

State Chart Regarding Tolling of Statutes of Limitations During COVID-19 Pandemic

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The following chart is intended to be a helpful guide to how each State has addressed, or not addressed, the tolling of statutes of limitations during the coronavirus pandemic. The chart does not address other U.S. territories and jurisdictions and is updated through March 27, 2020. The Orders referenced herein should be checked for any updates or changes subsequent to the making of this chart.

Hawaii	On March 20, 2020, the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of Hawaii issued an order stating "that all deadlines, time schedules, and filing requirements imposed by statutes, rules, or court orders, in all civil, criminal, and administrative matters in the circuit, district and family courts in the State of Hawai'i that expire between March 23, 2020 through and including April 3, 2020, are extended to April 6, 2020." Kansas	On March 18, 2020, the Kansas Supreme Court released Administrative Order 2020-PR-016, which states in relevant part that "[e]ffective upon publication of 2020 House Substitute for Senate Bill No. 102, all statutes of limitations and statutory time



	standards or deadlines applying to the conduct or processing of judicial proceedings is suspended until further order."

The order appears to extend statutes of limitations by stating that "all deadlines applicable to the commencement of all civil and probate case types [and] any date that falls during the state of emergency declared by the Governor related to COVID-19 is not included for purposes of" computation of time prescribed by Michigan rules of civil procedure, court order, or statute.

New York	On March 20, 2020, the Governor of New York issued an executive order which provides in part that "any specific time limit for the commencement, filing, or service of any legal action, notice, motion, or other process or proceeding, as prescribed by the procedural laws of the state, including but not limited to the criminal procedure law, the family court act, the civil practice law and rules, the court of claims act, the surrogate's court procedure act, and the uniform court acts, or by any other statute, local law, ordinance, order, rule, or regulation, or part thereof, is hereby tolled from the date of this executive order until April 19, 2020." https://www.nycourts.gov/whatsnew/pdf/EO-202.8-ocr.pdf

Ohio	On March 27, 2020, the Governor of Ohio signed House Bill 197, which applied retroactively to March 9, 2020, tolling the statute of limitations from that date to July 30, 2020 or the date the period of emergency ends, whichever is sooner. https://www.legislature.ohio.gov/download?key=13600&format=pdf
Oklahoma	On March 16, 2020, the Oklahoma Supreme Court entered SCAD No. 2020-24, First Emergency Join Order Regarding the COVID-19 State of Disaster, which states in relevant part, that "[i]n any civil case, the statute of limitations shall be extended for 30 days from the date of this order." https://www.oscn.net/images/news/SCAD-2020-24.pdf

Pennsylvania	Pennsylvania courts have not issued an order(s) which expressly toll or extend statute of limitation periods. The Pennsylvania Supreme Court issued an order, however, stating, in part, that "all time calculations for purposes of time computation relevant to court cases or other judicial business, as well as time deadlines, are SUSPENDED through April 3. 2020, subject to additional orders of this Court In all events, any legal papers or pleadings which are required to be filed between March 19, 2020 and April 3, 2020, SHALL BE DEEMED to have been timely filed if they are filed by April 6, 2020, or on a later date as permitted by the appellate or local court in question upon consideration of the potential volume of such filings." Texas	On March 13, 2020, the Supreme Court of Texas issued its "First Emergency Order Regarding The COVID-19 State Of Disaster," which provides in part that "[a]ll courts in Texas may extend the statute of limitations in any civil case for a stated period ending no later than 30 days after the Governor's state of disaster has been lifted." https://www.txcourts.gov/media/1446056/209042.pdf
Utah	On March 21, 2020, the Utah Supreme Court Utah Judicial Council issued an administrative order addressing the COVID-19 pandemic which states, in part that "[t]his Order does not extend filing deadlines. Deadlines, statutes of limitations, and statutes of repose that are not set to expire between March 23, 2020, and April 10, 2020, are not
