Mission Statement

The Tacoma-Pierce County Coalition to End Homelessness is the City of Tacoma and Pierce County's response to homelessness. It is the mission of the Coalition to preserve and create affordable housing, prevent homelessness, restore homeless persons to stable living environments, and promote community awareness of homelessness issues through education, legislative advocacy, mutual support and the sharing of resources.

The purpose of the Coalition is to:

- 1) Provide a network which shares ideas, concerns and resources applicable to homeless issues and foster collaboration in addressing their needs, and
- 2) Increase community awareness of the causes of homelessness, the needs of homeless people, and ways to end homelessness.

Grievance Procedure

Any individual, who has a complaint with a shelter, transitional program, or housing first program and is uncomfortable speaking with the administration of the program, may utilize the Coalition to end Homelessness Grievance Procedure.

Access Point 4 Housing

Pierce County's central point of access for shelter and housing services

The Access Point 4 Housing program at Associated Ministries serves as Pierce County's central point of access to which people in crisis are referred for homelessness prevention services, rent and utility assistance, a strength-based assessment, light case management, and referral to the shelter, housing provider or other services best suited to the client's needs.

Individuals or families in need should be referred to **253-682-3401**. The process begins with a telephone screening, followed by a scheduled assessment, and development of an action plan to help the client achieve self-sufficiency.

The program's top priority is to prevent homelessness through provision of rent or utility assistance or shallow subsidies designed to keep the client in their current housing situation. If needed, referral to the appropriate shelter or housing provider, and other needed services is provided.

This program provides a safe, secure, homey environment as well as therapeutic onsite daycare for the children of the women participating in the program.

Transitional Housing - Phoenix Housing Network has 70 transitional housing units for families at several sites throughout Pierce County. Case management and Life Skills classes are provided to everyone in transitional housing and mental health services are also available. Rent Assistance – Rental assistance for housholds at risk of homelessness. Phone calls for rent assistance are taken on the first Wednesday after the 5th of each month, starting at 9:00 AM.
