II. DESCRIPTION

The course will study issues of global society and its components, from the economic, political and sociological perspectives. The course will also address discussion and analysis of concepts and arguments for or against the globalization movement. The discussion will provide the student with a better understanding of the challenges and problems of the contemporary world.

III. OBJETIVES

- 1. To identify the fundamental sociological, political and economic theories involved in the study of society.
- 2. To explain social life in relation to the role played by the political systems, based on their economic and cultural arrangements.
- 3. To understand and explain the basic political ideologies and organizations as per their complexities and sociopolitical arrangements.
- 4. To understand, explain and analyze different forms of economic organization and their impact in the social order.
- 5. To understand, explain and analyze the basic characteristics of a global system, from a comparative perspective.
- 6. To define Global Society.
- 7. To analyze specific problems and challenges of today's Global Society.

IV. COURSE CONTENT

A. Basic Concepts

- 1. Social Life people, culture; citizenship, nationality, language, political activity, social life.
- 2. Global Society political systems, global communication, economic interdependence and political, industrial and post-industrial.
- 3. Institutions political parties, civil organizations, universities, church, family, courts, corporations.
- 4. Social organization modes of production and procurement of food, social stratification and minorities, technology; failed political and economic systems.
- 5. Social change causes natural or managed

B. Perspectives on Social Analysis

1. Fundamental ideas of social analysis - sociological, political, and economic.

C. Vision of the Global Society

1. Sociological perspective

- a. Fundamental questions: What is society? How and why is made? What are its basic institutions?
- b. Basics concepts: society, groups, system, culture, subculture, social change, religion, language.

2. Political Perspective

- a. Fundamental questions: What is government? How does it work? Who constitute the government?
- b. Basics concepts: government, state, nation, power, authority, ideology, representative government.

3. Economic perspective:

- a. Fundamental Questions: What is economics? What needs to be produce and in what quantities? What kind of economic systems success or fail?
- b. Basics concepts: means of production, distribution, capital, international markets, economic organizations, international trade, market failures, equality, efficiency, and privatization.

D. Challenges and Problems of Global Society: Case Studies Examples

- 1. Environment: management and conservation of natural resources, sustainable economic development, pollution, public policy.
- 2. Urban development: concentration, planning, population flow, growth vertical / horizontal.
- 3. Population: migration, population aging, population growth, population policy.
- 4. Social Justice: inequalities, the poor, discrimination based on age, gender, ethnicity, disability and / or mental, economic and political instability.
- 5. Science, Technology and Society: internet, human resources, capital resources, tools.
- 6. Colonialism and nations: nation-state, identity, ethnic conflict, economic dependence and political.
- 7. Fundamental human rights universal declaration.
