#### **Our Opportunity Awaits!**

Thank you to everyone that participated in our in-pew survey as well as those who completed it online a couple weeks ago. The big question is, *What was this for and how does it relate to St. Raymond?* Over the past couple weeks, you have been briefly made aware of projects that St. Raymond looks to address. Additionally, reference has been made to the *To Teach Who Christ Is (TTWCI)* campaign.

Back in 2012, Cardinal George and the Archdiocese decided to embark on a campaign to strengthen faith formation efforts within the Archdiocese. Each parish was asked to support this one-time capital and endowment campaign. Part of the effort is directed toward Archdiocesan needs, with funds earmarked for scholarships to Catholic schools, training for religious education catechists, innovative religious education programs and other critical facility needs. The added benefit of this campaign is that the **larger portion** of the funds generated by our parish, **remain with St. Raymond** to help strengthen and benefit our needs.

As you recall, in 2012 and for the next few years, St. Raymond was in the midst of its own *Upholding the Tradition* campaign. Because of this, St. Raymond requested and was granted permission to delay participation in this new Archdiocesan campaign as long as possible before the Archdiocesan campaign was completed. Following the completion of our *Upholding the Tradition* campaign in 2015, it is now our turn to take part in this Archdiocesan-wide effort.

In short, for the *TTWCI* campaign, each parish is given a minimum campaign target set by the Archdiocese and based on our annual offertory. How does this impact St. Raymond? Aside from our portion that goes to *TTWCI*, the parish has the opportunity to address its own needs under our own campaign title. There is a range of projects we know must be addressed to prolong the functionality of our parish facilities. These potential projects were all outlined in the survey questions you previously reviewed.

We have an extraordinary opportunity to take care of our most pressing campus projects. At this time, St. Raymond is in the planning stages of a campaign to satisfy the requirements of the Archdiocesan *TTWCI* campaign as well as our local needs. We are beyond grateful for your participation in the survey. It's important the parish listens and includes what you deem to be of a high priority project based on your survey responses and what we already know to be important. We will use the survey results to help develop a list of the St. Raymond campaign projects and the corresponding target goal for these local projects. These local projects, coupled with our share of the *TTWCI* campaign, will shape the magnitude of the campaign.


# **Through Our Alms We Touch the World**



On more occasions than I care to count, people will comment to me, "Ignatian spirituality does not have enough to do with Jesus. All you hear about is *finding God in all things*." While in my head I am thinking of all the things I *really* would like to say in response to that comment, I typically take a deep breath and ask them, "Have you ever gone through the Spiritual Exercises? They are all about Jesus and a relationship with him!"

Here are the top five things the Spiritual Exercises taught me about Jesus.

- 1. **Jesus was human.** This understanding deepened within me during the Second Week of the Exercises as I prayed with the nativity Scriptures, holding a six-month-old in my arms. It was really Mary who showed me Jesus' humanity, as a mother nurturing her infant son. Mary carried, birthed, and loved a child. I carried, birthed, and loved a child. The infant Jesus went through all the phases of growing up that my own children go through.
- 2. **Jesus discerned his Father's will.** Praying through the Exercises helped me understand that Jesus grew in wisdom and understanding. Jesus asked his Father, "What is my next right step?" I, too, am called to ask God, Jesus' Father, what is my "next right step?"
- 3. **Jesus gets suffering.** At times Jesus' discernment of his Father's will led him to some challenging situations: mockery by family and friends, unwelcome in his home town, betrayal by friends, and physical pain. Walking alongside Jesus and praying with Jesus' experiences of suffering, especially during the Third Week of the Exercises, showed me how Jesus, a human (see #1), felt pain. Jesus gets our suffering because he experienced his own share in his life.
- 4. **Jesus remained rooted in his Father.** Through all of the challenging times Jesus faced, he trusted in his Father and turned to him in time of need for strength on his journey. With his Father's help, Jesus entered Jerusalem and faced his death. What does Jesus' dependence on his Father teach me? That when my own discernment leads me to face challenging situations, I, too, can lean on God, and God will walk with me through the journey.
- 5. **Jesus was hopeful.** Jesus' hope came from his trust in God. Jesus understood that his passion was necessary for God to complete the rest of the plan—the Resurrection. Because Jesus was hopeful, I have a reason for hope in my own life. Because of Jesus' trust in God, I have a reason to believe that in tough times, light will eventually come.

What have the Spiritual Exercises taught you about Jesus?

#### There are two parts to complete your registration:

- Completing the online registration form.
- Setting up a payment schedule Smart Tuition. \*Families who do not set up a payment schedule via Smart Tuition (or pay in full by check) by July 31st will be assessed the \$50 Late Fee.\*

Payment on Smart Tuition alone does not count as registration and will not reserve a space in class.

# **Ordinary Goodness and our Spiritual Journey**

The spirituality writer, Tom Stella, tells a story about three monks at prayer in their monastery chapel. The first monk imagines himself being carried up to heaven by the angels. The second monk imagines himself already in heaven, chanting God's praises with the angels and saints. The third monk cannot focus on any holy thoughts but can only think about the great hamburger he had eaten just before coming to chapel. That night, when the devil was filing his report for the day, he wrote: "Today I tried to tempt three monks, but I only succeeded with two of them."

There's more depth to this story that initially meets the eye. I wish that, years ago, I had grasped how both angels and great hamburgers play a role in our spiritual journey. You see, for too many years, I identified the spiritual quest with only explicit religious thoughts, prayers, and actions. If I was in church, I was spiritual, whereas if I was enjoying a good meal with friends, I was merely human. If I was praying and could concentrate my thoughts and feelings on some holy or inspiring thing, I felt I was praying and was, for that time, spiritual and religious; whereas if I was distracted, fatigued, or too sleepy to concentrate, I felt I had prayed poorly. When I was doing explicitly religious things or making more-obvious moral decisions, I felt religious, everything else was, to my mind, mere humanism.

While I was not particularly Manichaean or negative on the things of this world, nonetheless the good things of creation (of life, of family and friendship, of the human body, of sexuality, of food and drink) were never understood as spiritual, as religious. In my mind, there was a pretty sharp distinction heaven and earth, the holy and the profane, the divine and the human, between the spiritual and the earthly. This was especially true for the more earthy aspects of life, namely, food, drink, sex, and bodily pleasures of any kind. At best, these were distractions from the spiritual; at worst, they were negative temptations tripping me up, obstacles to spirituality.

But, by stumbling often enough, we eventually learn: I tried to live like the first two monks, with my mind on spiritual things, but the third monk kept tripping me up, ironically not least when I was in church or at prayer. While in church or at prayer and trying to force mind and heart onto the things of the spirit, I would forever find myself assailed by things that, supposedly, had no place in church: memories and anticipations of gatherings with friends, anxieties about relationships, anxieties about unfinished tasks, thoughts about my favorite sports

teams, thoughts of wonderful meals with pasta and wine, of grilled steaks and bacon-burgers, and, most pagan of all, sexual fantasies that seemed the very antithesis of all that's spiritual.

It took some years and better spiritual guidance to learn that a many of these tensions were predicated on a poor and faulty understanding of Christian spirituality and of the real dynamics of prayer.

The first faulty understanding had to do with misunder-standing God's intent and design in creating us. God did not design our nature in one way, that is, to be sensual and to be so rooted deeply in the things of this earth, and then demand that we live as if we were not corporeal and as if the good things of this earth were only sham and obstacles to salvation, as opposed to being an integral part of salvation. Moreover, the incarnation, the mystery of God becoming corporeal, sensual, taking on human flesh, teaches unequivocally that we find salvation not by escaping the body and the things of this earth but by entering them more deeply and correctly. Jesus affirmed the resurrection of the bodily, not the flight of the soul.

The second misunderstanding had to do with the dynamics of prayer. Initially, in its early stages, prayer is about focus and concentration on the sacred, on conversations with God, on trying to leave aside, for a time, the things of this world to enter into the realm of the sacred. But that's the early stage of prayer. Eventually, as prayer deepens and matures, in the words of John of the Cross, the important things begin to happen under the surface and sitting in chapel with God is not unlike sitting down with someone you sit down with regularly. If you visit someone on a daily basis you won't each day have deep, intense conversations; mostly you will talk about everyday things, family concerns, the weather, sports, politics, the latest TV programs, food, and so on - and you'll find yourself looking at your watch occasionally. It's the same with our relationship to God. If you pray regularly, daily, you don't have to agonize about concentrating and keeping the conversation focused on deep, spiritual things. You only have to be there, at ease with a friend. The deep things are happening under the surface.
