



Cancer Immunotherapy: What Do Non-Oncology Nurse Practitioners Need to Know? 100% Rx



Immune checkpoint inhibitors are a new class of cancer treatments that help the body's own immune system recognize and destroy cancer cells. However, activating the immune system may cause a form of autoimmune reaction that can affect any organ or tissue. Most immune-related adverse events (irAE) are mild to moderate and reversible, if detected early and addressed appropriately. These irAE most commonly affect the skin, colon, lungs, liver and endocrine organs, and some can be permanent (hypothyroidism) or life threatening (myocarditis). Non-oncology NPs play an integral role in the care of cancer patients and survivors and NPs in specialties such as dermatology, GI, and endocrinology may be consulted regarding the management of an immune-related adverse event. Equip yourself with knowledge about immunotherapy and immune-related adverse events, so you can communicate with the oncology team and work together to address all the patient's medical needs.



Thyroid Function Disorders: Hyperthyroidism and Hypothyroidism 50% Rx



Hyperthyroidism and Hypothyroidism are common disorders in the general population, but many providers do not have a clear understanding of the best diagnostic tests and most appropriate treatment approaches and goals. Hyperthyroidism causes include Graves' disease, toxic multinodular goiter and toxic thyroid adenomas, various forms of thyroiditis, iodine excess, medication effects, and exogenous thyroid hormone use. Thyrotoxicosis can vary in severity from thyroid storm, a life-threatening form of extreme decompensated thyrotoxicosis, to a mild, asymptomatic form that shows up only as a laboratory abnormality. Hypothyroidism can result from diseases of the thyroid gland itself (primary hypothyroidism) or it can result from disorders of the hypothalamus and pituitary gland (secondary or central hypothyroidism). Learn about the use of testing options for the differential diagnosis of thyroid dysfunction, treatment of hyperthyroidism and hypothyroidism, with additional attention to special circumstances in the elderly.

Postpartum Depression 25% Rx



Perinatal depression includes depression during pregnancy and up to 12 months postpartum. Rates of perinatal depression range from 12-15% of women, and incidence is known to be higher for vulnerable populations. Women with untreated depression during pregnancy are at risk of developing postpartum depression and suicidality. Postpartum depression interfers with infant attachment and bonding, and can lead to developmental disorders that last into adolescence. Additionally, important caregiving activities such as breastfeeding, sleep, keeping up with well-child visits and vaccine schedules can be compromised in depressed mothers. Understand which women are at risk for postpartum depression, screening methods, and treatment options to optimize outcomes for moms and babies.

Pituitary Disorders: Evaluation and Management 50% Rx


