Pressure on WDC to avoid water consent breaches

It will provide extra capacity during times of peak water use and for fire fighting, but will not eliminate the difficulty Council has complying with abstraction consents at Te Tahi Road in summer.

Determination by Council Determination by Council water staff to do all they can to avoid breaching water abstraction consents at Te Tahi treatment plant could lead to more far reaching water restriction measures in coming months.

Lorraine Kendrick, water services manager, told Council's service delivery committee that least year's drought saw water

service defivery committee that last year's drought saw water restrictions of varying levels applied over a six month period, but a lack of rain this summer could trigger even longer restric-

tion periods. Ms Kend Ms Kendrick said Council water services staff were trying to be pro-active, rather than re-active, in seeking not to breach the consent from Waikato Regional Council to take water from sources on Pirongia Mountain.

The issue arose as part of the three monthly water services report, in which the water services manager stated that a Standard Operating Procedure was being prepared which would outline the steps associated with managing the Te Tahi supply in times of drought.

"We are currently investigating the Te Tahi water supply/demand mass balance and carrying out a survey of the raw water storage pond so that we can predict the remaining supply for the town with more confidence during these

drought periods."

It was anticipated that the procedure would be brought before the service delivery committee in October/November for its endorsement in preparation for the Summer Smart Water campaign.

Cr Clare St Pierre said when breaches had occurred staff were

only taking steps to ensure continuity of supply to townships.
"So why does the Regional Council not support these measures?"

Ms Kendrick said there was a reporting process in place that required Council staff to advise the Council and Regional Council when breaches of the consent appeared imminent.

The consent at Te Tahi Road is for abstraction up to 22,000 cubic metres per day. However, water available in the stream last summer was only about 7,500 cubic metres, and the consent states that 45 l/s (3888 m3/day) has to be left in the stream.

Peak demand last summer,

even with restrictions in place, was 10,000 cubic metres so there

was no way of ensuring continuity of supply without breaching the consent.

Ms Kendrick said it was a difficult context for staff, knowingly breaching consents in order to maintain supplies for residents' consumption and firefighting back-up.
"Population Health is part of

the (reporting) process as well, ensuring that we have sufficient

capacity to meet demand."

Chief executive Garry Dyet told the Courier that Waipa District Council and Waikato Regional Council work closely together to protect the environment and the community. The search for new and viable alternate supplies was continuing, with Council signal-ling the need for multi million dollar investment in water infrastructure over the next 10 years.

Days of rates squeeze is disappearing

Council are working on a new 10 Year Plan to take effect next year .The Mayor has stated in a recent press release that spending on the three waters could go as high as \$200 million in the ten year plan .

With the last 3-4 10 Year Plans there has been a pattern of rates in the first three years being the highest of the ten year plan.The first three year annual increases have varied between over 4 per cent — to 6 per cent. In this new plan ratepayers would find these annual increase far too high and will be looking for a more equitable spread over the total ten years.

The much publicised "Rock Star"

economy has come tumbling down with a massive drop in the forecast dairy pay out and the price of timber .

There has been little or no trickle down benefit from the "Rock Star" economy to those on fixed and low incomes, and its been widely published that these groups constantly battle to pay annual rates .

When properties are revalued every 3 years property has historically increased in value. When council use new increasing valuations to set annual rate increases they seem to think that this automatically means ratepayers have a rise in income increased property values.

This increases the rates burden on ratepayers especially the fixed and

lower income ratepayers.

Council will be receiving over \$200 million in depreciation over the next 10

year plan so this will help to offset some of the huge capital spending cost. Unfortunately there are many claims and the depreciation fund including other core services and debt reduction and expedience of the core services.

and annual interest .

If this new 10 Year Plan has the historically high rates in the first three years then council will automatically need to put an immediate three year cap on councils fixed costs including all the community facilities and organisations

that rely on ratepayers money for operational expenses.

The days of ratepayers being squeezed through high rates and council costs continuing to rise have gone.



Double blessing for Fire Brigade

It wasn't the delivery of twins, but the blessing of two new installations that drew a small group to the Te Awamutu Fire Station last week.

Waipa District Mayor Jim Mylchreest and councillor Marcus Gower joined Council staff and some Te Awamutu Volunteer Fire Brigade members to witness the blessing of a new carving installed in the Fire Station's memorial garden, and a replacement fire tanker owned by Council but operated by the Brigade.

Waipa District Council kaumatua Charlie Maikuku performed the blessing assisted by iwi liaison and principal rural fire

iwi liaison and principal rural fire officer, Chuck Davis. The 2003 Volvo FM12 truck was

supplied by Fonterra and replaces the 1993 Isuzu that the Brigade had operated for nearly 10 years.

The truck received a mechanical overhaul and rebuild at local

engineers Stewart and Cavalier before receiving its new paint scheme at Fleet Image Te Awa-

mutu.

Deane Mark Auto Electrical supplied and installed the required emergency and operational lighting, and played a significant role in managing the project and completing final work.

Signage, emergency markings and logos were completed by Devoy Signs, and upholstery and storage locker covers were made by CH Allen Upholstery.

As well as supplying the tanker initially, Fonterra also supplied a tank venting system, and staff members Simon Ackroyd and Chris Brett provided their time to ensure drivers received training in driving the new truck.

Mayor Mylchroset and Chief

Mayor Mylchreest and Chief Fire Officer Ian Campbell said that the tanker emphasised the important working relationship between the Brigade and Council, and also the support that the Brigade received from the local community which was critical to it being able

which was critical to it being able to perform activities as it did.
District councils are responsible for fires in rural areas, but many, including Waipa District contract the first response to fires to the Fire Service and its brigades. In turn Council provided the tanker and other equipment, and assisted other brigades in the

area with annual grants.

The new tanker has a similar capacity as that it replaces, being approximately 13,000 litres, but in terms of reliability, operation and emissions is expected to be a huge improvement.

He pou whakairo ténei e pā ana ki a Mahuika, te whaea tupuna o Māui i mau ai te mauri o te ahi ki ona maikuku. Nā te mahi tinihanga a tana

mokopuna a Maui ka karawhiua e Mahuika tōna maikuku whakamutunga murara katoa ai te ngahere. Noho rawa ai te mauri o te ahi ki roto i ngā rākau pērā i te kaikomako, te rimu, te mahoe, te patate me te totara. Translation: 'This carving

Translation: 'This carving represents Mahuika, the ances

tress who possessed the secret of fire in her fingertips. Due to the deception and trickery of her grandson Māui, Mahuika cast her last fingernail and set the forest

alight.

Thus the secret properties of fire became implanted in trees such as kaikōmako, rimu, mahoe, patatē and tōtara. 'Instead of returning with fire, Maui returned to his village with dry native wood which could be rubbed together, providing people with fire whenever they needed it.'

The vibrant colours of the carving also contain the Fire Service education slogan 'Come on guys, get fire-wise'.



The Te Awamutu Brigade con-tinues to seek suitable volunteers, especially in operational support roles, as well as fire-fighters.



Question for the violent

There is a lot of talk about Family Violence at the moment, but what can you

do if you are responsible for it?
If you think you might be, how can you tell? It's more than just physical and sexual abuse; it also includes psychological and financial abuse.

A couple of simple questions anyone, male or female, can ask themselves is 'do the people in my home feel safe and relaxed around me?

Can they say what they think without

being afraid, and am I the sort of partner I would want for my own kids when they grow up?

If the answer to those questions is 'no', it might be time to think about making some changes.

First you will need to talk to someone. If you can, talk to your family, friends, or workmates

Go and see a counsellor, or call the Family Violence Helpline on 0800 456 450. Just start talking and get some supporters who will be there when you need them.

It's Not OK ambassador Vic Tamati offered this advice recently to someone

who was struggling to control his violent outbursts: 'Make an agreement with your partner now when things are cool, calm and collected.

The agreement is that when this situation (that may result in violence) comes up again and you feel the rage burning either one of you will call for a timeout. You will take 30 deep breaths and leave the house for an agreed time such 20

minutes.

'Find a place close by where you can go to calm down, go for a walk to a safe place. You must not drink, drug or drive. You must not ring one of your mates to come must not ring one of your mates to come pick you up. Find a safe place to go to. After 20 minutes go back home and check whether you can both take the time now and talk about things.

You can let your anger wash over you and know that it will pass, but abusing your family will scar them forever.

A lot of conflict stems from financial stress — so perhaps a visit to a Budget Advisor might be a good idea. Do you fly off the handle when you're drunk or stoned? Ther's support for that too.

At the end of the day, think about what sort of legacy you would like to leave for your loved ones. Do you want to be remembered with love and respect, or as a bullly who would not their processing state. bully who paid out their pain onto

everyone else?

Its custom made, retro-styled pink caravan visited Te Awamutu last week as part of a nationwide tiki-tour through small-town New

Zealand.

On board for their visit to Te Awamutu were specialist breastcare nurse Valerie Pennick and breast surgeon, Dr Alison Hayes.

"We want women everywhere to know all the signs and symptoms of breast cancer, to understand their family and lifestyle risk factors and to know what to do if they have any

Dr Hayes and Mrs Pennick answered a raft of women's questions about breast cancer.
"Our visit had an education focus, not

fundraising — that's next week."

The caravan featured displays of breast cancer symptoms that most women won't have seen before, plus male and female prosthetic breasts that allowed people to literally get a feel

breasts triat aniowed people to interainly get a reef for what a lump is like.

"We particularly want women to be aware about changes to their breasts — breast cancer's not always indicated by a lump.

"If you have any unusual breast changes

you need to see your doctor."

Visitors to the caravan were also invited to sign a petition asking the Government to extend the upper age limit for free mammogram screening from 69 to 74, bringing New Zealand into line with countries like Australia and the

UK.

The independent hearings

commissioners who heard the applications (Alan Watson and Rauru Kirikiri) also granted consent to an application to operate guided tours within the operate guide tours within the reserve with access through Maungatautari 4GIV Block.

The consents were subject to conditions.

The property at 99 Tari Road, formerly a residential dwelling, was granted Waipa District Council land use consent in July 2012 to operate as a temporary

visitors centre.

Council and MEIT are involved in ongoing litigation with the 4GIV Block Trustees.

MEIT has relied on access to the southern enclosure over an ease-ment through part of 4GIV Block

at the northern end of Tari Road. The 4GIV Block trustees are dissatisfied with MEIT activity dissatisfied with MEIT activity as it affects their property and have sought redress through the courts. There are currently three separate but related court actions between the trustees and Council/MEIT and some

the Council/MEII and some landowners.
Earlier this year MEIT applied for resource consent to construct an alternative access construct an alternative access track from Tari Road to the southern enclosure of Maungatautari Scenic Reserve. The alignment of that track avoids access over 4GIV Block

land. This application was approved in May.

The visitors centre is the administrative hub for MEIT and its volunteers. It is also the primary source of visitor educational material and information relating to Maungatautari Eco-

Due to its charitable status, MEIT is seeking to supplement its income through the ancillary hire of the centre for bookings and ad hoc events

The frequency of events is expected to be one or two per

month with no more than two in any one month. The maximum number of attendees for private

hime events is 70.
Earthworks are proposed for the construction of two on-site car parking and drop-of areas.
Collectively, the car parks

will have capacity for approximately 82 parks, with overspill available on adjacent approximately

lawn areas.

Currently the trust averages Currently the trust averages less than three tours per week through Tautari Wetland, with an average of less than four people per tour.

In the garden with Palmers



Nothing beats home grown!

October is a very busy month for all garden enthusiasts.

With more daylight available, it's possible to squeeze in a bit of gardening after dinner or early in the morning. Take a look around your garden to identify any gaps in colour or height before making a trip to your nearest Palmers. The time has arrived to pull those gloves back on and start digging!
