Bleeding amazin

400 blood donations a selfless act of generosity

Te Awamutu's Tom Davies is a serial blood donor, and while reaching milestones isn't the reason for his generosity, yester-day he gave his 400th donation—a

day he gave his 400th donation — a rarity for any donor.

Mr Davies gave his first donation in Sydney on June 18, 1970, while on his OE.

His next donation was at Gladstone in Queensland, memorable he says 'because I fainted'.

"Still on my OE, I was working at the Gladstone Hotel," he says.

"It was a busy day so no time for lunch, then a rapid walk to blood collection site.

I donated, sat down with a cup of tea then fainted — fortunately putting the cup down beforehand.
"This is the only time I fainted

and I'm lucky to have been queasy only two or three times."

The service was operated by Red Cross, and he recalled his reu Cross, and he recalled his father talking about Red Cross and St John being saviours when he was in a German POW camp, so he saw it as a way of giving back, even at a young age

at a young age.

Another 'attraction' of being a donor is that is completely egalitarian.

"All of us, conscious of others can donate and each donation is treated as equal, no matter our financial or social status," he says. This started a habit that has

lasted another 398 donations and counting.

"I understand the advantage of relaxing as the needle is inserted

and removed," says Mr Davies.
"I have no recollection of ever feeling uneasy about insertion of the needle and watch it going in so I know when to fully relax.

I know when to fully relax.

"Perhaps the biggest pain is completing the exhaustive form each time before donating."

Mr Davies continued to make a

handful of donations in Australia,

nandful of donations in Australia, and even once in Toronto in 1975. "At that time Canada really spoiled their donors with special reclining chairs and great food,"

"However, we've certainly caught up, maybe leaped ahead with comfortable chairs to semi recline, a nice choice of drinks and biscuits and recognition of donors

"I've made donations in various centres throughout the Island and once soon after the quakes, in Christchurch."

From 2000 most donations have been at the Hamilton Blood Donor Centre. He says it is a great place to donate, perhaps the best in the country, with a friendly, prompt

and caring team.
"Donors are made to feel special," he says.

In the last 11 years Mr Davies has been a plasma donor, attending every fortnight when health permits and giving about 300 times.

He doesn't expect to get to 500 donations — but says 'who knows'.

Waipa District Council appreciates the concern expressed about the Te Awamutu Rose Gardens and wishes to correct some misinformation and provide some assurances.

We share the deep connection many people have with the Te Awamutu Rose Gardens. We take great pride in caring for them on behalf of the community.

Therefore, prior to any decisions being made about moving the roses, Council consulted with the Te Awamutu Rose Trust which approved the plans. Iwi were also consulted and approved the plans.

Please be assured the roses are not

being destroyed. Most are being moved to new beds in the existing rose gardens.

will allow greater use of a shared public space and means we can build a recreation space for families to enjoy. Doing so will encourage more people to see and appreciate the gar-

dens.

All up, around 10 per cent of the beds at the rose gardens will be affected. Any roses that will not fit in the current space will be moved to other places in town. Council and the Trust are working together to find suitable locations for these.

We are moving the roses now be-

cause, as gardeners will know, winter is the best time to do so.

Last year we shared a proposal to expand the new playground and recreation area near Selwyn Park and along Mangahoi Stream. Part of this project is the inclusion of a bike skills park — similar to what's at the Avantidrome in Cambridge — however this is dependent on funding.

There was extensive coverage of that proposal, including in the *Te* Awamutu Courier.

Specific details about the bike park, including funding arrangements, are yet to be finalised. We will share more information as soon as we can.

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
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Merit award made to Talos theatre stalwart

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Learn about subdividing

A greater demand for housing in Kihikihi could prove lucrative

for those able to subdivide.

Waipa District Council expects around 2300 people to live in Kihikihi by 2050, creating a greater demand for residential sections in the town.

Council's planning and regulatory manager Wayne Allan says there is a significant amount of residential land in Kihikihi that has the potential to be subdivided to create another property

"With most towns we look outside of the town boundary to provide land for development, however our draft Waipa Growth Strategy has identified that Kihishadegy has definited that kini-kihi has enough land within the town boundary to provide for expected growth up to 2050." Kihikihi landowners with a section 950m² or larger could be

eligible to subdivide.
"We understand subdividing

can be confusing so we are committed to helping guide landowners through the process and make it as easy as possible for them," Says Mr Allan.

Two information sessions will be held in Kihikihi, with a presentation from Council consents team leader Gareth Moran about the subdividing

Moran about the subdividing process and what you need to do.

The sessions will also be attended by Council development engineers and local surveyors who will be available to answer questions following the presentation.

Council invites any Kihikihi

property owners who are interested in subdividing to attend an information session to find out

The Kihikihi subdivision information sessions are at the Kihikihi Town Hall, Lyon Street on Wednesday, August 16 at 10am and Thursday, August 17 at 6pm.

DEVELOPMENT and building is already booming in Kihikihi and Council say there is room for even more housing yet in the village.



Once Waipa District Council and Waikato Regional Council rates and rubbish collection are added together the result is minus \$127 superannuation each superannuation day, leaving just \$336 per week with rents

\$336 per week with rents around \$200-250 per week. On April 1 power com-panies, insurance companies, councils and supermarkets increase costs as they divide up the \$6-8 per fortnight increase amongst themselves.

Then the supermarkets have a second round of price increases on September 1.

Pensioners are out of cket about \$5 per week every year.

This increase is further impacted as banks increase mortgage payments, rents increase and soon we will have to pay water costs and petrol cost increases.

I challenge the MP for our district to explain to all of us what inflation costs are considered for inflation adjusted pension increases and what of the above costs are not in-

MP welcomes replacing the school decile system generation to lead

National MP Barbara Kuriger has welcomed the Government decision to replace the decile system for New Zealand schools.

"I welcome the announcement of targeted funding to better support those students most at risk of not achieving due to disadvan-

"For too long, schools have been wrongly judged by their decile number — a number that in no way represents the enormous

potential of our young people.

"Decile funding accounts for less than 3 per cent of a school's resources, but the public decile rating currently used to distribute those resources can be wrongly used to judge a school. "This Government wants to end the stigma of decile," says Mrs Kuriger.

Cabinet has agreed to replace the decile system with a Risk Index that better targets funding to schools and early childhood education providers with children and young people most at risk of not achieving due to disadvantage

The specific factors to be used The specific factors to be used in the index are subject to further analysis, and there will be more engagement before the Risk Index is finalised. It is expected that the new funding system will take effect from 2019 or 2020

"We're committed to investing in schools, which is why we've made certain this change won't

Mr Davies has the most common O+ blood group, which is also the most in demand.

also the most in demand.

And to keep on top of his fortnightly schedule he uses the new NZ Blood Service phone app which contains his donor ID, future appointments and past donations back to 2004.

It is also how he books future appointments

appointments.

'My blood pressure is generally somewhat lower than normal, especially at 8.30am — my normal donation time," he

says.
"I understand this relates to cise from 6-7am and it is a common, known phenomena for our blood pressure to drop in the two hours following robust exercise.

"My blood pressure drops to a point at which the NZ Blood staff are uncomfortable, so on a couple of occasions I took a brisk walk to bring it back up to an acceptable level.
"We also had the charge

doctor note on my records that systolic pressure of 90 is normal.

His philosophy for donating blood is to serve others, and by donating plasma he can maximise this service by donating every two weeks.

werey two weeks.
Mr Davies believes there are also benefits to himself, such as donating seems likely to improve his body's response to losing blood.

However, he points out, this remains an unproven theory.
"Conversely there is no evi-

dence donating has done me anv harm.

Blood Waikato recruitment team leader Steve Dalgety says Mr Davies is an inspiration.

"It is an incredible number of donations — a completely selfless act," he says.

There is no substitute for donated blood and the New Zealand Blood Service has a constant need to recruit new donors. donors.

In the Waikato more than

In the warkato more than 500 donors per week are required to keep up with the current demand. Blood only lasts 35 days, so a steady stream of blood donors is needed.

Each whole blood donation helps save the life of up to three people, but the real push is for

plasma donors which can be used in many more ways — and

donors can give more often. Hamilton needs 155 plasma donations each week, but during winter that can be hard to achieve.

To become a plasma or platelet donor, you must first become a whole blood donor to check your eligibility. NZ Blood Service would like

you to consider becoming a donor, and if you have not donated in sometime, would appreciate your returned sup-

If you are over 18 years of age you can make a difference in your community by helping others and ensuring adequate supplies of blood are available you as well as your family and others.

Mother reflects on son's stellar career

Te Awamutu mother of 2016-17 The Awamutu mother of 2010-17 national premiership winning jockey Chris Johnson recalls his first-ever career win in 1981 as though it was yesterday.

an understatement. Sile's very, very proud' of him.

"Chris has come a long way since the day he left home as a 15-year-old, when we all lived in Fielding, to do his apprenticeship with Scott Hammersley at Wood-ville. I can still picture my boy having to learn to ride on one of

Scott's ponies.

"I'm so pleased he 'got back on the horse' and resumed his career after he very nearly gave it all away for good a number of years ago."

Johnson is relatively matter of

fact about what he has achieved in the past 12 months. It is Johnson's second premiership after first topping the ladder in the 1995-96 season.

While Johnson's tally of 112 winners for the season fell short of the 139 he notched in his first title 21 years earlier, for the 53-year-old the season represented an oppor-tunity to continue doing the job he adores which started back in 1980 and which has amassed him more

and which has amassed him more than 2200 winners.
"I've always loved racing, although when I first started riding I never thought I'd get to 1000 wins let alone over 2000," he said. "I have had some ups and downs along the way, but I've had the opportunity to ride some tremendous horses and have been

for me." While he has had several low periods throughout his career, even giving the game away between 1999 and 2006, Johnson credits some misfortune late last year as his motivation to achieve his second premiership title.

"I'd started the season off pretty well and things were going okay well and things were going okay when I copped a decent suspension around Christmas time," he said. "I hadn't really come out and confirmed I was thinking about the premiership at that point, but when that happened I thought I might have really stuffed things in." up.

Semi-retired barrister John Tannahill, a long-time friend and confidant who also manages Johnson's North Island rides, admits he too thought the worst when an

initial six-day suspension was extended by a further four days after an improper riding charge was reinstated following a special hearing by the Judicial Control

Authority.
"Based on the rides Chris had booked, or in the pipeline, I think he missed out on 11 winners due to the suspension," Tamnahill said. "That is a big hole to try and climb out of and I did say that he

was no show, but as it turned out he went out and rode 22 winners in January and was back on track by

January and was back of track by the end of the month."

It was also around that time that leading trainers such as Graeme and Debbie Rogerson announced they would be support. ing Johnson in his bid for the title as he attempted tochallenge the runaway leader at the time, Danielle Johnson.

The South Island-based John-

son started to spend increasing periods of time in the north as Tamnahill chased hard for rides and by mid-May the momentum had clearly shifted to the 'Magic

Man'.
"I think when he rode Let Her Tunnk when he rode Let Her Rip to victory in the stakes race at Rotorua it was then we both thought he could do it and, after some pretty hard slog, he has," Tannahill said.

"To have the support of trainers like Rogie, Shaune Ritchie and Donna Logan and Chris Gibbs along with his ardent South Island support base has been amazing and I know Chris is very appreciative of everyone who has helped him along the way.

"Personally, I think he is riding better than ever with his fitness level the best it has been in many years and pretty damn good for a 53-year-old."


