WHO ARE WE? We are a local group of aquatic enthusiasts. Formed in 1952, the Greater Akron Aquarium Society is a non-profit, non-commercial organization. Our membership ranges from the beginning hobbyist to the advanced aquarist with many years of experience. The goals of our club are to promote the care, study, breeding and exhibition of aquarium related aquatic life and to promote interest in the aquarium hobby.

MEETINGS: Our meetings are held on the second Friday of each month at 8:00 p.m. at the Ritchie Memorial Shelter House, 109 West Avenue, Tallmadge, OH 44278. It is located West of Tallmadge Circle with access from Sperry Ave., behind Vet Clinic and across from the Chevrolet dealer. Visitors are always welcome, it costs absolutely nothing to attend a meeting and look us over.

MEMBERSHIP: The cost is only \$10 for adults, a couple or a family (includes children under 10 years of age) and \$5.00 for a junior membership (10 to 17 years) Membership provides an opportunity to socialize with others that share your interests, a subscription to our bi-monthly magazine and more.

AGENDA: Our meeting agenda is simple and informal. The meeting will begin at 8:00 p.m. with a short business meeting. Immediately following is the program for the evening which usually lasts about 45 minutes. Our programs consist of a speaker, slide program, movie or perhaps a panel discussion always on a particular subject related to the hobby or various species of fish. Following the program is a short refreshment break. After which the winners of the Bowl Show are announced, the Breeder's Award Program fish are auctioned and tickets are drawn for the raffle.

THE BOWL SHOW: Each month members can bring in fish for specific classes to compete for first, second and third place awards. The charge for each entry is only \$.25. Members also compete for annual awards by accumulating wins throughout the year.

BREEDER'S AWARD and HORTICULTURE AWARD PROGRAMS: members can receive recognition for spawning species of fish or propagating aquatic plants. All that is required is to turn in a minimum of six fry from the spawn that are between 30 and 90 days old. Members earn certificates for each species and can work towards plaques in different categories.

EQUIPMENT RAFFLE: The raffle table has such items as tanks, fish food and aquarium accessories that are donated by national manufacturers, area dealers or purchased by the Society. Tickets may be purchased by anyone attending the meeting. Save your losing tickets for the Christmas Party raffle.

ANNUAL SHOW: The Ultra-Aqua show is held during the summer at the Tallmadge community Center. This has become one of the largest all-species tropical fish shows in North America. It is an international gathering of hobbyists to display their fish in class competition, talk fish and to learn about the hobby from each other.

TANK TOPICS: is published on a bi-monthly basis for the members of the Greater Akron Aquarium Society. Articles and comments for this publication are welcome and encouraged. Such articles are to be submitted no later than the board meeting prior to publication. All articles may be reprinted as long as the author(s) and GAAS are given proper credit. 



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Air Manifold Workshop



The Greater Akron will be hosting a build an air manifold workshop at the July meeting. Since members' needs are different, we will assist each member that attends and wants to make a manifold in building a customize manifold for their fish room. In order to make this fair the value of the manifold will be determined by the workshop presenters. GAAS will offer a \$10 discount for each paid member.

If you want to build a manifold, you need to contact Rich Serva or Bud White at least 14 days in advance of the meeting. To ensure that you get what you need please let us know if you want to build a manifold that is longer than 2 feet. This also applies to the number of valves/nipples needed for your manifold.

Schedule 80 pipe is thicker walled and works better for mounting the valves/nipples directly on the pipe. Straight saddles are ½ inch threaded and are a great alternative to threading a hold drilled into the pipe. You can use schedule 40 pipe if you plan to use a saddle.

To help you estimate the cost for your manifold use the values listed below.

- * ½ inch schedule 80 pipe 2 feet for \$1
- * ½ inch schedule 40 pipe 3 ft for \$1
- * 3/4 inch schedule 80 pipe 1 ft for \$1
- * 3/4 inch schedule 40 pipe 2 fr for \$1
- * Nickel plated lever valve with straight port, 1/4 inch threaded for pipe connection \$2 ea (if available)
- * Nickel plated lever valve, 1/8 inch self-threading for pipe connection \$1.30 ea
- * Plastic valve, ¼ inch threaded for pipe connection \$1 ea
- * Plastic nipple, 1/4 inch threaded for pipe connection \$0.25 ea
- * ½ inch Pipe saddles with ¼ inch threaded valve connection \$1 ea
- * 3/4 inch Pipe saddles with 1/4 inch threaded valve connection \$1 ea

Feed and maintain your fish however you normally do, but keep some records (tank size, water changes, feeding etc.) This will allow the winner to pass along to other members what worked for them.

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Mortality in the tank

A couple of weeks ago on a Thursday evening, my gold marble angelfish did not look quite right at all. I could tell there was something apparently wrong with the fish, so I grabbed the fish net and I poked him slightly. He moved a little. I did not believe in euthanizing him in a ziplock freezer bag. The gold marble angelfish did die overnight even though I offered him a variety of food, sometimes a high protein diet.

During the summer of 2015, I could tell there was something wrong with my *Aulonocara jacobfreigergi* female. There was plenty of aeration in the aquarium but she was behaving very strangely in my 20 gallon low aquarium. So, I netted her out, she jumped around in the net, threw here in the freezer bag and placed her in the freezer.

No matter how a fish dies it was a loss. I admit I cried about 20 minutes when I knew the angelfish would not

make it.

Never flush any tropical fish down the toilet.



Breeding Pearl Gouramis

The Pearl Gourami is a pretty anabantid which can be spawned with little difficulty. This fish has a beautiful pearl coloration which adds to the attractiveness of the fish. The male's coloration is usually more intense that the female's. These fish belong to the anabantid family and reach a length of about four inches. These fish generally breed best at a temperature of about eighty degrees fahrenheit.

Breeding pearl gouramis wasn't very difficult. They spawn just like all other anabantids, with the male blowing a nest of bubbles, into which he puts the eggs. Once the nest is blown and the female has swelled with eggs the actual spawning takes place. The male wraps his body around the female's and starts squeezing her until she releases a few eggs. These eggs float to the top, the male quickly release the female and begins to gather the eggs. He blows each egg into it's own individual bubble. The male then squeezes the female again and this process repeats itself until the female is depleted of eggs. After the spawning has taken place it is best to remove the female or the male is most likely to kill her. The male tends

to the nest repairing any bubbles which burst. The fry can be hatched without either parent present. Simply leave the nest float in the tank and the fry will hatch out o their own. If for some reason the nest is disturbed the eggs will float and they will still hatch. The eggs hatch in about four days and the

fry are very small. I fed these fry on liquid-fry, sponge filter squeezings and pulverized spinach. The fry grow rapidly as long as they are supplied with plenty of food.

The other cause for losses is the failure to keep the aquarium covered with glass during the critical period when the labyrinth is forming, for this organ does not begin to develop until the fish is about three weeks old. At this time they are particularly sensate to draughts and temperature changes. If the surface of the water is at II dirty or filmy it should be frequently cleaned by drawing a piece of newspaper across it.

If you are looking for an easy gourami to spawn, try the pearly gourami it should prove to be very rewarding.
