Message from The Venerable Master



Salve Frater et Amici!

Forsooth, me spies a light at the end of yon tunnel! Okay, that is about the limit of my waxing Shakespearean. Patience and understanding has brought us all this far during these difficult times to a point where we are finally ready to begin the process of reconnecting and reengaging life in our Valley. It is my hope that this good news finds you all well, healthy and eager to recover some of our fellowshipping that we has been on hold for the past 7 plus months.

Let me begin with the reengagement news of life in our Valley. Beginning in October we will have what we are calling a soft reopening. This means that we will once again begin having our Executive Meetings on the first Wednesday of each month as before. For the time being the Executive Meeting will begin at 6:45 p.m. and run through 7:25 p.m. We will return to the original time at a future date. We will then have our usual and customary Stated Meeting upstairs beginning at 7:30 p.m. There will be no social or meal served prior to the meeting until a future date when deemed safer and more appropriate. All precautions during both of these meetings will be maintained (i.e.: masks recommended, social distancing required and it is recommended to avoid handshakes and hugs). Of course none of these are dictated, but are highly recommended and nobody will think differently of any brother who either adheres to or abstains from these practices, of course.

Other meetings may also commence meeting at the Scottish Rite Building once again (committee meetings, etc.) providing the same temporary restrictions remain in place (NO FOOD, masks, social distancing. etc.). This means that Coffee Klatch will also remain on hold until a future date.

Supreme Council has created and approved (for at least this fall) a Virtual Reunion that will be conducted in the very near future under the leadership and guidance of our S.G.I.G., MW David Nielsen. More information will be forthcoming in the very near future. This may be the opportunity for those that just can't travel to Billings for a couple days or otherwise would join our Valley if time, distance or scheduling challenges have otherwise prevented a masonic brother from becoming a Scottish Rite mason. We also have a few brothers that have been waiting in the wings to unite with our wonderful organization who were also sidelined due to COVID. So, this is a good time to start talking it up in your Blue Lodges.

In my opening paragraph I touched on patience and how it has helped us, (me definitely) along in our absence from active Scottish Rite life this year. 

When discussed locally, I heard a range of opinions about an online Reunion and agree with many of the pros and cons. The Valley of Billings extends from Plentywood in the Northeast to Alzada to Southeast corners of the state. Some of our potential candidates could be a 6-hour drive from our Temple. We can focus on the opportunity to be able to provide our teachings to a Brother that otherwise might not make the trip. Like our G. C. Jim Cole said, "candidates are not joining us for our great ritual work, but more so to be a part of our great fraternity." Ultimately, I would rather look back and know that we gave it a try versus staying stagnant.

Also, I recently had the privilege of attending our Knights of St. Andrew's study group via ZOOM. The KSA have been meeting for a couple decades to study our Degrees, and this is the first time that they have met using this medium. These Gentlemen meet on the third Wednesday of the month at 5:30pm. A ZOOM invite is sent the day before to those who want to participate. This is a great time to join this group and learn more about the Scottish Rite as they just completed the 4th and will be discussing the 5th on October 21st at 5:30pm. THE RITE CORNER



"Going Forward" David L. Nielsen, S.G.I.G. In Montana

During the pandemic curtailment of our customary Masonic events our Scottish Rite Reunions were either cancelled or postponed. The Valleys throughout the Southern Jurisdiction of Scottish Rite are anxious to start getting back into the Reunion business. Though many enjoy the in-person presentation of the degrees in a Reunion, whether conferred or communicated, we recognize that this in-person experience may not be safe for all our members and candidates for the remainder of 2020 at least and maybe longer. The Supreme Council

with the direction of the Grand Commander a script was developed that may be used to help communicate all the degrees, including the mandatory five, in a virtual Reunion. In the Supreme Council Statutes, the mandatory degrees must be conferred, except that the SGIG or Deputy may communicate the mandatory degrees provided he does so personally. Under our Statutes the recording of the conferral of degrees is prohibited, but the degrees may all be communicated with the active participation of the SGIG or Deputy. With this guidance, I met with the Personal Representatives of the six Valleys in the Orient of Montana to discuss if there was interest to do a virtual Orient-wide Reunion through Zoom. After much discussion, the consensus was to do a virtual Reunion through communication of the degrees. The dates selected are November 7, 2020, starting at 9:00 a.m. for the 4th through the 17th degree (Lodge of Perfection and Chapter of Rose Croix) and December 5, 2020 at 9:00 a.m. for the 18th degree through the 32nd (Council of Kadosh and Consistory). Each Valley agreed to provide knowledgeable brethren to lead the communication on the degrees and I will communicate the five mandatory ones.

As we engaged in the discussion of whether to do a Reunion in a different way, it became apparent that this alternate Reunion is not a means to "just get by," but an opportunity to provide meaningful Scottish Rite education by a different method. This will provide a new Reunion experience and the presentation of the lessons of degrees in this form is expected to be educationally enlightening over other Reunion experiences. Often Reunions are viewed only as a process of initiation of new brothers, but Reunions have always been an event for all brothers to attend and renew their vows, recall the lessons learned, and learn new lessons. Every reunion I have ever attended, I always learn something that I had missed in previous reunions or studies of the degrees.

As we slug through the pandemic and its expectation of personal isolation and discouragement of personal interaction, we can either moan and have a fit over this strange new "normal" or we can use it as stimulation to innovate ways to move forward in a satisfying and productive manner. Who knows, maybe the changes experienced now through adjustments in our lifestyle and social interactions of our fraternity may have greater value than expected and may become the new accepted practice. We need to view this time as an opportunity for learning and growth, since the status quo has for so long beguiled us into rote complacency. The dawn is awaking for new experiences and opportunities. Let's grab it and profit from it.

Stay tuned for the **Orient Reunions** scheduled for **November 7, 2020, at 9:00 a.m. and December 5, 2020, at 9:00 a.m. Both are via Zoom.**

(the patience of Job) and what he endured, while he remained unshaken in his faith and his resolve. Although we teach in our Blue Lodges a lecture identifying the cardinal virtues, while patience is not listed as one, it is most certainly a virtue, and arguably a virtue of the highest importance. "It is amazing how far a little patience or impatience can go to change a moment, a life, lives, or even history." "Usually people are impatient when the moment calls for patience, but sometimes people can be too patient when the moment calls for a little impatience in order to put an early end to what eventually may become a disastrous situation." (P. Winston, 2011). I certainly think that a lack of patience in the face of recent health and safety concerns could have easily created a disastrous result. It was not an easy thing for any of us as masons to put our masonic activities on hold all this time, as it is just not what we do or what we are all about. Yet, we did and remained patient. Impatience is a dangerous thing. The Holy Writings have taught us all that from the beginning, "The first tragedy, namely, Adam's eating from the forbidden fruit also involved a lack of patience." Additionally, patience, is the sense of trusting in the Great Architect and letting things take their course. Impatience is caused by a false feeling of control over our destiny, and as we learn to relinquish that control to the GAOTU our patience grows, together with our spirituality.

So, as we re-open, reengage and start to see the fruits of our patience, witnessing our Valley come back to life, I encourage all of us to consider, if you feel comfortable coming back to Lodge in October as we begin to kick things once again into gear and get back into the swing of Scottish Rite Masonic life in Montana!

May the Great Architect watch over you always!


LOOK WHAT I FOUND IN THE LIBRARY
