If you love to dance or want to learn, please join us in the fellowship hall on Friday nights from 7 - 9 starting December 11th.



THE CHRISTMAS FUND

The Christmas Fund offering will take place on December 20th during the church service. The proceeds from The Christmas Fund for the Veterans of the Cross and the Emergency Fund are used to provide gifts to clergy and lay employees in all stages of their lives and ministries to and through the UCC. The availability of these funds is critical to the ability of the Board for Ministerial Assistance to help ensure a sustainable quality of life for those who ultimately receive the gifts.

During 2009 the Pension Boards have received an average of 3 to 4 new requests for assistance, each week! Response to those requests is possible because of dollars given to the Christmas Fund. The gifts go directly to those who serve or have served the church, in their moments of critical need. Currently, nearly 1,500 families have received either a one-time grant or are receiving continued assistance through your gifts to the Christmas Fund Offering.

A 1953 publication stated that: "In 1902, a little money was collected and special Christmas gifts were sent to ten older ministers." The same article also reported that \$121,054 was received for the Christmas Fund in 1952.

A little more than 50 years later, in 2008 the Christmas Fund received \$1,600,000, a record, and almost 1,500 families were assisted. Our goal is to be able to provide at least \$1,650,000 in assistance from the 2009 appeal.

Your generous contributions on December 20th for *The Christmas Fund for the Veterans of the Cross and the Emergency Fund* can and do make a difference in the lives of many.

Did you Know?

THE ADVENT WREATH:

Advent (from the Latin word *adventus*, meaning "coming towards") is the four week season of preparation for Christmas. The First Sunday of Advent marks the beginning of the church calendar year. Advent and Christmas both focus on the past - the coming of Jesus as an infant born into poverty in Bethlehem, and the future- the coming of Christ in glory to fulfill God's loving purpose for humanity.

From ancient times, one way to celebrate Advent in the church and in the home is by lighting candles on the Advent Wreath. The wreath was widely used in Northern Europe long before Christianity as a symbol of life and hope. Made of evergreens, it symbolized the circle of the year that would turn from winter to spring, from shadows to light. During the Middle Ages, Christians adopted this symbol and reinterpreted its meaning. The lighted candles symbolized the light of Christ shining to dispel the darkness of sin, and the evergreens represented the new life that Christ brings to the world.

The candle colors are derived from the traditional liturgical colors of Advent and Christmas. Three purple, one rose, and the center is white- the Christ candle. The purple candles originally symbolized the prayer, penance, and preparatory sacrifices and goods works undertaken at this time. The rose color likely is derived from an old Catholic custom of wearing rose colored vestments on the third Sunday in Advent. Each candle is first lit on the appropriate Sunday of Advent, and then the candles may be lit each day as a part of the individual or family's daily prayers. Stewardship Report and Annual Budget

The Stewardship Committee is pleased to report that as of the November 17th, 64 pledges have been received totaling \$116,149.00 for 2010. This is up \$15,000 from this time last year. Of these, 78% have increased their pledge with an average increase of 15%. There are still some folks out there who pledged last year and, if they give at the same rate, we can expect a pledge income of 133,000. This is wonderful news in these difficult economic times. We are extremely thankful for the generosity of our congregation. We depend heavily on these pledges as they make up roughly 80% of our income budget.

The budget, as seen below is the council's best estimate on what we need for income in order to meet our expenses. The expenses are determined by each committee's prayerful consideration of what they need to accomplish their goals so that we, as a body of Christ, may continue our mission. Expenses, as usual, continue to rise for example: The cost of insurance alone is up 15% and the search process has costs attached to it as well.

We need an additional \$15,000 in income to balance our budget and are asking YOU, the congregation, for help. The council is asking each of you to think and pray about who we are as a church, how we hope to serve God in this community, this country, and this world, and what you can do to help. There is such push back from the secular world around us; so many other demands on our time and money. However, with everyone pulling together, we can do great things.
