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The Radyr Court



Work has started to restore this very old building back to something exciting and good, hosting a coffee shop, quality restaurant, bar and private function suite

Snippets of history; Did you know? The name DANESCOURT comes from **DANES**brook Manor and Radyr COURT farm of which is now The Radyr Court. In 1469 Thomas Mathew, the third or fourth son of Sir David Mathew(died 1484) of Llandaf, inherited the land through marriage to Catherine, heiress of Radyr, and built Danesbrook manor house on the site of what is now The Radyr Court pub. The house was used as a court and although it was largely destroyed by a fire in the 19th century, the three large dungeons survived and can still be seen at the Inn. On Thomas' death shortly before 1470, his lands passed to his eldest son David and then to his younger son William Mathew (died 1528), who was knighted by King Henry VII at the Battle of Bosworth in 1485. Sir William accompanied Henry VIII to the Field of the Cloth of Gold in 1520. His successor was his eldest son Sir George Mathew who became MP for Glamorgan constituency and in 1545 Sheriff of Glamorgan.

Sir George created a deer park that partially caused the decline of the family fortune, as it ranged so far north of Radyr that it caused the previous income from tenant farmers to cease when they were evicted from their farms. He also had 24 children. (he was more fertile than the land his tenants farmed) eight of whom were illegitimate. Many were daughters and Sir George needed large sums of money for their dowries. On his death Sir George's lands passed to his eldest son William, who also became a Member of Parliament and invested in the Pentyrch ironworks. This was an astute move as feudalism was giving way to early industrialisation. William's descendants inherited a diminishing fortune. Captain George Mathew, the last of the family to live in Radyr, married Elizabeth Poyntz and the couple departed from Radyr to live on her estates at Thurles in County Tipperary (apparently it's a long way to....), Ireland during 1625.

Radyr's new owner was a wealthy landowner, Sir Edward Lewis who was knighted by James I. Sir Edward owned St Fagans Castle and its surrounding lands, scene of the Battle of St Fagans in the English Civil War. The Lewis fortune passed to Elizabeth Lewis, who married the Other Windsor, 3rd Earl of Plymouth, the principal landowner in Cardiff, Penarth and Barry. A survey in 1766 shows that the Plymouth family owned the freeholds of most of Radyr. It continues to do so today.

The probable reason the house was built where it is, is because of "In the parish is a spring of very cold water, called Y Pistyll Goleu, "the bright waterspout," issuing from the side of a hill, under a considerable depth of earth over a limestone rock: it has by some writers been termed mineral" and sure enough under an unassuming manhole cover in a garden we have discovered a very old stone well down to the underground spring. Tastings commence soon???

Dick and Steve, (local lads) with the guidance of a cool designer Tim Rice are sympathetically and professionally injecting new life into this grand old building and will be opening this quality venue this summer (2014). Lots of jobs are available and further releases will be made nearer opening.

CHAIN COOKERY CORNER

Chocolate and Cherry or Blackcurrant Muffins

Very rich and indulgent muffins. I like to use frozen blackcurrants and you hit that gorgeous fruit when you take a bite. Makes 15

Heat oven 200C or Gas 6

200g (7oz) softened unsalted butter

150g (5oz) caster sugar

4 medium eggs

200g (7oz) strong white flour

1¹/₂ tsp baking powder

Pinch salt

Splash milk

150g (5oz) dark chocolate, chopped

470g jar pitted morello cherries drained or

200g (7oz) frozen blackcurrants

Place paper cases in muffin tray or line muffin moulds with scrunched squares of parchment.

Cream butter and sugar together until light

Gradually beat in eggs

Sift flour, baking powder and salt

Fold into mixture with milk

Add chocolate and two thirds fruit

Share between paper cases

Press remaining fruit into surface

Bake for 15-20 minutes until golden and firm

Sieve a little icing sugar over to serve

IMPROVING AWARENESS TO HELP THOSE WITH DEMENTIA

Dementia is a very real challenge for some of us as we age. One in three of us will have a form of dementia at the time of our deaths and currently one in five people over the age of 80 has dementia. By 2021, the number of people with the condition in Wales is projected to increase by almost a third, but it could rise by as much as 44% in some rural areas. The Welsh Government has invested more than £130m in capital funding to provide new elderly mental health facilities across Wales.

The National Dementia Vision for Wales, which is now part of the Together for Mental Health strategy sets out the Welsh Government's commitment to provide support for people in Wales with dementia and their families. It identifies priorities, including early diagnosis and more timely interventions and improving information and support for people with dementia and their carers.

Lifelong learning in the health and social care field in contemporary Wales goes far beyond the narrow confines of the workplace. It is known that making life as good as it can be for some of our most disadvantaged fellow citizens depends upon changing the attitudes of society at large. Nowhere is that more true than in the field of mental health. The third sector has an especially important part to play in helping to change attitudes and challenge stigma.

As the vast majority of people with dementia live in the community, this is a good place to start. Having dementia-friendly and supportive environments – for example in local shops, cafes, libraries or leisure facilities – where people understand dementia, is at the heart of this.

Sadly, less than half of people with dementia say that they feel part of their local community. Last month, the Alzheimer's Society launched their Dementia Friends Wales programme. In an effort to tackle the social isolation often experienced by people living with dementia, this programme aims to make people aware of and understand more about dementia; raise awareness of available help and support amongst people with dementia and their carers;

and to help people with dementia feel included in their community, be more independent and have more choice and control over their lives.

The Alzheimer's Society wants 4,000 people in Wales to attend a Dementia Friends session by 2015. A dementia friend is someone who takes part in an information session and learns more about what it's like to live with dementia. They are then able to turn this understanding into practical action which can help someone with dementia in their community. Both Kevin Brennan MP and I are strong supporters of the campaign to create dementia friendly communities in Wales.

It provides a set of learning opportunities for anyone willing to be part of this collective effort. That can be from something as small as going along to a short information session, through to becoming a Dementia Friends Champion which involves encouraging others to make a positive difference to people living with dementia in the local community.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR REPORT FOR MAY 2014

Bus Service: I have raised the reduced bus service at Council and at Environment Scrutiny; I stated that this cut will save little or no money but will create hardship; other Councillors in north Cardiff agreed with my concerns. It was agreed that Ramesh Patel, Cabinet Member for transport, be asked to write to Welsh Government and Cardiff Bus to point this out. It was also agreed to ask Cardiff Bus Commercial Director to appear before committee to explain rationale of each imposed cut. I have asked that the redundant bus shelter at Ynys Bridge be moved to Lougher Estate and I have obtained agreement to my suggestion of an additional bus stop on Bryn Derwen. I point out that the new 66 service operates in the morning and does give a service to Morganstown; it also gives connection to Canton.

NatWest: I raised closure with UK Chief Executive of NatWest and received an explanation but no change of policy. With other local representatives I met Rhian Head, Local Director and Mark Douglas, Regional Director for Wales on Tuesday, 20th May. We pointed out that the closure is contrary to assurances given two years ago and that it is premature given the current lack of alternative facilities for paying-in. We did get some concessions but on the substantive point of closure they were immovable.

Post Office: I have sent a detailed letter in reply to consultation document about proposed changes which seem perverse as they give a worse service without making any obvious financial saving.

Road Repairs: I have asked for an immediate assessment of repair to Craig Hir which is of poor quality and this is being done. The damaged areas on Llantrisant Road have been repaired and the area near Ynys Bridge is about to be done. I have reported many pot holes and these have been repaired.

Pavement of Heol Isaf: Last year I arranged a site visit with a highways engineer so that he could hear the concerns of Cheshire Home residents about the risk of being diverted in a wheelchair on to Heol Isaf. Martin, a resident, pointed out the numerous hazards and the current repair is intended to address the worse of these.

Local Development Plan: Later this month we shall see the final draft of the plan before it is presented to Cardiff Council on 26th June for approval. Unless the final draft provides for extended phasing of local building works, I believe that I and your other local representatives will be arguing that the plan is unsound on

account of failing to address the acknowledged problems of roads and transport systems being grossly overloaded. Accompanied by members of the North West Cardiff Group I met the responsible cabinet member and senior council officers to explain our concerns; subsequently I expressed these to the Leader of Cardiff Council at a private meeting.

Speed disclosing sign near Maes yr Awel: I have asked that this be repaired.

Household Waste Reclamation Centre: I pointed out the nonsense of closing Waungron Road, the best used HWRC and the one best placed to serve the north west of our city and an area which has a high level of recycling; this folly is compounded by closing it before opening a new facility at Wedal Road and before the Wedal Road site has obtained planning permission local residents are opposing strongly this plan. None of our HWRCs was operating properly due to poor working practices and appaling management; the users of the site were not properly directed as to the proper bins to use and consequently, a contractor was employed at outrageous cost to post sort the intake - a necessary process to meet the Welsh Government imposed recycling target. Frankly, my suggestion was to keep the site open and discipline the management and staff but this was not accepted.

Cold Calling Zones: It is possible to prevent cold callers from visiting a given area but not to prevent cold calling by telephone. Please contact me if you are interested.

Radyr & Morganstown Festival: At the conclusion of another festival I would like to thank the principal organisers and all helpers for a huge array of events which gave us great pleasure as well as raising a substantial sum for the designated charity, LATCH.

HMS Dragon: I attended the Freedom of City ceremony and also enjoyed a tour of the ship which uses wonderful technology to operate in such diverse ways as shooting down offensive guided missiles attacking a convoy and protecting against pirate attack.

Neighbourhood Management: I am appointed as chairman of this committee which seeks to harness various support organisations and make them coordinate their efforts to alleviate concerns of the residents of North West Cardiff.

Education: During the last month I have been part of a selection panel seeking to bring much needed senior resources to advance the improvement of our school system.

THIRD WEEK IN AUGUST:

A REVIEW OF RADYR DRAMATIC SOCIETY'S PRODUCTION. APRIL 2014

Caravanning is rather like Marmite: either you love it or hate it. There are those whose ideal holiday is spending a week or two in a reduced scale version of home with as many conveniences as can be shoehorned into the confined space. And there are many veterans of such holidaying.

Take Neville and Mary Winthrop, for instance. They've been doing it for so long that they can't agree on how many years they have notched up. But they do like to argue about it. Neville is the know-all-about-caravans type: has every gadget, two of all the tools you're ever likely to need as well as those you don't and advice and opinions to spare. Mary, long-suffering wife, playing the complains endlessly, but when given the option of going abroad instead, thinks of so many drawbacks that another year of caravanning is inevitable.

Martin Jeeves and Jane Sinclair brought these characters vividly (or should that be grotesquely?) to life. Yet their caravan was not in view. Given the smallness of the Morganstown Village Hall stage, it was no mean feat to have (parts of) two caravans on set – a tribute to set designer and builder Dave Burgess and his team. In the one was amiable Sue, a singleton looking for a relaxing holiday and an opportunity to write a play, but finding neither. 

Colin The Gardener's To Do List

Prevent Sweet Peas from drying out by soaking the soil at least once a week and covering with a thick layer of mulch to retain moisture.

Continue to pick daily to prevent the seed pods from developing (which will make the plant die out) - and use the beautifully scented petals to add a splash of fresh perfume to the home! Deadhead perennials and bedding plants to help preserve their energy and keep them blooming throughout the summer and into autumn.

Tie in twining climbers such as sweet peas and honeysuckle to keep the young growth tidy and damage free.

Protect ripening strawberry plants by surrounding them with straw or matting then covering with a net to ward off birds.

Pinch out the tops of flowering broad beans as blackfly like to congregate in the tips. If they have already appeared, spray with water or use soapy water to wash them away.

Deadhead roses and feed with a slow-release fertiliser to encourage a new flush of flowers.

Snip the flowering heads of garlic to ensure the energy is directed to the bulb as opposed to the seeds – and use the heads for cooking and steaming to add fabulous flavour to your dishes.

Whether you have a large or small garden, a patio, a balcony or no garden at all, hanging baskets brimming with cascading flowers and foliage will provide months of pleasure.

Incredibly versatile - baskets can be securely attached to the side of a house, from the beams of a pergola, fixed to a wall or suspend from a sturdy branch on a well-sited tree.

There are a vast range flowering plants that flourish exceptionally well in hanging baskets - and don't forget that hanging baskets are not restricted to the summer months - and eye-catching display of ivy, primulas, winter flowering pansies, bulbs and heather will offer a year round splash of colour

Your local garden village offers a beautiful selection of ready-planted hanging baskets, but if you would prefer to create your own this summer, then here are Colin the gardener's top tips...

Rest the basket on a reasonably large pot so that trailing plants hang down as you plant.

Line the basket using sphagnum moss or a readily available liner - and place a saucer in the bottom of the basket to help retain water.

Fill the basket using either a proprietary tub and basket compost that has water-retaining crystals or add tour own crystals to a good quality general purpose potting compost.

Mix slow-release fertiliser into the compost to ensure an even supply of plant food throughout the season (halffill the basket with compost if using a wire basket with a mix of flowering and foliage plants).

Gently tease the roots of a few trailing plants through the sides and then cover with compost.

Add the flowing plants as you work up the basket and 'round off' the top of the basket by placing a more upright plant in the centre.

Water thoroughly and set the basket out of direct sunlight for approximately one week before placing it in its final

A liquid feed once a week will also help to maintain your plants in peak condition.

Remember that the secret of successful hanging baskets is watering! A daily watering is essential, but the visual effects will make it all worthwhile!





CHANGES AT RADYR POST OFFICE

[Transcription of emails Frank Bowles/Cllr.Roderick McKerlick/Ms. A. Jogia, Programme Correspondence Team, Post Office Ltd/Frank Bowles]

Dear Sir

Having read and re-read your leaflet outlining the changes proposed for Radyr Post Office and realising it is not April 1st to be a prank letter, I write to ask who on earth could embark on such a ridiculous scheme that dispenses with decades of safety and security for Post Office valuables and staff.

Many decades ago when banks and post offices conducted their business across open counters, there came a time sadly when post office and bank staff became subjected to customer threats and sometimes criminal attempts of robberies. Fast moves were then made for these open counters to have aluminium screens fitted with security glass to be installed as quickly as possible to protect members of staff and also the financial goods and services that were sold by them.

By carrying out what you are proposing for Radyr Post Office you are basically dispensing with the safety protection for the staff and putting the financial service that they offer at risk of possible criminal attempts at robbery. At present the Radyr Post Office cashier is housed in a safely locked room with security screens protecting the cashier when transacting post office business through the screen. Quite a bit of letter mail and parcel mail is handed through the security screen into the room and held safely until taken away by the Royal Mail delivery van.

In your proposals the cashier and till will be moving to a shared open counter position with the normal counter staff of the newsagent who will have to lose one of their operating tills. Think of the chaos this move will generate, particularly when the shop is especially busy on lottery days etc., with only one operational till point to use. The gueues for the paper shop transactions create enough problems at present, even though the Post Office department queue area is in a separate part of the shop. Then comes the question of what happens to letter and parcel mail that has to be handed over the open counter to the cashier. Will there be a safety area for these items to be placed or will they have to be taken to the present locked room? If the present locked room is to be left in situ for this reason after the changes have taken place, then I see no logical reason at all for changing the present Post Office arrangement as your proposed changes will only bring a severe detrimental service to members of the public.

These changes will almost coincide with the closing of the Radyr bank that is housed in the same shopping area. Radyr has quite a large population of elderly people who normally pay cheques over the counter for various bills and this is one of the services to be lost with this change. I see no reason to change the Post Office working hours to what you propose from the present ones, especially since the early times are extremely busy for the newsagent who has the task of sorting out the daily papers for delivery, in addition to the counter service given to members of the public on their way to work. With many pensioners living in the Radyr area, they do not have access to or have a computer facility of their own to carry out the easily specified "on line banking" to pay their bills normally dealt with at the Radyr Post Office. In your letter of proposals you indicate that is not a problem because cheque transactions can be carried out in Whitchurch Post Office. Parking at Whitchurch is a massive problem at the moment for those with their own transport BUT what about the many residents of Radyr who have to use public transport when there is no "direct service" from Radyr to Whitchurch?

The more your ridiculous proposed scheme is examined, the more flaws one can find in this very ill-thought-out scheme. I am sure that many people have similar thoughts on this proposal to mine and I would very respectfully ask that a reassessment be made to safeguard the valuable service that we enjoy at the moment here in Radyr. In closing can I commend the excellent service given to the people who use the Radyr Post Office by the present cashier, Colleen.

As County Councillor for Radyr and Morganstown I am glad that you consulted me and hope that you take account of local views and rethink. As a businessman I am aware of the need for change and welcome attempts to improve the service or save money; I can not see that your proposal does either but it will give worse service in many ways, namely:

- There is inadequate space for two separate queues and the end of the queue will block the entrance
- There will be no privacy for your customers given the shortage of space

- The impending closure of the local bank will lead to greater use of the post office with ongoing need to pay bills by cheque
- The need to go to the former post office counter to deposit parcels and top up cash will slow service
- The safety of staff and clients is jeopardised by the handling of significant cash in a non-secure environment
- Early morning business will impact on paper delivery

This community does not want the commercial success of either its post office or newsagent to be undermined leading to closure. If we had no post office and this was a measure to provide one, I would support it; given the above arguments, however, I deplore your proposal and ask that you do not proceed.

Thank you for your email of 28 April about our plans to modernise Radyr Post Office. Your views are important to us and your comments have been noted and will be considered during the decision making process.

Post Office takes security matters very seriously and this aspect has been fully factored into the development stage of the local model. As with every branch in our network, strict guidelines and measures are put in place to safeguard customers, staff and the cash and stock entrusted to the operator's care. I hope you can appreciate that I can't go into specific details around our security arrangements; however, our security team review and complete an assessment before a decision is made to change any of our branches to open plan counters.

About mail handed in at the counter, please be assured that all operators and sub postmasters must take all reasonable precautions to safeguard the mail in their care and procedures are in place to ensure mail is held in a secure environment until it is collected by Royal Mail. I can confirm that this would be the case at Radyr Post

Your comments around queuing have been noted. The local format we are proposing for Radyr is designed around following simple processes for handling transactions that are as straightforward and quick as possible. This helps to minimise queues and provide an efficient and speedy service when dealing with our customers' transactions. As such, a small number of

services and products won't be available at local branches, but these are generally the more time consuming, complex or paper-based transactions.

We recognise that some customers, including the elderly, do prefer to use personal cheques. Whilst this form of payment isn't accepted at local format branches, there are alternative payment methods available including cash or debit card. Personal banking customers can also make free cash withdrawals at the counter. We do believe that this means most customers can continue to make payments in branch, although this may not be their personal preference.

In terms of the alternative suggested branch of Whitchurch Post Office, I note that most customers will have a good knowledge of the area and will know which local branches will best suit their individual requirements; however, we provide the details of alternative branches that offer the same services as Radyr post Office to ensure customers have access to all the services they are used to. We have over 780 local post office branches and customer and operator feedback is very positive. I hope my response has been helpful and thank you for taking the time to contact us.

Sadly though, on that day after sending you my letter, it was intimated to me by a reliable source that the contract for the proposed alteration to the Radyr Post Office had already been placed with a contractor.

CHANGES IN BUS SERVICE

[Transcription of letter from Peter Heath, Operations & Commercial Director, Cardiff City Transport Services Ltd., to Dr. R.S. Vaughan]

Dear Dr. Vaughan,

Thank you for your letter of 21 March concerning the change to services in Radyr and Morganstown from 20 April.

As I am sure you are aware, these changes are drive by the reduction in Welsh Government funding for the bus industry and are based on a study of the level of demand for services.

Unfortunately, whilst the level of demand for the service to Radyr estate is such that we can maintain the current level of service, that beyond to Morganstown and Ffordd Berllan is simply insufficient to warrant any more than the peak hour journeys on service 63 and the few journeys on service 66.

Extending service 63 beyond the Radyr estate is not feasible on a regular basis as the service does not have enough available time to do so and the level of potential use just would not cover the additional time costs of such an extension.

My apologies for the obvious problems this will cause, but the level of funding reduction is that we have had to take harsh cost cutting measures throughout the company.

Local Development Plan Update

For those of you who have been following the progress of Cardiff's Local Development Plan (LDP) you will know that it is something we take very seriously and are fighting hard to improve for the benefit of existing and new residents of NW Cardiff. By the time you read this, Cardiff's Cabinet will have met and made a recommendation to June's full council.

We have now met with senior Cardiff Council officers and the Cabinet member for the LDP, Cllr Patel. While it felt like a very open meeting Cardiff seems to be in denial about the, frankly, catastrophic implications of the LDP for NW Cardiff, the city as a whole and for SE Wales. The LDP goes to Cardiff's Cabinet on

June 12 and we were told to expect some amendments to the LDP re the Metro, but could be given no details.

However, it was made very clear that there will be no aligning development in the NW with the Metro and that a new bus will provide public transport in the meantime. We, along with Cardiff Civic Society, believe this is a disaster for the future of Cardiff. Cardiff Council seem totally focused on getting a sound plan adopted (with which we are sympathetic) but regardless of whether it is good for the city and its region or not.

We have also now met with Roger Lewis, Chairman of the Cardiff Capital Region Board. We had a very positive meeting and we made a very strong case that the LDP, as it stands, threatens the success of the Metro and other regional development. We explained how Cardiff Civic Society's idea for a new town could leverage finance for the

Metro and other infrastructure and that Cardiff Council said to us that this could not be done, which is simply not true. Mr Lewis found our arguments impressive and persuasive and reported back to his Board.

We have gone back to Mark Drakeford, AM to seek his advice because Cardiff Council appears not to be listening and the press have no interest in our case. It seems that it is now up to the Welsh Government to step in and take action on behalf of the city, wider region and SE Wales if we are to avoid a very costly and very embarrassing LDP.

We would like to thank Steve Dance, The Manager of Radyr Golf Club and all his hard working staff, who always give such tremendous support.

The following are just a few of the many programmes and initiatives carried out by the NSPCC.

The number of children counselled by Childline because their parents were drinking too much or taking drugs more than doubled last year. The numbers increased from 2,509 in the year 2012 to 5,323 in 2013.

Another new initiative is the NSPCC's underwear rule campaign called 'Talk Pants. A website has been set up to encourage parents and carers to have simple conversations with their children to keep them safe from abuse.

The NSPCC have worked with experts from Warwick Medical School and Great Ormond Street Hospital to create a powerful new film to help educate parents to cope with the stress of a crying baby and so reduce the risk of harming a child. This programme is to be extended to many more areas.

The last Friday in May saw yet another successful CIA Insurance Pro-Am held at Radyr Golf Club. 34 PGA professionals from South Wales and the West Region teamed up with amateur partners comprising of club members and local businesses.

driven by Steve, Chris and Neil. In the words of Zoe, our Festival Queen -


