

FROM OUR DESIGNATED PASTOR...

Dear Friends,

A few years back, about this time of year, my husband's father died. Vernon, my father-in-law was and is and I believe always will be a great man of faith. He was an elder in the Presbyterian Church, faithful worshipper of God, and devoted servant in too many ways to count. He was a great love for many people, including me. And I think during the time of Lent, it was most impressive that somehow, his body, mind, and soul chose this time to fade. The grass withers, the flowers fade. . . our bodies are dust and to dust they shall return. People of faith die beside those who are just beginning to open their eyes to the largeness of God's grace. The thief dies beside the King of the Jews. The atheist and agnostic die beside the Christian and Jew. And all who can see, whether or not it's all their lives, like Vernon, or at the last minute, like the thief. . . will see the glory of God in their last breath. . . and we will take them off the cross, off their death bed and carry them to a tomb or casket to be buried. Seems like an ending, when in reality, it's only the beginning.

"I am the Alpha and the Omega, the beginning and the ending." says someone named John who has a vision of eternity and a vision of God's presence with us. God will determine the ending. Our bodies are finite, but our souls live forever. Vernon, the truest, most divine sense of Vernon. . .that part that was made in the image of God, lives forever with God. And how do I know? It's by the fruits that blessed me and the rest of the world when he was alive on earth for me to know him. It's by the fruits of the confession of the thief on the cross. . .I believe. I serve. I am not worthy, but I/we belong to You, great Creator!

Lent is a good time to die, both literally and figuratively. It's a good time to recognize that

we are dusty, sinful earthly creatures and a good time to let go of that part of ourselves as best we can right now in this time of our journey. And it's a good time to recognize whose we are. Jesus turned towards the thief and said he would be with him in paradise! Paradise! Everlasting life is like paradise. A place of beauty and glory! A place of grace and wholeness. A place where so much love surrounds and embodies us that we cannot even imagine now. Easter is a time to celebrate that God rolls away the dead stones of our lives. . .the ones that that carry weights and burdens. Easter is a time to celebrate that God makes all things new! God raises us, like his very Son, to new and glorious places even while we are here on earth, so we may see the glimpses of heaven that await us.

I saw the glimpses of heaven in Vernon as he smiled when I brought him his favorite pie, as he cheerfully and willingly offered help to others, as he extended his love to his family and friends in so many ways. I've seen glimpses of heaven in you as we have worshipped together, met together in committee meetings, worked together at Culver's and visioned together what the future of St. John UCC might be. Christ has risen! Christ has risen indeed! And because of that resurrection, we can also spring forth like Easter bulbs: new life, new passion, new energy and new ways of being Christ in the world, in the community and in each other!

The Reverend Justo González, II, M.Div., M.S.S.A., M.A.P.M.



Energetic and dynamic, the Reverend Justo González, II, brings a love of God and compassion to his ministry, social activism and community engagement. He came to the Illinois Conference in October 2018 to serve as Interim

Conference Minister. Previously, he served as the Associate Conference Minister for the Michigan Conference.

González, II, the youngest of seven children born to Isaias and Bernarda González, Puerto Rican immigrants who migrated to Buffalo as part of the first wave of Latinos in Western New York.

"My dad taught me that service to others is service to God. His activism helped many obtain justice from oppressive structures and helped to bring about bilingual (now multilingual) education in Buffalo Public Schools. Mom taught me to pray. She was a profound woman of faith. She would pray 3 to 4 hours per day. I try to combine my mother's spirituality and faith with my father's passion for justice for all of God's people."

He is a passionate activist on issues of immigrant rights, worker and women's rights, educational justice, equality and extravagant welcome for all of God's children. He believes and is actively living a "people first and who the hell cares about papers" philosophy that is challenging 45's war against immigrants and refugees. He and his previous congregations are actively challenging US Customs & Border Patrol and ICE by housing undocumented aliens and allowing a variety of community groups and activists to use their space at no charge.

"I am so proud of that fact. Our community of faith and the activists within among us are bold, prophetic risk takers. Our work is a team effort. We are on the right side of justice and history."

Gonzalez earned his undergraduate degree at Medialle College in Media Communications (1983). Additionally, he has earned three Master's degrees. He was awarded a Masters in Social Administration (Counseling) from Case Western Reserve University, Cleveland, OH (1993), a Master's in Divinity from the Iliff School of Theology, Denver, CO (1996) and a third in Pastoral Ministry from Christ the King Seminary, East Aurora, NY (2001). He has also earned Doctor of Ministry credit hours from Barry University, Miami, FL. Most recently he completed his Master of Fool-ology degree from SAK Comedy Lab where he finished his training in Improv Comedy. He started ENC Improv in October 2013 and offers free Improv training for the community as part of his ministry. He is also trained as a professional Chaplain and a professional Life Coach.

CONSENT AGENDA APPROVAL

It was moved and seconded to approve the consent agenda as submitted. All voting aye the motion passed.

PASTOR'S REPORT

- Pastor Laurie submitted her report and pointed out that she is now certified as a "Healing Arts Facilitator". She's always had an interest in art and decided that she wanted to take a course on her own and hopes to use this in her ministry.
- She will be taking Study Leave Time on Tuesday, April 23rd – Monday, April 29th. This includes one Sunday off. She will be bringing the reading list to the next council meeting. Her contract does allow for time off for this. At this time that Sunday service leader has not been decided.

OLD BUSINESS

- A. Pictorial Directory Work is continuing. Photos will be returned after being scanned for the directory.
- B. Technology Ministry Work has been started in adding new technology to the sanctuary. More will be done in this ongoing project, until it's completed. 

PORK PROJECT



Farm to Table is a growing movement in this country. Farmers markets are more popular than ever. Restaurants are growing their own herbs and buying locally

grown meat and vegetables. It is a great way to get better quality food and support the local economy.

Right here at St. John UCC we have our own Farm to Table program. It is called the Pork Project and it makes locally grown pork available to the clients of food pantries in Lincoln. This joint project of St. John UCC and Immanuel Lutheran churches collects money for processing the pork which is donated by local pork producers. That's right - these pork producers provide the pigs and all we have to do is provide the processing.

Please pick up an envelope in the back of the sanctuary and fill it with your donation any time during the month of April. You will be doing your

part to help provide good quality meat for the hungry families of Logan County.

We celebrate Earth Day on April 22, so this is a good time to celebrate our new addition - The Giving Tree. Stop by on your way into church and take a look at all the ways you can help to protect the Earth. But not only are we helping to keep God's creation beautiful, we are helping our neighbors at the same time. These are projects benefit the Earth as well as the people who live here.

As a reminder:

 Caps and Lids - Plastic caps and lids have been donated to Zion Lutheran Church to support Heifer Project and to the Atlanta 4H clubs for a park bench. These caps may include those from containers such as milk, juice and detergent bottles. The lids come from containers such as cottage cheese and margarine.

- Pop tabs The tabs are taken to Ronald McDonald House in Springfield and Peoria where they help to provide housing for families of children who are hospitalized or in treatment.
- Aluminum Cans The money raised from the can collection is sent to our sister church - St. John in Chicago.
- Athletic shoes Used and worn out athletic shoes are taken to Nike outlets. They are ground up and used for playground and court surfaces.
- Printer cartridges Used ink cartridges are also used to support Ronald McDonald House
- **Eye glasses** These are given to the Lion's Club for their eye glass projects.
- Cell phones The phones are given to Ronald McDonald House to use as emergency phones for their clients.
- Cancelled stamps We give the stamps to the catholic church. They are a source of income for the nuns.
- Box tops West Lincoln Broadwell School was the latest recipient of box tops. These are used to provide needed equipment for the school.
- Prescription bottles Bottles with lids (labels removed) will be given to the health department for re-use by local veterinarians.
- Re-chargeable batteries Our only goal here is to keep these things out of the landfill!
- **Bingo prizes** Our group who organizes Bingo at St. Clara's is always looking for prizes that those in the nursing home will enjoy.
- Christian Child Care This bucket includes a
 variety of items that can be used for crafts for
 the kids. Toilet paper and paper towel rolls,
 egg cartons and anything else that can be used
 for crafts are welcome.
- Greeting cards New cards are used in the pew folders and given to Logan/Mason Rehab.
 Used cards are used for craft projects.
- Food pantry Obviously, this is not a recycling project! We collect food items every month for the Community Action Food Pantry.
- Diapers We collect money for diapers for children in Early Head Start. There is no

- money in the budget for diapers and parents can't always afford enough diapers for the day.
- Brooklyn We support Brooklyn through Children, Inc. She is a third grader who lives in Salyersville, Kentucky.

drop prescription containers off in the Recycle Corner and they will be delivered.




