To our left were tables with glasses of lemon barley water served by young men in white jackets, and then there were the long "tea tents" with queues of smartly dressed fellow guests waiting to be served.

The food was beautifully presented. Tiny finger sandwiches, minus the crusts of course, of egg or cucumber and mint, and a wonderful array of miniature strawberry, chocolate or lemon tarts and Dundee cake.

Just before 4 p.m the National Anthem was played and the Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh appeared at the top of the steps. The Royal family were ushered down the steps and introduced to several groups of waiting guests.

By this time we had decided to have a look round the gardens. There were several sweet-smelling roses and the winding pathways took us past many beds of brightly coloured azaleas. There was also a large lake with waterfowl and several summer houses.

All too soon it was time for us to catch the train back to Thirsk. We had had a lovely day in London, but we both agreed that it was nice to be home again!

The small committee of Asenby Community Space had decorated the hall with bunting, fantastic table candelabra draped with ivy and wisteria, and fairy lights. They were helped with dinner service by enthusiastic and efficient members of the 1st Topcliffe Scouts who were all presented with a signed photograph by Peter Wright. A luxury raffle included prizes such as tickets for a day at the Thirsk Races, vouchers for York Theatre Royal, dinner with wine at Lockwoods in Ripon, tea for two at Aldwark Manor, a £50 voucher to spend at a West Park Inn, a wire sculpture and a day's tuition from Asenby artist Chris Moss plus many other prizes from local businesses.



This is the third event organised by the new committee of Asenby Community Space since it took over at the end of 2016. Thanks to tremendous local support for the Christmas Mulled Wine Evening, the Pie, Pea n' Pints Night and now the May Feast, the committee has been able to bank nearly £1200 which will go towards new play

equipment and a face lift for the field that the committee hopes will draw in all age groups.

"It was just a wonderful night" said Siobhan Gifford who chairs the committee for AOS. "The hall looked amazing and everyone was in really good spirits. It felt like the very best of community events. The committee worked their socks off and we'd just like to thank all those who came along, and Peter Wright too of course. #### **Quite A Year For Our Village Hall**

It's nearly a year since the major improvement works on the village hall were completed and unbelievably it's ten months since local vet, Peter Wright, came along and performed the official re-opening ceremony. Doesn't time fly?

The refurbishment works to the front of the village hall exterior, the entrance hall and the new build toilet block were completed slightly behind schedule due to some unforeseen problems with the hall foundations and existing roof structure that needed additional work completed prior to new works being able to go ahead. These additional works resulted in an overspend of the budget allowed from grants obtained, and the extra costs are currently being met from village hall funds. It is hoped that all bills will be paid by the end of this year. I am very grateful that the main contractor, Paul Thompson Builders of Northallerton, has been exceptionally generous by both limiting the additional costs for the unscheduled works and by extending an interest-free loan to the village hall committee, for which we are very grateful.

The hall also benefited from a total re-decoration which updated and improved the look of the interior of the main hall as well as the two function rooms. The addition of a storage room has helped with the tidy storage of hall chairs and tables.

The final stage of the refurbishment project will be to fix railings around the steps, ramp and flower beds and may possibly include the construction of a wooden canopy over the entry door to allow a place for shelter from the weather and a covered area to park prams/invalid scooters etc. The committee are hoping to obtain grants to fund this final stage of refurbishment.

Since the official re-opening, the number of organisations and individuals - both local and from further afield - using the hall has increased considerably and there's every reason to believe its popularity as a venue for all sorts of events and activities will continue to grow. I'm particularly pleased that bookings for private weekend functions has risen as this obviously means that the much-improved hall and facilities are considered to be of high enough quality to attract events such as wedding receptions and anniversary parties, as well as the regular children's parties.

The installation of a hearing loop and an audio-visual suit has proved useful for several functions and it is hoped that more use of the video projection facility will be forthcoming, with a plan for regular "Film Nights" now the new blackout curtains have been fitted.

The Village Hall Committee has a strong membership which has seen a number of new members join this year. I would like to thank all committee members for their continued support and hard work in making the village hall such a success and benefit to the villages of Topcliffe & Asenby.

#### **Spending Time In The Sun**

People who spend a lot of time in the sun, whether it's for work or play, are at increased risk of skin cancer if they don't take the right precautions. If you have lots of moles or freckles, your risk of getting skin cancer is higher than average, so take extra care.



Sunburn increases your risk of skin cancer. Sunburn doesn't just

happen on holiday - you can burn in the UK, even when it's cloudy. There's no safe or healthy way to get a tan. A tan doesn't protect your skin from the sun's harmful effects. Aim to strike a balance between protecting yourself from the sun and getting enough vitamin D from sunlight.

#### Sun safety tips

- Spend time in the shade when the sun is strongest. In the UK, this is between 11am and 3pm from March to October.
- Don't rely on sunscreen alone to protect yourself from the sun. Wear suitable clothing and spend time in the shade when the sun's at its hottest.
- Sunscreen should be applied to all exposed skin, including the face, neck and ears - and head if you have thinning or no hair - but a wide-brimmed hat is better.
- Sunscreen needs to be reapplied liberally and frequently, and according to the manufacturer's instructions. This includes applying it straight after you've been in water - even if it's "water resistant" - and after towel drying, sweating, or when it may have rubbed off.
- Make sure the sunscreen is not past its expiry date. Most sunscreens have a shelf life of two to three years. Don't spend any longer in the sun than you would without sunscreen.
- If sunscreen is applied too thinly, the amount of protection it gives is reduced. If you're worried you might not be applying enough SPF15, you could use a stronger SPF30 sunscreen.
- Take extra care to protect babies and children.
  Their skin is much more sensitive than adult skin, and damage caused by repeated exposure to sunlight could lead to skin cancer developing in later life. Children aged under six months should be kept out of direct strong sunlight.
- A day at the beach without proper eye protection can cause a temporary but painful burn to the surface of the eye, similar to sunburn. Reflected sunlight from snow, sand, concrete and water, and artificial light from sunbeds, is particularly dangerous.

#### How to deal with sunburn:

Sponge sore skin with cool water, then apply soothing aftersun or calamine lotion. Painkillers, such as paracetamol or ibuprofen, will ease the pain by helping to reduce inflammation caused by sunburn. Seek medical help if you feel unwell or the skin swells badly or blisters. Stay out of the sun until all signs of redness have gone.

#### **New Art Class For The Village Hall**

Art Connections" run by husband and wife artists, Barry & Vivien Wilton-Middlemass, intend to start new art workshops, with sessions commencing in September every Monday between 1pm to 4pm in the village hall.

The workshops will mainly concentrate on watercolour techniques, to enable everyone from beginners to experienced artists to enhance and improve their own styles. Acrylics and oil painting could be introduced if required. Cost of the workshop will be announced later when definite dates are available for the start of the sessions.

Barry and Vivien are both SAA Professional Associates and Barry has had paintings exhibited in The Mall Galleries London, and was recently "shortlisted" in The Yorkshire Life Landscape Painter of the Year! Vivien (FRSA) brings a loose colourful style into our Workshops including the new medium of "Brusho" a delicate watercolour powder painting method.

Both Artists have exhibited locally over the last few years in Helmsley Art Centre and NYMNP Centre Danby plus other venues.

From May 25 to 29 Barry/Vivien and 4 other artists will be exhibiting at a newly opened venue inside Helmsley Parish Church.
