- The Sustainable Development Goals are a call for action by all countries – poor, rich and middle-income – to promote prosperity while protecting the planet.
- They recognize that ending poverty must go hand-in-hand with strategies that build economic growth and address a range of social needs including education, health, social protection, and job opportunities, while tackling climate change and environmental protection.

 Working directly with our communities and nations directs our impact within the wider context of society, and amplifies the work we do


Teaching

Teaching the next generation to adopt sustainability in their lives






How have we gone from an SDG to a metric in 2019?

- 6. Expand Opportunities for Global Learning through SDG Involvement.




1. Collecting Data: Mapping SDG Work Across Campus


- Faculty Survey on Research, Teaching and Service-related work on SDGs.
 - Do you conduct research/teaching/service related to SDGs?
 - Which SDGs? Which countries?
 - Opportunity to provide summary of work in each area
 - More than 200 responses so far.
 - USA most commonly reported country of focus for SDG work.
 - Majority of respondents interested in increasing UC Davis engagement with the SDG agenda.

2. Participate in Networks/Initiatives that Promote SDGs

2017: Hosted UN Sustainable Development Goals Conference: Research to Action on the African Continent

2018: Hosted International Research Conference: Innovation within Changing Political and Research Environments - featured a number of speakers and discussions on SDGs

Signed Declaration on University Global Engagement

2019: Joined UN Academic Impact
Joined Sustainable Solutions Development Network (SDSN) USA



3. Support SDG Research and Policy

- June 2019: Center for Regional Change, John Muir Institute for the Environment and Global Affairs, UCD hosted faculty across disciplines workshop
 - Interdisciplinary research Food-Energy-Water and Land Use (FEW-LU) Nexus
 - Leverage proximity to the state capital. Link research to policy impact possible indicator systems; white papers
 - Integrate SDGs in undergraduate, graduate and professional schools
 - Mutually beneficial and respectful partnerships between the university and diverse communities
- Participation in international university networks (APLU, APRU, Universitas 21 (U21) and university partnerships.



Faculty Are Working Across Multiple SDGs

"On arid and semi-arid range lands worldwide, livestock share the landscape with native plant and animal biodiversity. Much of this land suffers degradation and desertification. We are seeking more innovative ways to manage, conserve, and restore these landscapes."

"I work on preventing malnutrition in low-income populations, particularly among women and young children. This has implications for the SDGs related to poverty, food security, equity, and health."

"My research seeks to reduce gender inequality and reduce environmental injustice in local, national, and global communities...also qualitatively assesses health outcomes related to social and environmental stressors in these communities."























4. Articulate University Commitment to Achieving SDGs

UC Davis Strategic Plan (*To Boldly Go*, released in 2018) provides strong foundation in support of SDG engagement.

Five Campus Goals:

- 1. Provide an educational experience that prepares all of our students to address the needs and challenges of a diverse and changing world;
- 2. Enable and support research that matters at the frontiers of knowledge, across and between the disciplines, in support of a healthy planet and the physical and societal well-being of its inhabitants;
- 3. Embrace diversity, practice inclusive excellence and strive for equity;



University Commitment (cont.)

- 4. Support our **community**, **region**, **state**, **nation** and **world** through mutual **beneficial** and **impactful partnerships** that reflect a firm commitment to our mission and increase the visibility and reputation of the university;
- 5. Create an intellectual and physical environment that supports the development of an **innovative and entrepreneurial culture** that extends the benefits of our research activities beyond the boundaries of the university.
- ➤ Campus Global Strategic Plan (in development) will draw from each of these goals to support global engagement across schools and colleges. SDGs prominent in the committee discussions.



5. Raise Awareness Among UC Davis Community

- Key message: SDGs are not just international —
 Critical at local, regional, state and national levels in the U.S.
 Create an inclusive frame to support involvement of all disciplines and locations of work.
- Inaugural Campus Global Theme: Food for Thought: Feeding Ourselves, Feeding the Planet.
- Webpage (in development) to share SDG work with external audiences and facilitate linkages for research, teaching and service on specific SDGs, countries and regions.



6. Expand Opportunities for Global Learning: *Global Education for All*

- 2018: 14 UC Davis students selected as UN Millennium Fellows leadership development program that convenes, challenges, and celebrates student leadership for UN goals, including SDGs.
- 2019 (Fall): Global Living and Learning Community will incorporate SDGs into course work and activities.
- 2019 (Fall): Global Learning Hub experiential opportunities at local, state, regional, national, international levels for students.
- Looking at MOOCs, and other potential opportunities for virtual learning.







New York Stands with Puerto Rico

From press release, March 9, 2018:

"Governor Andrew M. Cuomo today announced a new multi-pronged initiative to help Puerto Rico...In June, once the roadmap is complete, New York will mobilize teams of SUNY and CUNY students, and skilled workers from the construction and building trades, to work side-by-side with non-profit organizations already on the ground. To lay the groundwork for hundreds of student volunteers, a SUNY Maritime team will deploy in late May to connect with non-profits and transport supplies."

"I learn more from being abroad and studying in the field than I do from writing papers and sitting in class, human connection, compassion and kindness is more important than material possessions, The people of Puerto Rico appreciate all the help that they receive."

"No job or effort is too big or small, I want volunteerism to be a major part of my life forever and you don't have to like someone in order to work with them."

"The trip restored some of my faith in humanity, that people are good despite our differences."

"I am a more worldly person, I have a better understanding of my privileges as a citizen who occupies land in continental U.S., and have grown to love and care deeply for those unlike myself."

"I am much stronger than I think, physically and mentally."

"Community is the most powerful force of human nature, and it's the number one thing that pulls us out of disaster. Family can mean so many things, and that you never know when you'll meet the most influential people of your life. And lastly, that sometimes when you take a chance on an experience, amazing things can happen."

"This work is what I want to do for the rest of my life."




- Create a community of faculty who are committed to integrating interdisciplinary approaches to sustainability into the UVM curriculum




