More Than You Want to Know About COLA For 2013 ... And Beyond.

2013 COLA SET -- Military and federal civilian retirees, survivor benefit annuitants, disabled veterans and Social Security recipients will see a 1.7 percent cost-of-living adjustment in January.

Annual COLAs for federal benefits are based on inflation, as tracked by the Bureau of Labor Statistics' Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W). This COLA was set by comparing average prices for a market basket of goods and services tracked by CPI-W in the third quarter of last year to average prices in the third quarter this year.

That comparison shows the CPI-W average of 223.23 for July through September 2011 has climbed to 226.94 for the third quarter this year, an increase of 1.66 percent, which the BLS rounded up to 1.7 percent.

BLS economist Steve Reed said food inflation was relatively modest at 1.6 percent. Gasoline prices are high today but also were high in the third quarter of last year, climbing by only 2.6 percent since last September. The price of durable goods, meanwhile, rose more modestly.

This COLA will be less than half of last year's 3.6 percent adjustment, after two years without a cost-of-living raise when consumer prices fell during the recession and collapse of U.S. housing and financial markets.

Various debt reduction studies including the 2010 report of the National Commission on Fiscal Responsibility and Reform, also known as the Simpson-Bowles commission, have proposed moving from CPI-W to a "chain-weighted" CPI for adjusting federal entitlement and retirement programs.

This would save an estimated \$200 billion over the next 10 years. Retirees can expect adoption of the chain CPI for Urban Consumers (C-CPI-U) to be floated again when Republicans

and Democrats resume negotiations on addressing the debt crisis.

If Congress had agreed to the chain CPI already, the COLA in January would be 1.5 percent rather than 1.7 percent.

Proponents argue that the chain CPI addresses "substitution bias" found in the CPI-W. That market basket of goods and services is weighted based on spending patterns of American workers. And every two years BLS conducts a separate survey to readjust how those goods and services are weighted in the basket.

What CPI-W doesn't do is change the mix of goods and services it surveys to reflect changes in spending behavior. For example, as the price of beef rises, consumers buy less beef and more chicken. CPI-W doesn't take account of that shift so, critics contend, it exaggerates inflation.

A chain CPI would capture changes in consumer behavior. But opponents of that index argue it ignores the fact that consumers might prefer beef to chicken. And so over time they could feel worse off financially with inflation adjustments shaped more by prices than by preferences.

Editor's Note: *Don't be fooled by the subtle change in the current CPI to the CPI-W. Using the 2013 COLA of 1.7%, the author calculates that it would be 1.5% using the proposed CPI-W — a "savings" of \$200 Billion over just the next 10 years. This "small change" over 30 to 45 years amounts to a real reduction in the value of disability, retirement, SBP, and Social Security payments.*

Directions to Ginnie Springs:

Getting to Ginnie Springs Outdoors from I-75, Heading North

Take I-75 north from Gainesville. Look for and take Exit 399 (the Alachua exit). From Exit 399, take US-441 north approximately five miles to the town of High Springs. At the first stop light in High Springs (at the Hardee's), turn left onto state road 27/41. Continue through the next stop light, at the center of town, and go approximately one-half mile on main street to County Road 340/NE 182nd Avenue.(You will see a sign on top of a pole indicating that this is the turn off for Ginnie, Blue and Poe Springs.) Turn right on to County Road 340 and go West approximately 6.5 miles, to the sign indicating the turn off to Ginnie Springs (NE 60th Ave.) Turn right at the sign (NE 60th Ave.) and go approximately one mile further to the Ginnie Springs Outdoors entrance. Ask for MOAA.

RETIREE HEARING AID ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

The DoD sponsored Retiree-At-Cost Hearing Aid Program (RACHAP) is designed to help retirees purchase hearing aids through the Military Hospital Audiology Clinic at a special government negotiated cost. The hearing aids available through this program are the same state-of-the art technologies available to active duty service members. *The program is open to all military retirees who have hearing loss or tinnitus (ringing in the ears).*

Dependents of military retirees are not eligible for this program. Retirees can buy hearing aids at a significant savings by using the program. For example, a set of hearing aids (one of the best available) that retails for about \$5000.00 costs a retiree as little as \$755.00 or about 15% of the retail costs.

Services for the hearing evaluation, hearing aid fitting and follow up hearing aid checks are part of the retiree benefits and are available at no costs to you.

Not every medical facility is able to provide the RACHAP program. If you are traveling from out of town, you need to compare your travel costs and purchase savings to the costs of purchasing hearing aids privately in your local community. Travel and overnight expenses are not covered.

Generally, at least 2 visits are required for you to get hearing aids; one for your hearing evaluation and one for your hearing aid fitting.

Also, retirees may be eligible for hearing aids from the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) and receive hearing aids from the VA free of charge – in most cases there is no costs to the patient. Locally, contact Malcom Randall VA Medical Center for information.

Veterans' Diseases Associated With Agent Orange — See page 8 for a list of Agent Orange related diseases. *Vietnam veterans, primarily, are presumed to have these diseases as a result of military service in Vietnam or Thailand. The presumptive "service connection" results in a relatively simple disability claim. Spouses of veterans who die from any of these diseases also are eligible for survivor benefits, including Dependency and Indemnity Compensation (DIC). Spouses of veterans receiving Survivor Benefit Plan (SBP) payments will have them offset by DIC payments.*

Agent Orange and Survivors' Benefits. VA offers a wide range of benefits to surviving spouses, dependent children and dependent parents of Veterans who were exposed to Agent Orange and died as the result of diseases related to Agent Orange exposure. Benefits include compensation and health care benefits.

Dependency and Indemnity Compensation . Surviving spouses, dependent children and dependent parents of Veterans who were exposed to Agent Orange and died as the result of diseases related to Agent Orange exposure may be eligible for a monthly payment called Dependency and Indemnity Compensation.

Survivors also may be eligible for Dependency and Indemnity Compensation if the Veteran died from other service-related injuries or diseases or was totally disabled from service-connected conditions for certain lengths of time at the time of death.

Health Care Benefits. Surviving spouses and children of Veterans who died from a VA-rated, service-connected disability may be eligible for health care benefits under the Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Department of Veterans Affairs (CHAMPVA).

Survivors also may be eligible for CHAMPVA if the Veteran was rated permanently and totally disabled from a service connected disability at the time of death. To be eligible for CHAMPVA, you cannot be eligible for TRICARE/CHAMPUS.

Editor's Note: In just the past 10 days, we have been able to pass on the information on Agent Orange to the spouse of a friend who served in Vietnam, and died from a cancer on the page 8 list. Another friend, with infantry experience in Vietnam, has just been diagnosed with prostate cancer, a cancer on the Agent Orange list. The *Eagles Eye* is publishing this information so that we all can help others in their time of need.

Medical Flash: Flu Information - When should I get vaccinated?

CDC recommends that people get vaccinated against influenza as soon as 2012-2013 flu season vaccine becomes available in their community. Influenza seasons are unpredictable, and can begin as early as October.

It takes about two weeks after vaccination for antibodies to develop in the body and provide protection against the flu.

Doctors and nurses are encouraged to begin vaccinating their patients as soon as flu vaccine is available in their areas, even as early as August. Malcom Randall VA Medical Center will be offering flu shots to veterans at the Veterans Day ceremony at Kanapaha Veterans Memorial Park. The ceremony begins at 10:30am on Sunday, 11 November.

Veterans' Diseases Associated With Agent Orange [Continued From Page 7]

VA assumes that certain diseases can be related to a Veteran's qualifying military service. We call these "presumptive diseases." VA has recognized certain cancers and other health problems as presumptive diseases associated with exposure to Agent Orange or other herbicides during military service. Veterans and their survivors may be eligible for disability compensation or survivors' benefits for these diseases.

- **AL Amyloidosis**
A rare disease caused when an abnormal protein, amyloid, enters tissues or organs
- **Chronic B-cell Leukemias**
A type of cancer which affects white blood cells
- **Chloracne (or similar acneform disease)**
A skin condition that occurs soon after exposure to chemicals and looks like common forms of acne seen in teenagers. Under VA's rating regulations, it must be at least 10 percent disabling within one year of exposure to herbicides.
- **Diabetes Mellitus Type 2**
A disease characterized by high blood sugar levels resulting from the body's inability to respond properly to the hormone insulin
- **Hodgkin's Disease**
A malignant lymphoma (cancer) characterized by progressive enlargement of the lymph nodes, liver, and spleen, and by progressive anemia
- **Ischemic Heart Disease**
A disease characterized by a reduced supply of blood to the heart, that leads to chest pain
- **Multiple Myeloma**
A cancer of plasma cells, a type of white blood cell in bone marrow
- **Non-Hodgkin's Lymphoma**
A group of cancers that affect the lymph glands and other lymphatic tissue
- **Parkinson's Disease**
A progressive disorder of the nervous system that affects muscle movement
- **Peripheral Neuropathy, Acute and Subacute**
A nervous system condition that causes numbness, tingling, and motor weakness. Currently, it must be at least 10 percent disabling within one year of herbicide exposure and resolve within two years. VA proposed on Aug. 10, 2012, to replace "acute and subacute" with "early-onset" and eliminate the requirement that symptoms resolve within two years.
- **Porphyria Cutanea Tarda**
A disorder characterized by liver dysfunction and by thinning and blistering of the skin in sun-exposed areas. Under VA's rating regulations, it must be at least 10 percent disabling within one year of exposure to herbicides.
- **Prostate Cancer**
Cancer of the prostate; one of the most common cancers among men
- **Respiratory Cancers (includes lung cancer)**
Cancers of the lung, larynx, trachea, and bronchus
- **Soft Tissue Sarcomas (other than osteosarcoma, chondrosarcoma, Kaposi's sarcoma, or mesothelioma)**
A group of different types of cancers in body tissues such as muscle, fat, blood and lymph vessels, and connective tissues

Children with Birth Defects: VA presumes certain birth defects in children of Vietnam and Korea Veterans associated with Veterans' qualifying military service. **Veterans with Lou Gehrig's Disease:** VA presumes Lou Gehrig's Disease (amyotrophic lateral sclerosis or ALS) diagnosed in **all** Veterans who had 90 days or more continuous active military service is related to their service, although ALS is not related to Agent Orange exposure.
