

# EALL371: Representations of Samurai in Pre-Modern Japanese Literature

# Spring 2021: Tuesday/Thursday 12:00 – 1:15 PM Synchronous and Asynchronous Online

#### **Description:**

The course explores the literary and philosophical traditions of the samurai warrior in Japanese history and the ongoing meaning of those traditions in contemporary Japanese culture. Coursework consists of analysis and discussion of literature on warriors and swordsmanship, as well as visual media such as feature-length films. The course is divided into five units: 1) *The Tale of Heike*; 2) *the Mongol Invasion*; 3) *The Taiheki*; 4) Sengoku warriors; 5) Samurai under the Tokugawa Regime including the *47 Ronins*.

#### **Student Learning Outcomes (SLO):**

Upon completion of the course, a student should be able to explain and analyze the following: 1. to identify and describe major authors, works, features, forms and styles of premodern Japanese literature; 2. to analyze and interpret translated works of premodern Japanese poetry, prose, drama and critical writings and discuss the development of major themes and styles among them; 3. to situate and evaluate premodern Japanese



literature in its social, historical, intellectual and religious contexts as well as vis-à-vis "world literature" of the past and present.

#### Textbook:

There is no textbook. All of the reading materials for the course will be made available by the instructor online. All of the reading materials in PDF format will be located in Laulima under the Resources module. Please check the assignments in the schedule and assignments section below.

#### Two Response Papers (1 Page) 20 points (10 points x 2):

Please write and post your one-page response (approximately 400 words) on the Discussion module on Laulima, answering the questions below. This response should be based on the Zoom discussion and the related reading materials. Try to comment on your classmate's responses for extra credit.

#### Final Research Paper (3 - 5 pages) 20 points:

Choose a samurai character — historical or fictional, appeared in one of the literatures covered in class. Examine and analyze that character based on your research asking questions addressed in the Discussion excises. Contextualize the image of that specific samurai through considering the historical, cultural, spiritual, and socio-political factors. At least 3 bibliographies to be consulted. It can be a monograph, anthology, academic journal, newspaper, exhibition catalogue, etc. Do NOT use internet materials such as Wikipedia as your source since it often conveys erroneous information. Do NOT use the survey textbook either for the same reason. 3-5 pages text, double spaced, 12-font, Times New Roman, bibliography on a separate page.

#### Exams 60 points (30 points x 2):

Combination of multiple-choice quizzes and short answer questions. Open book, online.
