	AQA GCSE	Edexcel GCSE
Description:	GCSE Chinese (Mandarin) helps students develop their Mandarin language skills in a variety of contexts and a broad understanding of the culture of countries and communities where Mandarin is spoken. It encourages enjoyment of language learning and the recognition that language skills enable students to take their place in a multi-lingual global society. GCSE Chinese (Spoken Mandarin) has a Foundation Tier (grades 1–5) and a Higher Tier (grades 4–9). Students must take all four question papers (listening, speaking, reading and writing) at the same tier. All question papers must be taken in the same series.	Edexcel Level 1/Level 2 GCSE in Chinese enables the students to manipulate and use the target language effectively, independently and creatively, so that they have a solid basis from which to progress to A Level or employment. It allows students to develop their ability to communicate with Chinese native speakers in both speech and writing. Students will study across a variety of contexts relevant to their age and interests and will also develop a greater awareness of the culture of Chinese-speaking communities and countries.

Paper 4: Writing Questions Foundation Tier

- Question 1 message (student produces four items in response to a photo) – 8 marks
- Question 2 short passage (student writes a piece of continuous text in response to four brief bullet points, approximately 20 characters in total) - 16 marks
- Question 3 translation from English into Chinese (Mandarin) (minimum 20 words) - 10 marks
- Question 4 structured writing task (student responds to four compulsory detailed bullet

The assessment will be available in Mandarin and Cantonese.

Paper 3: Reading and understanding

Students are assessed on their understanding of written Chinese across a range of different types of texts, including advertisements, emails, letters, articles and literary texts.

Section A is set in English. The instructions to students are in English.

Section B includes a translation passage from Chinese into English with instructions in English.

Paper 4: Writing

Students are required to produce responses of varying lengths and types to express ideas and opinions in Chinese. The instructions to students are in English. Character counts are specified for each question. Students must answer all questions.

There are three open-response questions and one translation into Chinese.

Testing approach

Question type:

- Focus on a more global Chinese context (Mainland China, Hong Kong and Singapore for example).
- A small number of classical texts are used (e.g. see appendix)
- Functional writings (the writing of notes, letters for example) are tested.

Requirement for participants:

• AQA GCSE Chinese requires the choice of ABCD, and the writing of English and Chinese characters.

Question type:

- Focused on themes
- Only modern Chinese is tested
- Translation is tested
- (Modern) functional writing is tested: writing a short post, email, letter etc.

Requirement for participants:

• Edexcel GCSE requires the participants to answer questions in different formats and in English and Chinese characters.
