To All Students, but Especially Seniors:

At meetings in Annapolis and Santa Fe in November and December, the faculty of the College accepted the proposal of the Instruction Committee to discontinue the granting of 'honors' degrees, that is, BA degrees cum laude, magna cum laude, and summa cum laude. Transcripts of records of graduates, beginning with the members of the graduating class of 1977, will carry the statement that, as a matter of College policy, St John's does not award honors degrees.

This decision comes out of a conviction that public praising ought to be an act of assurance and joy and shared understanding; and that we cannot do properly or well we should not attempt to do at all. At most colleges and universities, honors degrees are determined automatically on the basis of 'grade point averages'. The faculty at St John's has always refused to accord to grades the officially sanctioned importance that such a procedure would imply. In the absence of a mechanically applicable criterion, the faculty has found it exceedingly difficult, if not impossible, to arrive at judgements that all or most could regard as based on adequate knowledge and uniformly applied standards. Arbitrariness in the linear ranking of students, and in the drawing of a line between the rite and cum laude and the magna cum laude graduate, has seemed impossible to avoid. Too often final judgements have been reached amidst widespread feelings of doubt or resignation. As for the recipients, too often they have viewed the results as unfair or incomprehensible. These difficulties have loomed larger as the size of senior classes has increased. In brief, while in no way wishing to stint our praises for intellectual achievement, we have not found that the granting of honors degrees could be carried out with a sufficiently strict and clear justice.

Will the elimination of the honorific additions to the degree have an adverse effect on graduates seeking admission to graduate or professional schools or other preferment? We do not believe this to be a necessary consequence. Whatever function of this kind that the

honors degrees may have had, we believe it can be better fulfilled by individual letters of recommendation, which can be more specific and less subject to misinterpretation than the Latin adverbial phrases. The faculty takes seriously the task of preparing written recommendations, and encourages students not to be shy but to request such recommendations in all circumstances in which they are likely to be helpful.

Delegate Council Minutes—Jan 4th

Scott Cooper presents: Three people at Central Michigan University were thrown in jail (supposedly unconstitutionally) for selling literature concerning the Socialist Alliance in front of public buildings of the campus. Cooper claims several judicial precedents indicate they are being held illegally. He more or less seeks the DC endorsement of the political group (and all groups) right to free speech on college campuses. He wants the DC to send a telegram to the president of CMU demanding that he drop charges. Rote claimed the pro-socialist group pamphlets could be biased. He suggested the delegates canvass their dorms as to the students' feelings. It was suggested that the literature be posted in THE COLLEGIAN for the students to read. Feuchtenberger proposed that these sort of endorsements were out of the scope of DC business. Van der Veur moved we table until some more feedback



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from the student body is available. Approved: Tonjes and Davidson opposed.

Levine read his charter for a dart club with a gallery for throwing in Chase-Stone basement and the board to be kept by the archon. Approved unanimously. Fant moved we give \$25 for equipment. Unanimous. Levine as archon.

Free speech and academic freedom are under attack at Central Michigan University (CMU) in Mt Pleasant. The issues raised there are important to supporters of civil liberties everywhere.

On October 20, 1976, three members of the Young Socialist Alliance were arrested on the CMU campus while distributing literature for the Socialist Workers party 1976 presidential ticket outside a public meeting held for former CBS News correspondent Daniel Schorr.

The three YSAers face trumped-up charges of criminal trespass and occupying a university building by force. If convicted, each faces up to six months in jail and a fine of \$1650. Hundreds of books,

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pamphlets, brochures, and other literature confiscated at the time of arrest remain locked up in the county prosecutor's office.

The socialists attempted to comply with university regulations, but met only stepped-up harassment by campus administrators.

A week before the socialist campaign workers arrived on campus, a Republican state representative brought his re-election bid onto campus. In his case, the administration ignored their own rules and bent over backwards to accommodate him. The socialists, on the other hand, were arrested and treated like criminals.

It is clear that the aim of the CMU administration is to drive socialist ideas off campus. This is why the CMU bookstore, two days after the arrest, canceled the order they had just placed for socialist books from Pathfinder Press.

The university regulations used to frame the socialist campaigners are clearly unconstitutional. In fact, courts throughout the country have struck down similar regulations that attempt to prohibit sales and distribution of political literature through unreasonable restrictions.

A Texas court ruled in 1970 in New Left Education Project vs Board of Regents:

"...distributing literature which 'communicates thoughts between citizens, and discusses public questions,'...is speech and association primarily political...It is well settled law that campus regulations cannot be allowed to stand when they made enjoyment of first amendment contingent upon the will of an administration..."

An Arizona court in 1970 ruled in Jones vs Board of Regents:

"Once a state had made public property generally available to the public, it may not arbitrarily restrict the freedom of individuals, lawfully on that property, to exercise their first amendment rights."

It should be noted that the three YSA members are all students in the Michigan state university system.

Everyone who supports civil liberties has a stake in supporting this defense effort. The attempt to prosecute socialists under such regulations is part of a recent wave of attempts by university administrators across the country, and poses a national test for all civil libertarians.

If the university succeeds in gaining a conviction, a dangerous precedent will be

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set that could embolden university administrators throughout the nation to step up their attacks on civil liberties and political rights. This could lead to restrictions on what students may read, what courses professors can teach, on what speakers may be invited to campus.

The Committee for Free Speech has been formed to build support for the defense of the socialists. The committee seeks sponsorship from supporters of civil liberties, and from college and university student governments and faculties, throughout the country.

I have requested the Delegate Council, as the student government at St John's, to send a telegram to Central Michigan University president Harold Abel protesting the arrest and demanding that all charges be dropped. A pretrial hearing is scheduled for 20 January, and it is important that this telegram be sent before that date.

Talk to your delegate and tell them that you support the efforts of the Committee for Free Speech. On Tuesday, the DC will make a decision on supporting this crucial test of political rights for students.

The big sports news this week comes from an unexpected source...our Fitness Test! Yes, Dear Readers, we have finally obtained an updated, revised version of the test, which has already taken the place of the old test.

Those of you who could pass seven of the old tests, and then failed the Softball Throw, will be delighted to know that this part of the test has been dropped. Those women who have

zipped through (struggled through?... laughed through?) the "modified" push-ups and pull-ups will be pleased to note that these have been dropped also. A single test, known as the Flexed-Arm Hang, will take their place. Push-ups for men have also been abandoned...the thought being that pull-ups are sufficient to test arm and shoulder strength.

In line with the trend towards more running and jogging, the 1/2-mile run will take the place of the 600 yard run. Stamina is probably the single most important aspect of physical fitness. This can be tested more fairly over a longer distance.

The revised test contains six parts ...sit-ups, pull-ups (or flexed-arm hang), shuttle run, standing long jump, 50-yard dash, and 1/2-mile run. Under the new scoring system, it will be possible to average your particular scores to obtain a final test rating. Our inability to do this in the past had been a source of some discontentment.

Generally speaking, the standards for most tests are a little tougher, indicating that our young people are more fit than they were fifteen years ago. This is especially true for the women, where the standards have been significantly upgraded in many tests.

Since there have been so many changes, we have abolished our Christmas deadline (for this winter only). Anyone now who passes the first four tests by the Spring Vacation will be eligible to complete the test in the spring.


If you had already qualified in December, you must do so again by March. Certain tests are now done differently ...and in all tests the scoring and rating systems are different. So, even if you passed them before, you must repeat them.

Men who had trouble with pull-ups before will have more trouble now. It states explicitly in the new rules that the start is from a hanging position, and this position must be resumed after each pull-up. There is to be no swinging, no kicking, no jerking, etc., and the chin must go clearly over the bar. But, fear not...you still have two more months to practice and improve your performance. Seven pull-ups is still passing.

Women who are doubtful about their arm and shoulder strength should prac-


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tice the flexed-arm hang. Simply place yourself, with assistance if necessary, with your chin above the bar and hands gripping the bar with palms facing away from you. Now hold that position as long as you can. To pass, you must maintain it for at least eight seconds.

The 1/2-mile run will not be done until the spring. So you have several months to do those things which will improve your stamina...such as jogging frequently, eating infrequently, and giving up all of your bad habits. Good luck!
