We have received quotes from McFarlane Aviation and AirCorps Aviation on the much needed landing gear actuator arms and cranks. Your Board of Directors and Swift Parts committee are working diligently to create a plan to make these parts available to the membership. It appears that if we can get enough orders, these PMA parts can be had at a very reasonable cost. These are commonly damaged in accidents but are also victim to corrosion causing even new seals to leak in a short time. Anyone with a Swift may want to get a set for later use in the event of unforeseen problems. We will be announcing the plan to order these parts in the next newsletter.

We have the gaskets ordered for the S-152 power pack rebuild kits. We have been out of these gaskets for a while but expect to have them soon in order to complete the kit. McFarlane has informed us that we should have the gaskets within a month. Many thanks to Steve Wilson and Ken Coughlin for their efforts with Dave McFarlane at McFarlane Aviation for getting this done. Great job everyone.

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

This print of the first wing concept of the GC-I was found. This wooden outer wing panel is not a model of the original Swift wing, it's the real thing. Dated 10/03/41, this drawing gives insight into just how much thought John Kennedy and his crew of engineers and technicians must have put into developing and bringing into fruition the magnificent flying machine we all enjoy so much today!



In Memory of our friend David Turner

In true Swift fashion a flight of four paid tribute to our dear departed Swifter, Dave Turner of Massachusetts. Dave, a long time Swifter, was suffering with a very rare incurable form of lung cancer. After undergoing the normal cancer regime he told me the cure was worse than the cancer and the worst of all it wasn't working. Despite the intense pain, Dave was almost always his jovial self never wanting anyone to know of his illness. Sandy and I visited with him last August and I took him up in my Swift and let him fly for what was to be his last flight but it was fellow long time Swifter Bud Wrightington who would regularly visit and fly him to help keep his spirits up.

Dave loved to fly. He got his instrument rating in his Swift and was very active in the formation program. He was a Wingman and was working towards his lead card when he became ill. He and Buddy would fly formations together often and I was proud to be part of that Yankee flight team when I was based up there in Plymouth and again when he and Buddy would come down to Athens for Swift Nationals and we would put the team together again. I can still picture his face always smiling with that little Irish grin.

Several weeks had passed after Dave lost his battle with cancer when I was contacted by Buddy and an energetic new Swifter, Sacha Botbol. I was honored to be asked to join them in a memorial missing man formation at a luncheon in Dave's honor. Dave's companion Sandy Love and his two daughters Tammy and Debbie asked that we do a fly by for them and of course we jumped at the chance. A call to another local New England Swifter, David DeVries and we now had four Swifts as I was going to fly Dave's airplane. Unfortunately, Dave's airplane would not be in annual in time so we turned to a friend of ours with a Piper Comanche. With the wheels in the well and at six hundred feet it was as close a match as we could get on short notice. I jumped in with David DeVries to lead the formation and though we had never formally met it was as though we were old friends just getting back together again. We were able to get together early enough to put up a practice flight so as to not embarrass ourselves and after a great luncheon gathering at a restaurant/pub on a narrow and short airfield, IB6 Hopedale Industrial Airpark, everyone stepped outside to watch as we loaded up and did our flyby, missing man with Taps being played, rejoin, and break to landing.
