# What are you a slave to?

The story of Israelite freedom from Egyptian bondage is central to Passover. According to our sages, each of us is obligated to see ourselves as though we had personally come out of slavery. To do this, one must ask "what are you a slave to?"

If we are honest, we are likely enslaved to more things in our modern lives than we expect.

One form of slavery that the

Jewish community could discuss more openly is alcoholism and addiction. This Passover season, along with eating matzah and attending or hosting a Seder, I invite you to attend a unique and special performance in our sanctuary.

"Freedom Song" is a live, on-stage musical that brilliantly interweaves a Passover Seder with personal stories of addiction. The cast of Freedom Song is not a cast of actors; they are actual addicts in recovery that have broken free from the shackles of drugs, alcohol, gambling, and other destructive behaviors. Using song and dance, tears and laughter, and an intimate post-show discussion with the cast, Freedom Song will open your eyes to the real-life struggle against the disease of addiction that is being fought every day in our world and in the Jewish community.

Temple Emanu-El is grateful to partner with the Jewish Federation of Sarasota-Manatee in sponsoring this important and compelling performance. The national touring show comes from Los Angeles's Beit T'Shuvah (House of Return), a residential treatment center and spiritual community that integrates Jewish spirituality, psychotherapy, the Twelve Steps, and creative arts.

Freedom Song will be performed on Sunday, April 14th at 2:00 pm in the temple sanctuary. It is free and open to the community. Please bring friends. The performance is appropriate for ages 13 and up and teens are strongly encouraged to attend.

May this Passover help you find freedom from whatever enslaves you.



# New College Re-Dedicates Dr. Helen N. Fagin Holocaust Collection.

On February 26, New College of Florida re-dedicated the Dr. Helen N. Fagin Holocaust, Genocide and Human Rights Collection in the Jane Bancroft Cook Library. Originally named the Holocaust, Genocide and Humanitarian Collection when it opened in 2008, the collection includes books, documentaries, audio recordings and other materials pertaining to the Holocaust.

A temple member, **Dr. Helen** Fagin is a Holocaust survivor and retired University of Miami professor. She endorsed the new name for the collection to draw attention to

the persistent threat to human rights around the world. She was introduced by Susan Marks, professor

of religion and Judaic studies at New College, an ordained rabbi and TEE member.


In announcing the new name for the collection, New College President Donal O'Shea said, "The study of human rights is inextricably linked to studies of the Holocaust and genocide. For to speak of what ought to be, one must, as Dr. Fagin has taught us, have the courage to speak of the unspeakable."

O'Shea also announced the creation of the Dr. Helen N. Fagin

Student Prize, which will recognize the best undergraduate paper in the Holocaust, genocide and human rights studies. The winning essay and up to two honorable mentions will be added to the collection. The \$500 annual prize will be funded by an endowment established by the late **Sidney Fagin** in honor of his wife.

During her remarks, Dr. Fagin read to the audience a portion of her testimony that she called "Our Legacy: "We, the surviving victims of the Holocaust, bequeath to you our legacy born of suffering, pain, dehumanization, and the loss of our loved ones, in hopes that from this depth of darkness a new light will emerge in your world—a light of hope, of peace, of tolerance, and of understanding. We pass to you a symbolic torch that carries the flame of responsibility of and obligation to vouchsafe integrity, justice, and reverence for life and human dignity for all men, women, and children of the world. This is my legacy and a fitting fulfillment giving meaning to my survival."

# Rabbi Brenner Glickman was invited to present a community

perspective. Speaking of the importance of the Fagin collection, he said: "The devastation and the horror of the Holocaust have spurred in all of us the most fervent desire to make sure that this never happens again. It is so important to have the witness and testimony so that future generations will know what hatred can lead to, what xenophobia and tribalism can lead to. To know that humanity,

which is capable of so much love, is also capable of unspeakable horror."

Several of Dr. Fagin's family members were present, including her sister, Terry Dolgov, also a Holocaust survivor, and Judith E. Fagin, representing the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum in Washington, D.C., where she serves as national chair of the museum's planned giving society. Judith Fagin also served on the planning committee for the event.

Attending the ceremony was Temple member Barbara Arch, whose husband, Marty Arch, was instrumental in establishing the collection with initial gifts from the Sarasota-Manatee Holocaust Survivors Group. Many books from the former Sarasota-Manatee Arch Family Holocaust Education Center are in the permanent collection. Guests also included retired TEE Rabbi Howard Simon and his wife, Rona.

Helen Fagin was born in Poland. In 1939, World War II interrupted her studies at the Jagiellonian University in Krakow. She and her family endured unspeakable conditions in a Polish ghetto, where she ran a clandestine school for Jewish children. Dr. Fagin and her two sisters were eventually able to escape and lived under false identities until liberation by the Russian army, but her parents perished in Treblinka.

After arriving in the United States in 1946, she concentrated on learning English and pursuing her education, eventually earning her B.A. and M.A. in English from the University of Miami, where she then was on the faculty for many years. She earned her Ph.D. while teaching full time. The idea of being involved in Holocaust education was initially too painful, but Dr. Fagin reluctantly agreed to teach an evening course on the subject in the early 1970s. She found it to be exhausting and vowed

not to do it again—until she met future Nobel prize winner Elie Wiesel at a faculty reception.

"I asked him if he had nightmares," she recalls, "and he looked straight into my eyes and said, 'If you and I, who are survivors of the Holocaust, don't speak about it and teach it, then other people will approach it with their own imagination.' I knew at that moment that this was my calling."

The Dr. Helen N. Fagin Holocaust, Genocide and Human Rights Collection serves as a resource for students as well as residents and scholars from throughout Florida. To visit the collection, contact the Jane Bancroft Cook Library at 941-487-4305.

What led you to work for Temple Emanu-El? From NY, I moved to Nashville, Tennessee where I worked at Vanderbilt University. 

# A Very Special Weekend at Temple Emanu-El

A *Shabbat Alive!* service dedicated to the memory of Debbie Friedman, the dedication of a new solar array, and a book talk by a globally-recognized photographer made February 15-17 an incredibly special weekend at Temple Emanu-El!

The weekend began with the winter installment of Temple Emanu-El's signature and much-anticipated *Shabbat Alive!* service. Featuring the music and spirit of beloved composer and liturgist Debbie Friedman, this wonderful all-musical Shabbat worship experience delighted, inspired, moved, and exhilarated the packed sanctuary. Much gratitude was expressed not only to the talented Shabbat Alive! band but especially to our wonderful Temple member Phyllis Dreyfuss for generously sponsoring Shabbat Alive! and joining the service leaders on the bima. Thank you, Phyllis!

After the service, attendees gathered in the lobby to dedicate a plaque marking the donation of an enormous solar array that will allow our synagogue and school to generate 70 percent of the power we need from the sun. The array was generously underwritten by Judy Glickman Lauder—mother of Senior Rabbi Brenner Glickman—and Leonard Lauder, and installed by local solar contractor *Brilliant Harvest*.

"The congregational leaders and rabbis got together two years ago and discussed our dreams for the temple," Rabbi Glickman recalled. "We dreamed of a solar-powered campus. We wanted to help in the fight against global warming. And we wanted to be a beacon to our members and the community, an example of environmental responsibility.

"My mom wanted to make a special gift to the Temple, and we discussed different ways she could make an impact," he continued. "When I suggested solar power, that was the end of the conversation. She loved the idea. She and Leonard have been wonderful supporters of our Temple and our mission."






