Anything Worth Keeping Susan Green

A woman without a past – that's how Anne, Tom and Paula think of their stepmother, Bliss

Lying in a morphine-induced state in Heywood House, the now older and wiser Bliss reflects on her life. A somewhat exotic existence: starting in Melbourne and moving to an expatriate bohemian life in London in the 50s, followed by fame and fortune in the swinging 60s. A return to Melbourne and marriage to 'the grey man' gives her an instant family of four stepchildren. Their lives and loves, both past and present, unfold and are intertwined with her reveries.

It's dark in here, and light outside, and the bird is flying through the heart to the light, and the music is a golden spiral rising up, up from the flagstones and the tombs and the votive candles through the arches to the roof to the sky. The shimmering music and the heart and the bird pierce me, all at once. Suddenly I'm stripped of my reasons and my ready answers. I am here in the light naked and trembling with my heart wide open, and all the beauty and sadness and pity in the world flow through me, hurting and healing at the same time. I turn to Alec and his plain face in the light is beautiful, and I know then and there that he is going to be the love of my life. Not happily ever after, but for ever and ever, till death us do part, like all those husbands and wives whose lives and deaths are written here in stone...A promise. You will be my joy and my desire. I will love you. I will because I say I will.

This is a story about family, about choices and consequences, about self-deception and truth, about secrets and memory and love, told partly in Bliss's own outrageous voice, and partly from the point of view of the three children. As they all sort through memories and uncover long-hidden emotions, will they find anything worth keeping?

Susan Green has written more than ten books for children, both fiction and non-fiction. *The Truth About Verity Sparks* (Walker Books) was shortlisted for the Children's Book Council of Australia Awards in 2012 and is an Honour Book. It was also short listed for the Davitt Awards and soon to be published in the UK as *Diamonds and Deception*. Two more books in the Verity Sparks series have recently been published in ANZ.

Susan lives with her family in the historic gold-rush town of Castlemaine in Central Victoria and when not writing, works in the local bookshop. This is her first full-length adult work.

Not only that, but Julia has dreamed of running her own café, and she's just spotted a For Sale sign outside the prettiest little tea-room by the lake . . .


Julia is finally on the verge of the life she's always wanted.


Bella's Run

Germaine Greer is arguably the most significant and influential Australian woman of her time. She helped to change the lives of millions of women all over the world through her writing and public life. She is still a controversial figure, loved and hated with equal passion. There are many puzzles and as yet unanswered questions. She is a remarkably talented yet in many ways a lonely woman. As a famous celebrity people will want to read about what makes her tick.



The story has to be told, and told properly.

No, says Elizabeth, I'm not afraid of you, Germaine. Not yet!

The imminent release of Greer's archive is an opportunity not to be missed. Melbourne University did not spend 3 million dollars on it for no reason. The massive archive of over 150 filing cabinets is a mine of fresh information that is waiting to be revealed to the world.

Greer will turn 80 in three years' time and it is now possible to critically review her life and work over a long period.

One Would Think the Deep

Claire Zorn

It's 1997 and seventeen-year-old Sam is mourning the sudden loss of his mum. Sam has always had things going on in his head that no one else understands, not even his mum. And now she's dead, it's worse than ever.

With nothing but his skateboard and a few belongings in a garbage bag, Sam goes to live with the strangers his mum cut ties with seven years ago: Aunty Lorraine and his cousins Shane and Minty. Sam soon reverts to his childhood habit of



following Minty around and finds himself learning to surf in order to cut through the static fuzz in his head. But the days slowly meld into one another, and as ghosts from the past begin to reappear, Sam has to make the ultimate decision: will he sink, or will he swim?
