rituals may hold too much pain to complete during



the first several years after a loss. This is the time to consider trying something new. Several individuals I have worked with felt that it was too much of a chore to decorate for the holidays. Several years on now, they are, indeed, decorating and carrying on in memory of their loved one.

We all get trapped in what we are "supposed" to do or "ought to do". Don't feel obligated to decorate, bake, entertain, send cards, etc. unless you find joy in doing any of these. Don't overextend yourself during the holidays. Be cautious about what you agree to take on as you may become overwhelmed and unable to complete commitments. Take it easy. Your family and loved ones will understand.

The first Christmas after my husband died, the kids took over and it was good to be somewhere else but home over that holiday. He was there with us, however, as the children talked to their children about their "Paw Paw's" love of Christmas and his great culinary skills. In the past 15 years, we have established new rituals. I started putting up a Christmas tree again after the second anniversary of his death as I remembered how he loved that ritual and it was fun to see the grandchildren's delight. Sometimes old holiday rituals are comforting after a death and sometimes they are not. Continue them only if they feel good to you. May your holidays be filled with love, laughter, and fond memories.


Flowers for the Altar

Ascent to Truth (Part 1) (Continued from pg 1)



... At the celebration of Jesus' Last Supper, the hour arrived for his apostles to receive a new *sacrament* instituted in his name. No longer would the thrust of worship center on Moses, the escape of a tribal people from Egypt and the blood of lambs and goats. Henceforth, the new and universal Church would "worship the Father in spirit and truth" [Jn 4:23] celebrating the *Mysterium Fidei* (Mystery of Faith) on the Lord's own mountain, the sign of the kingdom's fulfillment: "Save us, Savior of the world, for by your Cross and Resurrection you have set us free"!

St. Paul the Apostle understood clearly why Jesus instituted the "First Eucharist" at the Passover celebration on the night before his passion and death. Writing to the Corinthian Church, the apostle recalled our Lord's own words of institution to stirringly defend the "spirit and truth" of the Eucharist in the face of liturgical abuse and sacrilege.

St. Paul vigorously defended the saving reality of the eucharistic celebration in Jesus's name. The Eucharistic prayer affirms to the gathered Church that what God promises, God will always do—the gifts of bread and wine are transformed into the Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity of our Lord Jesus Christ, our great high priest! (Next week, Part 2 of "Ascent to Truth".)

Receiving Holy Communion


When you receive Communion during the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, it is the Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity of Christ that you are receiving. Holy Communion, in the Catholic Church, is reserved for those who have received the sacrament of First Holy Communion, have been catechized (taught) in our Catholic faith and have made a profession of faith. One should abstain from Holy Communion if they are in mortal sin and have not received the sacrament of reconciliation. If you are not Roman Catholic or are in need of the Sacrament of Reconciliation, we ask that you refrain from receiving Holy Communion in the Mass. However, you may go up to one of the ministers for a blessing when Holy Communion is being offered. By crossing your hands over your heart, the Priest or Eucharistic minister will know to give you the blessing.



Also, if you choose to receive only the Blessed Sacrament and not from the Chalice, it is fitting nevertheless to pause for a moment to honor Christ's presence in the Precious Blood—with an appropriate sign of devotion. We would not think to pass a friend on the street without some acknowledgement. Our Lord Jesus Christ deserves no less, and most assuredly, a great deal more.

SACRAMENT OF MATRIMONY

If you have been participating actively at least six months after registration in the parish, you may ask for an appointment with the pastor to begin marriage preparation. Marriage preparation requires six months.

SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM

If you have been participating actively at least six months after registration in the parish, you may call the parish office to begin baptismal preparation. Children age 6 or younger; documents are required before baptism date may be scheduled: parish & baptismal registrations, birth certificate, and baptism class certifications.

FUNERAL SERVICES

To ensure that parish ministers can assist you, please call the parish office **before** setting dates and times for funeral services. Regarding personal spoken remembrances at funeral liturgies, St. Philip parish adheres to the policies of the Archdiocese of Galveston-Houston.
