BRONCO GAME NOTES

THE SERIES
 Despite being just 380 miles apart, Saturday's meeting is just the 12th all-time between Boise State and BYU. This week's game is also the 10th of a 12-year series that began in 2012 and will end in 2023. The schools announced a series extension last season - after a one-year hiatus in 2024, the rivalry will resume in Boise in 2025 for the first of a 10-year scheduling home-and-home agreement.

The Broncos are 7-4 against the Cougars all-time, including a 2-3 mark on the road. The Broncos' last road victory came Oct. 6, 2017 (24-7).

WHIMPEY UP FOR THE ACADEMIC HEISMAN
 Fifth-year linebacker Riley Whimpey was named a semifinalist for the 2021 William V. Campbell Trophy, Sept. 29. The award recognizes the nation's top scholar-athlete, focusing on academic success, football performance and exemplary leadership. Whimpey joins fifth-year nickel Kekaula Kaniho and former Boise State center Mason Hampton as semifinalists for the award in recent years. Kaniho was named a finalist in 2020, earning an \$18,000 postgraduate scholarship, while Hampton earned the same honor in 2017.

VS RANKED OPPONENTS
 Boise State is 15-21 all-time against ranked opponents, but has lost each of its last four games against teams in the top 25. Against top-10 opponents, Boise State is 5-3 all-time. The Broncos dropped last year's meeting with BYU, ranked No. 9 in each poll, which ended a streak of four-straight wins over top-10 teams.

Boise State will be looking for its first victory over a top-10 opponent as an unranked team since knocking off No. 8 Fresno State on the road in 2001 (35-30).

TWO WOULD BE A STREAK AROUND HERE
 Boise State has not dropped consecutive games throughout the course of a single season since falling in the final two contests of 2016 - the regular-season finale against Air Force (27-20; Nov. 25) and against Baylor in the Cactus Bowl (31-12; Dec. 27).

IN THE POLLS

CONSECUTIVE YEARS IN THE RANKINGS

Boise State carries a streak of 19-straight seasons in the national rankings into 2021, tied with USC for the seventh-longest active streak in the country entering the season.

Boise State has been ranked for at least one week in either the AP or the Coaches Poll every season from 2002-20.

PRESEASON RANKINGS

Boise State enters its 2020 season receiving votes, but unranked in both the AP and Coaches Poll.

Over the course of the last 19 seasons, the Broncos opened a season unranked on 10 occasions, but finished the year ranked eight times - 2002, 2003, 2004, 2006, 2008, 2014, 2017 and 2019. In two of those seasons, 2006 and 2014, the Broncos capped the year with a victory in the Fiesta Bowl.

SUCCESS WHEN RANKED

Boise State has an all-time record of 119-22 (.844) when ranked in the top 25 of the AP Poll, the Coaches Poll or the College Football Playoff Poll. A complete history of the Broncos in the rankings can be found on pages 30-31.

THE FAVORITE SON RETURNS

Boise State is in its first season with Andy Avalos at the helm of the program. As a Bronco student-athlete, Avalos was a four-year letterwinner, served as team captain, earned a pair of first-team all-conference accolades at linebacker and was a member of the All-Blue Team - a selection of the 30 greatest players in school history, as voted on by the Bronco fanbase, in the 30th anniversary season of the world-famous turf. Avalos initially returned to The Blue in a coaching capacity in 2012 as defensive line coach, took over as linebackers coach in 2014 and was then promoted to defensive coordinator in 2016. After three seasons leading the Bronco defense, Avalos left for Oregon, where the Ducks captured a Rose Bowl victory in his first season and earned a spot in the Fiesta Bowl in his second.

PLAYING SMART

The Broncos have been penalized just 24 times through five games, tied for the 19th-fewest in the country. The 4.8 penalties per game ranks tied for 15th nationally.

FIRST-TIME STARTERS

Boise State has had nine players make their first starts as Broncos this season, including six against UCF during the opening week of the 2021 season. Included against the Knights were three student-athletes that transferred to Boise State - left guard Will Farrar (Texas Tech) and running back Cyrus Habibi-Likio (Oregon) transferred this past offseason, and nose tackle Jackson Cravens (Utah) transferred to Boise State prior to the 2019 season. Four of the first-time starters were on offense - Farrar, Habibi-Likio, right tackle Ben Dooley and wide receiver Stefan Cobbs. Cravens and cornerback Tyric LeBeauf also made their first-career starts for the Broncos on defense.

True freshman Rodney Robinson made his first-career start against UTEP (Sept. 10), getting the call in place of Kekaula Kaniho, who missed the first half against the Miners following a targeting call in the second half of the UCF game. Wide receiver Davis Koetter, a transfer from Portland State, then made his first-career start for the Broncos against Oklahoma State (Sept. 18), and transfer cornerback Caleb Biggers made his first-career start for the Broncos against Utah State, Sept. 25.

CONFERENCE OPENERS

With last week's victory over Utah State, Boise State has now won 22-consecutive conference openers since a loss in 1999, when the Broncos fell 17-10 to North Texas (Oct. 16) as a member of the Big West. The Broncos are 39-13 all-time in conference openers.

PRESEASON AWARDS

Boise State boasted 15 preseason all-conference honorees in both Athlon and Phil Steele, tied for the most in the Mountain West in each publication. The Broncos' four Preseason All-Mountain West selections in a poll of the league's media were also tied for the most in the conference. Senior wide receiver Khalil Shakir is one of only 11 players in the Mountain West to appear on the preseason first-team all-conference lists for Athlon, Pro Football Focus, Phil Steele and the Mountain West.

CHAMPIONSHIP GAMES

Boise State will be looking to make its fifth-consecutive appearance in the Mountain West Championship Game in 2021, and its sixth such appearance in the nine-year history of the game. The MW moved to its current format in the 2013 season. The Broncos' five appearance thus far are the most in the league, and its four-consecutive appearances from 2017-20 is also a conference record. The Broncos' current active streak of four-straight championship game appearances is tied with Ohio State for the third-longest in the country. Only Clemson (six; ACC) and Oklahoma (five; Big 12) have a longer current streak of conference championship game appearances.

MOST MW CHAMPIONSHIPS

Boise State will be looking for its fifth MW Championship in 2021, which would be the most in the history of the league - despite the Broncos being a member for just 11 of the conference's 23 seasons. The Broncos' four championships are the most by a current member of the league, and tied with BYU, Utah and TCU for the most in conference history.



Mountain West student-athletes who already hold a degree will have a little something extra on their jerseys this season. In conjunction with a program that started in 2019, student-athletes who have earned a degree, but have remaining eligibility will see the MW logo on their jersey replaced with one that incorporates both the MW mark and the word “GRADUATE.”

CONSECUTIVE CLASSES WITH A CHAMPIONSHIP

The Broncos' 2021 senior class is already the 23rd-straight group that will leave Boise State with at least one conference title. Of the 22 previous senior classes, 19 left with multiple championships, including 11 with three-or-more. This year's seniors already boast a title in 2019.

The last senior class without a league championship was the 1998 group.

The streak of 23-straight classes is the longest active streak in the country, and the third-longest in NCAA history. BYU (30; 1975-2004) and Nebraska (28; 1975-2002) boast the longest streaks in NCAA history.

UNDEFEATED IN MW PLAY (AGAIN)

Boise State concluded the 2020 regular season with a perfect 5-0 record in Mountain West games, the second-straight undefeated season in conference play. The Broncos are the first school in the league to post back-to-back undefeated seasons since TCU did it three-consecutive years from 2009-11.

Last season also marked Boise State's 13th unbeaten conference season in program history.

BEST UNIFORMS

In a tournament-style Twitter poll conducted by the Mountain West, the Boise State football team earned the title of best uniforms in the league. The Broncos defeated Air Force and Fresno State to reach the title round, then earned the championship with a win over Wyoming.

CAPTAINS

The embodiment of Blue Collar Mentality. Super senior defensive back Kekaula Kaniho and senior wide receiver Khalil Shakir were selected as team captains for the Boise State football team's 2021 season. The Broncos will also select a pair of captains on a game-by-game basis throughout the season. Shakir also served as a captain during the 2021 season.

CONFERENCE RECORD

Since 2000, Boise State is a national-best 145-18 (.890) in conference regular-season play. Since joining the FBS in 1996, the Broncos have played in three leagues: the Big West (1996-2000), WAC (2001-10) and Mountain West (2011-Present). Over the campaigns in those three conferences, the Broncos have posted an all-time record of 155-27 (.852).

MW SUCCESS

In its 11 seasons in the Mountain West, Boise State has lost just 14 games against conference opponents. Only four of those losses have come by more than seven points. Additionally, no Mountain West team has a winning record against the Broncos, although San Diego State is 3-3 against Boise State.

PRESEASON FAVORITES ONCE AGAIN

For the 11th time in their 11 seasons in the Mountain West, the Broncos found themselves atop the predicted order of finish in a poll of media members that cover the league. The Broncos were predicted to win the Mountain Division in 2021 for the ninth-straight season, and were also predicted to win the league in 2011 and 2012 before the conference moved to a division format in 2013.

The Broncos received 23 of 25 first-place votes with a Mountain Division-best total of 148 points. Wyoming received the remaining two first-place votes and 115 points, followed by Air Force (104), Colorado State (72), Utah State (47) and New Mexico (39).

Nevada topped the West Division poll, garnering 19 first-place votes and 141 points. San José State notched five first-place votes and 121 points, followed by San Diego State (96), Fresno State (one first-place vote, 85), Hawai'i (56) and UNLV (26).

CONFERENCE TITLES

Boise State will be looking for its 15th conference championship since joining what is now known as the Football Bowl Subdivision in 1996. The Broncos currently have 14 league titles since 1996, tied with Oklahoma for the most in the country during that time. Ohio State (13) and Florida State (1) are the only other schools in the country to win double-digit conference titles during that time.

The Broncos have won 20 conference championships all-time, including four in the Mountain West, eight in the WAC, two in the Big West and six in the Big Sky.

GAME NOTES

BOWL ELIGIBILITY STREAK

Boise State has reached bowl-eligible status in each of the last 23 seasons. The Broncos elected to not participate in a bowl game in 2020, ending a streak of 18-straight seasons resulting in a bowl game. The streak was tied with Wisconsin for the fifth-longest in the country. Outside of 2020, the only other season the Broncos did not participate in a bowl game was in 2001, when the team was not selected despite having a record of 8-4.

SCORING STREAK

Boise State's season-opening game against UCF was its 300th-consecutive tilt without being shut out. The Broncos are one of only nine schools in the history of college football to put a streak together of at least 300-straight such games. The current streak, which now stands at 304, is the sixth-longest active streak in the country and the ninth-longest in NCAA history. The nation's longest active streaks also include Florida (415; 1988-present), which is the longest in NCAA history, TCU (358; 1991-present), Virginia Tech (337; 1995-present), Georgia (333; 1995-present) and Nebraska (319; 1996-present). The Broncos could pass Air Force (306; 1992-2017), which currently ranks eighth in FBS history, in 2021.

ESTABLISHING A LEGACY

The Broncos are the second-winningest football program by percentage in the country since 2000 (226-48; .825), trailing only Ohio State (230-45; .836). Oklahoma (233-51; .820), Alabama (210-63; .769) and LSU (209-66; .760) round out the top five. For the complete top 15, see page four.

The Broncos have 226 wins since 2000, the third-most in college football during that time. Only Oklahoma (233) and Ohio State (230) have more victories over that span.

NATIONAL RANKINGS

Boise State carries a streak of 19-straight seasons being ranked in the top 25 into the 2021 season. The streak is tied for 25th in NCAA history (Texas; 1967-85), and Boise State is the only Group of Five school in NCAA history on the list of 25-longest streaks in college football history. The only schools entering this season with an active streak of at least 15-straight years of being ranked in the top 25 can be found below (the list does not include rankings for 2021).

PRESEASON NATIONAL AWARD LISTS

The Broncos were well represented on preseason national awards watch lists, with 10 different players earning a nod to at least one list. Hank Bachmeier (Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award), Donte Harrington (AFCA Good Works Team), George Holani (Doak Walker Award and Polynesian College Football Player of the Year), Kekaniokoa Holomalia-Gonzalez (Polynesian College Football Player of the Year), Kekaula Kaniho (Jim Thorpe Award, Lott IMPACT Trophy, Polynesian College Football Player of the Year and Wuerffel Award), Ezekiel Noa (Polynesian College Football Player of the Year), Khalil Shakir (Biletnikoff Award, Maxwell Award, Polynesian College Football Player of the Year and Reese's Senior Bowl), Jake Stetz (Outland Trophy and Reese's Senior Bowl) and CT Thomas (Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award) were all named to at least one watch list prior to the start of the season.

BREAKFAST WITH THE BRONCOS

Boise State kicked off its Mountain West opener against Utah State (Sept. 25) at 10:07 a.m., the earliest local start time for the Broncos since Nov. 13, 2004, when the team traveled to San Jose State for a 9:02 a.m. PT/10:02 a.m. MT kickoff. The Broncos won that game, 56-49 (OT).

The 10 a.m. MT kick was the first for the Broncos since opening the 2019 season against Florida State, Aug. 31. The game against the Seminoles was initially slated for 5 p.m. MT, but was moved as a result of Hurricane Dorian. The Broncos also kicked at 10 a.m. MT to open the 2016 season at Louisiana, at Connecticut in 2014 and at Southern Miss in 2012. The common themes? All in the Central or Eastern Time Zones, and all Bronco victories.

Boise State is also slated for a 9 a.m. PT/10 a.m. MT kick time against San Diego State, Nov. 26.

HANK AMONG NATIONAL LEADERS

Junior quarterback Hank Bachmeier has thrown for 1,529 yards through five games, eighth-most nationally, and his 305.8 passing yards per game ranks ninth in the country. His 11 passing touchdowns are tied for 14th nationally, his 24.20 completions per game ranks tied for 12th and his 298.6 yards of total offense per game ranks 19th.

SHAKIR DOES IT ALL

Senior wide receiver and team captain Khalil Shakir, who entered the 2021 season on the Biletnikoff Award Watch List, now has 162 career receptions, tied for the eighth-most in school history. His 2,279 yards receiving are 75 away from cracking the Broncos' career top-10 list, and his 17 touchdown catches are three away from the all-time top 10. Additionally, Shakir now has eight-career 100-yard receiving games, tied for the seventh-most in school history. He had four such games in a COVID-shortened 2020 season, which was limited to seven contests.

This season, Shakir ranks in the top 25 nationally in each of the three major receiving categories - receptions (6.2 per game; tied for 25th), yards (103.6 per game; 11th) and touchdowns (4; tied for 22nd).

Shakir led the Broncos in receptions (52), receiving yards (719) and receiving touchdowns (six) in 2020, earning first-team All-Mountain West honors. The senior team captain isn't just a threat as a receiver, as he has 58 career rush attempts for 308 yards and four touchdowns, and is also 4-for-4 in pass attempts for 20 yards and a touchdown.

SHUFFLING ALONG THE LINE

This past week against Nevada the Broncos started their fourth different combination along the offensive line in five games this season. Against the Wolf Pack, from left to right, Boise State started redshirt senior John Ojukwu, sixth-year senior Jake Stetz, redshirt senior Will Farrar, redshirt sophomore Ben Dooley and sixth year senior Uzo Osuji. For Stetz, it was his third-career start at left guard, and his first since Nov. 2, 2019 (San Jose State). For Osuji, the start was his second as a Bronco, both at right tackle (2020 at Hawai'i). For both Farrar and Dooley, the start marked the first of their Bronco careers at their center and right guard, respectively.

WHEN HOLANI FINDS THE END ZONE, GOOD THINGS HAPPEN

When George Holani rushes for a touchdown, Boise State is 5-0. He had one against UTEP earlier this season, one against Utah State in 2020, one against Hawaii in 2019, four against San Jose State in 2019 and two against Utah State in 2019.

BIG PERFORMANCES FOR COBBS

Redshirt junior wide receiver Stefan Cobbs returned a punt 81 yards for a score in the first quarter against UTEP (Sept. 10), tied with Avery Williams for sixth-longest return in school history. The return was the first for a score since Williams' 69-yarder against San Jose State in the 2020 Mountain West Championship. Cobbs added a 61-yard receiving touchdown in the second quarter to become the first Bronco since John Hightower (2018 vs. Connecticut) to have two 50-plus yard touchdowns in the same game.

Against Nevada (Oct. 2), Cobbs recorded his first-career 100-yard receiving game, finishing with a career-high 10 catches for 132 yards and a career-best two touchdowns.

A FAMILIAR NAME

Redshirt senior wide receiver Davis Koetter, a transfer from Portland State, got his first start as a Bronco against Oklahoma State (Sept. 18). He went on to record his first catch as a Bronco on the squad's first drive, and also caught his first touchdown as a Bronco against the Cowboys.

Davis's father, Dirk, was the Broncos' head coach from 1998-2000, and went on to become head coach at Arizona State (2001-06) before spending 2007-20 in the National Football League as an offensive coordinator (Jacksonville Jaguars, Atlanta Falcons and Tampa Bay Buccaneers) and head coach (Tampa Bay Buccaneers, 2016-18).

MULTIPLE RECEIVERS

Junior quarterback Hank Bachmeier connected with 11 different targets against UCF in the Broncos' season opener. The total is the highest by a Bronco quarterback since Brett Rypien also hit 11 receivers against Nevada, Nov. 4, 2017. Bachmeier then hit 10 different players in Week 2 against UTEP.

Against UCF, Bachmeier's first nine completions went to nine different players.

Entering Week 4 of the National Football League regular season, there were 18 Broncos on National Football League rosters, and 13 teams had at least one former member of the Boise State football team on their roster. At least one Bronco has been selected in the NFL Draft in each of the last 12 seasons, and 28 players have been drafted during that time - including nine in the first two rounds.

SET AT QB

Junior quarterback Hank Bachmeier was named the Broncos' starting quarterback entering the 2021 season, but the Broncos have multiple quarterbacks on the roster with starting experience. Bachmeier and redshirt senior Jack Sears, who transferred from USC prior to the 2020 season, have each started for the Broncos, and Sears also had a start under his belt for the Trojans.

Additionally, each received preseason all-conference recognition entering 2021. Sears picked up an honorable mention nod from Pro Football Focus, and Bachmeier picked up fourth-team honors from Athlon and Phil Steele.

Bachmeier entered 2021 with 13 starts for the Broncos, completing 233-of-375 pass attempts for 3,029 yards, 15 touchdowns and eight interceptions. Sears completed 23-of-27 pass attempts for the Broncos in 2020, for 332 yards and three touchdowns.

THOMAS'S RECEPTIONS STREAK

Super senior CT Thomas, a veteran in the Broncos' receiving corps, did not catch a pass against Oklahoma State, snapping a streak of 39-consecutive games with a catch. The streak was the second-longest in the country, trailing only Justin Hall of Ball State. He has been back in the catch column the last two weeks, hauling in three receptions against both Utah State and Nevada.

Thomas has 125-career receptions for 1,595 yards and 10 touchdowns in his five seasons as a Bronco, and also has 16-career rushes for 108 yards and a score. He is also 2-for-4 in the pass game, throwing for 24 yards and a touchdown. His four 100-yard receiving games are the second-most on the team (Shakir; eight).

A PLETHORA OF RICHES

Of the 12 Broncos to catch a pass in 2020, 11 return in 2021. The only departure is tight end John Bates (12 receptions), a fourth-round selection of the Washington Football Team in the National Football League Draft. Of the remaining 11, six wide receivers, three running backs and a pair of tight ends that caught a pass in 2020 return for 2021.

WR TO WR TD

Wide receivers Khalil Shakir and CT Thomas have each proven to be multidimensional threats in the Broncos' pass game. In addition to combining for 23 receiving touchdowns entering 2021, each has also thrown for a score. The list of Bronco wide receivers to throw for a touchdown over the years includes several names, including the current duo and the Broncos' current wide receivers' coach and all-time receptions leader (244), Matt Miller.

SMITH POISED TO LEAD TIGHT ENDS

John Bates, a fourth-round selection of the Washington Football Team in the 2021 National Football League Draft, is no longer a member of the Broncos' tight end group. But the unit's top passing target from a year ago returns for 2021. Riley Smith, a former Bronco quarterback turned tight end, led Boise State tight ends in receptions in 2020, catching 15 passes for 155 yards and a touchdown.

1,000-YARD RUSHERS

Boise State carried a streak of 11-consecutive seasons with a 1,000-yard rusher into the 2020 season, a feat most recently accomplished by George Holani in 2019 (1,014). Although the streak was not extended this past year, we're going to put an asterisk on it as a result of a seven-game, pandemic-shortened 2020 campaign. As such, the 11-straight seasons is the longest active streak in the country, and is tied for the second-longest in the history of college football with Texas (1; 1995-2005). Only North Carolina (12; 1973-84) has put together a longer streak in college football history.

OFFENSIVE LINE

Of the Broncos' 35 starts along the offensive line in 2020, 29 were made by student-athletes returning for the 2021 season. The only departure is Nick Crabtree, who started six games at right tackle this past season. John Ojukwu, Garrett Curran and Jake Stetz started all seven games in 2020 at left tackle, left guard and right guard, respectively, while Kekaniokoa Holomalia-Gonzalez started six games at center. Donte Harrington and Uzo Osuji each picked up one start in 2020, at center and right tackle, respectively. Ojukwu and Stetz each picked up second-team all-conference accolades this past season, and were preseason All-Mountain West honorees entering 2021, and Curran was honorable mention selection in 2020.



Boise State selects one player to lead the team onto the field with The Dan Paul Hammer each game. The Hammer was renamed prior to the Hawai'i game, Oct. 12, 2019. Dan Paul, a former fullback from 2009-12, passed away in July of 2019, and symbolized the blue collar culture of the Boise State football team. Traditionally, the honor has gone to the individual that made the best special teams play the week prior. However, the offensive line has been selected in the past, and the entire team entered the field with The Hammer in the MW Championship Games from 2017-20.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

YOUTHFUL SPIRIT

Boise State defensive coordinator Spencer Danielson (32) is the seventh-youngest coordinator in the country, and the third-youngest defensive coordinator nationally. Austin Armstrong, defensive coordinator at Southern Miss, is the youngest coordinator in the country.

HUNKERING DOWN

Opponents may have reached the red zone 19 times thus far this season, but getting there is only 68.4 percent of the battle. Of the 19 attempts, Boise State opponents have scored 13 times, eight of which have been touchdowns. The Broncos' red zone defense (.684) ranks tied for 14th nationally.

TURNOVER PARTY

With 12 turnovers forced in five games, the Broncos rank tied for eighth nationally in the statistical category. The mark includes five fumble recoveries (tied for 16th-most in the country) and seven interceptions (tied for 10th-most nationally).

The team's turnover margin (plus-0.80 per game) ranks tied for 25th nationally.

In the Broncos' home opener against UTEP (Sept. 10), Boise State forced six turnovers for the first time since also recording six against UT Martin, Sept. 7, 2013. The Broncos intercepted three passes against the Miners, the first such occurrence since Nov. 4, 2017, against Nevada, and picked off multiple passes in consecutive games for the first time since 2019 (at Colorado State/at Utah State).

Boise State also had three fumble recoveries against UTEP, the first such occurrence since Oct. 12, 2019 against Hawai'i.

Individually, linebacker Ezekiel Noa is one of only 27 players nationally with multiple fumble recoveries.

STOPPING ON FOURTH DOWN

This past week Nevada became the first team to convert a fourth down against the Bronco defense. Opponents are now 1-for-5 on fourth down, and the Broncos' defensive conversion percentage of .200 ranks tied for fifth nationally.

BECOMING A FORCE

Junior safety JL Skinner has 51 tackles (41 solo) through the first five games of the 2021 season, the most in the country among defensive backs. His 10.2 tackles per game ranks tied for eighth nationally and leads the Mountain West. Skinner also forced a pair of fumbles against UTEP (Sept. 10), each of which were recovered by the Broncos.

BREAKOUTS SECONDARY PERFORMANCES

Redshirt junior Tyric LeBeauf, in his first-career start, registered two interceptions in the Broncos' season opener at UCF (Sept. 2), and he added his team-leading third against Utah State (Sept. 25). True freshman safety Seyi Oladipo followed LeBeauf's breakout performance with one of his own, registering a pair of interceptions in his first extensive action on defense against UTEP, Sept. 10. For each, their single-game interception total was more than any single player had in all of 2020.

LeBeauf returned his first interception against the Knights 100 yards for a touchdown, and his 127 interception return yards on the game established a school record. His 128 interception return yards on the season are the most in the country in 2021. The 100-yard return for a score tied the Broncos' school record, initially set by Jamar Taylor against Arizona State in the 2011 MAACO Bowl Las Vegas. LeBeauf is the first Bronco to record multiple interceptions in a game since current Los Angeles Ram Donte Deayon did it against BYU, Sept. 12, 2015.

SACK ATTACK

Since the beginning of the 2010 season, Boise State ranks eighth nationally in sacks. Only Clemson (474), Alabama (416), Ohio State (405), Virginia Tech (398), Texas A&M (396), Pittsburgh (395) and Stanford (395) have more sacks during that time than Boise State (393).

IRWIN A HIDDEN GEM

Defensive end Shane Irwin made a name for himself in 2020, his first season as a Bronco. A transfer after stops at San Diego State and Long Beach City College, Irwin led the Broncos with 6.0 sacks in his debut season, earning second-team All-Mountain West accolades. His per-game sack total (0.86) this past season ranked 15th nationally. He had back-to-back two-sack performances against Colorado State (Nov. 12) and at Hawai'i (Nov. 21) in 2020, the only time a Bronco has accomplished the feat since the NCAA began tracking the statistic in 2000.

GAME NOTES

Irwin had a sack in back-to-back games against UTEP (Sept. 10) and Oklahoma State (Sept. 18), including a strip sack against UTEP, which was recovered by Broncos' defensive tackle Scott Matlock at the Miners' 3-yard line. Boise State scored on the first play of the ensuing possession, a 3-yard run from running back Andrew Van Buren.

BAGNAH'S PRODUCTION

No matter his role, redshirt sophomore EDGE Isaiah Bagnah is producing for the Broncos. Bagnah, who has three-career starts, has eight sacks over his last seven games. He started the final two games of the 2020 season, and this past week against Nevada (Oct. 2), in his first start of the season, registered three sacks. The total was the most by a Bronco since MW career sack king Curtis Weaver also had three against UNLV in 2019.

DEPTH UP FRONT

A deep defensive line returns for the Broncos in 2020. Seven different student-athletes that started a game in 2020 return to the Broncos for the 2021 season, and 10 different players that registered a tackle last year are also back this season. Those returning with starting experience from a year ago include defensive tackle Scott Matlock (seven starts in 2020), defensive end Shane Irwin (five), Scale Igiehon (four), EDGE Isaiah Bagnah (two), defensive tackle Divine Obichere (two), EDGE Demetri Washington (two) and nose tackle Keeghan Freeborn (one).

Of the Broncos' 18 sacks from 2020, 15 come from returning defensive linemen.

BLUE-COLLAR 'BACKERS

Boise State's linebacker corps is an apt representation of the Blue Collar Mindset of the program. The two returning starters, super senior Riley Whimpey and redshirt senior Ezekiel Noa, have each suffered season-ending knee injuries, with Whimpey having his 2018 season cut short, and Noa having his 2019 season abruptly ended by the injury. Whimpey rebounded in 2019 to be named to the All-Mountain West Second Team, leading Boise State with 83 tackles while making 7.0 tackles-for-loss, a pair of sacks, and breaking up seven passes in coverage. He garnered second-team honors again this past season. Noa, meanwhile, was off to a great start in 2019, making 28 tackles, with 3.0 for loss, before suffering his season-ending knee injury in the fourth contest. He was named honorable mention All-Mountain West in 2020.

TACKLING MACHINE

Senior linebacker Riley Whimpey has been the Broncos' tackling machine the last few seasons, leading the team in tackles in both 2019 (83) and 2020 (61). He also led Boise State in tackles-for-loss this past season (7.5). Whimpey was also the Broncos' leading tackle through nine games in 2018 (49), before an injury ended his season.

FUTURE PRESIDENT KANIHO

Super senior defensive back Kekaula Kaniho has made a name for himself on the football field, earning myriad accolades. But his off-field accolades may outshine his in-uniform production. A first-team Academic All-American in 2020, Kaniho was also named one of 12 members of the National Football Foundation's 2020 Scholar-Athlete Class, and a finalist for the William V. Campbell Trophy, which earned him a postgraduate scholarship worth \$18,000.

Kaniho was also college football's Senior CLASS Award winner in 2020. The award, chosen by a nationwide vote of Division I FBS football coaches, national football media and fans, is given annually to the most outstanding senior student-athlete in Division I football.

SAFETY TANDEM BACK

The Broncos' starting safeties from 2020, redshirt senior Tyreque Jones and junior JL Skinner, who boasted a combined 20 starts in the backfield entering this season, return in 2021. Skinner started each of his six games played last year, and Jones has started at least four games in each of the last three seasons - five in both 2018 and 2020, and four in 2019. Jones has 71-career tackles (51 solo), including 4.5 for-loss and a sack, in addition to an interception, six pass break-ups, a forced fumble and two fumble recoveries. Skinner has 51-career tackles (31 solo), including 2.0 for-loss, in addition to an interception and five pass break-ups.

THE REPLACEMENTS

While both starting safeties from a year ago are back for 2021, Boise State must replace each of its starting cornerbacks. Avery Williams, a fifth-round selection of the Atlanta Falcons in the National Football League Draft, and Jalen Walker combined for 68 starts during their Bronco careers. There was exactly one returning start at cornerback on the Broncos' roster entering 2021, made by Markel Reed against Air Force on Halloween in 2020.

SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES**MAKING THE MOST OF THE OPPORTUNITIES**

The Broncos have returned just four punts in 2021, but are averaging 29.25 yards per return. The mark ranks second nationally, trailing only Michigan State (32.83).

KEEP YOUR HEAD UP

Prior to his fourth-quarter field goal attempt against Oklahoma State being blocked, sophomore kicker Jonah Dalmas had made two field goals against the Cowboys, pushing his start as a Bronco to 14-for-15. The mark tied Kyle Brotzman (2007-10) and Haden Hoggarth (2017) for best start for a kicker in school history.

Dalmas ranks tied for third nationally in field goals per game (2.00) in 2021, and is 23rd nationally in scoring (9.8 points per game). His career field goal percentage of .850 (17-of-20) ranks 10th nationally amongst active kickers.

GAME-CHANGING SPECIAL TEAMS

Boise State is one of only two schools nationally (San Diego State) to have a punt return for a touchdown in each of the last five seasons. Kansas State, Pittsburgh and TCU each carry a streak of four-straight seasons into 2021, but have yet to accomplish the feat this year.

FLIPPING THE FIELD

Sixth-year senior punter Joel Velazquez was one of only six student-athletes in the country to average more than 50 yards per attempt the first week of the season. Velazquez booted six punts against UCF (Sept. 2), averaging 50.7 yards per attempt.

Velazquez is averaging 44.8 yards per punt this season, ranking 27th nationally. Of his 20 punts on the year, seven have been downed inside the 20 (35 percent) and six have gone for 50-plus yards.

ALL THE SPECIALISTS ARE BACK

The Broncos' kicker, punter, long snapper, holder and kickoff specialist are all back in 2021. Sophomore kicker Jonah Dalmas, an honorable mention All-Mountain West selection in 2020, went 7-for-8 on field goals during his debut season, including a long of 51 yards. Sixth-year senior punter Joel Velazquez has spent three of the past four seasons serving as the Broncos' starter, averaging 39.9 yards on 102 punts. This past season he averaged a career-best 41.0 yards per punt, including a long of 71 yards. He has also served as the Broncos' kickoff specialist each of the last four seasons, putting 164 of 266 kickoffs into the end zone for a touchback. Daniel Cantrell has 34 games in three seasons under his belt as Boise State's long snapper, and Connor Riddle, the son of tight ends coach Kent Riddle, has been the Broncos' holder in 20 games the past two seasons.

REPLACING AVERY

Avery Williams, the two-time Mountain West Special Teams Player of the Year and the 2020 Mountain West Male Athlete of the Year, is now a member of the Atlanta Falcons after being selected in the fifth round of 2021 National Football League Draft. The 2020 Consensus All-American and Jet Award Winner, given to the nation's best return specialist, departed college football with nine-career return touchdowns, tied for the most in NCAA history.

BLOCK PARTY

The Broncos blocked five kicks in 2020, tied for the second-most in the country and the team's highest total since 2011. Since-departed Avery Williams had two of the blocks, as did returning defensive tackle Scott Matlock. Cornerback Tyric LeBeauf also blocked a punt this past season, one of three such blocks on the season for the Broncos, tied for the most in college football.

Matlock also blocked a field goal attempt against Utah State, Sept. 25.

CAPTAINS

Boise State named senior wide receiver Khalil Shakir and super senior defensive back Kekaula Kaniho captains for the 2021 season.

- >> Named to the preseason watch list for the 2021 Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award.
- >> Holds a 13-5 record as the starting quarterback and has completed 64% of his passes.
- >> Threw for three touchdowns in the 2020 season-opening win against Utah State (Oct. 24), going 20-for-28 for 263 yards passing.
- >> First true freshman to start a Boise State season opener in the team's FBS Era (1996-present).
- >> Passed for over 13,000 yards, rushed for over 2,000 over his prep career.
- >> Set the CIF Southern Section career record with 156 touchdown passes, eclipsing the previous mark held by JT Daniels.
- >> Threw for two touchdowns in the 2021 season-opener at UCF (Sept. 2), marking his first game with multiple touchdown passes since throwing three in the 2020 season-opening win over Utah State.

Lyle Smith, the "Father of Boise State Football," head football coach from 1947-67 and Boise State Athletics Director from 1967-81, passed away the morning of July 26, 2017, at the age of 101.

Smith came to Boise Junior College in 1946 as basketball coach and assistant football coach. In 1947, he became head coach of the BJC football program and didn't lose a game until his fourth season.

His 1958 team won the National Junior College championship.

Smith retired from coaching after the 1967 season. In his 20 years as the head football coach at BJC; he compiled a 156-25-6 record, a winning percentage of .850.

Smith continued to lead Boise State as AD until his retirement after the 1980-81 academic year. Smith guided Boise State's transition from a junior college power to a highly-successful NCAA Division I athletic program.

In his honor, a statue was erected at the southwest corner of Albertsons Stadium. He was present for its unveiling prior to the 2016 season.

Albertsons Stadium - and Lyle Smith Field - is the home of Boise State football and the annual Famous Idaho Potato Bowl.

Smith, who passed away in July of 2017 at the age of 101, is the undisputed father of Bronco football, who from 1946-67 built one of the top junior college programs in the country. When he retired from his head coaching position to become the athletic director, Smith had a record of 156-25-6 (.850).

Completed during the summer of 1970 at a cost of \$2.2 million, what was originally known as Bronco Stadium had a seating capacity of 14,500. Since that time the stadium has expanded four times to its current capacity of 36,387.

Boise State established a first in 1986 by installing the first blue AstroTurf in the country. The second blue AstroTurf field was installed in 1995, with the third going in prior to the 2002 season. The first Blue FieldTurf surface was installed in 2008. A second Blue FieldTurf field was installed prior to the 2010 season, and the most recent edition was installed prior to the 2019 season - making a total of six different blue fields at the stadium.

Boise State's was the first collegiate stadium to have the entire field produced in a special color.

Since 1986, Boise State is a combined 192-42 on The Blue, a winning percentage of .821. And since 2000, Boise State has gone 123-12 at home (.911), the highest winning percentage in the country during that time.

Overall, since the construction of Albertsons Stadium in 1970, Boise State is 275-59 (.823), the third-highest winning percentage of any stadium in the country currently in use. Only Alabama's Bryant-Denny Stadium (280-54-3; .835), built in 1929, and Georgia Southern's Paulson Stadium (206-42; .831), built in 1984, have higher winning percentages for its tenants.

UNIFORM COMBINATIONS

Boise State unveiled a new look for the 2017 season, the first time the Broncos had overhauled their Nike uniforms since 2011.

Included in the new slate were blue, orange and white, and the jerseys featured new stripes on the sleeves and "Blue Collar" on the inside of the neck. The Broncos added a black set of uniforms that were unveiled against Air Force, Sept. 20, 2019.

The uniforms are from the Nike Vapor Untouchable line, with stretch woven material, a seamless front and shoulders and laser perforation fabric instead of mesh. The uniforms combine materials and science designed for speed and comfort for the players, based on four core principles - fit, durability, weight and core body temperature.

Boise State University named Andy Avalos, a former Bronco student-athlete, assistant coach and defensive coordinator, the 11th football head coach in the program's history as a four-year institution, Director of Athletics Jeramiah Dickey announced Jan. 9, 2021.

Avalos, a team captain and all-conference linebacker during his playing career (2000-04) under head coaches Dirk Koetter and Dan Hawkins, is just the second graduate of Boise State to lead the Broncos' football program (Bryan Harsin). He previously coached at Boise State from 2012-18 under head coaches Chris Petersen and Harsin, ascending to defensive coordinator for the 2016-18 seasons before accepting the same role at Oregon for the last two seasons (2018-19) under head coach Mario Cristobal.

In addition to coaching stops at Boise State (2012-18) and Oregon (2019-20), Avalos also spent time working under Hawkins at Colorado (2006-08), at Sacramento State (2011) and at Nebraska-Kearney (2009-10).

During his five seasons as a defensive coordinator, Avalos established himself as one of college football's premier coordinators. He was named a semifinalist for the Broyles Award, which honors college football's top assistant coach, during his first season at Oregon in 2019.

The Ducks won Pac-12 championships each season with Avalos in charge of the defense, adding to three Mountain West Championships the Broncos captured with Avalos on staff (2012, 2014 and 2017) and two Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference championships while at Nebraska-Kearney (2009-10). As a student-athlete, Avalos won three Western Athletic Conference championships (2002, 2003, 2004) in his four years as a starting linebacker.

In Avalos' two seasons at Oregon, the Ducks earned a victory in the 2020 Rose Bowl and played in the 2021 Fiesta Bowl, a game the Broncos also appeared in during the 2014 season, defeating Arizona (38-30) for Boise State's third victory in the game. With Avalos on staff, Boise State also appeared in the Las Vegas Bowl (2012 and 2017), the Hawai'i Bowl (2013), the Poinsettia Bowl (2015) and the Cactus Bowl (2016), and was selected to play in the First Responder Bowl (2018). While Avalos was playing for the Broncos, Boise State appeared in the 2002 Humanitarian Bowl, the 2003 Fort Worth Bowl and the 2004 Liberty Bowl, a game in which he returned an interception 92 yards for a touchdown.

Avalos has overseen the development of 50 student-athletes that have garnered all-conference honors, and multiple All-Americans, of whom several will be familiar to Bronco Nation - DeMarcus Lawrence, Curtis Weaver and Leighton Vander Esch. Ducks defensive end Kayvon Thibodeaux picked up All-America accolades this past season, in addition to being one of four student-athletes to earn Freshman All-America honors in Avalos' two seasons with Oregon (linebacker Noah Sewell in 2020, and Thibodeaux, defensive back Verone McKinley III and linebacker Mase Funa in 2019). Thibodeaux and Sewell were named Pac-12 Freshman Defensive Player of the Year in back-to-back seasons (2019-20).

Vander Esch was named MW Defensive Player of the Year for the Broncos in 2017 before declaring early for the National Football League Draft and ultimately being selected in the first round by the Dallas Cowboys. Lawrence and Weaver also opted to forego their final seasons of eligibility with the Broncos, being selected in the second and fifth rounds, respectively.

Oregon led the Pac-12 in sacks over the course of his two seasons as coordinator, and ranked third in the conference in both rush defense and total defense. Oregon finished the 2019 season ninth in the nation in scoring defense, allowing just 16.5 points per game. The Ducks ranked 13th nationally in rushing defense (108.93 yards per game) and 22nd in total defense (329.1 YPG). Avalos' defense disrupted opposing offenses, finishing second in the country in interceptions (20), sixth in passes defended (76), 13th in sacks (41.0) and 21st in tackles-for-loss (97.0).

Prior to joining the Oregon staff, Avalos spent seven seasons coaching at Boise State, including the final three as defensive coordinator. During his time as coordinator the Broncos led the MW in sacks, ranked second in rush defense and

third in total defense. While at his alma mater he also served as defensive line coach (2012-13) and linebackers coach (2014-15).

Avalos started his coaching career in his hometown of Corona, Calif., where he coached linebackers at Corona High School. He then spent three seasons as a graduate assistant at Colorado before coaching two seasons at Nebraska-Kearney and one at Sacramento State.

A four-year letterwinner for the Broncos, Avalos earned first-team All-WAC honors at outside linebacker in each of his final two seasons. He completed his career ranked fourth all-time with 355 tackles, and led the Broncos in the statistical category in each of his final three seasons. He was named to the All-Blue Team during the 2016 season, a list of the 30 greatest players at Boise State since the inception of The Blue in 1986.

Avalos and his wife Summer had their first child, a daughter named Paityn, Jan. 31, 2014, and added a second daughter, Paige, April 12, 2016.

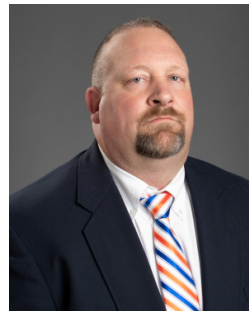

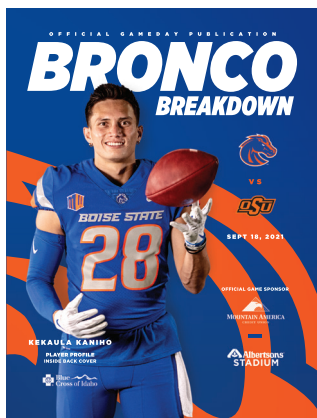
